

Since we are staying at a Connecticut state park which books through Reserve America it is essential to book directly through the website and do it early as the sites are popular and, at only \$17 a night(+ booking charge), sellout fast. Go to Reserveamerica.com, establish an account (if you haven't already), and book a site close to your hosts who are on sites 24 and 25. Use the campground map feature to locate sites. As this is a state park it is dry camping yet a dump station is available. There is a no pet policy along with firewood restrictions. All sites are well shaded. Once you have booked your site please notify Bard Fuller of your location either by mail or email(bardfuller@hotmail.com). At this time there will be little or no rally fee (to be discussed at the Happy Hour).

Getting There.

From New Milford: Follow Route 202 to New Preston. Turn left onto Route 45. Take a left onto North Shore Road and follow the signs around the lake to the park.

From Torrington/Litchfield: Follow Route 118 to Litchfield. At the intersection of Routes 118 and 202 in Litchfield, bear left onto Route 202. Follow route 202 to New Preston. Take a right onto Route 45, and then turn left onto North Shore Road. Continue around the lake to the park.

Note: Both Bard and Ted will be arriving on Thursday afternoon should anyone desire to come a day early you will have some company.
