John Edward Taylor (November 8, 1930 - March 16, 2025) A Remembrance by Carol Jean Beard, BRN 8150

John Taylor was a man of many abilities. He was a salt of the earth gentleman. He wasn't pretentious. He was himself...not out to impress anyone and yet left a memorable impression on those who knew him. At age 94, John died in March. It is a privilege for me to be eulogizing John. He and Alice joined WBCCI and the Michigan Unit in 1994.



Our first experience with WBCCI was a Buddy Rally in Mason, Michigan. As it turns out, the couple from the Unit that had invited us to the buddy rally couldn't attend. When we arrived at the rally alone with our Lance camper on the back of an old Chevy dually truck (to attend a buddy rally one does not have to own an Airstream), John was the first person we met. He was the "Welcome to the Rally" greeter. He asked us if we were looking for someone. We proceeded to tell him that we were invited to this Airstream Buddy Rally but that our buddies were not able to attend. We then told John that I was Velma Clark's daughter. He said, "Velma's daughter!" From that moment on, we were in. We have been members of WBCCI since 2006 John made us feel so welcome!

It was at that Buddy Rally that we decided we were going to buy a used Airstream and join the fun! As a side comment, our buddies weren't my folks as would seem logical, but were mutual friends of my folks and us...Art and Mary Jane Thayer. At that point my mom, Velma Clark, had died and my step-dad, Ralph Clark, wasn't attending many WBCCI functions being by himself and all.

I shall always miss John. John possessed strong Christian faith. He often said grace at our rallies before meals. His prayers were so deep and heart-felt. John loved Biblical history. It inspired him to travel to Jerusalem. He even learned Hebrew. He built, to scale, a replica of Solomon's Temple. The hours and intensity of building something like that is unimaginable. It is now permanently on display at the Masonic Temple in Battle Creek, Michigan. It's unbelievable that anyone could build a replica so exact and so beautiful.

John was a proud veteran having served our country as a Marine. Education was very important to John. He went back and finished his high school education graduating in his early 40's.

At our rallies, Alice was always busy volunteering with this and that. John was always there sitting quietly close by. He enjoyed their trailer and worked on improving things to make it more comfortable and homey. With his hands folded in front of him, he would walk around the campground and meditate. John was comfortable within himself. He knew who he was. I believe his nature walks brought him closer to his Maker. In that regard, he brought a relaxed, no hurry presence of peace which I found so appealing. In my opinion, in our hurried society, slowing down and smelling the roses, needs to be our goal.

John helped park our trailers when we arrived at the rallies. He offered to help whenever and wherever he was needed. He was also very non-controlling of Alice who loved to play Joker or cribbage when all the rally activities were done for the night. He would go back to the trailer and go to bed while Alice, others and I joined together to play Joker, etc. As an added comment, Alice, bless her heart, would then be up very early getting the coffee started for our complimentary breakfast. The memories are so vivid and special.

John's mind started to go a few years ago. When we visited them he would often say my name. "Carol Jean Beard" in his deep voice and would always extend love with a big hug. As I stated before I shall always miss John. His reading the Bible, playing the piano (which he taught himself how to play), singing hymns, sharing wonderful meals, going on rally tours together. He was a self-made man who earned and deserved respect. For me...to know John was to love John.

Our Airstream Safari By John & Anne Williams, BRN #1997

Our Airstream is a 1997, 25-foot rear bed queen. Safari that we purchased lightly used in 1998. The original owners traded it back to the dealer for a 30-footer, which I've learned is a fairly common occurrence in the Airstream world.

I became part of the Airstream family. in 1983, through my marriage to Anne. Anne's Grandparents had a 32-foot Land Yacht which her parents inherited when she was a child. Anne grew up traveling and camping with that Airstream. When she and her brother outgrew camping trips with the family her parents downsized from the 32-foot Land Yacht to a 23-foot Safari which they had when we were married. Through the generosity of my in-laws, we used the Airstream a few times at our local campgrounds and even lived in it temporarily while building our first house. It was during this time that I became aware of how special Airstream trailers are. When we started talking about getting a camper, we both wanted an Airstream.



During this same time period I was active in the local sportsmen's club and while attending a club function one of my fellow competitors overheard me talking about shopping for an Airstream camper. He said his parents had an Argosy he was selling for them. The price was right and in 1987 we were the proud owners of a 1979 24-foot Argosy made by Airstream. We loved camping in that Argosy, but as much as we liked the Argosy, we didn't really care for the floor plan so the hunt for our Airstream continued but at a much more subdued pace.

Jump forward 11 years and while traveling through Ohio on I-75 north of Dayton we noticed a RV dealer with many Airstreams on his lot so we stopped, just to look around. After checking out most of the Airstreams and exchanging contact information with the salesperson I explained we didn't see what we were looking for on the lot. About three months later I received a call from the salesperson telling me they had a couple of trailers with the floor plan we wanted. In October of 1998, and a quick trip back to Dayton, we traded our Argosy in and became the caretakers of our 25-foot Airstream Safari.

Looking back as we roll into our 26th summer with our Safari, we have taken the Airstream to almost every National Park west of the Mississippi and several on the east side. It has made the Lake Superior circle tour and been on so many camping trips around the Great Lakes we've lost track. We were living in Michigan when we purchased the Safari and spent a dozen years boondocking for two weeks in the wilds of Wyoming, in October. Then a week in central South Dakota on the way home. After transferring to Colorado, for work in 2001, we started doing the opposite. Hauling the trailer back to Michigan in September for a couple months then back to Colorado. Most of our camping in Colorado was boondocking in the mountains on the National Forest or BLM lands. Now as we get older, most of our camping is in developed campgrounds for the convenience of hookups. After our retirement we moved back to Michigan in 2019.

Our Airstream Safari By John & Anne Williams, BRN #1997



Fortunately, I'm able to do most of my own maintenance and repair work on the Safari and over the years I have fixed all the little things that have gone wrong as well as added a few upgrades. This changed when for the first time since we bought the trailer. I had to schedule a repair I didn't feel comfortable doing myself. The grey water tank had developed a serious leak and without knowing exactly what the problem was, this was a much bigger job than I wanted to tackle. I opted to take it to Jackson Center because I thought they would have more experience with a vintage trailer than most of the dealers. In mid-March I towed the trailer to the Airstream repair facility at Jackson Center. As it turned out the dump valves were just worn out and needed replacing. I'm very happy with my decision to go to Jackson Center and the service they provided. While at the service center the repair staff kept coming over to take photos of our Safari and when I asked what was going on they said our Safari is part of a very limited production run and was quite rare. Many of the service people said this was the first one they had seen and were surprised at its good condition. In addition to the repair

work we learned that our Safari was special to more than just us.

This was the first time during our ownership that our Safari needed to be taken to an Airstream repair facility. After all the years and all the miles, it wasn't that we never had anything fail, we just never had anything serious break or fail that I couldn't repair to keep our Safari on the road until now. That's a pretty outstanding record for a 28-year-old Airstream and I hope it's good for another 20 plus years. But that's what makes an Airstream special.



Apparently, I Camp by Steve & Jennifer Lee

Steve:



Growing up, a vacation usually meant getting in the car and heading North to the cabin or a road-trip to see out-of-state family or friends. The road trips included resorts, museums and theme parks along the way. For us, roughing it was a hotel that didn't have its own restaurant! I don't camp.

Jennifer:

I camp; I have always camped. Springtime found me under the lilac bush "camping" in the backyard. Winter camping was in the comfort of the living room under a tent of blankets draped over chairs. I camped before I knew I was camping. As an infant, I'm told, I was a charter member of Michigan's first chapter of the National Campers and Hikers Association (N.C.H.A.), Tails-A-Wagon. I slept in the front dinette bed of a tiny Airstream, Sis beside me and my brother in a bassinet at our feet. Breakfast was served on the oven door pulled down to make a table for Sis and me.

Steve:

I think I slept in a tent on three occasions. 1) My cousin's house caught fire, and we got to "camp out" while his parents stayed in a camper during reconstruction. 2) Our church youth group camped at Cedar Point one summer. 3) A group of us teenagers took a tent up with motorcycles to ride in northern MI. None of these experiences left me wanting to do more as I don't camp.

Jennifer:

In the late 1960s, early 70s I "camped" in the trailers at Northwoods RV Sales in Mt. Morris, Michigan and later at Chilson's All Seasons Trailers Sales where Dad was salesperson and owner respectively. All Season's Travelers became another N.C.H.A. unit my family helped charter.
