Caravanning Up the Oregon Coast - page 18 Under smoky, ashy, foggy skies in Crescent City, CA

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I cook with lentils quite a bit, at home and in our Airstream. They are lightweight, last virtually forever, and serve multiple uses. Lentils are high in fiber and complex carbohydrates, while low in fat and calories. Don't know about you, but I've gained some weight over the holidays and the COVID quarantine, so watching fat and calories is on my list. Lentils also have a high protein content (1/2 cup delivers about 12 g of protein) a good part of anyone's diet, especially for vegetarians or vegans. They are naturally gluten-free, making them a delicious staple in a gluten-free kitchen.

There are multiple types of lentils with different cooking characteristics. Brown, black and green lentils tend to hold their shape after cooking. This makes them fabulous for adding to salads or soups where you want the individual lentils to stand out. Red lentils (orange in color) break down when cooked, making themselves useful in curries, hummus, and soups as a thickening agent. Red split lentils make a wonderful Dal (an Indian curry soup). You may also find specialty lentils such as Black Beluga or French green (Puy), even blue lentils from Australia. The foodie that I am, I brought home a bag of blue lentils from Australia in my suitcase. Most of our lentils here in the US come from our neighbors in Canada. A good source for lentil recipes is Lentils.org.

Insta Pot Lentil Soup with Vegetables and Spinach

This recipe is super easy and fast and uses one pot. You can also make it in a crock pot or a soup pot on the stove. And it is delicious! I have halved the full recipe adapted from thekitchen.com. The full recipe made a lot, too much for my 3-quart Insta Pot, though if you double this it will fit in a 6 quart or larger pot. As written here, it will serve two people several meals, or eat and freeze the remainder. A larger family should have enough for one meal or add a salad and bread to dip into the broth.

- 1 small to medium onion, diced large
- 2 celery stalks, diced large
- 1 large or 2 small carrots, halved and sliced
- 2 cloves of garlic, minced
- 1 cup of green, French green or brown lentils (or use a combination, which the photo shows)
- 1/2 tsp cumin
- 1/2 tsp coriander

- 1/2 tsp paprika (hot or sweet, your choice)
- ³⁄₄ tsp salt
- 1/4 tsp pepper
- 1 32 oz box of vegetable broth
- 1 15 oz can of fire-roasted tomatoes (this really boosts the flavor, but if you don't have it, use chopped tomatoes)
- To add after cooking: 2-3 cups of baby spinach or regular spinach chopped into large pieces.
- 1. Put everything but spinach into your Insta Pot. Lock the lid and close pressure valve. Set to cook on high pressure for 15 minutes.
- 2. Release pressure slowly (with a long-handled spoon and standing far away).
- 3. Open lid (after the pressure button drops down) add spinach and stir in.
- 4. Optional: You can add croutons or cheese on the top.



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You can cook lentils in water or broth. The green and black/brown varieties take about 20-25 minutes on the stove and 10-15 minutes in an Insta Pot (after it heats ups which makes the cooking time about the same).

A basic lentil recipe that you can serve as a side, or over rice, is to mix 34 cup of lentils with

2 cups of vegetable broth, 1 tsp onion powder, ½ tsp garlic powder, ½ tsp oregano, ½ tsp paprika, and salt and pepper to taste. Everything goes in one pot and cooks until lentils are soft, about 20-25 minutes. After coming to a boil, let simmer, covered, until done.

Last month, I asked readers to send me some of their favorite campgrounds. You responded so generously and today, I'm going to share some of them with you. I've also added rating and comments from campgroundreviews.com. Favorites range from Maine to Oregon with some stops in between.

The Cathedral Pines Campground, Eustis, ME (9.5). This is a beautiful county owned park set amidst towering Norwegian pines on Flagstaff Lake. The sites are large and well dispersed and the lakeside sites are picturesque with views of the Crockers, a series of premiere Maine mountains. You are within quick reach of Sugarloaf (a world class skiing resort) and Rangeley. There are amazing hiking opportunities and Moose viewing abounds. It's very hard to get into but if you can get a reservation, and you are way up there in Maine, it's worth a stop.

Fort Pickens CG at Fort Pickens National Seashore, Pensacola Beach, FL (8.1) This park is super close to the beach, good restaurants are nearby and is very quiet except when you get to watch The Blue Angels practice from nearby Pensacola NAS. Love the hiking trails. The main fort is accessible by foot, bike, or vehicle from the campground. The ranger led talks about the fort were terrific, as was the Discovery Center.

Goulding's Campground in Monument Valley, **UT (7.7).** We never tire of Monument Valley and the surrounding area. You should request one of the back in sites and you won't be jammed in with the motorhomes in the pull through sites. The campground is spacious, clean and in a beautiful canyon surrounded by majestic rock mountains. It is an engineering feat and is built into the red rocks around the valley. There are great hikes to the campground's very own natural arch. The views are some of the best and the environment is one of a kind. Goulding's has everything you need from food and fuel to incomparable views.

Ridgway State Park, Ridgway, CO (4.7 out of 5 on Google reviews) This is a great location for exploring Ouray, Telluride, Black Canyon of the Gunnison NP. The large sites range from full hookups to water and electric only. Trout fishing is only a short walk from many sites. Stay here for a week to fully enjoy the area around the park and the park itself. The Park Rangers are really nice and helpful. The campground host keeps the park clean and is available if needed. There is a bike trail that leads you to other park areas but it is quite steep. You will see quite a bit of wildlife including deer that come to the campsites in the evening. The town of Ridgway has a lot of activities in the summer.

One member writes in detail about their favorite park: Our most favorite campground in Maine was **Schoodic Woods (9.2)** on "the quiet side" of Acadia National Park. The Schoodic Peninsula is actually part of Acadia and the campground, built in 2015, is close to Winter Harbor, ME, a quintessential small Maine town brimming over with picture-worthy sites at every turn. The town has several shops, a general store, a few restaurants, a grocery store and laundromat (offering showers for a small fee). There is a really good seafood market (The Lobstore) where we bought the fresh catch to cook for



dinner several nights. There is a walk-on ferry from Winter Harbor to Bar Harbor, allowing visitors to use the bus system to visit Acadia from Bar Harbor. Alternately, the drive around to Bar Harbor is a scenic 1 hr. 15 minute ride. The road around the Schoodic Peninsula becomes one-way just past the campground and it has a number of pullouts where you can hike, picnic or take pictures and video as mementos of your trip.

Schoodic Woods Campground, https://www. nps.gov/acad/planyourvisit/schoodic-woodscampground.htm has 41 RV and 13 tent sites on separate loops. RV sites are available with 20-30-50 amp service and water or water only for \$36-40 per night. (Senior and Access passes are accepted.) A dump station is available near the office. There are both back in and pull-through sites and the bathhouses have flush toilets. The grounds are rustically beautiful and adequate vegetation provides privacy between sites. The campground is open late May to mid-October and takes reservations 3 months out through recreation.gov. We daytripped so much that we never had time to take advantage of the campground activities, so our 9-day stay was clearly too short, meaning we will have to visit again. We have moved up to a 31-foot Classic Limited recently so my husband and I look forward to going back and staying longer.

Grayton Beach State Park (8.7) in Santa Rose Beach, FL, between Panama City and Destin, FL. It is truly the Florida of old. The park has an uncrowded pristine sugar sand beach with crystal clear water, surrounded by dunes,

palmetto palms/bushes and moss-covered oak trees. The fauna provides a nice buffer to each campsite. Plenty of walking trails including miles of paved biked paths. Colorful Seaside, FL (Truman Show filmed here) is a walk or short bike ride from the park. Our three cross-country Airstream trips always included a stop at Grayton Beach State Park.

One of our long time favorites is **Cape Blanco State Park (9.2)** on the southern Oregon coast near Port Orford. The sites are surrounded with hedges to block the wind that also makes for nice privacy. The park features beach access, hiking trails, and the lighthouse used to be open for tours at night. The area is secluded and beautiful and works for any time of year. Sites have water and electricity.

For us, it's far enough from home to feel like a real trip but not so far that it takes all day to get there.

Another Oregon park ranked in the favorites: We love camping at the **Pelton PGE Park (9.9)** near Madras, OR. It is set on a big lake that is there as a result of a dam. There is a great marina where you can rent boats and other water toys, have lunch and shop for a few essentials. Many of the campsites are right on the water but high up. The views are amazing and the area is high desert. There is electric at most sites but come filled with water. There are spigots throughout the park should you run low. We love renting a patio boat and wandering up and down the lake, so peaceful.

Thank you for your ideas. So sorry I don't have room to include every favorite!

I'm going to share with you something that was sent to me about mentoring. I found it both thought provoking about application to my own club and I think it will be really helpful for others to read as well. This comes from Larry and Terry Madden.

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Caravanning Up the Oregon Coast in the Face of COVID-19, Wildfires and Suffocating Smoke

The Beginning

To say the year 2020 will be etched in the memories of us all who survive COVID-19, unrelenting wildfires, social unrest, and a sagging economy is an understatement. As Airstreamers all over the country were forced to cancel their scheduled caravans and rallies due to the pandemic, the Northern California Airstream Club (NorCal) refused to concede to these challenges by continually moving forward on its planned caravan north along the Oregon Coast.



Two years ago, NorCal members Carmen Ortiz and Carole Echols brainstormed a caravan adventure along the Oregon Coast, beginning in mid-September 2020 at the northwestern tip of California and continuing all the way to the Columbia River: seventeen days and six stops to enjoy the numerous activities and scenery of one of America's revered coastlines (all with public access no less). The schedule for the caravan was set for September 13-30, 2020. The Oregon Coast Caravan (U-438) was advertised in The Poppy, NorCal's Newsletter, in September 2019. Shortly thereafter, 20 Airstreams were on the list. They all paid their deposits and the caravan was a go.

The year-end holidays came and went. Everyone was very excited about the upcoming caravan. Then, on March 11, 2020, the novel coronavirus

(COVID-19) outbreak was declared a global pandemic. Most of the country shut down in an effort to stem the spread, with stay-at-home orders and travel restrictions surfacing everywhere. Soon thereafter, numerous caravans and rallies were canceled, including the International. Just like that, the 2020 Oregon Coast Caravan was also in jeopardy of being canceled, with all the effort behind it being for naught. But instead of following suit, the Oregon caravan leaders elected to "wait and see" before deciding to cancel, with the hope that time was on their side, and conditions would improve by the time September rolled around.

By August 2020, the pandemic did not appear to affect Oregon as it did California. The leaders continued forward with their plans since conditions appeared to be improving and there was more knowledge about the virus. But in late August/early September, wildfires continually erupted in California and Oregon, closing roads, impacting traffic, and spreading a thick blanket of unhealthy smoke everywhere, including the coast. The leaders again faced a decision: should they cancel or should they go forward? A vigorous process of monitoring the virus and wildfire impacts ensued.

Hoping that the fires would be contained by September 13, the leaders decided once again to move forward with the caravan. The proviso was that all attendees would be required to maintain social distancing, wear masks, and follow all local and state regulations around the pandemic and fire situations. All but three of the original sign-ups stayed the course, amidst the smoke and uncertainty, to commence their Airstream Adventure.

The Journey

Ramblin' Redwoods RV Park in Crescent City, CA served as the caravan's start location on September 13, 2020. Two nights were spent there under smoky, ashy, foggy skies. The planned "welcome dinner" was canceled because the caterer went out of business, a victim to the pandemic stay-at-home orders and business closures. Undaunted, the leaders commenced a socially distanced/masked "welcome meeting" (with favorite beverage) and after a brief interlude for dinner, they arranged for the caravanners to sit around campfires in groups of 4 to make artisanal

s'mores and conversation. It was a hit! Participants shared their journeys through the pandemic and discussed how glad they were that they were finally going somewhere in their Airstreams again.





One of the objectives of this caravan was to take it easy, not drive too many hours from one stop to another so that the journey could be enjoyed. Another was to have time to see as many attractions at each stop as possible, either as part of a group or solo. So, on day three, September 15, Airstreams caravanned north to Bandon, Oregon, only 109 miles from Crescent City. As soon as they crossed over the Oregon border, about 20 miles, the smoke dissipated. It was now a beautiful, sunny, clear driving day to the next stop, Bullards Beach State Park, for three nights.

Notwithstanding that the pandemic caused many facilities in/around Bandon to close to the public (e.g., most lighthouses, some hiking trails and museums), the group was determined to make the best of it by enjoying the scenery, wearing masks as needed, and adjusting as they went along.

The first group activity occurred on day four: a 4.5 hour, 64-mile roundtrip ride up the Rogue River on one of Jerry's Rogue River Jet Boats, in this case an historic mail boat that is still in operation. Along the way, caravanners saw many fishermen, some on boats, some fly fishing. As riders enjoyed the scenery, the boat captain explained the history of the river and about the original people of the area, the wildlife of the river, and its importance to the livelihoods of those who came to live on the river. Half-way through the trip, the group stopped for an outdoor lunch at the Cougar Lane Lodge in Agness. During the return trip, a bear was spotted fishing by the riverbank and the group was treated to several 360-degree gentle spins and turns that were most fun.



The following free day, caravanners visited nearby Face Rock, walked on the wind-free beach, inspected several nearby lighthouses, toured the historic old town/marina of Bandon, with its incredibly creative sculptures from ocean trash that are displayed, and/or waited patiently in line for a very generous scoop of delicious Face Rock Creamery ice cream.

On the last day in Bandon, the group drove to the Mills Casino Resort for a delicious baked salmon dinner, with all the proper protocols in place. The original plan to see an outdoor demonstration of how the Coquille People historically bake salmon in a sand pit was canceled because state authorities banned all fires in the area. Nevertheless, the Resort Chef came to the dining room before dinner and explained, with props, how the Coquille traditionally bake salmon, and how they attempt to make do in the kitchen when the sand pit is unavailable. The group celebrated September salmon bake season in style.

On day six, September 18, the Airstreams headed to Waldport, 105 miles north of Bandon, where they stayed three nights at the local KOA. Waldport is centrally located between Florence and Newport, OR. The KOA is located on a bluff overlooking where the Alsea River and Pacific Ocean meet.



Driving over the Yaquina Bay Bridge south of Newport was spectacular. It is another of the 22 bridges designed by Conde McCullough, and one of the most recognizable of the eleven major bridges on the Oregon Coast Highway designed by him.





On the second day of this stop, the caravan leaders made a trip to the Oregon Oyster Farm (on Yaquina Bay in Newport), which has been serving premium oysters since 1917. They purchased fresh

oysters on behalf of those caravanners who made requests, returning to the campground where individuals roasted them on their portable BBQs. Some made special sauces and brought bread to accompany the oysters. Everyone thought they were delicious!

A highlight of this stop was the Sandland Adventures narrated dune buggy ride in Florence, OR, where the entire group toured the Oregon Dunes National Recreation Area, the largest expanse of coastal sand dunes in North America, via a large dune buggy built on a bus chassis. The amount and breadth of sand was amazing. [Insert photos 8 & 9] Afterwards, many caravanners toured the nearby old town of Florence, with its lovely harbor and hidden parks on the Siuslaw River.





During their time in Waldport (and other areas), several of the caravanners indulged in the many fishing opportunities afforded by Oregon's waterways and Pacific coastline. Others visited the Seal Rock State Recreation Site where some went tide pooling, finding beautiful sea stars and other creatures clinging to the moist rocks. Some managed to visit the Umpqua River Lighthouse in Reedsport, the only one open for tours. And others enjoyed the dog friendly beaches of Oregon, a contrast from California.

On their last day in the area, the group met for dinner on the outdoor patio of the Drift Inn in nearby Yachats, with plenty of distance between tables. Everyone enjoyed delicious food and drink, shared their adventures thus far, and made plans for their next stops.



On day ten, September 21, the Airstreams continued 54 miles further up the coast for a three night stay in the Pacific City area, specifically Cape Kiwanda, home of the dory boat fishermen who fish for salmon, Dungeness crab, albacore tuna and rock fish. Cape Kiwanda is the southernmost of the capes that are part of the Three Capes Scenic Route: Kiwanda, Lookout, and Meares. The loop is a scenic route off U.S. 101, with spectacular views of the coast.





Unfortunately, due to the coronavirus, the hike to Cape Lookout, the most scenic of the three capes, was closed. However, many made the drive to the Cape Meares Scenic Lookout area, including the Cape Meares Lighthouse, the shortest on the Oregon Coast. It has a red lens whose light can be seen for 20 miles out to sea because of the steep cliff on which it rests.



Sadly, the planned Rail Riding adventure was canceled since the Forest Service, which oversees the forest through which the rails go, banned all activity due to the recent wildfires in the area. But folks did not seem to mind much. It was a rainy day perfect for indoor adventures. Some went to the Tillamook Cheese Factory in nearby Tillamook, for cheddar cheese products and more ice cream. Several enjoyed a day visiting the Evergreen Aviation & Space Museum in McMinnville, the current home of the Spruce Goose, and/or the Oregon Tillamook Air Museum.

On the last night at the campground, pizza was ordered and served by the leaders in our private clubhouse. Tillamook ice cream bars were also provided while the much-needed rain (2 inches maybe) kept pouring down.

The next day was beautiful, great for driving to new adventures.

On day twelve, September 24, caravanners drove 83 miles north to the Astoria/Warrenton area where they spent four nights, staying at the KOA across the road from the historic Fort Stevens State Park. While here, many visited the Columbia River Maritime Museum in downtown Astoria, which was very entertaining and educational in telling the stories of the original people of the area as well as those who came later to fish and work on the river, including the Coast Guard. The museum contains terrific displays, along with a retired "lighthouse boat," that before buoys, acted as the guidepost into the Columbia.

Another point of interest was the remains of the Peter Iredale Shipweck listing on the beach at Fort Stevens. Beyond being the site of the former military installation that protected the mouth of the Columbia River from the Civil War to after WWII, Fort Stevens is also the location of the South Jetty, a 6.5 mile engineering feat that took 27 years to build. It blocks and traps shifting sand and silt from the entrance to the River, thereby keeping the area navigable, and lessening the chance of shipwrecks, such as the Peter Iredale.



Of course, many went to see the famous Astoria Column, built in 1926 by the Great Northern Railway and Vincent Astor as a monument to the hardships, bravery, and awe experienced by the first Europeans to live in Pacific Northwest. Although the Column is currently closed due to the pandemic, the park-like grounds, on a hill high above downtown Astoria, offers an incredible 180-degree view of the confluence of three rivers. It is also a great spot to appreciate the grandeur of the Astoria-Megler Bridge, spanning 4 miles from Oregon to Washington.



Besides Astoria, many caravanners explored the nearby coastal towns of Manzanita, Cannon Beach and Seaside to the south. Other caravanners rented a boat and went crabbing, while still others eschewed the boat and directly feasted on fresh crabs!

A highlight of Astoria was the group lunch (once again in our own private dining area) at the Bridgewater Bistro on the Astoria waterfront, a scenic location from where the Astoria-Megler Bridge could be seen up close. Afterwards, a few visited nearby Pier 39 to watch the ships and sea lions at the 135-year-old Hanthorn Cannery at the foot of the pier. The building has many photos depicting the history of the cannery and the many brave men and women who worked there for decades until its closing.

The Grand Finale

The caravan was winding down when, on September 28, the Airstreams left the Oregon Coast and headed east along the Columbia River Scenic Highway for a two-night stop at the Cascade Locks KOA in the Columbia River Gorge.

On the second-to-the-last night of the caravan, caravanners once again enjoyed an evening of artisanal s'mores around several campfires. The following day, each camper was left to their own devices.



Some walked on the Bridge of the Gods, a steel truss cantilever bridge that spans the Columbia River at one of its narrowest points. There is no pedestrian walkway on the bridge, but traffic is slowed by the 15 mph speed limit and the bridge's narrowness. But the bridge is not for those affected by heights. Its deck surface is open steel grating, with the 140-foot depth to the River clearly visible as you walk on it. As one caravanner put it mildly, "It was a different



experience." But the view from the bridge was lovely.

A few reported driving over the Bridge of Gods to Washington State for a look at the river towns on that side of the Columbia or driving through the countryside in Oregon with wonderful views of Mount Rainier and Mount Hood. But everyone returned that evening for the last activity of the caravan.

The coda to the Oregon Coast Caravan was a two-hour dinner cruise onboard the Columbia River Gorge Sternwheeler on the Columbia River, captained and narrated by Captain Tom, also the Mayor of Cascade Locks. Caravanners walked the decks, enjoying the beautiful, balmy, clear evening with no wind in what is typically a "wind tunnel" as described by the Captain in his remarks. The tranquility of the evening was wonderful. The sunset was gorgeous as was the subsequent moon rise.



Dinner was outstanding and the company even better. Carol and Carmen were thanked profusely for their efforts in creating and spearheading the caravan, and everyone had a great time – the perfect end to a wonderful Airstream experience.



On September 30, 2020, the caravanners headed back to their respective destinations, free of smoke and fires at the moment, but full of the exuberance one feels from experiencing an Airstream Adventure up the Oregon Coast.

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Our Flags Past & Present

I'm happy to report that we are now in possession of a newly constructed AL-MON-O ceremonial flag that embodies our new club logo with our updated name! When our officers and I set out to update the flag last year, I thought the process would be a simple administrative undertaking. We completed the design and approval processes pretty quickly, and then began the adventure of finding the best flag maker to fabricate our new custom design flag, carefully considering cost, capability & reputation. After speaking with three top companies, I selected *Flag & Banner* in Little Rock, AR and have been very pleased with both the overall professional experience and the excellent quality of the resulting flag.



An important goal was to make sure our new flag would have similar construction quality and beauty as our legacy flag, which is a very tall order. The workmanship of the legacy flag is quite extraordinary and I was absolutely convinced that it was professionally made using stitched appliqué techniques (careful layering of fabric pieces) by a top shelf company. That was not the case! In fact, our legacy flag was <u>hand made</u> by a former longtime AL-MON-O member, Daryl Roll, and I found that her construction technique could not be commercially replicated. After a bit of interaction with *Flag & Banner*, we settled on going with digital single reverse printing on a white nylon background. The resulting flag is quite attractive and something we can be proud to display as a symbol of our club, even if it does not have the uniqueness of Daryl's beautiful handiwork.

I'd like to share some of the history I learned about our legacy flag along this journey. Daryl was truly AL-MON-O's "Betsy Ross". In the early 1990's, she was "persuaded" by Bev Clayton and Frank & Louise Cannistra (long time members...Frank was the club's unofficial photographer and Louise was the chaplain) to make a flag using the AL-MON-O logo that they had just recently designed on paper. Daryl bought fabrics at Joanne's while wintering in Florida with her late husband Robert and she constructed every aspect of the flag based on that design. The logo is actually pieced and sewn together, with logo features and line art stitched for effect. Her work included a combination of hand stitching and machine stitching that she performed right on their Airstream dinette table! Except for the appliqué layering of the lettering, the rest of the flag is only a single layer of fabric. Even the fabric she selected was perfect for a ceremonial flag...it falls and drapes just right!

Daryl told me she was amazed & happy to hear that the flag was still in service almost 30 years later! It has been passed down to each president and has obviously been carefully looked after; it remains in near perfect condition. As we retire our legacy flag and begin to display the new one, we will definitely continue to take great care to safeguard Daryl's creation so that we can treasure this important piece of our history.

Airstreams to Scandinavia and Russia in 1960 - Part 1

While the last article concluded the official 1960 European Caravan, this article will follow the group of African Caravanners that made a side trip to the Nordkapp and Moscow, Russia.

On June 16, 1960, the day after the European Caravan arrived in Copenhagen, Denmark, several African Caravan families decided to extend their adventure by seeing how far north they could pull their Airstreams. They hoped to reach Hammerfest, Norway, over 1500 miles north of Copenhagen, and over 300 miles north of the Arctic Circle.

Different accounts suggest that seven or eight African Caravan families undertook this adventure, but so far only the following five have been confirmed:

- #163 Roy and Lorraine Waas
- #165 Oscar and Etta Payne
- #598 Joe and Toots Bos
- #1166 Horace and Alice Dickey
- #2345 Alfred and Mildred Frosch and daughters Judith, Linda, and Susan

This group departed Copenhagen on June 17 and made a quick dash north thru Sweden to Oslo, Norway, where they stopped for a few days to check out local attractions like Vigeland Sculpture Park. Its 650 bronze, granite, and wrought iron sculptures all depicted nude human beings in dynamic poses. They also visited the Viking Ship Museum.

From Oslo they continued west to Bergen, Norway and then turned north toward Hammerfest. The caravanners crossed several fjords by ferry on their journey from Bergen to Hammerfest. The roads were very narrow and the Bos's rig was hit by a passing truck but they were lucky to find a town with big aluminum sheets to repair it. On June 28, almost 800 miles north of Bergen they crossed the Arctic Circle in Norway's Saltfjellat Mountains and entered the "land of the midnight sun", where the sun never set during that time of year. The caravanners found it hard to sleep and would sometimes look at their watches and be surprised they were still driving at one or two o'clock in the morning as they were seeing locals taking a walk along the road or even weeding their gardens well after midnight.

They found Hammerfest to be a fishing town on the coast of the Norwegian Sea. The smell of fish was everywhere, coming from hundreds of open racks containing thousands of fish that were put out to dry. Some caravanners took a fishing trip where Joe Bos caught a 15-pound codfish.

While Hammerfest was the northernmost point to which they could pull their Airstreams, the lack of a road further north did not stop the caravanners. Many of them took a boat from Hammerfest to Nordkapp (the North Cape), the northernmost point on the European Continent, and less than 1000 miles from the North Pole. At Nordkapp, the caravanners disembarked and climbed up a huge cliff to view the midnight sun over the Arctic Ocean, culminating their extreme Airstream trip from the southernmost point in Africa to the northernmost point in Europe!

The Frosch family went their own way from Hammerfest and caught back up with the European Caravan on July 11 in Brussels, Belgium. The rest of the group decided to take a different route south through Finland. About 100 miles from Hammerfest, they crossed into Finland's Lapland region and saw many herds of reindeer along the road. They enjoyed a dinner of salted reindeer in one of the Lapp villages they visited. On July 9, they overnighted in Ivalo, Finland. A day or two later they exited the "land of the midnight sun" when they crossed back to the south of the Arctic Circle.

In general, the caravanners found the roads in Finland rougher than in Norway and they were again breaking parts on their trucks and Airstreams. Gas was expensive at about 70 cents per gallon.

By July 15, this adventurous group had reached Helsinki, Finland where they camped in a formal campground among hundreds of tent campers including many Americans. The caravanners were happy to have utility hookups and not be sleeping on the ground when a storm blew through knocking over tents and turning the ground to mud. This small group had just pulled their Airstreams over 3000 miles from Copenhagen to Hammerfest to Helsinki in just under 4 weeks on roads too narrow and bumpy to be attempted by most caravanners. These were true adventurers for which nothing seemed imposing after traversing the wilds of Africa!

At Helsinki, an almost "spur of the moment" decision split this group approximately in half. Some decided to take a ferry to Stockholm, Sweden and race to catch back up with the European Caravan, while the #163 Wass's, #165 Paynes, #598 Bos's, and #1166 Dickeys applied for visas proposing a 19-day trip through Russia (then known as the U.S.S.R., the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics) and Czechoslovakia. Three of these four couples had been on the 1956 European Caravan and wanted to see something different. Nine days later, their visas were approved. They were told they would be fine if they strictly followed the prescribed route, stayed in the specified camps, and obeyed all rules and regulations, but deviating off their preapproved route would get them in trouble.

On July 24, the four rigs departed for Russia. At the border, their trucks and trailers were searched more thoroughly than ever before. Drawers were pulled so that the insides of the cabinets could be searched for undeclared money or other hidden items. The mess the authorities left behind required them to repack everything.

Once they cleared customs, the roads in Russia were wide and paved, but bumpy. They were filled with so many policemen that the caravanners doubted they were ever out of the sight of one. They felt sure the Russian authorities knew where they were at all times. A

few miles past the border, they stopped briefly at Vyborg to get gasoline and camping coupons.

The first night they stopped at their approved camping platz a few miles from Leningrad (now St. Petersburg) and found many international campers from a variety of nations. The following morning, they reported to the Intourist Office in Leningrad and were furnished a guide to take them on a tour of the city of 3,000,000. They found the buildings, squares, parks, fountains, statues, and monuments in Leningrad to all be colossal in size. The city was built on 100 islands with 500 bridges all perfectly planned and laid out. The wide streets looked even wider due to the absence of cars, with traffic composed of only buses, trolleys, and taxi cabs. The subway was brand new and each huge marble subway station had ornate chandeliers and magnificent statues, paintings, and tile mosaics. They visited the old Winter Palace of Peter the Great, which had become part of The Hermitage, one of the world's most distinguished art galleries. Leningrad's old cathedrals had been converted to museums and storehouses with lesser churches just abandoned. Only the older people talked about religion. The younger people just talked of the Communist Party.

It seemed that all the men they saw were policemen with the women doing all the road work and other heavy labor. The stores were mostly empty with long lines to buy whatever was available. There were always more buyers and more money than there was food or other products to buy. The condition of the food they saw, whether meat, chicken, fruits, or vegetables, was pretty poor in comparison to what was available in the USA. The caravanners wanted to visit Peterhof, the Summer Palace of Peter the Great, which was built in 1707 and surrounded by 300 acres of gardens and magnificent fountains. Though just 20 miles from Leningrad, their preapproved schedule and permits would not allow a visit.

On July 27, the caravanners began their 450 mile, 3-day drive to Moscow. They passed forests of birch and pine and large collective farms for grain and corn, but most looked weedy and unkempt. Most of the homes in villages along the way looked to be very old and were often built of logs that were decaying, giving the houses a noticeable lean. Some of the old homes were in the process of being repaired and a few new ones were being built. They were told that log homes were warmer than other types, a valid consideration given they were still almost as far north as Anchorage, Alaska. Most homes had small vegetable gardens filled with flowers and potatoes and often chickens or geese running around. Many homes, even the smallest shacks, had TV antennas, but none had cars. Each community appeared to have only one or two water wells for the entire town with residents frequently seen toting two buckets of water on a pole across their shoulders.

The first night they overnighted at a camp at Novgorod and the second night at Kalinin (now Tver), which was in an agricultural area with fields of wheat, oats, and barley, but little corn.

On July 29, the caravanners arrived at a large camp within the Moscow city limits and were parked under huge oak trees. They were again surrounded by campers from many nations, including several US citizens, as they planned how to make the best use of their scheduled 4-day visit to Moscow.

Loose Door Hinge Bolt...

... Comments by a Nebraska Airstreamer:

After reading the article in the November issue of the *Blue Beret*, I thought I would write because there is another way to replace, and tighten-forgood, the loose hinge nuts within the body of the Airstream. A few years ago, I used this method to replace the interior nuts on the top hinge of my 2003 Airstream Classic. When you are done, you would never know, or see, anything different inside your trailer. It could be that other trailers may have a different interior trim piece surrounding, and abutting, the door frame. The width of the trim piece needs to be wide enough to cover a 3/4" hole. This method has also been used by another member of our Nebraska Unit.

First, remove the abutting interior metal trim piece next to the door frame. Just remove the screws and set the piece aside. Using a measure, masking tape, and a Sharpie or pencil, mark the location

(height) of the bolt on the inside of the trailer next to the door frame. Do one bolt at a time, and I would suggest doing the bottom bolt first. Next, you want to drill a 3/4" diameter hole right next to the door frame at the same height as the outside bolt. You are just drilling through the aluminum skin and any interior aluminum framing, so it does not take much pressure. The reason to use a 3/4" metal hole saw drill bit is that a socket will fit through the hole to unscrew the nut. You will also see, in most cases, Airstream spread sealant around the nut. With a pick, or

other suitable tool, pry away the sealant to get access to the nut. While one person is outside with a Phillips head screwdriver on the bolt head, you are inside unscrewing the nut. Let the nut fall within the wall unless it comes out with the socket. Discard the nut as you will no longer need it. You will see with a light that there is a metal backing plate (inside the wall) for additional hinge strength. By doing one bolt at a time, the other bolt keeps the backing plate in place. From the outside, remove the bolt, go to a hardware store and buy new stainless-steel nylon lock nuts (four to do a complete job). Keep the bolts as you will use them again. Do not use a new nut more than one time. With one person outside, push the existing bolt back into the hole and hold with a Phillips screwdriver. The other person inside will insert the new nut onto the socket and insert it into the hole and onto the bolt threads. Do this with a socket extension and without the wrench as you will have better control. With the socket wrench, tighten up the new nut. I found it necessary to put something sticky on the socket and nut, so the nut does not fall off inside the wall. I have used modeling clay, but plumber's putty or gum may also work. If you have more than one loose hinge bolt, the procedure will be the same for all of them. When you are done, replace the door frame trim piece and you will not see any holes. My hinges have stayed nice and tight.

CO2 and Propane Detectors

The recommended service life of most RV CO2 and propane detector alarms is 5-10 years. You should check the date on your devices and consider replacing propane & CO2 alarms that are over 5 years old! You should also test the LP detector, carbon monoxide and smoke detector every time you use your RV.



An easy reminder for keeping your batteries fresh, change the carbon monoxide and smoke detector batteries when you change clocks for daylight savings time. LP Detectors are normally hard wired into your 12-volt system and remain powered even when battery shut off has been activated.

Fire Extinguisher

Inspect fire extinguishers at least once a month and ensure that:

- The extinguisher is not blocked and there is easy access in an emergency.
- The pressure is at the recommended level. On extinguishers equipped with a gauge, the needle should be in the green zone not too high and not too low.
- The nozzle or other parts are not hindered in any way.

Some manufacturers recommend shaking your dry chemical extinguishers once a month to prevent the powder from settling/packing.

Consult your owner's manual, extinguisher label or the manufacturer to see recommendations.

IMPORTANT: Recharge or replace all extinguishers immediately after use regardless of how much they were used.

Hope y'all are still looking forward to your grand adventure into Tennessee in July for the International Rally in Lebanon, TN. We've already explored Wilson County, and the musical and historical aspects of nearby Nashville in past articles, and are now ready to wrap up loose ends, if you will - to share things not musical or historical. And there is plenty more to see and do!

Nashville is home to some fine museums:

- The Frist Art Museum in downtown Nashville houses a modest permanent collection, traveling collections, and special exhibits. This year's special exhibit is "A Landmark Repurposed" which describes how the 1930's classic art deco building, originally designed and used as the main Post Office, was converted responsibly into the art museum it is today.



- The Lane Motor Museum is another Nashville treasure which is housed in a repurposed building. Originally the Sunbeam Bakery, Jeff Lane turned it into a home for his burgeoning collection of vehicles which has grown into the hundreds, many of them European. As its mission statement reads, it will "collect, preserve, document and interpret an eclectic and technically interesting collection of cars and other transportation-related objects for the purposes of educating the public about the history of transportation." It's fun and fascinating!

- The Adventure Science Center is a place of wonder for all ages. In their own words, they feature "more than 175 hands-on exhibits focused on biology, astronomy, physics, earth science, energy, weather, sound, and space..." The museum also boasts a top-notch, stateof-the-art planetarium. It would be hard to visit here and not find something that tickles your fancy. - Cheekwood Estate and Gardens is actually a combined art museum and botanical garden located on the southern edge of Nashville-Davidson County. The art museum portion is housed in the Cheek Mansion, built by the Cheeks of Maxwell House Coffee fame. The estate grounds have beautiful gardens and woods with several walking trails, and so much more! Scheduled this summer is an exhibit of 40 LEGO statues - all of natural things, animals and plants - created by Sean Kenney. This is a delightful place to bring a sandwich and spend the day.



And - if you are looking for outdoor activities, which are guite popular in this era, Nashville can provide a variety of those for you. In addition to visiting the majestic estate at Cheekwood, Nashville offers some wonderful natural areas within the borders of the city-county. Shelby Bottoms Nature Center and Park, within a few miles of downtown Nashville, boasts a wonderful nature center, 5 miles each of hiking trail, and of paved ADA accessible trail, and a public golf course. Birdwatching (no, not birdie watching!) is a popular activity in this park, as it is in the larger Warner Parks system near the southern edge of the county (adjacent to Cheekwood). Warner Parks has an extensive system of beautiful hiking trails. Within the boundaries of the county is 1,368-acre Radnor Lake State Park - a protected Class II natural area. It has a small nature center, but boasts 7.7 miles of trail, most of which are only for hiking, photography, and nature observation. There is a short, paved Otter Road trail by the lake, which allows pets, bicycles, and jogging. All-terrain wheelchairs can be accommodated on this trail and on the short Lake Trail. The wildlife (both flora and fauna) is amazingly diverse in this park.

For the more adventurous of us, there is Adventureworks Zipline Forest at Nashville North - providing beautiful views in an approximately 1 hour long tour of a lovely, forested area just north of town. This activity needs to be booked online, preferably several days in advance.

Nashville is proud of the Nashville Zoo at Grassmere. With nearly 3,000 animals representing over 350 species from around the world, you can spend several hours in the wide-open spaces enjoying the antics (or naps!) of a wide variety of critters. Keeper talks go on regularly, as of course do feedings. A zip line ride (costs extra) gives you a bird's eye view of many of the animals. There is even a Kangaroo Kickabout, allowing visitors to wander the pathway in the red kangaroo exhibit and literally interact with

the animals, which are free to go anywhere in their habitat, including your pathway. That could be exciting! (Zookeepers are on hand to supervise, if necessary.)

In our next article, we will begin to look at the exciting things to see and do elsewhere in Tennessee as you make your way to our rally in the center of the state. But first, please note, Tennessee has a wonderful state park system with lots of terrific campgrounds. We highly recommend you consider them as you trek through our state. But, word of warning, they are filling up quickly in this era of outdoor activity, so you might consider making reservations for your trip to and from Lebanon as soon as possible.

New Caravan Standing Committee Chair

After winter IBT, I took over for Jay Thompson as Chairman of the Caravan Standing Committee. As such, I would like to thank Jay and introduce myself.

When I was working, I had a colleague tell me that after performing a role for a while, the best measure was whether you left things better than you found them. Jay was Chairman for three and a half years and he has undoubtably left things better than when he started. Among the significant changes were:

Revamp Caravan Leader Training

I took the prior version of the training at the Lewisburg, WV International Rally. While there were some very good aspects - sections were presented and discussed by experienced caravan leaders, for example it was long (three consecutive afternoons) and was offered infrequently. The training is now available in a series of videos that can be reviewed and discussed remotely. It was a significant improvement and very timely as it allowed the training to continue during the pandemic.

Established New Bank Account Support

We now have an ability to establish a bank account for a caravan at US Bank. In the past, leaders used a variety of personal and business accounts that either had high fees or lacked flexibility. For example, we can now route deposits for kitty fees directly to Jackson Center for deposit (in case a leader is traveling) as well as take other forms of payment.

Online Applications

Participants can sign up for a caravan online, and the information is transmitted to a caravan leader in electronic form.

Pandemic

Caravan leaders and their participants faced an unfolding crisis in early 2020 as caravans in process were curtailed and most others cancelled. My thanks to Jay for his leadership during this difficult time.

We still have some work to continue to improve, for example, making it easier to manage payments to and from caravans operating in Canada. But without a doubt, things are better than when Jay took the role. Finally, I want to thank Jay and Elna for their many years of leading caravans. My wife and I were lucky to join them for the Southwest Adventure Caravan in 2017.

With the help of all the caravan leaders, I hope I can build on Jay's good work. I am a member and Past President of the Piedmont NC Airstream Club. I am also Caravan Chair for Region 3. My wife Nancy and I scouted and led two Club caravans, and along with Margaret Van de Ree of the Carolinas Airstream Club, lead the Kentucky Bourbon and Beyond National Caravan.

We are looking forward to returning to traveling as soon as possible, both in the US and abroad. My wife and I have lived and worked in three countries outside the US. We have one son living in Edinburgh, Scotland and another in Singapore - so the vaccine can't come soon enough! I look forward to seeing you down the road!

It is spring and time to examine your bucket list. Is Big Bend National Park on it? I read somewhere that Big Bend National Park is not in Texas. It is in "far west Texas," which is so isolated and so completely different from the rest of the region in both personality and terrain that it might as well be its own state. The park's name comes from the 100-mile-long big bend in the Rio Grande river that forms the Texas- Mexico border. The park is roughly the size of Rhode Island. Its remoteness makes it a top Dark Sky destination. The last time I visited, I led a small caravan of Airstreamers who had never visited the area; one couple had never been to Texas period. Getting ready to lead the group heightened my awareness of the majesty of this place. Did you know that over 450 species of birds have been documented in the park? Because Big Bend is on the central flyway of North America, over the course of a year, according to a park ranger, it is possible to see nearly 2/3 of all the birds found within the continental US. Three distinct ecosystems come together: the Rio Grande, the desert,

day in each section. Big Bend is the only National Park that contains an entire mountain range within its boundaries. We visited in February when the desert is warming to its bloom song. Ocotillo dressed in flaming scarlet blooms and whip-shaped, prickly branches, often up to 20 feet tall, emanates like candles from a candelabra. Another showstopper, the blooming desert marigold grows everywhere in all elevations. The bluebonnet, Texas's state flower, covers the dramatic cliffs that form the natural wall between Texas and Mexico. Over 1600 native plant species thrive in a Big Bend topsoil of limestone that some describe as baked crust. And the fauna is very impressive too. If you choose to camp inside the national park at the Rio Grande RV Village, you will make friends with a "wild" javelina that is more park pet than wild animal. Roadrunners tease you, darting across your hiking path constantly. No trip to Big Bend is complete without a hike down to the Rio Grande at Santa Elena Canyon to listen to the peregrine falcons' call, their voices bouncing back and forth, down the walls of the canyon surrounding you. Sit quietly in the iuniper and pinvon pines of the Chisos mountains. Look on a cleft called the Window in the ring of the mountains. A whole another landscape can be viewed through the Window. How can one place host so many different landscapes? Desert- alpine- river. I do not know if it is true, but I read somewhere that the topography of Big Bend is so barren and jagged in places that America's astronauts in the 60s took field trips to the park to prepare them for landing on the moon. If you do not believe me about the majesty of Big Bend, here is a description from a 19th century Mexican vaquero describing the Big Bend: "You go south from Fort Davis until you come to the place where the rainbows wait for rain, and the big river is kept in a stone box, and the water flows uphill. And the mountains float in the air, except at night, when they run off to play with other mountains."

Happy New Year from your extended Airstream family here in Jackson Center, OH! What started as a very slow start to 2020 with everyone stuck in their homes for six weeks, turned into a whirlwind of a year that seemed to fly by! 2021 has come in with a bang here at Airstream and we see another very busy year ahead of us here in Jackson Center, OH, as we try to keep up with unprecedented demand.

It was great to see so many familiar faces on the recent virtual mid-winter IBT meeting. I just hope I can see those same faces in person soon! In addition to the IBT meeting, we recently had a virtual "holiday lunch" with the incredible team at WBCCI Headquarters. Each December, a few of us at Airstream buy lunch and spend some time with this incredible group, but just like every other gathering last year, we had to cancel the in-person gathering and be a bit more resourceful in these crazy times. Like the IBT virtual meeting, it was so nice to see the entire team at Headquarters and get an update of everything they have been up to these days. The pandemic has brought several challenges, but boy, it has also driven many of us to be resourceful in solving those challenges. I am very impressed in how the club has handled it all, nice work!

As I write this article in the second week of February, we are putting the final touches on a full, virtual, factory training session for our dealers. Every November, we host our dealers for an in-person, factory training session here in Jackson Center, OH. It is a required part of being a Five Rivet dealer and is very effective. Unfortunately, with the pandemic, we were unable to hold it in-person this year, so we pivoted, and now we are doing an incredible virtual session. On average, we would have 80-90 people attend the session in each year, but because it is so much easier to attend a virtual session, we will have over 350 people attend this week! The session will cover the new factories, products, programs, and suppliers we have here at Airstream and will also have a test for each participant to pass. It is the largest digital investment we have ever made in training, and judging by the participation numbers, I am certain virtual is here to stay for a while!

In addition to the virtual factory training, our service team has been doing virtual training sessions with dealer techs across the nation each week. What started as 20-30 techs attending the sessions has turned into 150-175 techs each week learning about our products and how to work on them. In addition, our suppliers have been very supportive in each event providing great insight into their products for our dealer techs across the nation. Airstream has received great feedback on these sessions, and we are looking at more ways to invest in these tools so our dealers can service each of you better.

As I mentioned before, Airstream decided to not attend RV shows this winter and spring. The risk of sending our reps across the country during a pandemic did not seem like a good idea right now and when combined with the fact our dealers are at historic lows in inventory, they

Greetings. I hope you are staying warm and safe through this Winter season. As I write this article in early February, we have just had our first measurable snowstorm of the season and it will be followed up with some very frigid days for us here in Ohio. I cannot wait for Spring to get here!!

We receive a lot of questions concerning maintenance on the new Relax Power Awning. As more and more of our trailers come equipped with the power awning, I have asked the manufacture (Zip Dee) if they could provide some maintenance tips that I could share with our owners. You can also go to <u>https://www.youtube.com/watch?v-5fxpVgbZclk</u> to watch a video of this process. Please visit Zip Dee's website for other how-to videos concerning manual awnings as well.

Relax Awning Care

- 1. Lubricants needed.
 - a. Silicone spray and a rag for the steel bars and rafter arms.
 - b. White lithium grease with a spray straw for the main arm screws.
 - c. Scotch-Brite pad.
- 2. Frequency.

a. Steel bars and rafter arms should be lubricated once every two months.

b. The main arm screw accessed through the lubrication hole on the arm should be lubricated once every 6 months.

3. Lubricate the gas rafters.

a. Open the awning completely. The areas that need lubrication are all exposed when the awning is open.

b. If there is any buildup of white residue on the rafter arm, use the Scotch-Brite pad to clean it off so it remains smooth.

c. Place a rag over the top side of the gas rafter to protect the fabric from overspray. Spray the bright stainless tubing with the silicone spray being sure to move your protective rag as you move your spray nozzle.

d. Wipe off any excess lubricant. Pictured below.



- 4. Lubricate the steel bars.
 - a. Spray the steel bars with silicone spray.
 - b. Wipe off any excess lubricant. Pictured below.

5. Lubricate the main arm screw.

a. Locate the main arm screw on the interior top side of the main awning arm. The side that faces the trailer when the awning is closed.

30 Amp Inlet

b. Place the tip of the spray straw of the white lithium grease can in the hole and spray a few sprays of lubricant down in the hole.

c. Close the awning. As the arms close, the grease is worked into all the moving parts inside the awning arm.

Cleaning The Awning Fabric

1. Supplies Needed.

a. Bucket of water, long handled soft bristle brush, ¼ cup mild soap,1 cup bleach.

2. Frequency.

a. The fabric should be washed once per year to help retain its water resistant properties. The top and the bottom side of the fabric should be washed at the same time.

- - 3. Cleaning the fabric.

Multi-point locking system

Solid sleeve connection-

eliminates pressure on

Triple Weatherproof Seals

a. Open the awning completely.

b. Use the soft bristled brush to scrub soapy mixture on to both sides of the fabric. Avoid excess scrubbing on the seams to help protect the stitching.

c. Roll up the awning while still covered in the soap mixture.

d. Let sit for 15 to 30 minutes.

e. Then open the awning back up and rinse repeatedly until all the soap is out of the fabric.

f. Let the awning air dry for one hour before closing it again.

I hope this answers any questions you may have had for lubricating and cleaning the awning. If you need more assistance, please visit the Zip Dee website or their You Tube videos.
