## Region 7 Thunder Bay Rally

Forty units arrived for a successful Region 7 rally at Thunder Bay, Ontario. The rally was held August 11-15 at Confederation College, in the heart of Thunder Bay only blocks from the waterfront. Thunder Bay isn't actually in Region 7, but members of all Units of Region 7, as well as the Ontario Unit, attended. The size of the province of Ontario can be appreciated from the fact that one couple from Toronto drove a thousand miles to the rally in Thunder Bay! The Canadian route north of Lake Superior is slightly shorter, but they came south of Lake Superior, through the US, to take advantage of lower US gas prices.

We enjoyed fine weather for the entire rally, sunny but not too hot, which permitted the first evening's barbecue and the rally opening ceremonies to be held outdoors. Parking was in

the parking lot of Sibley Hall residence, where we had access to rest rooms and showers. Electricity was conveniently supplied by plentiful 20 amp outlets provided in the parking lot to keep car engines warm

during the cold Ontario winter, and water was supplied by lots of hose! Meetings and meals were in the Shuniah Building about a quarter mile away.

The busy rally schedule included a visit to the largest amethyst mine in North America, where we could prospect for (rare) gem-grade amethyst on our own or buy run-of-the-mine amethyst

for just \$3 a pound! From there we went to Ouimet ("wee-met") Canyon, a billion-year-old crack in the bedrock from which a thin slice of the original volcanic rock was removed by the glaciers. The canyon is so narrow that sunlight seldom reaches the bottom, where sub-arctic plants grow, far south of the Arctic Circle.

The crown jewel of Thunder Bay tourist attractions is historic Fort William, the original settlement. (The city of Thunder Bay was formed by the 1970 merger of the cities of Port Arthur and Fort William.) The name "fort" is slightly misleading, as Fort William was a fur trading post of the Northwest Company. We spent one morning at the Fort William Historical Site, staffed by actors in period costumes playing the part of 1812 occupants of the fort. Other activities included the
