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Potlucks and Cooking for 70 People

I've been asked to submit recipes for 2 people and for 70 people. Can they be the same?

In many cases they can be. But first, hold on a minute here, if there are 70 people on a caravan, am I cooking for all of them to eat a full serving? The answer is no. You can expect that if you make enough for everyone to have a spoonful or two, you're covered. I'm notorious with my family for making too much food. Leftovers can be great, but with food sitting outside for hours and touched by many hands (and possibly flies), not so much. Unless your dish is completely covered between servings, and doesn't need to be refrigerated, it's not safe to keep it around very much longer. Making the correct amount means less waste. If your dish is completely eaten up, great! They loved it and you don't have to try to save a huge dish of food in your tiny fridge. I've never been to a potluck where anyone went away hungry, have you?

their events could be raucous and competitive based on who could eat the most. Potlucks are practical for traveling in groups. You share what you have, and they with you. You find new dishes, new tastes, something you have never made, and best of all you share the conviviality of eating with friends.

Dishes that are best for groups fall into several categories: Finger food, dips (you supply the crackers or tortilla chips), cheese and vegetable plates, crockpot foods that can be ladled onto a plate, breads, desserts and salads (including pasta, rice, and fruit salads). If your dish requires a bowl, don't forget to supply the bowls. Guests bringing their own plates and utensils may not know to bring a bowl. Think about the weather and what would be

most appealing. Cold or wet means warm foods will be a hit. Don't be afraid to change your planned dish if the weather changes. In Doswell, VA at the International Rally, I made a "day of" decision to change one of my presentation

Spinach Coconut Rice

Easy, fast, can be doubled, one pan. All ingredients are easily stored for whenever needed.

In a large pot or sauté pan on the stove (cast iron or Dutch oven or Insta-pot works too), add:

½ tsp cumin

½ - 1 tsp curry powder

2 cups rice (any kind, but basmati is nice)

1 ½ to 2 cups of water or vegetable stock (start with 1 ½ if using white rice)

- 1 14 ounce can of coconut milk (full fat)
- 1 tsp salt and a couple grinds of pepper

Bring to boil, reduce heat and simmer 10 minutes. Add:

1 10 oz package of frozen spinach (or fresh, chopped) Juice of 1 lime (if you don't have a lime, use half a lemon)

Re-cover the pan and cook until rice is done. If you're using brown rice, you'll probably have to add more water.

Top with cashews or toasted coconut or nothing. It all works.

meals. It was hot, so hot that preparing anything using much heat was out of the question.

I always have a back-up plan. And most importantly, be proud of your dish! Display it on the nicest dish you have in your trailer!

Have you ever given thought to what makes one local Airstream club run successfully and another that needs to shut down for lack of participation? I've been thinking guite a bit about this and thought I would share some ideas in my membership column this month.

For purposes of this article, I am going to use the term "club" vs. "unit" as more and more units are becoming clubs. Why, you ask (and I have been asked repeatedly why the change) would a unit become a club? Take for example my club, the Oregon Airstream Club. If someone wants to find a local club, they will Google "Airstream Club", not "unit #90 of the WBCCI". "Unit" has traditionally been a military designation and as we move toward a more recreationally focused organization, the term club vs unit seems more friendly, somehow. More than 60% of our local "units" are now "clubs". But enough about that. Let's talk about my ideas about qualities that make a successful local club.

The first and most obvious one would be activities. These are an essential reason that someone might join a club - things to do with fellow Airstreamers. We seek out people with whom we have things in common, right? And when we have Airstreams in common, that's something really special. Rallies are the first thing that comes to mind and there are so many ways that this can be done. I gave a talk at Doswell titled "More and Better Rallies". Yes, I had my perspective to share, complete with a slide presentation, but I also learned so much from the audience about how other clubs do successful rallies. For example. our club reserves all sites ahead of time and people register online, based on a description of the rally. But others have members reserve their own sites. Meals vary from the host cooking three course dinners and breakfasts for two days to all potluck meals to reserving restaurants for the group. Some rallies are highly structured with events and/or tours planned throughout the event while others are

far more laid back. Some larger clubs, like ours, have 20 or more rallies per year while smaller clubs might only have 5 or 6 in a year. Other activities might include a monthly breakfast or lunch held at a central location. Some clubs offer special holiday gatherings and some hold smaller gatherings at the home of club members, perhaps a BBQ or picnic. Some will offer flash rallies, a last-minute sort of thing where someone gets an idea to go to a particular camping location and invites others to join them. And certainly local clubs can also run caravans, be they numbered and formal or not numbered and far more casual.

Communication with members is the next essential component. For many clubs, this means a newsletter, filled with pictures of past events, a schedule of upcoming ones, news about members, a welcome to new members, recipes, etc. When they are filled with color and good pictures, they are a joy to read. Cara Goedeking of the Idaho unit is especially good at newsletters – I love to read what she sends because it is visually charming, and the content is interesting and upbeat. Other communication that I have found to be helpful is using a service like Survey Monkey to assess what it is that club members want from their organization. Giving multiple choice options about such things as rally locations or size of rallies or costs or other activities can clarify if those who are planning events for the club are right on about their instincts of what people want or are they way off? Sometimes we think we know what people want but it's easy to check out those perceptions through a tool like this. Some clubs will send out a last minute email about openings in a rally that come about as a result of cancellations and a note to all members might interest someone who would grab a last minute spot that opens up.

But without **leadership**, the club cannot exist. As Region 10 president, I had to preside over the closure of a unit (yes, a unit). Though there were many interested members, no one would

agree to step up and serve as officers. The same people had rotated in and out of the officer positions for years and they finally said "enough!" So in spite of member interest, the club folded due to lack of leadership. And I would say that it isn't enough just to have warm bodies to fill the spots, we need leaders who are engaged and excited and enthusiastic about their roles – that's infectious to members as well. However, one mistake I have seen is approaching new members too quickly about becoming officers. It's probably not cool to say, "Hi Susie and John, welcome to the XYZ Airstream Club, we need officers, and I hope you will sign up soon". People need time to get a feel for the organization, see if it fits for them, let them get acquainted with the structure and other members and THFN ask.


The final component that is far more nebulous is the concept of inclusivity. The history of this club is one of formality and specific rules and wonderful traditions. But we've definitely come a long way to being more relaxed and open. Our members are slightly more diverse than they used to be and now include all sorts of different folks. Young members with children should be welcome. People with both old and new rigs should feel welcome. Gay and lesbians couples should feel welcome. Aging folks who appreciate a bit of help with their rigs should feel welcome. People of color should feel welcome. People of all religions or no religion should feel welcome. Democrats and Republicans should feel welcome (though best to leave politics at home). People who want to climb mountains and hike for miles in the woods and kayak should feel welcome. And people who want to just hang out with friends and enjoy happy hour should feel welcome. Clubs with a heart that welcomes all of these people and more have a far greater chance for success.



Our European Road Trip - Part 4 More Swiss Mountains, Walks and National Days

I continue the story of our wonderful trip through France, Switzerland, Germany and Belgium in the summer of 2018. Hopefully you read the first three episodes in previous *Blue Beret* issues where after travelling down the west coast of France, across to the Midi-Pyrenees, Provence and then to Lake Annecy in the West of France. I continue our travelogue still camped in Lauterbrunnen in Switzerland in Ali, our 2015 International 684 Airstream, similar to a 27ft US model but 8ft 3ins wide.

To remind you of who was travelling, we are the Lewis family - Don (me), my wife Amanda, Abigail our 15-year-old daughter and, with us on every trip so far, Amanda's mum, Betty. And of course we can't forget Barkley, our wonderful Golden Doodle dog — the only one on the trip who doesn't answer back!!

Every day, Switzerland lives up to expectations and, to be honest, we may not have gone there had we not got into the camping lifestyle when we did the motorhome trip in 2014 to Yellowstone, Glacier and Canada where we first saw and fell in love with Airstreams — and now we have one of our own...we love our Airstream!!

I hadn't really appreciated how much there is to do in the summer in the Alps. Day 29 had finished in Birg where there was a cliff walk - a metal path bolted to the side of the cliff with glass and wire floors and other fun challenges like wire ropes and a net

Day 30 continued with hiking in the hills and, after waking up to the sun shining down on our Airstream, we drove first to Grindelwald in the next valley along. It is about twice the size of Lauterbrunnen and is the starting point of quite a few cable cars and trains that take you up into the mountains around. The North Face of the Eiger dominates the scenery from the town with the Mönch and the Jungfrau beyond. We headed up to a cable car station called 'Grindelwald First'. Barkley was getting very used to cable cars and quite happily sat as the world disappeared from under him! There are lots of activities up there including zip wires and three-wheel scooters that you can race down the mountain on. There are also some great walks.

We headed to Lake Bachalpsee, which was about a 70-minute walk from the top of the cable car. It was worth it to see the reflection of the mountains in the lake. The flowers along the route were fantastic and the scenery around was stunning. We even got up close and personal with some of the not-so-wildlife...although I wouldn't want to mess with mountain goats!!

I mentioned the North Face of the Eiger - just looking at the enormity of this almost sheer rock face raised my admiration for climbers everywhere, but especially those that had conquered this mountain ... something I remember reading about in my childhood comics. To see it was something else!!

Day 31 was the Swiss National Day - 1st of August. We had been pretty busy up to now and, as we woke up to a pretty damp day, we decided to chill and relax. Amanda got on with the cardigan she was crocheting. It was just a bunch of knots to me, but I was told that it's 'macramé'...still a bunch of knots! Abigail read another book and

Betty wandered into town. Me - well I did all the cooking, cleaning and tidying up... seriously?...no, honest, really...ok, I lied - I chilled!!

When it got dark the rain stopped and we wandered down to town where there was an event with the town band and a bonfire to celebrate the Swiss National Day - lots of balloons and Swiss flags. And what better way to finish the day but with some great fireworks with waterfalls as the backdrop - a nice day with the family just taking it easy around Ali - our home from home.

Our next day consisted of more hiking and steep train rides back into the mountains near our campsite in Lauterbrunnen. We headed to Wilderswil which is about 10 minutes drive from Lauterbrunnen and is the starting point for the Schynige Platte Mountain Railway, which was the first one to go into operation in 1893. It was built for the well-healed Victorian visitors on their 'European Grand Tour' who would stay at

the grand hotels in Interlaken. It is also one of the steepest mountain railways and they still use the original rolling stock, so we really experienced it as the early tourists did. Barkley got used to the mountain railways but this one was quite amusing as it was so steep he was sliding down the centre of the carriage and we had to wedge him in place.

The 7.2km journey once again was breathtaking with the views of the mountains and down into the valley to Lake Thun beyond Interlaken. Of course, at the top of Schynige Platte the views were fantastic, but there was also an alpine garden with hundreds of different species. We got up close and personal with Edelweiss - which is actually an ugly plant in my view, BUT it did provoke memories of Julie Andrews singing the song in The Sound of Music. Naturally Amanda and Abigail had to sing a verse.

Now, at this point in the trip, I actually had a few comments on Facebook saying that friends were concerned for my welfare because I had been lacking in ice cream intake. Well, for those who cared, there was no need to worry as we did finish the day with an ice cream...when we got back to the Airstream fridge. Yum!!

Day 33 – We woke to bright sunshine and...well, I am running out of superlatives!!

We went to the Top of Europe - to the Jungfraujoch. This is the highest publicly open observation point in Europe at a height of 3454m above sea level. It overlooks the UNESCO World Heritage Swiss Alps Jungfrau-Aletsch...and if you look at the pictures (even though again they don't do it justice) you will see why it has World Heritage site accreditation - The Alps longest Glacier - the Aletsch glacier.

The Jungfraujoch observation deck was opened in 1912 and to get to it meant another (expensive but worth it) train journey to the highest train station in Europe. We got a very early train 8 AM (!!!! We're on holiday so that is early!) from Lauterbrunnen first to Kleine Scheidegg where we changed to the Jungfraubahn to take us the last 40 minutes to the top. And wow was it worth it!!

The highest point is the Sphinx observation terrace where you get views into Switzerland, Germany, Italy and France as well as a Birdseye view of the Aletsch Glacier.

There are numerous things to do such as visiting Europe's highest watch shop and also a Lindt chocolate shop - we didn't buy any due to the stupid prices!! There is also an ice tunnel where there are numerous ice carvings. The funniest for me was the frozen character - Scrat and his acorn, from the film *Ice Age*!!

The highlight of the day for me was to walk to a climbers' hut that was at the end of an ice (or slush) walk up hill. The views were just amazing. Even if all you were able to do on a visit to Switzerland was come to Jungfraujoch then it would be worth the time, energy and expense.



On the way back down, we stopped for a while at Kleine Scheidegg and took in some more magnificent views of the Jungfrau, Mönch and the Eiger. The latter for me is the one that stirs the emotions when you look at the sheer wall of the North Face.

Further down the mountain we also stopped for an hour at Wengen. I am sure it is a great place to visit in the winter where it is most famous for the Lauberhorn downhill ski race - on the list for the future...after all we do have to test out the Airstream's winter capabilities sometime eh!!

Of course, we finished back at the Airstream with BBQ bratwurst and a glass of wine!! Its been such a tough day we had to replenish our fuel cells.

Day 34 and after the excitement of yesterday climbing mountains and riding the highest railway in Europe, we had another rest day. We woke up to Blue sky again, but this was even bettered by having BBQ bacon sandwiches for breakfast cooked on our BBQ. Just something about the little





features of the Airstream – like being able to attach our BBQ to the gas outlet on the side of the Airstream just makes everything work together.

Today I did something I have not done all of this trip - I sat in front of the Airstream this afternoon and fell asleep. Of course, I am always the fall guy when Abigail fell about laughing when my own snoring woke me up!!

The day got even better when Abigail took over the BBQ AND we had ice cream. As my fellow Airstreamer Joe Harris (#16000) would say... "a balanced diet is an ice cream in each hand."

Day 35 was our last day in Lauterbrunnen so some of the day was spent packing up the awning etc. Our surrounding waterfalls looked lovely this morning and so we decided to visit the Trümmelbach Fallen - these are the waterfalls that alone act as the drain for the Eiger, the Mönch and the Jungfrau throwing out 20,000 litres

of water a second and over 20 tonnes of debris and boulders per year.

The Trümmelbach Falls are also inside the mountain and made accessible via a tunnel lift and stairs. The noise was deafening and again the pictures just can't show the amount of water that was pouring out - it's amazing there is any glacier left!! Both Amanda and I did get very wet from the waterfall spray...very, very wet!

The falls were only a short distance from our camp, so we walked through the valley to them and back again along the river created from all the water from the falls. This really has been a perfectly placed campsite. It has been the longest stay in a location on our trip – 10 days and we even had the grass growing up the wheels. It was a good choice.

Our evening was spent packing up, putting bikes back on the roof of the car and doing all we could for a quick departure in the morning. - off to Germany tomorrow!!

This excerpt was only a few days in Switzerland. We have exhausted every superlative in trying to describe the scenery and couldn't recommend it high enough... excuse the pun.

The Beneficiary

Shortly after the International Rally, a partnership was created between Region 4 and a very special organization named Santa's Hide-A-Way Hollow.

This non-profit organization founded in 1981, is dedicated to working with seriously and terminally ill children and their families to provide comfort and support throughout the final stages of the child's illness. Many children ask to see Santa for a last Christmas as they near the end of their struggle. Santa's Hide-Away is committed to meeting that very need any time of the year. Santa gives his healing Spirit to all!

Terminally and seriously ill children face incredible personal challenges throughout the progressive stages of their illness. The mythology and folkways of Santa Claus represents a very special form of support for these children. Santa Claus is about listening and supporting a child's dreams, wishes and emotional and spiritual needs. A day of excitement being with Santa is a statement about the child's worthiness. A child is encouraged to ask for what it is he or she wants and participates in the Spirit of Christmas with their family and friends. Santa also provides joyful and fond memories for the families that will support their healing needs after the loss of their loved one.



The compound naturally has a large workshop for Santa, a tailor shop that specializes in making either red suits or green suits, and a barber shop to keep Santa and his elves looking spiffy.

There's a full-scale wooden lookout tower for the elves to watch for the first signs of snow and a garage for Santa's sleigh, which along with Santa, was at the North Pole. The grounds also have a heliport for Santa to land his helicopter.

Of course, there's a working train and there's also an ice cream shop.

A fishing pond is stocked with fullsized fish to catch for that photo opportunity, and a nearby pavilion provides shelter for a Christmas in July picnic for Santa's special guests.

A nurse's station, complete with beds, is available for sick children to rest for a while or receive a needed shot of medicine.

The 93-acre property has nearly everything Santa could want in a perfect hideaway, including a school for Teddy bears as well as a cabin for Bernard, when the chief elf visits.

The crowning building is an incredibly beautiful 100 seat chapel that was just completed. Families asked for a chapel to hold services for children who have died. There are 600 Christmas trees planted on the property by families who have lost a child. That is, except for one tree. It was planted by a girl whose father died from complications after giving her lifesaving bone marrow.

Picture a scene reminiscent of a small-town corner lot where families select the perfect tree to tie to the top of the car, take home, and decorate in preparation for Christmas. The lot is contained by an old wood and wire snow fence. Strands of exposed lights are hung above. Various evergreen trees stand ready for selection. And of course, an old, silver Airstream trailer is in the corner where 'Wally' is awaiting a sale!

Our chosen lot is about 150 feet square. Many Christmas trees will be permanently planted, decorated, and lit. Various garland,





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fun signage, and other appointments fill the lot. An ADA compliant path and small ramp will lead into an Airstream that contains a warmly decorated interior. The modified layout will allow for children to cool off and relax while enjoying a movie. The rear of the Airstream will be employed as a volunteer workspace where various tasks can be completed, and communication radios are charged and stored.

How does this become a reality? Tasks include initiating a campaign to raise funds from our membership and beyond, acquiring and modify a trailer, and planning and executing an early springtime work rally. This is a lot of work, but I really believe we have many great people in the WBCCI that will be excited to help.

We are budgeting about \$6,000 for our end of the project. Santa has agreed to the same

amount. Seems he has a lot of elves that pitch in with supplies and services! Today we visited the project site. Santa has been busy! The lot is already rough graded, the drive has been placed and will be paved soon.

The largest item to acquire will be the trailer. Unfortunately, many Airstreams can be found that have been gutted by big dreamers without the proper resources to complete their project. As we are looking for an Airstream that does not have working 12-volt, propane or water/waste systems, the search will be easier and less expensive. Additionally, the trailer will be permanently placed, so good running gear isn't critical. If you are aware of an Airstream that may fit our needs near Ohio, please do contact us.

Your assistance may be financial, physical or both. We do promise you that any support will be appreciated!






Caught up with my friends from Texas again plus met some new friends to be. It's always good to settle in for a few nights to catch my breath.

The 1959-60 African Caravan Part 6: Eritrea and Sudan

We continue our 1959-60 African Caravan review following the caravanners thru Eritrea and Sudan.

Eritrea December 14-27, 1959

On December 14, the caravan drove the last 100 miles in Ethiopia and entered Eritrea, a territory loosely federated with Ethiopia under the sovereignty of Emperor Haile Selassie. They made it to Senafe by nightfall and arrived in Asmara the following day.

After arrival at their pre-arranged campsite in Asmara, the caravan was permitted full use of the facilities at the U.S. Army's Kagnew Station, including the Officer's Mess, the Gl's Oasis Club, the Guest House (for baths and showers), Snack Bar, and Movie Theatre. The caravanners took advantage of all these facilities and decided to

extend their stay through Christmas Day, finally enjoying the company of Americans after a long time in native areas.

During their stay in Asmara, the caravanners took a bus trip to Axum (now Aksum) in northern Ethiopia, the ancient capital city of Ethiopia, center of the Coptic Church, and the supposed burial site of the Queen of Sheba. They saw many ruins and had the chance to view the old Crown Jewels of Ethiopia. The men were able to enter a church to see the jewels, however the women were not, so the jewels were brought outside for the women to see, something that probably would not have happened had it not been for the power of the caravan.

Many caravanners took a train ride down the mountains to Massawa to see the Red Sea.

Some even pulled their Airstreams there.

They found Massawa to be a very Arab city, in

contrast to the African cities they had seen so far. The caravanners attended the Christmas pageant at Kagnew and had Christmas dinner there, including turkey with all the trimmings. A couple of caravan families missed the Christmas dinner due to illness. The most serious was Dr. Andrew, who was recuperating in the hospital after having a stroke a couple days after the caravan arrived in Asmara. 85-year-old Dr. Monroe was also sick and missed Christmas dinner.

The day after Christmas, the 30 Airstreams still with the caravan pulled out to head west to Khartoum, Sudan, accompanied by U.S. Army guards. Dr. & Mrs. Andrew remained behind in the hospital, while their two daughters drove their rig to Khartoum. 14-year-old Carmen Andrew, who had learned to drive and pull the Airstream during the African caravan, was joined by older sister Charlotte, who had recently flown to Africa to join the rest of the family. In two days, the caravan reached Tessenei (now Tesseney) near the Sudan border.

Sudan Dec. 28, 1959 – Late Jan. 1960

On December 28, the caravan entered Sudan at Kassala. Clearing customs was slow as the officials searched every trailer. The caravan now faced 325 miles of semidesert, the southern reaches of the Nubian Desert, on the way to Khartoum. Many crisscrossing roads made navigation difficult.

#342 Ralph Douglass was very sick, so Ralph and Lillie and #2476 Dr. Anthony and Helen Reiger and a guide familiar with the roads sped ahead of the main caravan to try to get Ralph to a hospital in Khartoum as quickly as possible. At 4 o'clock in the morning, after driving 16 hours at breakneck speeds, the two rigs made it to Khartoum, where Ralph spent a week in the hospital before being discharged, though he was too weak to drive for several more days.

The two caboose rigs for the first day in Sudan, #360 Harry and Grace Zeigler and #2375 Norman and Era Totten, drank tea while the caravan departed. When they finally hit the road, they took a wrong turn and ended up going an extra 150 miles and were not seen again until they arrived in Khartoum.

The caravan arrived in Khartoum on December 31, taking 3 days to travel the distance that the Douglass's and Reigers had driven in 16 hours. Damage included a broken spring on the trailer of #2421 John and Ruth Edgar and a fallen sink in the #2058 Andrew trailer pulled by daughters Carmen and Charlotte. After arrival at their beautiful campsite on the bank of the Blue Nile, most caravanners began the task of cleaning great amounts of sand and dust out of their Airstreams.

The caravanners spent about 2 weeks in Khartoum. Many took boat rides on the Blue Nile and White Nile Rivers that merged in Khartoum. Others visited Omdurman, the native section of town, and visited various museums and markets, took camel rides, etc. Some caravanners attended a Sudanese Wedding Celebration. The city band gave the caravanners a concert in camp.

#1986 Gen Christie burned her hand in a fire in their trailer. While cooking, she experienced a small stovetop fire that flashed when gasoline was accidentally thrown on it instead of water. Other caravanners quickly rushed over and put out the fire.

#2209 Adam and Helen Mackay, sold their rig in Khartoum and flew home, dropping the number of Airstreams continuing with the caravan to 29 of the original 41. #2380 Art and Ellen Martin flew home to lowa temporarily after learning that Art's father was gravely ill. A young dentist that had been traveling with the caravan since Nairobi, took the Martin's rig to Cairo, Egypt

where the Martins planned to reunite with the caravan.

The caravanners had a big choice to make for the next leg of the journey, with about half electing to load their rigs on rail cars for a 3-day train ride to Wadi Halfa, their last stop in Sudan. The first twelve rigs departed Khartoum on January 10 after a full day of loading on train cars, secured in places with frayed ropes. The rest would follow as soon as train cars were available. The train cars were exactly two inches wider than the trailer wheels, which made entering the trailers difficult, yet that is where the caravanners typically rode on the 50 mile stretches between train stations. The first rigs arrived in Wadi Halfa on January 13.

The other half of the caravanners wanted to get the fullest possible African experience and decided to drive 200 desert miles north to Atbara where a further decision would be required before they entered the most desolate part of the Nubian Desert. This group drove out of Khartoum on January 12. The first day the road was generally passable in 2-wheel drive and they saw a few small towns and very little traffic. The major trouble of the day was a broken spring shackle on the #616 Halbritter's trailer. After camping in the desert overnight, the road became sandier and 4-wheel drive was often required. A few rigs got stuck and had to be pulled out. Along the way they visited the ancient Pyramids of Meroe. At Atbara, it was decided that seven Airstreams, the three support trucks, and Dr. Andrew's truck with Gene Ritchie riding shotgun would drive across the Nubian Desert to Wadi Halfa while the rest, including Dr. Andrew's Airstream and family and Gene Ritchie's rig, would load onto train cars at Atbara. Many thought it unwise for Dr. Andrew to go so soon after his stroke, but he wanted the full experience and felt that the winch on his truck would prove invaluable to the group and he could not be dissuaded.

On January 14, eight rigs remained at Atbara to ship to Wadi Halfa as soon as train cars became available, while the following caravanners drove into the deep Nubian Desert:

- #2201 Elmer & Ida Benham

- #2058 Dr. Earl Andrew & #1199 Gene Ritchie (truck only)
- Scouts Dale Schwamborn & Nick Charles
- Mechanic Arturo Ruiz
- Photographer Pete Turner

By dusk this group had made it 22 miles past Atbara. In the days that followed, each rig took turns getting stuck in the sand and damage included flat tires, broken trailer and truck springs, and many less serious issues. Dr. Andrew and Gene Ritchie turned down offers to sleep in others' Airstreams and bedded down each night in trenches they dug in the sand.

On January 16, the caravanners were told they were on the wrong road and many got stuck crossing over the railroad tracks to the correct road on the other side. On January 17, before departing Abu Hamad, two rigs got stuck trying to get into the fuel station and all caravanners had to sign papers acknowledging that there would be no water or fuel available until they reached Wadi Halfa. On January 18, the Goldens broke the rear axle in their truck and Dr. Andrew began towing their trailer while they limped forward in front wheel drive. On

January 19, mechanic Art Ruiz sped ahead to Wadi Halfa to get spider gears to repair the Golden's truck. Other rigs were experiencing a variety of other breakage issues but continued on. On January 20, the group stopped because the Golden's truck could not make it through the soft sand without assistance. Art returned in the afternoon with the necessary parts and had the Golden's truck repaired within an hour and a half. On January 21, the #2375 Tottens jackknifed and ripped the propane bottles and

battery box off the front of their Airstream. On January 22, the Totten's trailer came unhitched and punched a hole in the back of their truck. Later in the day they finally pulled into Wadi Halfa.

This group was the last to reach Wadi Halfa, having taken 9 days to drive 580 miles across the Nubian Desert from Khartoum. Dr. Andrew had used his winch 33 times to help extricate stuck rigs. Mechanic Art Ruiz lost count of how many times he used his winch.

The caravan had trickled into Wadi Halfa, Sudan over the period of January 13 to 22. They were not permitted to drive any further, so over the next few days each rig would depart for Aswan, Egypt via the Nile River as soon as barges became available. One more country to traverse and their Cape Town to Cairo dream would be complete.

African Caravan Advance Scout Dale Schwamborn Talks About Adventures in Eritrea and Sudan

Shangri-La: The oasis has always been a respite for the traveler. Our oasis was Kagnew Station, an American military listening station located in Asmara, Eritrea. We received permission to shop and eat at the PX (Post Exchange). For the young set it was hamburgers, French fries, soft drinks, milk shakes, and ice cream once, twice, and again and again and again. The base radio had pop music, a time to catch up on the top forty hits from home. Human contact with Americans, a very special sojourn.

•••

Riding Shotgun: The Kagnew Station commander knew we would be travelling through an area controlled by bandits when we left Asmara. He provided a military escort of three Jeeps with mounted 50 caliber machine guns that stayed with us until we were past the point of attack.

•••

Water Hole: The eastern part of Sudan is the southern Nubian Desert. Miles from Khartoum is a water hole frequented by camel trains and nomads in search of water. The caravan was

a hit. Without words the camel drivers provided hours of camel rides for the caravanners. No guide pulling the camel, just a real "hands on", "giddy up", rompin', stompin' ride as the jockey. Encounters like these discard the barriers of politics, class and ulterior motives. This is another memory of a lifetime.

•••

One if by Rail, and Two if by Sand: Overnight condensation created a thin paving on the sand. If momentum was kept up vehicles maintained their speed and direction. Slowing down and stopping was the same as skating on thin ice - down you go up to the axle in fine sand.

Several of the Caravanners wanted to take their trucks and trailers over each inch of Africa by road, so we hired Sudanese sandrunners to help us. They came with a truck and many heavy, sixfoot-long steel sand tracks. The tracks provide a solid surface for a truck to drive over soft sand. As a rig passes by, you pick up a track from the back, run to the front and place it down again. You do this over and over again until you have passed through the treacherous sand. Not only did the Sudanese run and place tracks, so did caravanners, the mechanic and the scouts.

Several caravanners fed up with getting stuck in the sand drove on the railway tracks. The severity of the bumps from the railway ties wasn't any worse than the washboard roads in the Congo. The Sudanese National Railway had extreme displeasure with the caravan. The trucks and trailers loosened the ties and rails such that a maintenance train was required to re-secure them. An apology soothed the angry railway officials.

The photographer's truck, mechanic's truck and advance scout truck chose to not ride the rails. It took hours and hours and the right combination of gears, direction, speed, and driving skill to get each vehicle through.

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Winterizing

WINTERIZING. This item has been written about by various authors over the years. This is a compilation that includes the items to be considered when winterizing your trailer or motorhome. You may note some duplication — this should add clarity and emphasis as to what to do and how to do it.

Winterizing is not only important but a necessity. If you are in an area that freezes, you will almost certainly blow up a water pipe, water pump and/or a fixture if you do not do this properly. If you are unlucky, you might even have a pipe blow that is under the belly skin that will require drilling rivets to remove large sections of the aluminum at great expense.

First - To be most effective you should have a hot water heater bypass kit installed so that you can bypass the water heater tank. Otherwise, you will need six or seven gallons of antifreeze to fill the tank, so you can fill the hot water lines. With a tank bypass, you will only need about one gallon of antifreeze. In the summer just run clean water through everything and you are ready to go. HINT - Make a sign "Heater Bypass Valves," indicate the direction the three valves should be turned to enable or disable the bypass and tape it over the switch. In bypass the cold-in valve should be closed, the hot-out valve should be closed, and the by-pass valve (the one in the middle) should be open.

- 1. Drain and flush your black water tank.
- 2. Drain and flush your grey water tank.
- 3. Drain and flush your fresh water tank.
- 4. Drain and flush hot water heater. Reinstall drain plug.
- 5. If you have low point drain lines under your trailer/coach:
- Open the hot and cold faucets in your trailer/coach.

- Uncap the low point drain lines under the trailer/coach—let water drain completely.
- Recap/close the drain lines.
- Close the hot and cold faucets.
- Remove any water filter cartridge, if applicable.

Note: The above items need to be completed before winterizing with compressed air <u>or</u> antifreeze.

- 6. Winterize by blowing out water lines with air pressure compressed air method:
- Screw on compressed air adaptor into the city water connection.
- Apply compressed air, keeping pressure between 50 60 psi.
- Open each faucet one at a time to force water out of lines.
- Depress toilet valve. Depress toilet hand spray, if applicable.
- Depending on your unit, you may have an ice maker, washing machine, etc. The lines to these appliances will also need to be drained and blown out (consult owner's manual).
- If you have an exterior shower, be sure to blow compressed air through this.
- If you have a black tank flush, be sure to blow compressed air in this fitting.
- Purge the water pump by turning it on and allowing air pressure to clear any water that may be trapped in the pump itself.

- Remove the compressed air adaptor from the city water connection.
- Add one cup of antifreeze to all sink drains, and, to the toilet.

Summary: You can use an air compressor to blow the water out of all the lines. We recommend about 50 to 60 psi and a clamp on air fitting. You can obtain a male-water-hose connector to air-valve-hook-up. Hook up the air hose and open at least one faucet before you turn on the compressor. Make sure that there is always one open faucet. We recommend you start with the hot water heater; after it is blown out, shut off the compressor, turn off the heater bypass valves and close the heater clean out valve. Then open the bathroom hot water outlet and turn on the compressor. Make sure you open each individual outlet, including the spray hoses and water filter outlets, and allow them to completely drain. You should also blow out your external filter system and all the hoses that have been used. Throw out your old water filters and add antifreeze to each sink, shower and toilet drain to protect them. This approach is the fastest and if done correctly, will completely protect your water lines, fixtures and appliances. Be sure you have removed all the water from the water pump.

7. Winterizing using antifreeze:

- Use RV non-toxic antifreeze only. You will need approximately one to two gallons.
- Make sure the water pump is off and faucets are closed.
- Close the water heater bypass valve if applicable.
- Purchase an antifreeze 'T' kit to install on the inlet side of the water pump connection. This will allow you to pump the antifreeze from the jug into the water system.
- Switch on the water pump. It will start to pump the antifreeze through the water lines.
- Open each hot and cold faucet lines one at a time until you see the noticeable red color of the antifreeze flowing from each valve.
- Open the toilet valve and the shower valve until antifreeze flows through.
- Add one cup of antifreeze to all sink drains, and to the toilet.
- Shut off the antifreeze 'T' valve installed near the water pump.

Summary: Using a special valve and hose input, pump non-toxic antifreeze through your water pump to all outlets in the RV. You turn on the pump and open each individual faucet one at a time until pure antifreeze is coming out. This includes the toilet valve, its spray hose, the kitchen spray hose and any external faucets. You must do this for both the cold and hot water outlets. Then some antifreeze should be poured into each drain and the toilet to keep them from freezing. Open the hot water heater drain and fresh water tank valves and leave them open during winter storage. Also leave all faucet valves open.

NOTE: Blowing out the lines and then pumping antifreeze through all parts of the system is the safest approach but may be considered overkill if you have a trailer, depending upon where you live. However, if you have a motorhome with an Aqua-hot heater, fridge with icemaker, washer/dryer, dishwasher etc. you need to pump antifreeze to make sure all these units are thoroughly winterized. Check each appliance instruction manual for winterizing recommendations.

8. Winterizing an Alde system:

Drain all the water from the WATER system. It takes a while, especially from the 2.5 gallon hot water tank. **Do not touch the actual Alde glycol system.** You will need about three to four gallons of RV antifreeze.

Close all valves and put 50 - 60# of air pressure into the lines. Then one by one open faucets and blow them out, including the low point drains and the drain for the Alde hot water jacket, which is a flip valve — that may be located under the front dinette end cap.

Install an antifreeze 'T' kit just before the water pump. You may need additional clear 1/4" line if the supplied line with the winterizing kit is not long enough. Put the valve in the winterizing mode and turn on the fresh water pump and start pumping RV antifreeze through the system. Open faucets/sprayers one at a time, including the hot water jacket and the outside shower and the toilet to make sure the antifreeze is through the system. Once done, drain the whole system and capture the antifreeze by draining it from the low points and back into the gallon jugs. Blow out the lines again to get as much of the antifreeze out as you can. Clean up all the residual antifreeze, pour some of the captured antifreeze down the drains and the rest into the gray and black holding tanks.

This whole process takes just about an hour. This method drains the antifreeze used for purging the water lines and the hot water jacket and reuses it in the drains and in the gray and black holding tanks. You could also just leave the antifreeze in place for the winter and purge the lines with water in the spring. Add one cup of antifreeze to all sink drains, and to the toilet. Shut off the 'T' valve when done.

Winter storage for your Airstream.

Here are some quick tips that you may want to consider:

- Wash and wax your Airstream (this will give you an opportunity to inspect for any areas in need of attention).
- Make a list of any items that you may find during your inspection that need to be repaired but that you feel can wait until spring. Place inside unit where you will find the list next spring.
- Inspect the roof of your Airstream, check all vents, skylights and covers for any cracks or to make sure the covers are not missing; this can prevent damage from leaks over the winter.

- Correct any areas where the sealer appears to be degrading or fill any visible voids.
- Store your Airstream inside a building whenever possible (an
 environmentally controlled building would be best). Don't store under
 trees or where there are weeds or tall grass. Airstream does not
 recommend using a cover for trailers because it can leave marks in
 the finish due to the cover moving when windy.
- Park your Airstream on a concrete pad or a level area. If you are parking on bare ground, put something between the tires and the ground.
- Check the tire pressure; fill the tires to the maximum sidewall cold pressure while being stored.
- If your Airstream is being stored outside cover your tires to prevent damage caused by UV rays.
- Charge lead acid batteries to full charge. A weak battery can freeze and damage the case or reduce battery life.
- You may want to disconnect the batteries and remove them from your Airstream; you can keep them charged up by using a battery maintainer. If you leave the batteries in the RV, you should activate the converter at least once a month to keep batteries charged. With the proper converter (three to four stage) you can just plug your unit into shore power and forget it.
- Drain all water lines and water systems including any holding tanks and the water heater. Also drain any water filters you may have in the system; don't forget your exterior faucets or outside shower.
- Winterize your Airstream by blowing out the water system with compressed air and putting antifreeze in all traps and toilet or pumping antifreeze through the complete plumbing system.
- Lubricate hinges, awning brackets, step hinge points (this should help prevent rust and corrosion during storage period).
- Clean and apply a lubricant to all gaskets to keep them pliable over the winter. (We have recommended 303 Aerospace Rubber Seal Protectant in the past.)
- The vent for the range hood should be latched using the travel lock clips.
- Clean the interior of your Airstream, as well as range/oven, microwave. Also clean out refrigerator and leave doors open several inches to prevent mildew.
- Remove all non-sealed food from the RV so you are not encouraging any winter guests.

- You may also want to install some moisture control in your Airstream, such as Damp-Rid or No-Damp dehumidifiers. If you have shore power available use a1500 watt electric heater set at about 40 degrees F and open anything inside that you can to allow the warm air to reach all areas.
- If you have a motorhome, check all fluid levels; change the oil; check antifreeze (cooling system and windshield washer) and filters prior to storage.
- Make a point to start your motorhome and generator each month.
 It is suggested running both at least 15 to 30 minutes at a time monthly. This will allow for circulation of the engine fluids as well as testing of the batteries if you do not remove them for the winter.
- You may also want to add a fuel stabilizer to keep your gasoline or diesel fuel from becoming stale, or to remove moisture.

WINTER HINTS: If you are closing the door of your RV for a winter layover period, don't walk away satisfied that all will instantly return to full operation when you are ready to go. After you complete the winterization basics with water systems, etc., it is time to consider other items that also need attention. Walk around your rig and squirt a few drops of WD-40 onto every door and cabinet hinge inside and outside your RV. Take the time to lay on a cloth full of furniture preservative on all wood surfaces inside to maintain those surfaces and to prevent "brittleness" and surface stain. Don't forget to lubricate your outside folding entrance steps. Turn all gas (propane) valves OFF. Cover all tires with wheel covers to protect against freezing dry rot and sun damage. In the case of motorhomes, fill the gas tank and add a few doses of gasoline preservative to maintain the chemical balance of the fuel in the tank (refer to preservative can label for dose requirements - available at auto supply stores). Lubricate both ends of your hitches whether you tow a trailer or automobile. Spray an antibacterial deodorizer into your grey-wash water drain hose and into its storage tube. Take the time to run a cloth containing rubber gasket preservative over your outside window gaskets to preclude winter dryness and summer leaks. (We have recommended 303 Aerospace Rubber Seal Protectant in the past.) Don't forget the vent gaskets and include the Fantastic vent gasket if installed. After checking your propane valve(s) for OFF, open all your range burners (stove) to drain off the trapped gases (do the same for refrigerator valve) as it assures easier relighting when needed. Leave open all water faucets to vent out during nonuse periods. Periodically recharge your rig's batteries to maintain the wet cells and prevent sulfation and costly battery replacements. Lube your battery terminals to prevent rust coating. Your attention to the above items can make your return to the road much easier.

Construction site assignments will be available on Tuesday, Thursday, Friday and Saturday. The tools and safety equipment you need for the job will be provided. Typical tasks include framing, drywall, soffit installation, interior and exterior painting, as well as landscaping. If you don't want to climb a ladder or operate a power tool, there are a variety of other activities on the job site to keep you busy. Previous construction experience is not required, any skill level is welcome. Remember, Habitat builds homes almost entirely with volunteer labor. Tuesday and Thursday hours are 8:30 AM to 3:30 PM. Friday and Saturday hours are 8:30 AM to 3:30 PM. Volunteers bring their own lunch, but snacks and water are provided. Construction site volunteers must be 18 years or older.
