There are several groups we would like to thank. We want to express our appreciation to the Executive Committee for their support of our Club and us. Next, thank you Region Officers, Standing Committee Chairs, Unit Officers and all Club volunteers. We are an all-volunteer organization and share in the tasks of making our events special. Our Caravans and Rallies are the Heart of the Airstream Club. A special thanks to all those members who have "stepped up" to help us in many different ways. Many of those volunteers have utilized their special skills they achieved in previous careers and life experiences. The help of all of these members are mandatory for our Club to continue to grow and attract new members. Remember, we are all "family" with a special interest in "Airstreaming".

Last but certainly not least; we would like to thank the extremely capable staff at Jackson Center for their assistance whenever the need arises.

- A new procedure was implemented at mid-winter IBT. The seminars that preceded the IBT meetings have been incorporated within the IBT meeting. It allows for more interaction from our members as well as reducing the number of meetings from six to
- At the January International Board of Trustees meeting in Robertsdale, a project was approved to design and launch a new website. The new design is planned to significantly improve user experience and will allow use across smartphones, tablets and desktop computers.

Karen and I are looking forward to meeting everyone who attends our Rally at Doswell, VA. This is going to be an exciting rally where we will have the opportunity to have a reunion of old friends and experience meeting and making new friends while attending various seminars. tours and evening entertainment. The Pt of AIRSTREAM COOKING Gina Eggers, #3732



I've been experimenting with the 3 quart Instant Pot, and contrary to my expectations, I really like it. I think it's a useful substitution for multiple appliances in the Airstream. Since I already have a crockpot, a rice cooker, a pressure cooker and numerous saute pans and steamers, the idea of adding another appliance made little sense. And summer makes me long for raw foods and cold meals. Nothing beats a freshly sliced cucumber in creamy tzatziki sauce, or a ripened fruit salad made with juicy peaches, cold watermelon and bright red strawberries, tossed with a light dressing of honey yogurt and sprinkled with

walnuts. But on cold or rainy days, a warm meal is a blessing. And to come home from a hike, kayak or bike ride to find dinner ready and waiting is heaven.

There are numerous(!) cookbooks on the Instant-Pot, and to give it a fair test, I purchased a boatload of them. I am a testing (and eating) my way through them. I am an advocate for cookbooks, especially in the RV when there is often no internet or cell coverage. A cookbook can not only be an inspiration for dinner (or

dessert), it can give you new techniques and ingredients you haven't cooked with. The recipe for this month was taken to an Airstream rally pot-luck at Peninsula State Park in Fish Creek, WI. It was adapted from a book called "Cooking with Your Instant Pot Mini" by Heather Schlueter. It is a Sloppy Joe, tangy and sweet. Served with a side of coleslaw or potato salad, it makes a nice meal. If you don't own an Instant Pot, this is easily made in a saute pan or Dutch oven. Saute everything in your pan and let simmer until thickened.

Tangy Sloppy Joes

- Select saute function to heat the pot. When the display reads "hot", add 1T of oil. Add 1 stalk of chopped celery, ½ chopped onion, 2 cloves of minced garlic and 1 lb. of beef, turkey or meat substitute (such as Beyond Meat crumbles). Stir and cook until meat is no longer pink.
- Add ½ cup of water, 1 can crushed tomatoes, ½ cup ketchup, 2 T tomato paste, 2 T Worcestershire sauce, 1 T red wine vinegar, a dash or two of hot pepper sauce (optional), 1 T brown sugar, 1 tsp dried oregano, 1 tsp salt and ½ tsp black pepper. Press the pressure cook button and set the time to 5 minutes.
- Once cooking is complete, let pressure release naturally.
 Press cancel to turn off and carefully remove the lid. Select "saute" function and simmer until thickened.

Streamin on the Harbor

Georgetown, South Carolina

The stage was set.....a historic town on the Sampit River which flows into Winyah Bay, 58 enthusiastic Airstreamers, mild temps and "Streamin on the Harbor" was ready to begin. A combined Unit and National/Special Event Rally sponsored and organized by the SC Coastal Airstream Club and orchestrated by Henry Knight, was about to begin. We gathered Thursday night at Carroll A. Campbell Marine Complex outside of Georgetown,

South Carolina. After a rousing welcome and a dinner provided by Rally Sponsor Bojangles of Georgetown, a night in SC would not be complete without a few shag dance lessons to set the mood. As the music played, attendees from North Carolina, South Carolina, Florida, Georgia, Alabama & New York socialized.

Georgetown, being the 3rd oldest city in South Carolina, was founded in 1729 with rice and indigo exports as its lifeblood. It was an official Port of Entry in 1732 and by 1840 Georgetown County produced ½ of the total rice crop in the US, and exported more than any other port in the world. Due to poor crops, competition and changing social norms, the Civil War signaled the end of rice production in Georgetown County. The area gradually re-invented itself and found economic stability once again through forest products. In the early 1900's timber was king and Georgetown

had the largest lumber producing plant on the east coast. By the 30's the lumber industry was waning but other industries moved in to sustain the economic picture. The International Paper Company still operates there today. Commercial shrimping, a steel mill and most recently tourism have all contributed to the vitality of the city.

Under a light 'mood setting' fog on Friday morning, the Airstreams moved to East Bay Park in Georgetown in preparation for our police escorted 'Cruise Through' on Front Street. Flags flying from 27 trailers made their way through town alongside the harbor, representing the following Airstream clubs: SC Coastal, Big Bend, FL, Carolinas, Piedmont NC, Palmetto State, New York Finger Lakes and Southeastern Camping Unit. What fun to have the locals calling 'Welcome' from the sidewalks and taking photos and video. Police Chief Waites and his officers made our transition into town flawless. 



It was an homage to the classic Airstream Bambi of the 1960s — one of the world's first single-axle, self-contained 16-foot travel trailers.

Now, the all new 2020 Airstream Bambi will continue that legacy with four single-axle models: 16RB, 19CB, 20FB, and 22FB. Ideal for the new owner who wants to get into the Airstream lifestyle, the Bambi line offers an affordable price point while preserving Wally's promise of travel with "all the comforts of home."

The 16 Sport Bambi has been the #1 selling Airstream floor plan since 2014, proving that today – just as it was in 1961 – small Airstreams packing a ton of adventure are still popular.

"Bambi both honors the past and looks to the future," said Bob Wheeler, Airstream President and CEO. "We've known for a while that our single-axle travel trailers were popular. Now we have even more options with a variety of decors, lengths, floor plans, and price points."

Bambi isn't the only throwback in 2020. With the new 2020 Airstream Caravel line, owners get the same four single-axle options – 16RB, 19CB, 20FB, and 22FB – but with added features and amenities previously unavailable in such a small package. Striking decor options bring modern style to Caravel, while high-end fixtures and appliances ensure Caravel sails beyond expectations.

"With Caravel, we found a way to incorporate luxury and style that before now was only available in some of our large, dual-axle models," said Justin Humphreys, Airstream COO. "I think people are going to be blown away by these new floor plans and the range of amenities they'll find inside."

Both Bambi and Caravel offer lightweight options and the ease-of-towing one expects from a single-axle model, and the iconic Airstream riveted aluminum exterior. And with the introduction of both these lines, the single-axle Flying Cloud, International, and Sport models will phase out.

Since 2007 a Bambi has been housed in the permanent collection of the Museum of Modern Art for excellence in style and design. MOMA states: "With its aerodynamic body of gleaming aluminum, the Bambi is a machine for living and traveling. As a cultural icon, the Bambi evokes the freedom of the open road and the convenience and comfort of a home on wheels."

Inspiration from Yesteryear

The original 16-foot Bambi was introduced in 1961. It was a revolutionary lightweight, single axle travel trailer. According to its introductory sales letter, the Bambi was named after a miniature deer called "O'Mbambi" in the Umbundu dialect of the Bantu language. The indigenous people of Angola admired the deer because of its speed, fantastic stamina, and sure-footedness. When Wally returned from the famous Cape Town to Cairo Caravan (1959-1960), he felt that the name would be perfect for this "small car Airstream."

The Bambi was self-contained and able to be towed by a compact car. Smaller cars were becoming popular in the 1960s and Airstream was quick to respond to this need. The prototype was put through a series of tests to prove that, like any Airstream, it could truly travel anywhere. The Bambi was advertised as a scaled-down replica of a larger Airstream with the same dedication to quality and efficiency of space.

The 1961 features included: Dura-Torque axles with rubber torsion bars (standard on all models by that point), 2 cu. ft. gas refrigerator, single sink with double faucet, sealed-unit gas space heater, 20 gal. pressure water tank, 12V compressor, toilet, shower, septic tank, 3 burner surface mounted cooking unit, 4 full-opening windows, convertible lounge, hardwood furniture, Formica covered folding table, and a match-light gas water heater.

The 16-foot Bambi was produced from 1961-1963 with a 7-panel end shell. It attracted new customers with a variety of smaller tow vehicles who were looking to take shorter trips. It was replaced in 1964 by the 1-foot Bambi II with a 5-panel end shell. The Bambi would ultimately be replaced in the model line-up by the 17-foot Caravel in 1965.

The Caravel model name first appeared throughout the mid 1950s and into the early 1960s on certain 18-foot models made in Ohio with particular options or features.

A caravel was a type of sailing ship used in Europe throughout the 15th-17th centuries. An Airstream model name with a nautical theme was not surprising given Wally Byam's love for the sea. Growing up, he served as a cabin boy, sailing up the Pacific Coast from Oregon to Alaska. He joined the Seaman's Union in 1918 and spent his college summers on a freighter in the Pacific Ocean. This love for the sea and sailing would stay with him throughout his life.

In fact, Wally often used nautical names for products including Clipper, Trade Wind, Flying Cloud, Liner, and Land Yacht. In addition, many of the interior components of Airstreams were often referred to by nautical names, such as galleys or bulkheads.

A 1961 brochure from Ohio lists the 18-foot Caravel as the "model of economy and efficiency."


"Every inch has been engineered to give maximum livability in minimum length, without sacrificing any of the basic Airstream features of construction and comfort," the brochure reads. The 1961 18-foot Caravel had a unique layout with the galley sitting crossways in the trailer to allow for a rare street-side bed. Its features included: a double bed, convertible lounge, Dura-Torque axles, hardwood furniture, 3 burner range, oven, 4 cu. ft. ice electric refrigerator, porcelain single sink, sealed-unit butane heater, toilet, 3 position folding table, 5 full-opening windows, touch control built in step, 12V battery light, and a trunk compartment in rear.

After replacing the Bambi in 1965, the 17-foot Caravel was the shortest travel trailer offering through 1968. The 1965 brochure lists it as "the first travel trailer big enough for a family of six but light enough to be towed with compact car."

It had the same quality features and "go-anywhere" construction of a larger Airstream including: two double beds and two optional fold-up bunks, full size Formica topped galley with 3 burner range, full size bathroom with toilet, sink, and shower, table that accommodates 6 and disappears when not in use, and plenty of storage space. In addition, the 1965 Caravel was self-contained with hot and cold water, heat, refrigeration, and Uni-Volt lighting. After the 1969 model change, the Caravel gained a foot and the 18-foot model was offered through 1971.

After these early models, an Airstream travel trailer below 20 feet did not appear again until the Bambi 19 of 1998-2002. In 2002, it was joined by a 16-foot model, at which point the name Bambi was applied to any single axle travel trailer.

The Bambi has always been a favorite among Airstreamers. In the 1960s, it was the perfect solution for those looking for a travel trailer that could be towed by a compact, more fuel-efficient vehicle. Today, it continues to be the perfect fit for anyone who is searching for big adventure in a small package.

The 1959-60 African Caravan Part 2: South Africa and the Rhodesias

We will continue the story of the 1959-60 African Caravan with a country by country review. In this episode we will start as the caravanners ship from the USA and will stay with them as they travel thru South Africa and Southern and Northern Rhodesia.

Union of South Africa May 26 – August 24, 1959

To get the rigs from the USA to Cape Town, the caravanners used about a dozen ships. The first three rigs shipped out of New York City on May 8, 1959 on the S.S. African Lightning and 18 days later, on May

26, they unloaded in Cape Town, South Africa. These three rigs included Wagon Boss #50 Louis and Mildred Mousley as well as veteran

caravanners #598 Joe and Toots Bos and #627 Guy and Louise Hawks. These three couples arranged for caravan campsites in Cape Town and in towns along the route to Jeffrey's Bay, South Africa, 475 miles away. The brand new, custom ordered "African Special" Airstream of Joe and Toots Bos was on its "shakedown" trip as the trio made their way to


Jeffrey's Bay and back, when it experienced the first mishap of the caravan — its battery cable shorted. Worse, their truck blew its engine. Good thing they arrived early.

By the 1st of July 19 of the 41 rigs had arrived, with many caravanners travelling on the freighters with their rigs. These included Wally and Stella Byam and the scouts Dale Schwamborn and Nick Charles, who arrived on the S.S. African Enterprise. During their time in Cape Town, some caravanners were invited into the homes of local residents where they were surprised by the need to wear their coats. July is winter in South Africa, and most South Africans did not have heat in their homes because "the winter is only four months long".

By July 10, two ships had not yet arrived, so it was decided to split the caravan in two groups to allow one group to meet scheduled commitments

while the other group waited for the late arrivals. They would reunite in Durban, South Africa.

The first group departed Cape Town on July 13, 1959, officially beginning the African Caravan. #2345 Mildred Frosch, with her three young daughters, drove out with the first group without Alfred Frosch who was still at home tending to their pickle farm.

Alfred joined the family six weeks later. The second group waited for the remaining rigs to arrive and departed on July 17. Both groups saw most of the same sights on their way to Durban, including the Highgate Ostrich Farm at Oudtshoorn, the Cango Caves, and the Addo Elephant Reserve.

Several receptions and barbeques were held for the caravanners in towns along the way to Durban. This section provided the first towing challenges in the form of

mountain grades up to 18% with hairpin turns, though they were at least paved. Their Jeffrey's Bay campsite was right on the ocean, but due to rain the campsite became muddy and required the first use of four-wheel-drive to get out. Twice on their way to Durban, the Bos's trailer sprung water leaks when fittings to one of the two water tanks cracked. The tank and cabinets surrounding it had to be removed twice so the tank could be welded. Their stove also vibrated loose and the caravan had not even gotten to the "bad" roads yet.

By the time the two groups met in Durban, a couple of incidents worth noting had occurred. In the first group, the Wagon Boss, Lou Mousley, had one of the caravan doctors, #2058 Dr. Earl

Andrew, look at a sore on his tongue and was immediately rushed to the hospital where it was diagnosed as cancer and cut out. Though Lou could not eat or talk very well, he continued to lead the caravan. In the second group, the Airstream of #2209 Adam and Helen Mackay experienced terrible sway and rolled on its side right in front of Wally Byam. Wally agreed to pay for

the repairs and the Mackays returned to Cape Town to have the trailer fixed, hoping to rejoin the caravan at Johannesburg. Ultimately, the Mackays stayed with the caravan until Khartoum, Sudan.

On July 24, after 1200 towing miles, the two groups reunited at Durban. Busses took the caravanners to the annual Shembe Festival where several Zulu Warrior groups performed tribal dances. Near Ladysmith, South Africa, they visited Royal Natal National Park, one of their first chances to see a wide variety of African wildlife. Some caravanners made side trips to the British protectorate states of Basutoland (now Lesotho) and Swaziland. At Kimberly, they toured

the DeBeers diamond mines and diamond processing mills.

It was becoming much warmer as they arrived in Johannesburg on August 7. The caravanners felt like "creatures in a zoo" as crowds flooded their campsite and continually tried to peer in their trailers. They had to keep the door, windows, and curtains shut, to have any sense of privacy, despite the heat. There they toured the gold mines and saw "gum boot" dances put on by several different tribes

that worked in the mines. Sixteen families took a 3-day side trip to Mozambique, then a province of Portugal, on their way to Kruger National Park.

One of the early highlights of the caravan was an 8-day stay in Kruger National Park for wildlife watching. Special permits were needed to enter with their Airstreams. The caravanners had to remain in their vehicles at all times, except when in the three different fenced compounds where they parked their trailers. The speed limit inside the 211-mile-long park was 25 mph, and they had to be inside the fenced compounds before the gates closed at 6pm each night. One day, #1986 Don and Genevieve Christie had to talk their way out of a fine when they were late getting to a compound, despite speeding, because elephants

had blocked the road for over an hour. Another time, an elephant pushed a tree down across the road and after the elephant moved on Guy Hawks had to get out of this truck and move the log for the caravan to continue to the next compound. Besides elephants, the caravanners saw zebras, giraffes, lions, baboons, hippos, Cape buffalo, impalas, wildebeest, crocodiles, and other exotic animals. At night they

could hear howls, screams, and roars as they tried to sleep in their Airstreams in the fenced compounds. Though the roads would get worse as they traveled north, flat tires and broken leaf springs were already starting to afflict some rigs inside the park. Leaving the park, the Bos's broke the rear axle on their truck, blocking the road. They had to be winched up a hill to a flat spot where the axle was replaced while a park guard protected them from elephants and lions. On the rough road to the town of Louis Trichardt, the last stop in South Africa, one truck broke its transmission and had to wait several days for repair parts as the caravan pushed ahead.

Southern Rhodesia August 25 – September 6, 1959

After crossing the border into Southern Rhodesia (now Zimbabwe), the caravanners spent a couple days exploring the Zimbabwe Ruins that have been dated to between 500 and 700 A.D.

Then they visited the Wankie Game Reserve (now Hwange National Park) for three days and reported seeing even more wild animals than in Kruger National Park.

At Bulawayo, some caravanners, including Joe Bos, went big game hunting and one shot a 350 lb. kudu. The next major attraction was Victoria Falls on the Zambezi River. At over 300 feet high

and over a mile wide, it is significantly bigger than Niagara Falls.

During their three days there, some caravanners, including Toots Bos, booked sightseeing flights over the falls. Others, including Joe Bos and Lee Golden, son of #692 Virgil and Grace Golden, took a boat trip up the Zambezi River to go fishing for barracuda-like Tigerfish. In the city of Livingston, which is located near Victoria Falls, some caravanners went to see the American movie "Peyton Place", a small reminder of home. It was about this point on the caravan that many men started collecting native artifacts such as spears, axes, bows and arrows, masks, and animal skins from natives in villages and along the roads they traveled. This activity would continue until the end of the caravan or for as long as they had space for these items in their truck and Airstream.

Northern Rhodesia September 6 – 11, 1959

After crossing the Zambezi River into Northern Rhodesia (now Zambia) in early September, the roads were surrounded by centuries old termite mounds that sometimes reached 20 or 30 feet high, but wildlife was not frequently seen.

They passed thru the modern cities of Lusaka and Ndola that were centers for gold, copper, lithium, iron, coal, and bauxite mining. More trailers broke springs on the rough washboard roads. Interior damage like broken water tank connections and appliances and cabinets coming loose from the walls were becoming more common. So much dust got into their trailers during travel days that it took an hour of cleaning to get them inhabitable for eating and sleeping when they reached camp. Those that had dust masks wore them while traveling to make breathing easier. During their last night in Northern Rhodesia in Mufulira, reports came in that the roads in the Belgian Congo would be much worse.

Caravanning Tech Tips - Part 3

Tires & Wheels

How much air should I put in my RV tires? For your tow vehicle, there are a few answers depending on the number of passengers and how heavily the vehicle is loaded. Just check your manual. For the trailer or motor home however, there is no easy answer. Get it weighed when it is fully loaded with water, propane and equipment. This should be done for each wheel of the vehicle for a motor home and for each side for a trailer. Use the manufacturer's chart to determine the air pressure versus actual weight for the front single tires, the rear duals and the tag axle for your tire size and type. The air pressure should be the same on both sides for the front tires as well as the rears. Use the highest air pressure required in any individual tire axle set. When in doubt, use the side wall pressure recommended by the tire manufacturer. Michelin and Goodyear provide tire charts for determining the proper air pressures based upon the measured weight of your rig. Check at least once per week for proper inflation with a quality gauge. You can always be slightly overinflated with no problems. As the tires heat up the pressure will increase; be sure to check them when they are cold. Tire blowouts usually cause collateral damage especially on trailers that is far more expensive than tire replacement. This is especially true on trailers.

After your Airstream has been sitting and before you move it, you should torque your wheel nuts. You should torque your lug nuts every 200 miles thereafter. We recommend a ½ inch "clicker" torque wrench. Currently, for trailers, Airstream recommends 110 foot-pounds of torque. I have seen too many vehicles lose wheels on a trip even after the caravan leader had continually recommended checking wheel nut torque. You should have a ½-inch socket set in your tool kit and a torque wrench. For your wheel nuts purchase the correct size, black 6-point socket, that was designed for an air driven wrench. Torque wrenches are available at Amazon. Be sure you get your neighbors to check their vehicles as well, and before you know it, a crowd will form and maybe everyone will be

doing it. You will have to check your manual for your motor home lug nut torque. The larger motor homes require a torque wrench that goes into the 500 foot-pound range. This requires a special ¾ inch drive torque wrench that can cost in the \$500 range. You can add a torque multiplier, which increases a standard ½ inch torque wrench by a factor of 3:1. This provides a ¾ inch drive output providing 450 foot-pounds for around \$250 to \$300. Ebay is a reasonable source for these. I picked up a used Snap-On 200 foot-pound wrench for less than \$110.

On my first Viking Caravan, while driving to a new campsite, I passed several of our units parked beside the road. I stopped to see if I could help and found everyone in the bush looking for a missing wheel and tire. Yes, the entire wheel had come off and disappeared into the bush. It seems it was not torqued properly after a brake job, and it had sheared off all the wheel studs. I drove to the campsite with the wife driving the three-wheel rig and leaving the owner with several helpers searching for the wheel. I checked and found all the other wheel nuts were under-torqued and in fact had been set for aluminum wheels. The trailer had steel wheels with stainless steel covers. A bad mistake by the dealer who had done the brake job on all the wheels. A much more severe mistake was made by the Airstream owner who should have checked the wheels within 25 miles of the brake job, then again after 50 miles, again after 100 miles, and every 200 miles thereafter. The caravan leader had reminded us on a regular basis to check wheel torque. They never found the wheel but fortunately, he had a spare. Not so fortunate - there were no wheel studs to be found in Newfoundland and we had to leave them at the campsite. They had to wait several days before the studs arrived in the mail.

Tires for your trailer or motor home die of old age helped along by ozone and temperature. They have a shelf life of about five years especially since they spend most of their life sitting in the storage area. The tire is protected when it is being used and the waxes and emollients come to the surface. That means if the tire sits on the dealer shelf for two years

before you have purchased it you only get three years of safe life. A full set of treads on a new-looking tire is meaningless. When I buy tires, my dealer knows I will not accept anything more than six months old. I call ahead and, if none is in stock, he orders me one-month-old tires and sells the others to the truckers. A trucker usually runs the tires bald within a vear and gets it retreaded. How old is the tire? Look for DOT followed by numbers and letters. The last group of numbers, four of them, is the date of manufacture. For a group of four numbers the first two numbers are the week it was made and the last two are the year. For example, 2318 would be the 23rd week of 2018. If you are not sure how to read the date, ask the dealer to show it to you when you are buying the tire.

On my first Caravan to Alaska, one of the members had a flat tire on her B-van. I checked all her tires and they were all six years or older. I recommended she purchase a complete new set and just keep the best of the old set for a spare. One of our other caravan members who had a motor home said this was a total waste of money and she should just buy one used tire to replace the blown one. He only ran used tires on his motor home as long as they had good tread and sidewalls. Fortunately, the B-van owner purchased new tires and had no tire problems on the rest of the Caravan. Unfortunately, the motor home owner became a believer as he had three separate tire blowouts on his way home.

Hitches & Towbars

If your hitch is installed properly and the bolts are tight, then your major concern is a loose ball mount. This should be checked before each trip. You need a very large set of channel lock pliers or a pipe wrench and an adjustable spanner wrench or deep socket. This set could cost in the \$50 to \$70 range. You should have a ½-inch socket set with an additional 1-1/2-foot handle to check all the hitch platform, A-frame, and sway control bolts. For torqueing the wheel nuts, purchase the correct size of blackcolored sockets that are 6-point. These are designed for air-powered tools and will not round off the high-torque nuts or bolts. You would be surprised how many hitch platforms are installed incorrectly. During our annual maintenance rally, we have discovered dozens of incorrectly installed units. There are very good write-ups on this for all the types of hitches and sway controls. If you are uncomfortable with this, find someone in your unit that knows, or visit your local dealer. Learn the proper method for setting your brake controller and checking for correct operation. These concerns also apply to motor home owners who tow cars.

Batteries & Chargers

Completely check out both your engine start and coach batteries before you are ready for the new camping year. A battery failure on the road will not only be costly but you may have to buy an off-brand battery with no effective warranty. For this reason, I usually recommend Wal-Mart (or equivalent well-known retailer) batteries since they have stores all over the US and Canada. If your batteries are using water every week, they are going bad. Do not buy sealed lead acid batteries that never require

water for your coach batteries. These have one-way valves to release the pressure when the battery overheats so that it does not blow up. The water vapor escapes through this valve, and since the battery is sealed, it cannot be replaced. Your coach batteries go through many deep cycles requiring many recharges during their useful life. Your engine batteries, however, do not, and can be the sealed type. Lead acid batteries must be mounted externally because the gases they give off are toxic. The only truly sealed batteries are either absorbed glass mat (AGM) or gel cell. These do not give off gases and can be mounted anywhere in the rig. They are excellent, long life units; however, they are guite expensive. I would recommend Lifeline AGM, which for about 90 amp-hours (size 27) costs about \$180. A high quality, lead acid battery, will run about \$75 which means you can completely replace the batteries with a second set for less than one AGM set. Unless you are going to mount the batteries inside the rig, it is more cost effective to stay with lead acid batteries. Having said that, AGM batteries will not require the maintenance that lead acid batteries do. Any battery is only as good as its guarantee.

One key consideration is the Power Converter/Charger. Most of the trailers have poor converter/chargers that do not maximize the useful life of the batteries. The best converter/chargers are computer controlled and can handle a dead battery as well as allowing AC power to be on all the time without hurting the batteries. These usually have three charge modes (stages) including bulk, absorption, and float that are automatically selected by the computer control circuits. These converter/chargers will ensure that you get maximum life from your batteries. For the motor home owners most of the modern diesel rigs have excellent computercontrolled charge systems included with the inverter. However, you should remember that for some gas motor home models the engine start battery is not charged when you are on AC shore power. If this is the case, you should obtain a separate inexpensive staged charger, which can be used when in a campground. Most of the classic motor homes have very poor charging systems and do not provide an engine charge capability. The highest quality staged chargers will also incorporate a sensor that modifies the charge cycle based upon the battery's actual temperature and charge status.

A load test is the best way to check a battery. When you take your car in for a battery test, they wheel out a 3-foot unit on a cart. An engine start battery is load tested to see how many amps (200 to 400) are available to start the engine. This takes a big resister that gets quite hot. You can also get a reasonable idea of the battery condition by monitoring the voltage level on the batteries. You will need a digital voltmeter because a fully charged battery will read in the range of 12.6 to 12.7 volts. At 11.9 volts a battery is considered completely discharged. Refrigerator power requirement is 11.5 volts, or higher, for the refrigerator control board to function and the solenoid to open. The furnace power requirement is 10.5 volts or higher. If not, the gas valve and spark ignitor will not work but the blower will. A digital voltmeter is available for about \$15 to \$50. If you have a friend with a high-quality meter, ask him to calibrate your \$15 model and it will work fine.

Happy trails to you. See you, safely, down the road.

Airstream founder Wally Byam was not only a businessman, but also a promoter who wanted people to follow their dreams. He envisioned an Airstream club that fostered fun, fellowship and adventure through caravans around the world, and local and international rallies.

That same spirit has produced creative camping opportunities, one of which is the latest craze: street camping. The Arkansas Razorback Airstream Club held its first city rally in September 2018 in El Dorado, AR with 21 Airstreams from five states. The rigs parked around the Union County Courthouse for the weekend event.

Planning for the rally began months earlier, finding a suitable city. El Dorado is a member of Main Street Arkansas, a program that promotes downtown revitalization. The idea was pitched at an initial meeting attended by the county judge, mayor, police and fire chiefs, Main Street staff, Chamber of Commerce officials, the Downtown Merchants Association, the local newspaper and advertising and promotion professionals.

The support was amazing. "Not one person said no to anything we asked for. In fact, we suggested beginning small with 15 rigs, and they wanted our event bigger," said Mark Magie, club president. "It takes community leaders who are willing to think outside the box, to try something fresh and new," Magie added. Club members Charles and Jan Heavener had attended a similar event in another state and hosted the El Dorado event.

After several other planning meetings, the rally was named "Airstreams on the Square" and a logo was designed to reflect the city's oil industry. To go along with a flamingo theme, t-shirts were printed with the message "I Got Flocked in El Dorado!"

A Thursday evening spaghetti supper raised \$800 for the local American Cancer Society Relay for Life team. Instead of a block party, there was a "Flock Party" street dance on Friday evening. Public tours of the Airstreams were held Saturday with visitors voting on the bestdecorated rig by leaving canned food at the door. A truckload of canned food was collected and donated to the local Salvation Army food pantry.

Other activities included a Baggo (cornhole) tournament, pub crawl, and Painting with a Twist... painting was with acrylic paints and the twist was lemon in adult beverages.

Ten dollars of the registration fee was returned to the campers in the form of \$2 bills to be spent locally – an idea copied from Wally Byam and used at International Rallies. \$1,000 from the registration fees collected was donated back to the Main Street El Dorado program for their work in insuring the success of the rally.

The El Dorado mayor presented a key to the city to the Arkansas Razorback Airstream Club and invited the group to return. The rally received an ALFiE (Arkansans Love Festivals & Events) Silver Award in the Best New Festival or Event category competition sponsored by the Arkansas Festivals and Events Association.

This year's Airstreams on the Square is set for September 5-8, 2019 in El Dorado. Registration information will be posted soon on the club's Facebook page: Riveted Razorbacks, and at arkansasrazorback.airstreamclub.net

Doswell, Virginia

As summer quickly approaches, so does the International Airstream Rally in Doswell! We know you will want to make the most of your travels and take time to experience some noteworthy attractions here in the Commonwealth of Virginia. This then, is the last in a series of six articles prepared for the *Blue Beret*, describing things to see and do. In this one, we look at the busiest, most congested and densely populated part of Virginia; but it is also (arguably) the most exciting part of the state. Let's put it this way: if by attending this rally you are visiting the "Old Dominion" for the first time, it would be very sad if you went home without seeing some of the world-renowned sites lying about 84 miles NORTH of The Meadow Event Park.

First, let's talk about our Nation's Capital. Did you know that the District of Columbia originally included a slice of Virginia? In 1791, a 100 square-mile plot of land was ceded by Maryland and Virginia to form the District. One third of it was on the Virginia side of the Potomac River and included what is today Arlington County and most of the City of Alexandria. But the entire Virginia parcel was given back to the state in 1846, thereafter confining the District boundaries to the Maryland side of the river.

It would take weeks, if not months, to experience all the things to see and do in D.C. and Northern Virginia, so we will only mention highlights. Please consult the two destination charts we've included for details and links to various web sites.

Right up front we need to inform you that getting in and out of the D.C./ Northern Virginia area is problematic. Traffic on I-95 is always a mess, and once you get there, parking is difficult, especially for larger vehicles. Complicating matters this summer is the fact that all MetroRail stations south of Reagan National Airport will be closed for major repairs from

Because of this, some alternatives are under consideration. For example, one of the scheduled bus tours (Monday, July 22) will go to the Udvar-Hazy Center of the Smithsonian Institution's Air & Space Museum. It is located in Dulles, VA, next to the big airport. After

spending time at that amazing museum, there will be a drive-through "window tour" (no getting off) of D.C. with a stop at Arlington National

Cemetery to see the Tomb of the Unknowns and the Kennedy graves.

At the time this article was written, rally planners were looking into the possibility of chartering busses for

an optional trip to D.C., possibly on

Thursday, July 27. This would enable a full day of "on-your-own" sight-seeing on the National Mall where the famous monuments, memorials and museums are located. If interested, please pay attention to pre-rally e-mail communications and check the rally website (https://doswell.wbcci.net/) where more information should be available.

That's sums up D.C. in a nutshell. Now let's focus on things to see and do in Northern Virginia.

It's a 76-mile drive from Doswell to George Washington's estate and home at Mount Vernon, located on the edge of the Potomac River, south of Alexandria. At the entry to the estate is a wonderful and relatively new museum to explore, and a colonial-theme tavern for dining. In addition to touring the mansion, gardens, and outbuildings, you can pay respects to our Nation's first president at his grave, located on the property.

A few miles upriver is "Old Town"
Alexandria, established in 1746.
Washington really did eat and sleep
here! Walk the quaint streets, shop and
eat at the delightful establishments
along King Street, stroll through a
newly completed riverside park, and

tour the Torpedo Factory Art Center. The whole town is dog friendly! If you are more adventurous, you can rent bicycles at Big Wheel Bike Shop on Prince Street and pedal part or all of a 14-mile paved riverside bike path between Old Town Alexandria and Washington's Mount Vernon.

Airstreamers who are Civil War buffs might consider driving about 80 miles to Manassas National Battlefield. There, in July 1861 near the stream named "Bull Run," the first major battle between North and South ended in a Southern victory, when confederate commander Thomas



Jackson stood his ground "like a stone wall" against Union troops. And it was this same ground where North and South fought a <u>second</u> major battle in August 1862, with Stonewall Jackson again playing a pivotal role.



Pentagon

In modern times (for the last 76 years), Northern
Virginia is where you find the headquarters of the Army,
Navy, Air Force, Marines,
and U.S. Department of
Defense. All share space in
The Pentagon in Arlington, the world's largest office building.

Tours of the building are offered, but you need to make reservations weeks in advance (see chart). Along one the Pentagon's five sides, the side where a plane hijacked by terrorists impacted on 9/11, there is a poignant memorial to the 184 innocent people who died in that attack.

Attention shoppers! The best shopping complexes in the metropolitan Washington D.C. area are in Northern Virginia. The sprawling Potomac Mills Mall, located In Woodbridge off I-95 (Exit 156), has over 225 outlet stores and was, for some time after it opened in the 1990s, the "biggest tourist attraction in Virginia." Or, if an upscale shopping experience is what

you crave, it's hard to beat two malls located next to each other in the Tysons Corner area. Tysons Corner Center and Tysons Galleria are large, attractive, multi-level complexes with scores of restaurants and hundreds of retailers including Bloomingdales, Nordstrom, Neiman-Marcus, Saks Fifth Avenue, Lord & Taylor, Gucci,

Cartier, and many others. If you possess a military ID, one of the newest and largest PX and Commissary complexes in the world is at the Army's Fort Belvoir, off I-95 Exit 161 and U.S. Highway 1. Somewhat closer to Doswell, is the BX and Commissary at Quantico Marine Base, just off I-95 Exit 148. It isn't as large or as new as Belvoir, but it's certainly adequate, and it's close to the National Museum of the Marine Corps.

As you see, Northern Virginia has a lot to offer and you may wish to spend more time there, before or after the Rally. Unfortunately, there are no commercial campgrounds in the area; however, the two public and one military campground (military ID required) listed are very good and worth a stay.

Whew! This wraps up all six articles about what to see and do while you are visiting Virginia. WBAC membership in our state includes more than

Rally Reminders

- 1. Can I park with my buddy? The parking team will make every effort to park you with your friends if you arrive together. Please plan to meet offsite and caravan to the grounds together.
- 2 How often are they going to pump-out our waste tanks? We plan to pump rigs approximately every 4 days. However, issues can interfere, so you should use water/sewage conservation measures whenever possible.

 3 Do I have to belong the there for my pump-out? No, but if your valves
- 3 Do I have to help or be there for my pump-out? No, but if your valves are inside a compartment, leave that compartment open on pump day to speed up the process. Also, provide a clear path for the sanitation crew to get to your service access point. If the sanitation team cannot access your valves or access point, you will not be pumped that day.
- 4. Is there a dump station where I can do it myself, if necessary? There is a dump station on the rally grounds. Transporting your waste in a tote (blue boy) to the dump station is the recommended procedure if you need to dump more frequently. You would need to bring a blue boy to do this.
- 5. What do people do at the Rally? There will be seminars on Airstream maintenance and lifestyle, history of the area, and other topics that might be of interest to you. There will be entertainment each evening. Day tours of the area are being planned. There will be a Friendship center where you can gather with friends and play games or just visit. Most regions will plan gatherings including meals. There will be a business meeting for the Club which you may attend as an observer, if you choose.
- 6 When will the rally agenda be ready for viewing? We plan to announce the rally preliminary agenda to all registrants by April 1. Tour information will be available sometime in April. Go to doswell.wbcci.net/
- 7. For members parking offsite, how do I check in? The first time you enter the rally grounds, please enter through the Staging Area. Follow the WBCCI signs with arrow. We'll welcome you, provide information you need, and help you get on board for the rally,
- 8. For members parking offsite, will I be able to park my vehicle that I drive to and from the rally close to the rally activities? There is some vehicle parking relatively close to the assembly buildings during the rally. There will also be shuttle carts running during events to move people from camping areas and parking to the main buildings.
- 9. Howcan I volunteer for a committee? Committees seeking volunteers will post their needs in News & Views and the Blue Beret in upcoming months. We encourage you to contact the chair of the committee that has asked for assistance.
- 10. Does handicap parking guarantee me a site in the water/electric camping area? No. Any member with documented special needs will be parked in a Handicapped section of the grounds, whether water/electric or solar or generator.
- 11. Do I have to park on my parking date? Please plan to arrive on your parking date, if at all possible. The Rally Arrival Team will make every effort to accommodate members who arrive later than their assigned parking date.
- 12 Can I park on the grounds before the rally begins? The rally cannot arrange any pre-rally parking. There are campgrounds available in this part of Virginia.

- 13. What do I do if I arrive after hours? If you come to the rally after hours (parking closes by 8 p.m.), follow the signs to the parking staging area, park, and dry camp overnight. Do not unhitch as you will be parked as soon as the parkers return the next morning. Please be ready to park when the parkers arrive. This should be at 8 a.m.
- 14. Do you supply a generator or do I need to bring one? The rally does not supply generators for personal use in generator parking.
- 15. Is my generator required to meet "quiet generator" standards? Personal generators at the Doswell Rally must be inverter-type (e.g., Honda EU2000i, Yamaha EF1000iS, Yamaha EF2000iS). Your neighbors will appreciate a quiet generator and you will too.
- 16 Is there free WI-Fi at the fairgrounds? There is limited Wi-Fi available in the main gathering places.
- 17. Are there activities for the children? The rally will have activities planned for youth and children. The cost is included in their rally fee.
- 18 May we attend the entire rally without having our Airstream parked on site? Yes, you may register for the rally without paying any camping fee. The cost is \$110 per adult and \$40 per youth (13 yrs. 17 yrs.).
- 19. Since I can only come for a few days, is there a daily rate? Day pass attendees may attend all events on the calendar day they have paid for. The guests and members day pass is \$20 per day for 18 years and older. Children and youth day passes are free but children/youth activities may require a small fee.
- 20. What if I want to just attend the International Board of Trustees and/ or Delegates seminar/meeting? Current members may attend any club business meeting at no charge. To attend any additional events, you must pay the day pass fee.
- 21. Can I run two air conditioners at Dosvvell? No, there is only 30 amp service at all sites. Also, refrigerators and water heaters should be run on gas so as not to overload the temporary power grid. If you normally run on 50 amp, be sure to bring a 30 amp adapter.

Remember to bring:

as quickly as possible.

50' of water hose (clarification - 2 hoses, each at least 25' in length, as water will be daisy chained)

Water hose "Y" (connectors without valves are best)

- 2 electric cords, each at least 25 feet in length (30 amp adapter for 50 amp trailers)
- 22. The reference to having refrigerator and water heater on gas leads me to ask if we actually have 30 amp service, or will more than one trailer share a 30 amp post, or is electricity daisy chained? Electricity will be provided through an electrical distribution system (electric daisy chain). Weather is usually very warm in Virginia this time of year and we expect a lot of A/C units will be running. Although electric usage on refrigerators and water heaters is not as significant, it does all add up. 23 What if I have a question that doesn't appear here? The Rally Arrivals Team looks forward to welcoming you to Doswell. Below is helpful information to smooth your arrival experience.

When you arrive to the staging area, we'll provide you a rally packet containing rally ribbons, maps, tickets and a welcome letter. We've extended parking hours, now 8 AM – 8 PM. After hours arrivals can overnight in the staging area (dry camping) and we'll park you the next morning. Airstreamers wishing to park together must arrive together – we plan to park rigs in the order in which they arrive as we have 700 plus units to park in a short period of time.

Be prepared. We are camping on a state fairground where water and electric may not be close to your rig. Please bring (2) 25 ft. water hoses or longer with free flow Y adapter so we can daisy chain the water if necessary. Bring an additional electric cord and adapters suitable to carry the electrical load your trailer requires. Please switch your water heater and refrigerator to gas and run only one air conditioner. We don't want to overload the temporary power grid. Arrive with your holding tanks empty and fresh water tank completely full.

They also operate a Veterans Transitional Home program for those facing a housing crisis. Home Again provides a long term rental subsidy and case management services to eligible families who meet the HUD definition of homeless and disability categories. generations as well. Over 600 volunteers dedicate hours of service as front desk assistants and after school tutors.



Taste of the Blue Ridge

Want a caravan adventure that will take you to treetops, white water, gardens and scenic vistas? You will want to put Taste of the Blue Ridge on your calendar for May 26-June 19, 2020!

Starting the caravan at Bryson City, NC, camping will be on the Tuckasegee River where hiking, fishing and paddling on the river are available. The river is famous as the location of the train wreck escape scene in Harrison Ford's The Fugitive movie. At Bryson, raft the Nantahala River through the Gorge, visit the Museum of the Cherokee Indian (www.cherokeemuseum.org) and there might even be an opportunity to ride the Great Smoky Mountain Railroad (www.gsmr.com).



The Ashville stay will include a visit to the historic Biltmore Estate (www.biltmore.com), brunch at the 1913 Grove Park Inn (www.thegroveparkinn.com) and zip-lining! Hiking to waterfalls, visiting breweries and eating at some of the country's best food-to-table restaurants has also been arranged for this stop.

Boondocking for three nights is on the agenda as the caravan travels up the Blue Ridge Parkway to Linville Gorge — known as the "Grand Canyon of the Southern Appalachians." 



Apps on your smart phone from Good Sam, Passport, KOA, Allstays, RV Parks & Campgrounds and others can be gotten for free or very little money but there are others that will cost you less than a dollar to many dollars.

Last, but certainly not least, is the Airstream Club's own Courtesy Parking list. Check out the Courtesy Parking page on WBCCl.org for a map of members with room for courtesy parking. Just call the member offering courtesy parking to make sure they and/or their property will be available. More than likely, they will welcome you to stay over.
