



# The 1t of AIRSTREAM COOKING Gina Eggers, #3732



Our first trip this year is to an Airstream rally in Door County, Wisconsin at the end of April, which by the time you read this in May will be over. It's going to be an exciting year of travel! Mark and I are organizing our first rally in June at Pictured Rocks in Munising, Michigan. One evening will be a potluck, so what to bring that can be made in one dish? Or better yet, finger food! Spring rolls come to mind. I've taken them on kayaking trips, picnics, hikes and potlucks. They are easy, healthy, fast and fresh. You can make or buy a dipping sauce, but that's not always even necessary. This recipe makes 8, cut in half you'll get 16 pieces. For a group you'll need to double or triple. First, we'll discuss the wrappers and the rice noodles. Rice noodles are also called "rice sticks." They are hair-like noodles; a common brand you'll find is Dynasty, called MAIFUN Rice Sticks, in a red bag with a clear front (6.75 oz). These are easily found in most grocery stores. Spring roll wrappers are paperthin rice wrappers, Vietnamese in origin, also easily found in grocery stores, often in the Asian or International section. You can get brown rice or white rice wrappers, though white is much more common. They are sold dried and flat in a stack, in a plastic wrapper. You don't boil them; you lay one at a time in hot water for 15-20 seconds, then take it out and lay it on your work surface. Add fillings, roll up, repeat.



Boil some water in a medium-sized pot. Take about 2 oz of rice noodles, (about 1/3 of the bag) and drop in the water. Remove pan from the heat, lightly stir, and let stand for 10 minutes. Drain, rinse with cold water and drain again.

While noodles are sitting for those first 10 minutes, you can begin cutting up your fillings and lay out your assembly line:

Heat some more water to soak your spring roll wrappers in.

You'll use 1 cup of bean sprouts, 1 cup of finely shredded carrots, 8 soft lettuce leaves (butter lettuce works well in these), 4 chopped green onions (scallions) including tops and greens, and either cilantro or mint or both. You could also add shredded red cabbage and/or chunks of avocado. Avocado makes everything better.

Pour the hot water from step #1 into a flat skillet or cookie sheet. Lay one spring roll wrapper in the water. When soft, about 15-20 seconds, remove from water and lay on your work surface.

- 1. Lay a piece of lettuce on the wrapper first.
- 2. Place a small amount of rice noodles (1/8th of what you have) on one side of the lettuce on the wrapper. Roll paper/lettuce over the noodles.Add some carrots, scallions and bean sprouts and continue to roll in each addition. Add some chopped cilantro or mint, then fold in the top and bottom ends. Finish rolling up so that the ends are tucked in. Place the seam on the bottom. Cut in half diagonally.
- Keep moist with a damp towel or saran wrap so they don't dry out. They shouldn't be touching each other or they will stick together.

You can make a spicy dipping sauce with a couple tablespoons of soy sauce, sesame oil and rice vinegar. Sweet chili sauce works well too.

It was quite a mouthful over the phone and took several attempts to spit it all out. I couldn't even repeat it back correctly. My reply was "Who the heck is Wally Byam, what does he have to do with Airstreams, is a caravan part of a circus, and how does International fit in?"

We all know the answers now, but I will wager the first time you heard a similar story, you probably had the same questions. We know the history of Wally, his caravans and the club that bears his name.

Fast forward 10 years. Among many RV'ers, and astoundingly among many new Airstream owners today, the WBCCI remains a much too well-kept secret. Many new owners don't know Wally, or our Club, and the little they do know is not as appealing to them as it is to us.

Wally Byam was a remarkable man. He was a dreamer, an entrepreneur, a natural and trusted leader, and he always had a plan. Totally dedicated to his passion for travel and adventure, he shared his dreams with his friends,

leading them on historic caravans all over the globe. He was relentless in developing and improving his trailers and caravans, making them the very best available anywhere.

So, what would Wally say about our Club today?

He would say... "It is time for improvements; we can make it better. It is time to find new roads to travel, new places to go, new hills to climb, new stars to gaze upon, new rocks to collect, new rainbows to follow, and new dreams to share. And as we do this, let's bring along some new friends. Let's show them what they are missing and introduce them to a whole new world of travel experiences".

Wally would be correct; those same old roads are showing their age and many are not as appealing, especially to our new friends. We have been down them for many years and they need a new surface.

Let us never forget Wally Byam and our past history, for we would not be here today without him and those that traveled with him. Those old roads led us to where we are today. But let us also never forget that Wally would not be held back, nor would he hold us back, because he always moved forward, always looked for new roads, always looked for bigger and better. He was a visionary, a renaissance man, a seeker of perfection, and would always encourage moving forward even if it required a change in the original course.

So, what would Wally do?

He would move forward, and find those new roads. He would send his scouts ahead to find the best route, trust their advice, then move the group forward. Today, we have the same opportunity.



### **Journey to 60 National Parks**

Pell we did it! Finally made it to all 60 National Parks. It's been decades in the doing, but we picked up speed when we bought our first Airstream in 2014. The Airstream gave focus to our wanderings as this was a new lifestyle for us. The first thing we did was research how many actual NP's there really are as the National Park Service now manages over 418 entities. Besides the National Parks, 88 are National Monuments, 19 are Preserves and 129 are National Historic Sites or Parks and so on. Our goal was just the National Parks. The Michael Joseph Oswald Guide to National Parks became our bible.

We spent many years as sailors and were able to explore several parks by water. Most memorable were the three days inside Glacier Bay, where there is a nail-biting lottery for private boat admittance. We spent a week in Northeast Harbor in Acadia NP in Maine, where we were weathered in for a few days

due to Hurricane Dan back in 2009. We never imagined we'd have hurricane trouble in Maine. St. John Virgin Islands or maybe Biscayne Bay or Key West's Dry Tortugas but not Maine. And for years our own Channel Islands National Park was our boating playground. With those accomplished along with a trip to American Samoa's Pago Pago, a newly established National Park in the late 80's (it wasn't officially recognized by Samoa until 1993 when the NPS was able to lease the land for 50 years) we thought we had the hard parts done. However, there were still almost 30 parks we'd not visited and at least a dozen more that warranted a closer, second look.

Our summers, of late, have been spent crisscrossing the country and tying together visiting family and friends with visits to National Parks. Some were right along the way, but others took us off the beaten path, and some are not even accessible by road. Voyageurs in Northern Michigan and Isle Royale in Northern Minnesota are best explored by boat or kayaks. In both cases, we camped as close as possible and went to visit by boat.

We never try to camp IN the park's boundaries except during off season. We are not skilled at securing coveted reserved sites 6-months in advance, nor carefree enough to try to grab a spot on the morning of our arrival. We found

that our formula was finding camps adjacent to the parks where we can secure a reservation.

We're often asked which park is our favorite. Our answer is we like them all — well, except maybe Guadalupe Mountains. We have come to appreciate how each park was established and the exceptional people that were responsible for making it happen. The politicians only get involved long after the often-times heroic vision, passion and endurance of one person or a small group of ordinary people decide that this place is special, they must protect it for the generations to come.

Alaska is extra special. We've done its eight parks in three visits. First on our boat. Next, we rented a Class C and explored Denali and a bit of Wrangell-St. Elias and Kenai Fjords. And finally, this summer we flew bush planes to visit the Final Four — those you can't reach by road or boat.

Our first stop took us north to tiny Beetles, Alaska, 35-miles above the Arctic Circle. From here we fly into both Kobuk Valley NP and Gates of the Arctic NP. We stayed at the Beetles Lodge, the only accommodations, bar and restaurant in this region with a tiny air strip and just steps from the National Park visitors center.

It was here that we first encountered "Park Collectors," individual travelers who are also on a quest to "Collect" all the parks. We proudly stated that we were here to get #56's – to #59. Then someone said, "but there are 60 now." What? Noooo! It was then we learned that the St. Louis Arch area had been re-designated a National Park in July just days before this trip. Ah, but then we were assured that since we'd visited the Arch and Memorial a few times, we could still count it as done. Phew. So, we

added Gateway Arch National Park to our done list and we were still counting down the Final Four.

No roads enter Gates of the Arctic NP. Most visitors need to take a bush plane to visit the park. Some get dropped off and then backpack and paddle out miles of this pristine wilderness. We took the 4-seat bush plane option into the park's Brooks Range. It was magnificent flying over the endless oxbow rivers and through the towering, snowcapped craggy mountains. There are no landing strips allowed in the park, so our mid-summer visit made it difficult for our pilot to find a place to land. Continuous snow melt changes the water levels of the rivers hourly making a dry landing difficult. After some searching, we able to put down on a newly exposed rocky beach so we could explore some of the area on foot. It is the quiet that is most remarkable. All we could discern was the movement of the water and the slight rustle of the leaves. We saw no one.

Kobuk Valley NP is not far from Gates of the Arctic, but the topography is vastly different. This arctic wilderness is flat and barren. The tundra is soggy as the permafrost prevents drainage. It is also home to the Great Kobuk Sand Dune. There are no roads, trails or facilities in the park and again the best way to see it is by bush plane. Experienced backpackers and paddlers can work with an outfitter if they want to create a multi-day exploration. We flew in and landed on a pristine Sand Dune and set up a picnic lunch under the wings. Again, total silence. No footprints, not a soul around. We were too early in the year to be able to catch a glimpse of migrating caribou.

We revisited Wrangell-St. Elias, this time taking the teeth rattling McCarthy Road into Kennecott Mill and Inn. The Root Glacier is easily explored from the historic Inn. We also returned to Kenai

Fjords just to hang out in a tiny cabin on the shores of Resurrection Bay. We'd arranged a private boat to take us out to the little coves and bays, however the weather did not cooperate. Looks like we will have to go back again for a deeper explore. Not a bad thing.

Our 59<sup>th</sup> park was Katmai on the Alaskan Peninsula. We really wanted to get up close to the Grizzly Bears at Brooks Camp, which is also home to the NPS center, and so was our best option. Again, this park is only accessible by plane or boat. We took a seaplane in and were

delighted to immediately see bears frolicking in nearby Naknek Lake. There are no fences, so the mandatory first stop for everyone is the National Park HQ where we underwent an hourlong training on how to handle the inevitable bear encounters. There are viewing platforms so you can observe, out of harm's way, literally dozens of bears at a time in the lake or along the Brooks River as they are fishing for spawning salmon in the falls. The bears, usually two or three together would roam throughout our scattered sleeping cabins to eat the grass,

scratch their backs on the trees and wrestle with each other. What a show!

Our most elusive and final National Park was beautiful Lake Clark on the Alaskan Peninsula where the Aleutian Mountain Range meets up with the Alaskan Range. It is only accessible by air and there are many bad weather days when flights are grounded. The miserable weather cancelled our planned float plane excursion, but we didn't give up. We scrambled and were able to find a 6 passenger scheduled all weather flight through the mountain passes and into Port Alsworth, site of the NPS office. It was the most frightening flight of our lives. There was much comforting hand squeezing as we watched the pilot use his radar screen, with bright red mountain warning indicators on both sides, as he carefully navigated us through miles of narrow canyons as we bumped and gyrated through the storm.

Finally breaking out of those clouds and seeing the 32-mile milky azure lake was a "Hallelujah" moment for us. It turned out to be a magical day. Our arrival was on Sunday morning and we soon realized that every local native Alaskan and visitor alike were making their way to their outdoor chapel. Soon we were all part of a celebratory joyful service featuring a remarkable missionary family from Iraq.

Afterwards, we were able to have a picnic, hike the trails, stroll along the lakeshore and have a long visit with the very lonely NP ranger who said he gets less than 200 non-native visitors a summer. To cap it off we were asked to grab a U.S. Flag and join the locals on the landing strip to say "Welcome home" to wounded veterans and their spouses arriving for a week-long retreat to help them rebuild their shattered lives.

We will be forever grateful for this opportunity to say Thank You to these brave soldiers. It somehow seemed a fitting end to our quest to experience this country's greatest treasure, our National Parks.

### The 1959-60 African Caravan Part 1: Introduction and Overview

It is time to celebrate the 60<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of one of the greatest Airstream adventures ever undertaken, the:

1959-60 African Caravan (a.k.a. "Cape Town to Cairo")

We cannot be sure when the idea for an African caravan first occurred to Wally Byam, but in December 1952, during a caravan to Mexico, he mentioned the idea to eventual African caravanner Harry Halbritter. After the formation of the Wally Byam Caravan Club in 1955, Wally finally had his cousin Helen Byam Schwamborn in the perfect position to act upon the idea.

Certainly, this major undertaking required many months of detailed planning. Proposed routes, passports, visas, carnets (passports for trucks and Airstreams), international drivers' licenses, and insurance all had to be arranged. One underappreciated task was that of ensuring an adequate supply of gasoline and butane along the planned caravan route as they would be traveling in very remote and primitive areas.



Arrangements were made to truck 50-gallon drums of gasoline to remote locations along the route so the caravan could refuel. Butane availability was just as critical as it allowed the caravanners to boil their drinking water and keep their refrigerators cold.

The first formal announcement that an African Caravan was in development occurred in the

September 1958 edition of the Caravanner newspaper. The African Caravan was then heavily promoted at the Palm Springs Airstream Rally in October 1958.

A series of thirteen bulletins were published for prospective African caravanners advising them on all sorts of details including required paperwork, vaccinations, spare parts, and overseas shipping options. In anticipation of poor road conditions, one of the most important requirements was a 4-wheel-drive tow vehicle, with International Harvester trucks being specifically recommended. These trucks had to be able to carry enough fuel for 600 miles between fuel stops.

The bulletins were critical for the success of the caravan, as 25 of the 41 families had never participated on an Airstream caravan before. Some were such "newbies" that they had never traveled in a trailer before and bought their first trailer, an Airstream, specifically for this caravan. The members of the 41 families that made up the caravan numbered 106 in total, and ranged in age from 6 to 86, including 21 children and young adults. Most caravanners were of retirement age and many came from comfortable backgrounds and were not necessarily familiar with changing a flat tire, or leaf spring, or the rear axle on their truck, but they would become adept at these tasks during the caravan as the provided mechanic could not keep up with the breakages. Very importantly, caravanners included five doctors whose services would prove to be truly lifesaving during the caravan.

Wally Byam also had some very experienced caravanners on this adventure who he could lean on for any help he needed. One of the most important was #50 Louis and Mildred Mousley, with Lou serving as the Wagon Boss for the caravan. Another was #616 Harry and Eileen Halbritter. Harry assumed the Wagon Boss duties on at least two occasions when the Mousleys broke their truck and had to stay behind waiting for repairs. Harry also assisted the mechanic and became very adept at quickly replacing broken springs and axles.

Two special support trucks were provided to assist the caravan, each featuring a shortened Airstream body on a 4-wheel-drive Chevrolet chassis. One was used by the Advance Scouts, Dale Schwamborn and Nick Charles. Dale was 21, the cousin of Wally Byam and son of Helen

Byam Schwamborn. Nick was 17, the son of Ohio Airstream Plant President Andy Charles.

The second similar truck pulled a small parts trailer and was for Mechanic Arturo (Art) Ruiz. A third support truck for the Photographer, Pete Turner, sported a white camper body on a 4-wheel-drive International Harvester chassis.

No discussion of the African Caravan would be complete without a mention that this was the last and most famous trip that Wally and Stella Byam took in the Gold Airstream that now resides at the Airstream Factory in Jackson Center, OH. Besides the gold anodized exterior skin, this trailer was a test bed for new technologies, including prototype Duratorque torsion axles. While every other trailer on the African caravan was breaking leaf springs, Wally's trailer was riding comfortably on the rubber rods contained in its torsion axles. This success led to the Duratorque torsion axle becoming standard equipment on 1961 Airstreams.

The official labeling on the trucks used by Wally Byam, the Scouts, and the Mechanic initially read:

Wally Byam's CARAVAN Africa – Bibleland – Europe

but by the time they visited the Pygmies in the Belgian Congo the labeling had been changed to:

Wally Byam's CARAVAN Africa – Near East – Europe

so that they could enter the predominantly Muslim countries in northern Africa and the Middle East. If you are puzzled by the inclusion of "Europe" in the truck labels, that is because from the start, touring Europe was always part of the plan for this grand adventure. Many of the African Caravanners did indeed continue with the caravan to tour the Middle East and then Europe. Eventually, the European portion of the caravan was opened up to other club members that did not have the time, resources, or sense of adventure to also pull their Airstream the length of Africa. This resulted in the following two caravans being formally recognized ever since:

- Caravan 20: Africa Holy Land 1959-60
- Caravan 24: Europe Summer 1960


The proposed Africa itinerary had the caravanners arriving in Cape Town, South Africa on July 7, 1959 with departure set for July 14, though caravanners actually arrived between late-May and mid-July via a variety of ships. A few caravanners shipped their rigs by sea

and then flew to Cape Town. The proposed itinerary had the caravanners reaching Cairo on December 7, 1959 and the port at Alexandria, Egypt on December 11, 1959. Total distance was estimated to be 11,501 miles over 85 travel days for an average of 135 miles per travel day. Hindsight shows this to have been an extremely optimistic expectation as the caravan often failed to meet their expected mileage. sometimes traveling less than 10 miles after a full day's effort, causing them to arrive in Cairo about 2 months later than planned. The proposed itinerary called for travel in or thru 11 countries on the African continent though some caravanners made side trips to neighboring countries along the way. It is astonishing that 29 of the 41 Airstreams that started in Cape Town made it to camp below the Pyramids near Cairo on February 6, 1960. Wally Byam's telegram to the USA read "Because the impossible takes a little longer, we arrived a little late, but you can tell the world that the Wally Byam Caravan from Cape Town to Cairo is history."

The African Caravan was in the right place at the right time. It could not have been run much earlier due to a lack of roads, nor much later due to political instability. The caravanners





did sense a common tension in most of the countries they visited as the native peoples were edging toward independence from their European colonizers. This feeling was never more prevalent than in the Belgian Congo that was scheduled to be given its independence from Belgium in 1960 and would be the site of bloody battles and the massacre of white inhabitants less than a year after the caravan passed through. Similar tensions, though not as strong, existed in many of the African countries

> then under the "protection" of Great Britain. In Ethiopia and Eritrea there was some threat from roving bandits and guards traveled with the caravan for its protection, but no security incidents occurred.

The biggest challenge the caravan faced was the condition of the roads they traveled over, or in some cases the lack of any real roads at all. In many countries the roads were made up of hundreds of miles of dusty, rocky washboards. In other places they fought deep mudholes or traversed very steep, narrow, rocky mountain passes. They quickly became adept at pulling a rig out of a mudhole with ropes and muscle power and crawling under a truck or trailer on the side of the road to fix a broken spring or broken axle.

Vibration from the rough roads caused more extensive damage on some rigs. Truck and trailer frames cracked requiring welding repairs, Airstream bodies came loose from their frames. cabinets and appliances came free from the walls, and water and butane lines broke causing leaks. In Ethiopia, they had to spend days filling in mudholes and deep ruts before they could even attempt to drive over them. But through it all, when a new obstacle was to be faced almost all would vote to push on forward.

Another challenge was public opinion. Before they left the USA and from Cape Town, South Africa to Khartoum, Sudan in Africa they were repeatedly told they would not make it. Oh, they might make it thru Rhodesia, but the Congo

### **Caravanning Tech Tips - Part 2**

### Continued from April 2019

#### **Fuses**

Obtain a set of various size fuses for your Airstream and your tow (or towed) vehicle. Check your manuals and find the physical location of the boxes. There are several different fuse types as well as sizes so be sure you get the correct ones. Do not forget any extra electronics or appliances you have added to the vehicles. Do you know where all your fuses are? What about the in-line fuse holders behind the dashboard? This is particularly important for motor homes where you will have panels installed by both Airstream and the chassis builder. I have fixed many failures by discovering a hidden panel with a blown fuse. Find all the panels before you have a failure. Trying to troubleshoot a problem without knowing the fuse locations and circuit being protected, can more than double or triple the troubleshooting time and repair costs. Provide this information to the mechanic even if you are not the service tech yourself. My current motor home has more than ten major panels and at least another ten inline or circuit board fuse holders. You always need at least two of each fuse. The second one is needed after you install the first one and it blows again, which proves that something is shorted or defective and the fuse is doing its job. Never replace a fuse with a higher current rated fuse unless you know what the circuit does, and the operating current being drawn through it. A fuse is not there to protect the light bulb, circuit board, appliance or computer. Its purpose is to protect the wiring. You can always get a new bulb or board but replacing a burnt-out

wire or causing a fire in a wall or subfloor can really be expensive. On very rare occasions, a design engineer may not have considered the wide environmental range our RVs have to live in. In this case, a change in fuse size might be needed. I have run into this only three or four times in over 50 years. Do not increase any fuse size; bigger is not always better and sometimes it can lead to disaster.

A handy item to carry is a set of ATC automotive type fuses that are circuit breakers. These will open if there is excessive current flow and then heal/reset once the current goes below the fuse rating. These are handy for troubleshooting and determining that you have solved a problem. I carry 15A, 20A and 30A sets. Once the problem is resolved and the breaker no longer opens, you can replace it with the properly rated fuse. Many trailers use self-healing 12-volt circuit breakers and when there is an overcurrent condition, they seem to be buzzing which usually means you have exceeded the current rating and they are just turning on and off.

LED replacements are available, at reasonable costs, for your interior and exterior lighting needs. These are particularly effective for replacing incandescent lights. "Super Bright LEDs" (the supplier) also provides a complete series of automotive replacement LEDs which have the standard auto bulb bases for easily converting running lights, tail lights, turn signals, etc. They are also available for fluorescent fixtures and can be wired into your existing fixtures in place of the bulbs. LED replacements will considerably reduce current draw wherever they are used, thus extending battery life when dry camping.

#### **Electronic Boards**

Another connection area that can cause all kinds of problems is the tiny Molex plugs on your circuit boards. All your gas appliances that have self-lighting capability have circuit boards to control this function. Some of these are exposed to the elements and pick up dirt as well as corrosion. You cannot use WD-40 to clean these connections since it will leave a film that attracts dirt and grease. You should have a spray can of "Electronic Circuit Cleaner" that leaves no residue after use. It can also be used on the entire board to remove dirt and prevent short circuits. Most of the appliance vendors have gone to potted circuit boards when they are exposed to the elements; this is particularly important on earlier RVs. On occasion, an appliance will be intermittent, just start, and then stop working. Check the connections to the circuit boards. Carefully remove them, spray with contact cleaner; plug in and out a few times and then remake the connection. I have fixed dozens of problems with this simple procedure.

would stop them. If they made it thru most of the Belgian Congo, they'd never make it across the Luvua River. If they made it to Nairobi, Kenya, they'd never make it to Addis Ababa, Ethiopia. And if they made it to Addis Ababa, they'd never make it across the Nubian Desert in Sudan. But they did all of these things, though some of the obstacles did slow them down.

In part 2 we will begin a country by country review of this caravan, highlighting some of the wildlife, African tribes, and ancient ruins they saw; many of the hardships they overcame; and a few of the many occasions they were invited into the homes of natives, Europeans, and Americans living in Africa. This review will be based upon the combined accounts of four African Caravan families:

#342 Lillie and Ralph Douglass

#598 Joe and Toots Bos

#692 Virgil and Grace Golden

When we are done, I think you will understand why the WBCCI membership numbers used on this caravan have been recognized as Heritage Numbers.

### Doswell, Virginia

It's springtime, and as the weather gets increasingly warmer we get ever closer to the International Rally in Doswell. To help you plan your agenda for the time you will spend in Virginia in July, this is the fifth in a series of six articles about places of significance you may want to visit.

In each of these Blue Beret articles, we examine places of significance when driving in a specific direction from Doswell. Thus far we described places to the west, southeast, and northeast, as well as attractions very close to Doswell. We've mentioned that some of these places, like the National Museum of the Marine Corps (see the April issue of Blue Beret) can be done as a "day trip." But we've also cautioned that major Virginia tourist attractions, like Williamsburg and the Historic Colonial Triangle area (see the March issue) take several days to experience fully.

In this month's article, we look at a few points of interest SOUTH of our rally site. Admittedly, they get fewer visitors than Virginia's bigger and better-known attractions, but they are interesting, less crowded and historically significant. Any of them can easily be seen in a day trip from Doswell. And, because they are close to each other and less than an hour away, you might even have time to visit two or three in a single trip.

Richmond, Virginia's capital, is only 25 miles south and it's worth a full day. We described highlights of this city in the November 2018 Blue Beret, but to explore what Richmond offers, it's best to start at the Visitor Center. Get a map, talk to a representative at the desk and plan your stops.

On the way toward Richmond, you will pass Virginia's one and only Airstream dealership. "Airstream of Virginia" has a new location just off I-95 Exit 89 near Ashland. As you drive south for eight miles, you'll see a whole bunch of familiar-looking silver trailers (and many SOB RVs) parked in a huge lot off the edge of the Interstate at mile marker 90.0. The dealership is operated by Camping World and located alongside their larger McGeorge's Rolling Hills RV facility. It offers RV service and has an accessories store.

Near Richmond, the old and the new stand side-by-side. A 21<sup>st</sup> Century Dominion Electric power plant is adjacent to a 17<sup>th</sup> Century historic site on the James River. The "Citie of Henricus at Dutch Gap." was the second English

settlement in America founded in 1611, four years after Jamestown. Henricus is where the famous princess of the Powhatan tribe we know as "Pocahontas" converted to Christianity and lived with her English husband, tobacco planter John Rolfe. On the piece of land believed to be the original site of Henricus, Chesterfield County now operates a living history museum employing a staff of 17 interpreters in period dress. Visitors are greeted in replica buildings of the 17th Century; including a settler's home with chickens, hogs and goats; a replica of the first hospital in English America; a parsonage; a church/meeting hall; and an Indian village. Everything here is on a much smaller scale than the "Jamestown Settlement" tourist attraction, 50 miles downstream, but fewer visitors means more time to spend with the interpreters to learn about 17th Century life in America.

Drive a little further south to Petersburg and you fast forward in time more than 250 years. Petersburg was of pivotal importance in the middle of the 19<sup>th</sup> Century. It was where the closing eastern battles of the Civil War were fought. Just

off I-85 southwest of the city is Pamplin Historic Park, which includes the award-winning National Museum of the Civil War Soldier. Here you

learn a lot about the bloodiest war in American history from the perspective of those who did the fighting, Union and Confederate. The museum's displays, artifacts, interactive audio programs and videos purposefully de-emphasize leaders and politics, focusing instead on the war's impact on the life of the common soldier. Also at Pamplin is the site where, on April 2, 1865, the 5<sup>th</sup> Vermont Infantry broke through the Confederate defenses surrounding Petersburg, hastening Robert E. Lee's retreat and inevitable surrender at Appomattox seven days later.

On the east side of the city is the Petersburg National Battlefield, maintained by the National Park Service. An 18-minute video and a driving tour explain General Ulysses S. Grant's siege of the city between

June 1864 and April 1865. Grant knew that capturing Petersburg would cut off supplies to Richmond and strangle the Confederacy. During a nine-month siege, many battles were fought along the city's perimeter, resulting in over 70,000 casualties. In one early battle, Union troops from Pennsylvania used their expertise as coal miners to dig a 511-foot-long tunnel under a Confederate strongpoint and then detonated explosives in what was described at the time as the "largest, loudest boom in the history of the world." Visitors can view the site to learn what happened after the explosion in what became known as the "Battle of the Crater."

to each other on this Army base.

Returning to this century, two small museums which showcase aspects of today's Army are at nearby Fort Lee. You can visit the U.S. Army Quartermaster Museum and the U.S. Army Women's Museum. They are located next We have described these Virginia destinations south of Doswell as "day trips;" but there is also good camping in the Petersburg area for longer stays, or as an overnight stop on the way to the International Rally. A favorite of Virginia's Airstreamers is

Pocahontas State Park, which has a well-maintained public campground with water/electric sites.

The next issue of Blue Beret will feature the final article in this series. We take an in-depth look at Northern Virginia, a bustling metropolis about 70 miles due north of Doswell via Interstate 95. The land between the Rappahannock and Potomac Rivers was once the colonial stomping grounds (and home) of George Washington. Today, Northern Virginia (often abbreviated "NoVa" or "NORVA") serves as a government, business and residential extension of the Nation's Capital. NoVa and metropolitan Washington D.C. is a "must see," especially if you are visiting Virginia for the first time.

The Rally Arrivals Team looks forward to welcoming you to Doswell. Below is helpful information to smooth your arrival experience.

When you arrive to the staging area, we'll provide you a rally packet containing rally ribbons, maps, tickets and a welcome letter. We've extended parking hours, now  $8\,\text{AM} - 8\,\text{PM}$ . After hours arrivals can overnight in the staging area (dry camping) and we'll park you the next morning. Airstreamers wishing to park together must arrive together – we plan to park rigs in the order in which they arrive as we have 700 plus units to park in a short period of time.

Be prepared. We are camping on a state fairground where water and electric may not be close to your rig. Please bring (2) 25 ft. water hoses or longer with free flow Y adapter so we can daisy chain the water if necessary. Bring an additional electric cord and adapters suitable to carry the electrical load your trailer requires. Please switch your water heater and refrigerator to gas and run only one air conditioner. We don't want to overload the temporary power grid. Arrive with your holding tanks empty and fresh water tank completely full.

Over 600 volunteers dedicate hours of service as front desk assistants and after school tutors.



#### **Directions to the Doswell VA International Rally Arrival area.**

I-95 North and South take VA exit 98 on to VA State Rte 30 east (Dawn Blvd) Take for 2 miles, then take the right on to VA-652 (Meadow Farm Rd) Take the second right hand turn which is Horsemans Alley, Gate #6. Welcome to the reception center, on the right (Lot D).

### **Golden State Caravan**

"California, Here I come", though not the official state song of California, conjures up images of the "Golden State" and all it has to offer for residents and visitors alike.

Join Mike and Phyllis Minadeo as they take a caravan from San Diego to San Francisco. As residents of California, they would like for you to join them to see their state from the southern to the northern areas of interest. There will be 12 stops on this 41-day long caravan, there will be

lots of time to explore, learn and make memories!

Starting in La Mesa on April 30, 2020, touring the San Diego area will be the first area of exploration. Hop-on, hop-off tour of San Diego will make a stop at the USS Midway Museum where veteran pilots give talks on the flight deck (<a href="www.midway.org">www.midway.org</a>). In the San Diego area is La Jolla, the home of the Scripps Institution of Oceanography (<a href="www.scripps.ucsd.edu">www.scripps.ucsd.edu</a>), Cabrillo National Monument (<a href="www.nps.gov/cabr">www.nps.gov/cabr</a>) at Point Loma with beautiful views of the harbor and Mexico's Coronado Islands, Coronado Island with the famous Del Coronado Hotel, Balboa Park, San Diego Zoo (<a href="www.zoo.sandiegozoo.org">www.zoo.sandiegozoo.org</a>) and the historic Gaslamp Quarter/District (<a href="www.gaslamp.org">www.gaslamp.org</a>) known for its restaurants and shopping.

Next stop is Newport Beach and a narrated harbor tour of Newport Bay's multimillion dollar celebrity homes. A day on Catalina Island hiking, eating in great restaurants or shopping in quirky shops will pass quickly. The Wrigley Memorial and Botanic Garden (chewing gum tycoon) is definitely worth seeing (<a href="https://www.catalinaconservancy.org">www.catalinaconservancy.org</a>).

Touring the Ronald Regan Presidential Library (<a href="www.reaganlibrary.gov">www.reaganlibrary.gov</a>) and enjoying lunch under the wings of Air Force One located in the beautiful Simi Valley is planned for the next stop in the Los Angeles area. A tour of LA will include visits to Hollywood, Sunset Blvd, Beverly Hills and celebrity

homes. A visit to one of California's most famous art museums the Getty, with its stunning architecture, gardens and views of LA (<a href="https://www.getty.edu">www.getty.edu</a>) another scheduled stop.

For the fourth stop, the caravan goes to Santa Barbara and the Slovang area. Santa Barbara is promoted as the "American Riviera" with its Spanish and Mexican history and influence. Solvang is known for its Danish-style architecture and many wineries. La

Purisima Mission (<u>www.lapurimamission.org</u>) is considered the most completely restored mission in California with 10 of the original buildings fully restored and furnished to the 1820s.

Moving north, the caravan heads to Morro Bay/Pismo Bay and Hearst Castle – one of America's 10 most amazing castles (<a href="www.hearstcastle.org">www.hearstcastle.org</a>). A visit to the Madonna Inn in San Luis Obispo for dinner or a slice of pie is always a treat – recommends Phyllis!

Stop 6 takes the caravan to Monterey Bay area and Steinbeck country. A visit and lunch at his birthplace, childhood home and museum are planned. The amazing Monterey Bay Aquarium's (www.montereybayaquarium.org) mission is to inspire conservation of the ocean. Elkhorn Slough has playful sea otters, curious harbor seals, boisterous sea lions and hundreds of bird species. Other areas of interest include Carmel, Cannery Row, Pebble Beach's 17-mile drive, Big Sur and Big Basin Redwood State Park.

The California Delta and the historic small town of Locke is the next stop on the continuing route to the north. Locke housed many Chinese immigrants hired to drain the Delta wetland and build levees to regulate flood control. Lodi, home to more than 80 wineries, is known as the "Zinfandel Capital of the World" because the local wineries produce 40% of the premiere Zinfandel in California.

Stop 8 will bring the caravan to Yosemite in the Sierra Nevada Mountains. Yosemite National Park (<a href="www.nps.gov/yose">www.nps.gov/yose</a>) is famous for its giant Sequoia trees, Tunnel View Overlook, Bridal Veil Falls, the cliffs of El Capitan and Half Dome. Springtime is peak flow for many of the waterfalls in Yosemite.

Moving on to Gold Country, the caravan will go to Columbia — a living gold rush town located in the heart of the California Mother Lode. Here the history of the gold rush comes to life — pan for gold, explore exhibits, ride the stagecoach and learn about the rich history of the gold rush. (www. visitcolumbiacalifornia.com)

At stop 10, the caravan will be visiting Lake Tahoe, the largest alpine lake in North American known for the clarity of its water and the panorama of surrounding mountains on all sides. There will be a lake cruise to visit Emerald Bay which features Eagle Falls and Vikingsholm, a 38-room mansion that is considered one of the finest examples of Scandinavian architecture in the United States. (www.vikingsholm.com)

Onto Sacramento and the capital of California. While there will be time to take advantage of great dining in the city, there will also be time to visit Old Sacramento (www.oldsacramento.com) – the riverfront historic district that has many Gold Rush era buildings, shops, cobble stone streets and

museums including the Sacramento History Museum and the Railroad Museum (www.californiarailroad.museum).

The last (12th) but certainly not least stop is San Francisco Bay area! Phyllis and Mike will be introducing caravanners to the popular San Francisco highlights including Chinatown, Alcatraz, Fisherman's Wharf, cable cars, the Golden Gate Bridge and nearby Sonoma and Napa valleys renowned for vineyards and wine production! No visit to San Francisco would be complete without seeing the hilarious production of Beach Blanket Babylon, an iconic theatre production for 50 years.

Greetings! As I write this article in early April, the weather here in Ohio has finally turned the corner. We have had some nice early spring days. That gets us excited about the summer season by getting out of the house for a while and taking a vacation. I hope you are all making your plans!!

In this article I will be covering the door hinges we use in the travel trailers. We get questions concerning how to adjust the hinges, as well as owners telling us sometimes they do not stay connected to the hinge base if they are bumped while getting items in and out of the cabinet.

### Grass Euro style hidden door hinges

Airstream has used two different Euro style hidden hinges. The earlier models will have a black plastic cover while the later models will have a chrome cover. This change took place in the 2014 model year and all 2015 models would have the chrome cover. The removal of this cover will give you access to the adjustment screws on the hinges. The newer style is a direct replacement if for some reason one would have to be replaced. Below I will show you a picture of each hinge.



Earlier style with black cover




Current style with chrome cover

#### Adjustment points on the hinge

Interesting to note that whether you have the earlier style with the black cover or the newer style with the chrome cover the adjustment points are the same. I will show you a picture detailing the three adjustment points on the hinges with a closed cabinet door view.

#### The three center screws do not tighten latch!



### Gray release button lock

The question we get asked frequently is that their cabinet door hinges are always coming apart or even falling off. The hinge comes detached from the base. Is there a fix or should I just replace the hinges?

The answer to this question is that the quick release lever (pictured above) is not protected and that sometimes just by bumping them, or even rough roads can cause them to come detached from the hinge base. There is a fix however as there is a release button lock that can be installed so that you cannot accidentally release the hinge from the base. It locks it in place and can be installed in seconds. I capture the grey lock in the first pictures of this article but I will show another picture of how it installs.
