

PA and NY shine on 2019 NORVA caravan

Throughout Friday and Saturday, silver bullets started arriving with anticipation, one by one, at our rendezvous at Old Mill Stream Campground in Lancaster, Pa. As rigs began hooking up to utilities, the greeting and relaxing started in earnest. If Saturday night's dinner was any indication, we soon realized we were going to "eat great" on this trip as we made our way through the incredible fare offered at the Manor Buffet-which advertises itself as the "largest and best buffet in Lancaster," and it's doubtful anyone could argue that claim! After dinner, our caravan leaders, Gerry and Patsy Nagel, had each of us introduce ourselves and each rig received a "Drivers Manual" with all the pertinent information needed throughout the caravan.

After a sudden and vigorous rainstorm Saturday night (which included small hail), the next morning greeted the caravan with sunshine. The nice weather was just in time for some in the group to head out to area churches or the onsite service conducted by a local Mennonite pastor. Then it was off to our first adventure-the "Turkey Hill Experience." Besides enjoying lots of free ice cream-and even making our own individual flavors in their ice cream lab-we learned about and tasted teas from around the world.

The next day was full of fun and learning also, as everyone embarked on a narrated trolley car tour of Kreider Farms (est. 1736) where there were dairy cows as far as the eye could see.

The well-cared-for cows are milked three times daily via a walk-on, walk-off carousel with very little human intervention. The more adventurous in our group hiked up to the top of a silo to get a bird's-eye view of the surrounding countryside. After the dairy tour, the caravan was treated to a buffet lunch catered by Enck's Banquet; then off everyone went to the Julius Sturgis Pretzel factory in Lititz, Pa. After learning the art of pretzel-making, each trainee received certification as a pretzel maker.

Tuesday was again a beautiful day and the caravan took full advantage of it by hitting the Lancaster City Farmers Market and narrated walking food tour. Tasting was the order

Dick Arnold explains how and why to weigh your rig

Tane and I had a great time J on the wonderful PA-NY Pot Pourri Caravan led by Gerry & Patsy Nagel in June. The sights and sounds we caravanners experienced ranged from rhythmic clops of horse-drawn buggies in the Dutch Amish farmlands to the ceaseless honking of horns in New York City traffic. Gerry and Patsy did a masterful job of planning, organizing, and conducting it. It was their first time as caravan leaders and they did themselves proud. You can read all about this caravan in Janeene Rider's write-up, starting on Page One of this issue of NORVA News.

For this month's column, I thought I would ask you to get on a scale. We are all concerned with weight...trailer weight, that is. Flying J Truck Stops have truck weighing scales which we can use. The cost is \$11.50 to \$23.00 depending on who is at the counter. Go inside and tell someone at the counter what you plan to do.

Then:

Step 1 - Drive your truck and trailer onto the scales, making sure they both fit in one set of lines.

Step 2 - Call the office using the phone on the pole. They will note the weight.

Step 3 - Move forward until your truck is off the scale, but the trailer is still on it.

Step 4 - Put down your jack stand to take the trailer weight off truck.

Step 5 - Call the office for a second weight.

Step 6 - Drive off, park, go in and pay.

You should now know the gross weight of your truck and trailer combined, and a separate weight of the trailer only.



Do not be surprised if you are over your gross trailer weight. Your tires may have to be inflated more to carry your weight. Knowing your weight should make you comfortable. Please check to see that your partner is not carrying rocks for a rock garden, like Lucille Ball in the movie, "The Long, Long Trailer."

Maintaining your Airstream's brake system is important


Hello again, everyone!

I want to thank those of you who attended the rally at the end of March. It was great meeting everyone there, and I do apologize if I wasn't able to address all your concerns as it was really late once I got everyone looked at. I have been contacting people in the order that I received their information so I can get them scheduled in for a repair.

Now, about the brakes on travel trailers. Most Airstream trailers are equipped with electric drum brakes. The older ones were manually adjusted; the newer ones are considered auto adjusting, meaning the brake clearance is adjusted by simply applying the brakes. There are maintanance requirements on these systems, from visually inspecting

each brake lining, magnet, and drum surfaces, to adjusting the clearance for proper operation. How these systems function is as follows: the brake controller in the tow vehicle sends a DC (direct current) signal through the 7-way cord, all the way back to the brake drums. Then the magnets energize to the brake drum pulling an arm that applies the brakes. Once the current is gone, the magnet de-energizes releasing the brakes and allowing the wheel to rotate freely, similar to letting your foot up off the brake pedal on the tow vehicle. These systems can be the difference between a safe enjoyable towing experience or a white knuckle hard to stop experience. Proper setting of the brake controller gain is critical to balancing the braking. Too much

gain and the trailer does most of the braking, too little and the truck does most of the braking. Every tow vehicle and trailer is different, and there is no magic number to set this by. You will need to find the balance point where the trailer doesn't jerk you back, or keep pushing you forward, when trying to stop. The pictures show a brake assembly that has failed on several wheels allowing the shoe lining to separate and causing a brake failure. This exact failure, although rare, does happen. Pulling the drums to inspect the brakes yearly (for older trailers this is done when repacking the wheels bearings) is a must. Thanks for reading and always remember to check and set your tire pressure accordingly and when they are cold.
