Did you know you can visit Mr. Ed's grave? Or see the tallest file cabinet, the largest pistachio, chile pepper, or fire hydrant? Or visit museums for Archie Campbell, Tina Turner, the Bonnie and Clyde Ambush, the Kazoo, the Zippo lighter? How about the smallest Post Office? The grave of Stonewall Jackson's arm? Oddities like these abound in this great country. And many of them are free! But how to find them when you are on a camping adventure? Sure, TripAdvisor has the most visited and "normal" sites, and those are worthy, as well. But for good ole Americana Kitsch, website my go-to is RoadsideAmerica.com.

Here are a few hints: Go to the website, and select the state map you are interested in. Enlarge the map to the area you want. Clicking on a marker will bring up the name of the spot, and if it interests you, click "More." A page will pop up with lots of info - detailed description, photo (which is helpful in locating obscure sights), history, directions (if it says, "5 miles down a dead end gravel road," you probably don't want to haul the Airstream there!), and comments from recent visitors. That last one is important, as the sight may have closed, or is on private property and needs an appointment to visit, etc. It also helps to find the spot on GoogleMaps to check out the parking or accessibility. Sometimes the online photo and Wikipedia article will have to suffice. Many are on Main St. or alongside the Interstate and just involve a drive by or a quick photo op. Others sound almost too goofy to visit, but have turned out to be some of our favorite stops! And many do have interesting history behind them, like the Buffalo Jump, the Viking Museum, the last store James Dean visited, Smokey Bear's grave .... 'Oh, the Places You'll Go!'
