Knowing what you like to see happen at campouts, rallies, and meetings is a start. Keeping the members of the WBAC working within the mechanics of the Constitution and By Laws is necessary. To do this, your leadership and viewpoint are important.

The three yearly International Board of Trustees (IBT) meetings and the Officer Forums will really help you to evaluate issues, their impact, and to develop a viewpoint. We often consult the Blue Book for specifics.

Region 7 Officers do maintain a flexible approach because, after all, this is volunteer work. There is no pay and the reimbursement for mileage, while helpful, won't be the real reason you do this.

There will be choices presented to you as the Region 7 representative and you will want to consult with your members and with other officers. Your decision to travel and to attend functions should fit you, your family, your job, your happiness, and your calendar.




