#### THANKFUL?

NORVA has a great slate of officers and active members with new members stepping up and getting involved in club activities. We had great rallies this past year and have many exciting things planned for 2021. We are planning a



bowling rally, an escape room rally and possibly a super bowl rally. Plans are also underway for our annual maintenance rally, a NORVA Spring rally which includes a movie at a drive-in theater, a caravan to learn about the eight presidents from Ohio, and a caravan through Tennessee in route to the International Rally in Lebanon, TN. We anticipate the chance to attend the Old Fiddler's Convention in Galax, VA in August followed by the Commonwealth rally in September. With a few other weekend rallies thrown in, there is a lot to look forward to in 2021.

Now I want to give a little history of Thanksgiving and how it came to be celebrated in our country and how it continues to be celebrated at critical points in the United States of America. I read two articles, one by Myra Kahn Adams, media producer and writer who serves as Executive Director of SignFromGod.org ministry, on "Thanksgiving to God." In the article she brought up a couple of examples of the real meaning of Thanksgiving. The first instance comes from the "Father of Our Country" George Washington, who also fathered the Thanksgiving holiday. As you read his brief proclamation dated Oct. 3, 1789, notice how Washington incorporated reverence, obedience, recognition, and praise for "Almighty God." Remember when Washington wrote this proclamation, the U.S. government, under its new Constitution, was only seven months old. This was an underlying reason why he offered "a day of thanksgiving and prayer" acknowledging God's role in that bold endeavor. The proclamation reads:

"Whereas it is the duty of all Nations to acknowledge the providence of Almighty God, to obey his will, to be grateful for his benefits, and humbly to implore his protection and favor -- and whereas both Houses of Congress have by their joint Committee requested me to recommend to the People of the United States a day of public thanksgiving and prayer to be observed by acknowledging with grateful hearts the many signal favors of Almighty God especially by affording them an opportunity peaceably to establish a form of government for their safety and happiness.

Let's move ahead 153 years to Thanksgiving 1942 when Psalms were central to President Franklin D. Roosevelt's proclamation. Keep in mind 1942 was our nation's first and very tough year of combat in World War II. Roosevelt began his

proclamation with a verse from Psalm 92:1 - "It is a good thing to give thanks unto the Lord." The president expressed "our dependence upon Almighty God" and asked for "holy Protection." Read how he incorporated all of Psalm 23 into the proclamation, a Psalm of trial, suffering, death, praise, and gratitude:

"It is a good thing to give thanks unto the Lord. Across the uncertain ways of space and time our hearts echo those words, for the days are with us again when, at the gathering of the harvest, we solemnly express our dependence upon Almighty God. The final months of this year, now almost spent, find our Republic and the Nations joined with it waging a battle on many fronts for the preservation of liberty. In giving thanks for the greatest harvest in the history of our Nation, we who plant and reap can well resolve that in the year to come we will do all in our power to pass that milestone; for by our labors in the fields we can share some part of the sacrifice with our brothers and sons who wear the uniform of the United States. It is fitting that we recall now the reverent words of George Washington, 'Almighty God, we make our earnest prayer that Thou wilt keep the United States in Thy holy Protection,' and that every American in his own way lift his voice to heaven."

The second article is by Susan Stamper Brown, a columnist who has written for USA Today, Townhall, The Christian Post, and Jewish World Review. The article "Remember the Long Game This Thanksgiving" quotes President Abraham Lincoln in 1863 with a divided nation. He officially set aside the last Thursday of November "as a day of Thanksgiving and Praise to our beneficent Father who dwelleth in the Heavens." He requested everyone offer up "the ascriptions justly due" to God "for such singular deliverances and blessings...with humble penitence for our national perverseness and disobedience...and fervently implore the interposition of the Almighty to heal the wounds of the nation and to restore it as soon as may be consistent with the Divine purposes to the full enjoyment of peace, harmony, tranquility and union."

Now in 2020 our country is at a crossroads of division and it behooves us to recognize that we are all Americans and God is in charge. So let's give thanks to Him for all our blessings.

take cruises. Fortunately, the cruise line instituted infection control measures that were dutifully followed by all of us nerds






#### **Airstreaming Over the Years**


Ron and I come from the finance industry. Ron was an active district manager in mortgage lending overseeing five states. I was a banker and certified financial planner.

Itinerary from one of our rallies given to all participants at check-in




Another: Caravan #117 (cost \$150 per couple)




