CAROLINA BALLOONFEST

Joint Rally 2020





Please join members of the Southeastern Camping, Carolinas Airstream, South Carolina Coastal, Piedmont NC, Florida, and other Airstream Clubs from Region 3 and beyond for the Carolina BalloonFest Rally in Statesville, NC October 16-18, 2020. We will have parking convenient to the entrance to the festival grounds.

New this year there will be a password-controlled page for us to sign up and pay online. It will still be possible to mail in a check and it is required to mail in a signed copy of the parking application. The application will also include a privacy release allowing the festival to release names of those signing up to the rally organizers (Al Waschka #1322,) so that we can know who has signed up. Last year the balloon fest organizers stopped providing that information toward the end of the rally due to privacy concerns. There will also be (only on the password-protected page) a listing of those who have signed up so that members can see who is coming.

We will have access to sign up before the general public. In order to guarantee a space with the club, our applications and deposits will have to be received by the end of May. After that the festival, as last year, will start assigning spaces with WBAC starting at space 1 and the general public starting at the other end (whatever that may be, this year it was 75).

This will be a no-frills rally with no rally fee. We attempt to plan our happy hours and meals around the festival events which requires some flexibility as the event timing is dictated by weather conditions. Note:

- 1. Reservations are not refundable, but the festival has committed to support transfer of a reservation to another person as needed.
- 2. This is boondock-style camping. Arrive full of water, batteries charged, and holding tanks empty! Generators are allowed and pets are OK in the camping area. There will be food trucks on site. Exit and re-entry are possible, but not convenient.

TECH STUFF

USE/STORE Switch

This article is based on a request, but has long been a source of confusion for many Airstream owners. As you enter your trailer, you will see a Battery Disconnect Switch with USE and STORE positions. Airstream has apparently had some variations over the years in how this is connected, but in most cases, what follows here will apply to your trailer. Check your Owners' Manual if this does not apply. Now for what this switch does and does not do. First, the switch is not like a light switch in the sense that it does not stay in one position. What it does is it actuates a DC operated relay in the front of your trailer. Think of that relay having an open and a closed position and the USE-STORE switch

alternates it between the two. Note that if you have run down your batteries to a very low voltage, the relay cannot operate.

In the USE position, the batteries are connected to the DC Distribution panel in your Power Center, where all those fuses reside. IF you are NOT connected to shorepower, the switch will light up in the USE position, but not in the STORE position. The STORE position disconnects the batteries from the DC distribution panel, but your trailer brake system, your tongue jack, and your propane detector are essentially connected directly to the battery and will remain operational. Nothing else will have DC power. If you have factory solar, that remains connected directly to the batteries. If you are connected to shorepower, your converter will provide DC power to the DC Distribution panel, the light on the switch will stay lighted in both positions, but the battery will still be disconnected in the STORE position. Note that the items mentioned above, that are directly connected to the batteries, are still connected to the batteries, not the DC Distribution Panel.

So when should you use each position? The simple part is that if you are storing your trailer, use the STORE position. Your solar will still charge the batteries, your propane detector will still be energized, and your tongue jack will still work.

The harder part is when you are *using* the trailer. Before you head down the road, you will want your refrigerator to operate on propane and the switch must be in the USE position for any DC appliances to work. If you don't care about that, you can remain in the STORE position and the trailer lights, brakes, and charging from the tow vehicle will still function. At the campsite, use the USE position.

Now for the big UNLESS. If your trailer is pre-2019 (I think) and you have the stock charger, it is not battery friendly and a long time on shorepower will overcharge/cook your batteries. If you are going to be on shorepower for many days, you do not need to keep charging the batteries. I have not seen any studies or reports on exact numbers, but a week is not going to be an issue. If you have wet cell batteries,

remember to periodically check water levels. If you see the water levels decreasing, refill the cells and put your switch in the STORE position. You will still have all of your DC appliances available from the converter and you can go to the USE position every few days to top off the battery charge. Certainly you never want to leave your switch in the USE position if you are storing the trailer, connected to shorepower or not.



BE AWARE OF PHISHING ATTEMPTS

- . I hover my mouse over a hyperlink that's displayed in the email message, but the link-to address is for a different website. (This is a big red flag.)
- . I received an email that only has long hyperlinks with no further information, and the rest of the email is completely blank.
- . I received an email with a hyperlink that is a misspelling of a known web site. For instance, www.bankofarnerica.com - the "m" is really two characters - "r" and "n."
- Is the sender asking me to click on a link or open an attachment to avoid a negative consequence or to gain something of value?
- Is the email out of the ordinary, or does it have bad grammar or spelling errors?
- . Is the sender asking me to click a link or open up an attachment that seems odd or illogical?
- . Do I have an uncomfortable gut feeling about the sender's request to open an attachment or click a link?
- . Is the email asking me to look at a compromising or embarrassing picture of myself or someone I know?
