Foremost in our thoughts, we must respect the varying desires of our NorCal friends for privacy, physical distancing, mask wearing, hand washing, dog interactions, etc. If you are unable to abide by the state and local county health officer orders/directives such as wearing of masks, and social distancing, do not attend the rally. <u>Above all, if you are or feel unwell, stay home and call your doctor.</u>

Ever since reading about the water theft of Owens Valley, I have wanted to visit the area. Hiking in the Alabama Hills was wonderful, touring the outdoor grounds of Manzanar was sobering and disquieting, what with the tar paper/wood barracks, guard towers and barbed wire; driving up 5,000 plus vertical feet on an eight mile long pinched 1 and a $\frac{1}{2}$ lane road, with a sheer drop-off on the left, to the small ghost "town" of Cerro Gordo was not for the faint of heart, seeing the 100 acre Owens Lake, dry as a bone except for a small fraction of its surface that has now been "reclaimed" as a marsh(due to various lawsuits over fish and air quality since the Lake was drained by the City of L.A.), was very interesting, and the Eastern Sierras were amazing as the sun and clouds moved across the sky. I look forward to another trip, hopefully when the museums and exhibits are open in order to learn more about the fascinating area.

Meet Your Senior Trustees

Marget Williams is a Fourth (4th) generation Northern Californian, born in San Francisco and raised in Sacramento from the age of three. She attended El Camino High School and spent summers teaching swimming and life guarding at summer camp. Then it was off to UC Davis where she majored in Biological Science and met future husband, Dave, in the dining hall no less. She moved on to UC San Francisco, graduating with a BS degree in Dental Hygiene, which she practiced for 43 1/2 years, retiring 5 1/2 years ago.

Marget and Dave purchased their 30ft Airstream in 2006 after Dave said they needed a trailer for fishing and Marget said "it is an Airstream or nothing. " (Ed note: their Airstream looks like a cozy fishing cottage inside.) They joined NorCal in September of 2013 after a chance meeting with the Smithsons at their mutual Airstream storage facility.

Marget and Dave are avid and accomplished flyfishers, and enjoy fishing the Tahoe area, Highway 395 South to Mammoth, and Montana, to which they travel every year. Marget is also an accomplished needlepointer, and enjoys their grandchildren, cooking, and wine, not necessarily in that order. They also enjoy dry camping, and look forward to many more Airstream adventures with their sheltie Karly, named after a winery of course.





Jim Christie was born in Stoneham, Massachusetts on October 1, 1948, the oldest son and second child in a family of eight children. He graduated from Stoneham Senior High School in 1967. When he received his draft notice in April of 1968, he decided to enlist in the United States Air Force. That same year, after completing his training as a Hospital Corpsman, he married Deborah and together they traveled to Omaha, Nebraska for Jim's first duty station at Ehrling Bergquist Hospital, Offutt Air Force Base. In 1970, Jim received orders to Air Force Base Hospital, Tachikawa, Japan.

A few years later, Jim left the military, returning to Massachusetts with his family (they now had two children) to attend college. In 1974, Jim began attending Boston State College, graduating in 1978 with his Bachelor of Science Degree in Nursing. In July, 1978, he returned to military duty, receiving his commission as an Ensign in the United States Navy Nurse Corps, and by October 1978, Jim was at his first duty station as a Nurse Corps Officer at Naval Hospital, Camp Pendleton, Oceanside, CA. After four years at Pendleton, it was off to the Naval Hospital, Guam. By this time, Jim had been promoted to the rank of Lieutenant.

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What really happened in Lone Pine, CA, from June 1 to June 7? Was there a NorCal rally? No. The rally was officially canceled. But ... some NorCal members decided that a mental health break was necessary, requiring "essential travel." They just happened to separately appear in sites 26 through 31 at the Boulder Creek RV Resort in Lone Pine, CA, each paying separately for their own site parking. There was no rally fee.



Lone Pine is a long way from most member's residences, so where did folks spend the night before? Bakersfield or Topaz Lake or ? It was to each his/her own choice.

How was the weather? High desert – very warm, sometimes windy, with some thunder clouds.



How was the scenery? Spectacular!



What was the schedule like? There was no schedule. Jim Christie con't

Jim and his family spent two years on Guam before a third set of orders came, assigning Jim to Balboa Naval Hospital, San Diego, where he moved in 1984. There, Jim was promoted to the rank of Lieutenant Commander.

In the Fall of 1989, Jim received orders to report to Naval Hospital, Long Beach, CA, as the Head Nurse of the Emergency Department, later becoming the Head Nurse of the Internal Medicine Clinic. It was during his time in Long Beach that he was deployed to Saudi Arabia in Desert Shield/Desert Storm with the Marines as the Senior Nurse of Foxtrot Field Hospital. He served in that capacity from August 1990 - May 1991, returning to Naval Hospital, Long Beach. He retired from the United States Navy in July 1992, having completed 20 years active duty.

Thereafter, Jim worked five years as the evening Shift Supervisor of the Emergency Department at UCSD Medical Center and was active in the San Diego Emergency Nurses Association, serving as President for one year. He also worked fifteen years with Kaiser Permanente in Telemedicine as a staff Nurse and later as a Lead Nurse in his Department.

After living in southern CA for 30 years, Jim and Deborah moved north to Lincoln, CA, in 2011 and soon took up residency in Lincoln Sun City. Jim's last five years of employment were with Blue Shield of California in various capacities, including reviewing medical claims and performing audits.

Jim retired from Nursing in 2015, and in 2018, Jim and Deborah celebrated their 50th Wedding Anniversary with a River Cruise from Paris to Normandy, France.

In 2014, Jim and Deborah purchased a new 25ft Flying Cloud Airstream, aka "Sweetie," after progressing from tents, through a used 19 foot Terry Trailer and a 29 foot Fifth Wheel. They have put almost 27,000 miles on her, during which they have attended, hosted, and/or co-hosted numerous rallies. They have been on one national Caravan and are hoping to do their second in 2021.

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What One NorCaler is Doing During the Pandemic.

Looking for a few good men and women ... That was the subject of the email I received from a county disaster preparedness group on behalf of the animal rescue where I volunteer. Since I had a little time on my hands, I read through the entire email.

Apparently, Humboldt County was looking for help with the Covid-19 situation. I was mostly thinking I could volunteer part time to perhaps deliver food to homeless folks, which is part of Humboldt's pandemic plan. When I spoke with the personnel officer, she had other ideas for me. The very next Monday (April 20th) I began a new job working as the Situation Unit Leader for the Planning Section at the Humboldt County Covid-19 Emergency Operations Center! So, imagine this, starting a new job at 62, where everyone is wearing masks and you can't shake anyone's hand. Oy Vey. It has been very challenging. I think the hardest part is wearing a mask 8+ hours a day. Also, going from working zero hours a day to 8 is a very steep climb.



I am thoroughly enjoying the challenge and I'm working with some very interesting people. Most of them are much younger than me, although there are a few of us retired folks helping out. Most of my work is done with Google Docs, which is a whole new enchilada for me. I get why we have to use a collaborative tool, but sometimes (like when you're trying to add a simple watermark) it makes me crazy. All in all, I'm glad Dean talked me in to it. Yep, it's all his fault. He said "we" should do our part. So now he has to run all the errands and do all the dishes.

We really miss our Airstream friends and glamping, although we manage to camp in the Schmoofari out in our yard once in a while, just for fun. I would like to suggest to anyone who might be bored, healthy and able - and want to participate - your county is probably looking for help, be it volunteer or paid. I'm making a decent hourly wage, which was incentive for me to agree to a full-time job for the duration of the pandemic. It's a very safe environment. We're all wearing masks and they take our temperature twice a day. I also get tested every 14 days. We've been fortunate so far in Humboldt County - only 175 cases, 16 hospitalizations and 4 deaths as of July 16th. Our Emergency Operations Center is again ramping up as many of the law enforcement folks are having to return to their regular jobs and the COVID numbers continue to climb.

Please take care of yourselves and let's meet up again when this is all over.

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Drive up (and I do mean up!) 8 miles on Cerro Gordo Mine Road and you will come to the Cerro Gordo Ghost Town, a very small "town" purchased two years ago for \$1.4 million by two entrepreneurs and their partners with dreams of turning it into something. Not much has been accomplished since the sale. The mine and its company town have a storied history. The mine ceased operation in the 1950s, but the American Hotel was refurbished and running as a B&B into from the late 1990s to 2009, until the owner's death. Their children sold the property to the current owners. One caretaker lives full time on the property and gives tours when people visit.
