WOW!! HURRAY!! YIPPEE!!

Much of the following information was provided by Carol Heckman, our Past First Lady and hostess for the October rally in Allison. Thank you, Carol, for your efforts.

At long last, the Iowa Airstream Club finally held a 2020 rally!! It was at Wilder City Park in Allison, Iowa, on October 8-11. Wilder City Park is literally a "manufactured park" since all but three of the trees in the 78-acre park have been planted by volunteers. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, it had been one year since the club's last rally in October, 2019, at Swan Lake State Park near Carroll, IA.



Rally attendance this year was 9 member trailers, 2 members in parkprovided lodging, one affiliate trailer, our Region 8 President and one guest, for a total of 13 represented Airstreams and 27 individuals. There were several members who wanted to come, but, having pre-existing conditions, felt it safer to remain at home.

They were missed, but those who did make the rally greatly enjoyed finally seeing their Airstream friends. John and Carol Heckman, our rally hosts, did a wonderful job in pulling the rally together, despite that "dog-gone" virus.

Thursday evening found the group gathered around a campfire, enjoying sandwiches and beverages they brought from their Airstreams. The weather was beautifully clear and there were numerous conversations, as members caught each other up on what had happened since last October.

Following a Friday morning "rally-provided" breakfast of muffins, bagels, bananas, juice and coffee, the day was a "free day" with nothing scheduled, so everyone could take off and visit various places in the area. With the leaves



changing into their fall colors, the drives through the area provided numerous beautiful landscapes. Several members visited Waverly, while others just toured Butler County, looking for antique stores and garage sales. One couple even drove as far as the Amish area NW of Independence, IA to stock up on inexpensive canned goods for the winter. The hosts had made arrangements for the entire group to go to Doc's Bar & Grill in Clarksville (about 8 miles away) for a fish fry supper. Upon arriving, members discovered that if they didn't want walleye fillets, they could order anything on the menu. Those who ordered the fish en-



joyed a very tasty and filling meal, as did those who ordered chicken, ribs, etc. Then, it was back to the campground, where "robber bingo" was played. The turnout was small, but the excitement was not lacking, as a key chain with a pink flamingo seemed to be the most popular prize. Those not interested in playing Bingo again enjoyed sitting around a campfire.

Saturday morning's breakfast was followed by the only organized outing at the rally. The car caravan drove about



12 miles NE to visit the New Day Dairy operation. The owners, Dan and Deb Bolin and Dan's mother, were our tour guides. Many rally attendees had either grown up milking cows or had visited a farm where cows were milked. However, no one (and we mean, NO ONE) had ever visited a dairy operation like this one. The stand-out feature was "Rita the Robot" that takes milking to an entirely new level. The robot, made of parts from Japan and the Netherlands, does everything, from washing the cow's udder and teats, to attaching the cups to the teats, milking the cow, disconnecting when finished, retracting the cups to their docking positions and washing out the cups to be ready for the next cow. Even the cows seemed to act like robots. Approximately 110-120 cows roam freely in a huge open-sided barn with curtains for year-around tempera-

ture control. Feed is available at all times. Whenever a cow feels the urge to be milked, she walks up to a small gate which opens. She enters the milking stall, Rita does



her thing, and, when the milking is completed, a second gate opens, the cow walks out and another cow takes her place. While in the milking stall, each cow gets a small special food treat and this encourages them to come to be milked. The group was told that some cows like the treat



so much that they come to be milked as many as 8-10 times a day. A battery-powered sensor strapped around a front leg identifies each cow and, if a cow has been milked recently and the computer feels she is just entering for additional treats, there are no treats and the exit gate opens immediately. If the cow does not get the message, small electrical wires hanging down and making contact with her back give her a small shock to move her out. Each cow's milk is weighed and recorded. The entire operation is so automated that no one even needs to be around at "milking time" since milking time is 24/7. Even the manure deposited where the cows are waiting to be milked is scraped out automatically every two hours and the floor is washed, again automatically. The adult son of the family (who was most instrumental in setting up the operation) tries to be around for a while each morning and evening, but isn't required to be there. About 3,000 gallons of milk is picked up by truck every other day and delivered to Prairie Farms for processing. It is quite an operation!

The family has a 2-story addition on the west end of the huge barn, where they have a bed-and-breakfast facility in the upper level. One can sleep in modern comfort and look down on the entire operation from two large windows; watching cows come and go to be milked by Rita. The rest of the day was "free time" before everyone gathered at the campground lodge for a hot dog and chips picnic supper. However, a short business meeting was held out under the trees in the afternoon, where it was voted to not assess a rally fee for this rally, but to pay all expenses from our treasury. Following the supper, Region 8 Pres-
