AIRSTREAM HUGS Western Trip (Part 2)

After arriving at Heartland RV Park, Hermosa, SD around mid-afternoon on June 23, we were looking forward to unhooking and enjoying a nice relaxing afternoon. But, alas unplanned event number 3 occurred. After completing our normal unhitching procedures, the stinger would not slide out of the hitch. We completed several rounds of resetting the hitch back to the towing configuration and going through the unhitching procedure without success. Patsy said "call Sean!" Sean is the owner of Pro Pride Hitch and provides his cell phone number and you can call or text him at any time. Sean was in a meeting, we were tired, so we looked at this from another angle. Since the stinger was vertically adjustable, I removed the bolts and moved the truck out of the way with the stinger still in the hitch on the trailer. I had planned to adjust the stinger during our campground stay so this action put it on the schedule earlier than planned. By this time another employee of Pro Pride called back and provided tips on unhitching that should avoid this problem in the future. Sean, the owner, called back a little bit later and provided some other maintenance tips to help prevent this from happening again. Pro Pride has



always provided excellent customer service. I adjusted the stinger to the proper height and since then, with the tips provided, the stinger slides in and out of the receiver like butter when hitching and unhitching the trailer.

After breakfast on June 24th, we were off to view wildlife at Custer State Park, the largest state park in South Dakota. After a stopover at the visitor center, it was off to drive the Wildlife Loop Road and see what critters were up and about. After the first half mile we came across buffalo herd with many females with their calves. At this time of year, the bulls are pretty much loners. Further down the Wild Life Loop at the Wildlife Station Visitor Center, we came across another buffalo herd with calves. As we continued the loop, we arrived at the area where the wild "Begging Burros" live. There were quite a few young burros within the herd, and they are tame as you can easily walk amongst them. Continuing around the loop we passed a prairie dog town that didn't have much activity. The Wildlife Loop Road ended at the intersection with SD 87; we headed north towards Blue Bell campground and found a nice picnic area for lunch. After lunch we continued on SD

87 to SD 16A and back to the visitor center. As it was still early, we decided to go for a short bike ride before heading back to the campground. We headed down the bike path to the Grace Coolidge Campground and on the return trip Patsy's wildlife antenna went up as there was a Big Horn Sheep jam on the road parallel to the bike path. She stopped on a dime and I had to swerve to avoid hitting her. There was about 50 feet between the bike path and the road where the sheep had



vehicle traffic blocked in both directions. The sheep did not care. In fact, they were enjoying it. One of the sheep came down to the creek between the path and road and was checking Patsy out. After watching these young Big Horn Sheep for a time, we returned to the truck, headed back to the campground, and planned the next day's activities.

We were back at Custer State Park on Thursday, June 25, and had decided to take a bike ride on the Wildlife Loop Road. As we were starting our ride Patsy said it looked like a rainstorm was coming. I replied it was passing over us. We rode by the herd of buffalo that were still in the same area from the day before and were able to get some good pictures. Continuing down the road through rolling terrain, we passed a herd of Big Horn Sheep and then the road started a steady incline. As we pedaled on, we would reach the top of an incline to find out that there was another incline around the next curve. After several of these and also with the elevation between 3,580 and 5069 feet, it kind of sucked the wind out of us. We looked at the map and the time and decided to turn around and head back. Clouds were really rolling in and we had not gone very far when a light rain started. Then the rain got heavier and finally there was a hailstorm with pea size hail. Bike helmets are good hail protection, but the worse thing was soaked socks and shoes. The only thing you can do in this situation is keep going. When we were over a mile from the truck, we encountered a big buffalo jam with several buffalo in the middle of the road blocking traffic in both directions. As everyone patiently waited for the buffalo to move, a local buffalo tour company Jeep came up behind us and asked if we wanted to follow them through. Of course, we said yes. We slowly followed the vehicle which stopped and blew their horn at the buffalo. The buffalo made a head turn of disgust and moved out of the road. We continued to follow the Jeep until we were clear of the jam and thanked them. Once back at the truck, we headed back to the campground to dry out and prepare for departure the next day.

It was a clear day on Friday June 26 as we headed up SD79 to I-90 with a short stop at Rapid City Sam's Club to pick up a few items. From Rapid City we stayed on I-90 heading into Wyoming with a stop at the visitor's center for a picnic lunch. Our destination for the day was another Harvest Host location in Gillette, WY, "Sharpest Town in the West." We arrived at "Our Wyoming Life" Ranch and Farm mid-afternoon and found a nice level spot near some small trees that provided afternoon shade. Laural Veloz had stayed at this ranch during her travels returning from the Mexico caravan. Once settled, we walked over to the Farm Store and purchased some homegrown steaks, pork chops and eggs. Before departing the next morning,

we went on a farm tour and Patsy got to bottle feed a calf. We also saw ducks, geese, baby chickens and piglets they were raising on the farm. They even have a working fire truck!

From the ranch we traveled on I-90 and at Buffalo, WY took US 16 to drive the scenic highway through the Bighorn Mountains which would eventually take us to Cody. After a picnic lunch at the Pioneer Park in Worland, WY, we continued on to Cody. Our stopover in Cody was the Parkway RV Campground. We nicknamed it the bunny campground as there were wild bunnies all over the place. That evening unplanned event number 4 occurred. Patsy could not get out of the shower as the drip strip on the bottom of the door was catching on the frame and I had to free her. After a trip to Walmart for a file, I fixed this issue and the problem was solved.

We decided to visit the Buffalo Bill Wild West Draper Museum on Sunday, June 28. There are five museums under one roof. Buffalo Bill Museum, which had possessions of Buffalo Bill and Annie Oakley and told the story of their lives. The Plains Indian Museum had stories and displays of their cultures, traditions,





trials, and triumphs past and present. The Cody Firearms Museum has over 10,000 artifacts that spark meaningful conversations for firearms enthusiasts and casual visitors. The Draper Natural History Museum is an immersive museum for those who love Yellowstone. You can look, listen, feel, and even sometimes smell what makes Yellowstone's diverse ecosystems special. And the Whitney Western Art Museum with timeless classics and selections from today's world-



renowned Western Artists. In addition to the museums they have a "Live Raptor Experience" where you see golden eagles, acid-spitting turkey vultures, owls and other birds of prey. After the museum we took a short walk to down-town Cody and then returned to the Airstream to prepare for our trip to West Yellowstone, MT.

It was a cold and overcast day on Monday, June 29th, as we departed the Parkway RV Campground on US 20 heading west to Yellowstone National Park (YNP). Even though it was the end of June, we did run into some light snow, but it was not sticking on the roads. Several stops were made along the way to take in the magnificent scenery. As the light rain and snow kept things slow, the Park Service was also doing construction on a highway section we traveled before reaching Fishing Bridge Visitor Center. This slight detour put us on a gravel and muddy, dirt road. By the time we reached the visitor center, the truck was no longer white, the running boards were caked with mud and the Airstream looked very spotty. We stopped at the Fishing Bridge Visitor Center for a rest and to see if there were any touristy items we could not live without. Without making purchases, we continued the central route through YNP to our destination just outside the western entrance at the Buffalo Crossing RV Park. During check-in, the park attendant informed us that for \$10.00 we could wash our truck and Airstream at our campsite. After unhooking and settling in, the grill was unpacked to prepare dinner. Because this campground is the closest RV Park to YNP, your grill must be stored inside your vehicle after use.



Now it was time to plan our time at YNP. (Part 3 continued next month)

Meet Nancy & Ed Matricardi

When my husband and I stepped into the 2017 International Serenity, we both said, "this is it!". It was light and bright, with plenty of room but not overly lavish. We had been shopping for two years - during my cancer treatment and looked at everything from drivable RVs to toy haulers, etc. The Airstream had the quality and re-sale-ability that was most exciting.

Our first BIG trip was in 2017 when we headed south from Virginia for the winter. Our travels took us through North and South Carolina and Georgia. Then we headed west and stopped in New Orleans for a few days at the Naval Base. As we continued through Texas's amazingly vast state, we decided to visit Great Bend National Park on the southern border. On the way, I started craving authentic tacos. So, my husband began the quest for tacos. Because we were so distracted by our "quest," we missed the signs that warned us that we were headed for the Mexican border. We stopped at the border station, and the attendant laughed, handed us a piece of paper that said, "LOST," and told us we could turn around on the bridge...and then wait in a massive line of traffic to get back into the US. I was SO happy to see the "Welcome to Texas" sign! Neither of us had our passports, so we could have been for a bigger adventure than we had intended.

We stayed one night in a tiny park which was just a few miles from the National Park. The next day, it seemed like we were driving forever to get to the southern border. Finally, after a lovely afternoon on the Rio Grande - and enjoying the view of the colorful Mexican border town, we had only one night to get used to this massive desert.

About that time, I received an urgent call regarding my 95-year-old father, who had been taken to the ER. We shifted our relaxing trip into high gear up toward New Mexico and over to Arizona (with just a couple of overnights on the way). As my father gained strength, we decided to move him closer to the family in Phoenix. I lived in the Airstream while I cleaned out his house. It was a wonderful break from the difficult task. My husband took a plane back home to Virginia to take care of some business - and then flew back a couple of weeks later.



We headed back home by way of the Grand Canyon. We were dismayed when we realized that it was Spring Break for all the Arizona schools, and we could barely manage driving the "Rig" through the parking lot - let alone find a place to park. As we headed east, we found a place to pull over and park, walked across the two-lane highway, and there was the Grand Canyon! We had it all to ourselves! No fences, no people, no noise. Just the massive canyon. It was beautiful—a photographer's dream.

Since we were now on the Indian Reservation, we were warned of severe restrictions of parking anywhere overnight. So, we drove toward Colorado - deciding that we would simply take turns until we arrived at my friend's house. On the way, we recognized a turning sign: "Monument Valley" and turned left. This detour led us to one of our most amazing camping experiences. We found an RV park near the top of a hill. It was \$25/night with no electricity, no sewer, no water. Although it was full of people, it was nearly silent - almost worshipful. We heard some drums in the distance and saw people taking pictures, doing yoga, quietly walking, and some were simply sitting and enjoying the view of the "praying mountains." Simply amazing.

The next day we continued our drive west to visit friends in Durango, Colorado, then on across Kansas' plains. There were many more stops and attractions, but this leg of the trip had a primary purpose: to go home.

We have had many trips since that time, but that one was particularly memorable.

I hope that gives you a little sample of some of our travel experiences.

Meet Allysa Kropp

I love camping and travel, and in my younger years had a bit of disdain for RV travel. But later, I found I couldn't sleep comfortably on the ground anymore (despite my Army credentials) and started rethinking my preconceptions. I heard many stories of my grandparents' travels in their Airstream in the 60s. My aunt, uncle, and cousins took annual 6-week trips across the country in their Airstream in the 70s and 80s.

When I had to find a weekday living arrangement for myself and my golden retriever in 2014 at Ft Pickett, VA (I was in command of a unit in the Virginia National Guard and I would travel home to my house in Alexandria most weekends), I decided that I'd get a used Airstream - why wait till retirement?! I found a 1998 25ft Safari with an ugly dent in its rear cap and vintage 90s decor (teal carpet!) in Fredericksburg and had it delivered to the campground at Ft Pickett. For two years, my dog and I lived in it weekdays, enjoying the small campground's camaraderie and the vast trails in the evenings. It took me a few years before I traveled in it. No sooner did I finally get a tow vehicle than I had to store my Airstream - now named Hap after my grandfather Harold - while I attended War College in Norfolk. Eventually, in the fall of 2016, I took Hap on my first weekend trip -Westmoreland State Park. And since then, it has been on several trips in Tennessee while Hap was loaned to a friend while I was deployed to the Middle East in 2018-19, North Carolina for maintenance work, the Airstream International Rally in 2019 (where I met the wonderful NORVA group!), and more recently Solomon's Island where I store it and camp in it at the Navy





campground. I will retire from the Army this year, and I am looking forward to finally participating in some rallies and some longer trips - not sure where to yet! I do hope to travel for a year around the country at some point soon. Pics attached include one of my grandparents in front of their Airstream at a rally, sporting their berets!
