

"On the Road Again" May Meet-Up

Welcome to the 1st 2021 NY Finger Lakes Airstream Club Rally. As promised, our club's 1st pop-up is scheduled for May 20 -23. We will follow all NYS Covid-19 guidelines as stated below. We followed these precautions last year and had no issues at our events.

15 prime sites have been reserved at Sampson State Park and are located in Loop #2. Mary and Mark Sweeney and Suzanne and Gary Russo are the hosts. You do not need to use Reserve America! All sites have been allocated by the park for our use. All sites have 30-amp service, note that electrical service may not be on the driver side of your trailer so plan to bring an extension cord just in case.

Our theme is 'On the Road Again' with my friends, from the Willie Nelson song. As always, this getaway is NOT limited to adults, so bring the kids and/or the grandchildren along! This is a pet friendly park also so they can come along to stretch their legs.

Due to Covid-19 we have modified the rally to be socially distanced and healthcare conscious. In saying that, we are asking attendees to adhere to the following guidelines:

- You are responsible for all your own food and beverage.
- No meal or food sharing outside of your own travel companions.
- Maintain a 6 ft. distance between you and other campers at all times.
- We will be outside much of the time and masks are not required. When in confined spaces or within 6 ft. please wear a mask.

We will have two Happy Hour gatherings. An assigned happy hour host will to be provided upon your arrival for each evening. Groups will be small to limit exposure and maintain social distancing. Bring your own chair, food and favorite beverage.

We're adding a twist in the evenings. To go with our theme, we will feature two movie nights so bring your lawn chair, blanket and favorite munchies! Weather permitting, we will show Robin Williams in "RV" and National Lampoon's "Vacation" with Chevy Chase. The evening events are not required, but they will be fun!

See You Down the Road......

Well March came in like a LION. Hope no one lost any yard items i.e., lawn chairs, grills, or their favorite lawn gnome! SO, it's time to start filling up your spring/summer/fall schedules with camping adventures.

In this newsletter you will find the information for the Sampson SP Rally. In the February newsletter we were encouraging new 1st time Airstream members to join us. *As something new, the NYFLAC will pick up the cost of the first 3 new members who sign up for this getaway.* Mary and Mark Sweeney are in charge of reservations. Please don't use Reserve America!! Sites have already been allocated by the park for our use.

Have you thought about Boondocking?

Now that we are thinking about camping adventures, have you ever thought about boondocking? Boondocking is living the RV dream. Go where you want, do activities that you can't in a State or National park. It's picking a spot in nature with NO hookups, setting up camp and enjoying the great outdoors. That also means you're using only the power, water, and shelter that you bring with you. We tent camped for 10+ years before buying our Airstream "MaryAnn" so the lessons we learned then work for boondocking now.



How do you find Boondocking locations? Technology has opened the door to finding sites:

- Campendium has a website and an app for Apple phone users
- Bureau of Land Management (BLM) website
- Try the Airstream Forums. Ask members what are their favorite boondocking sites are all around the country.

BLM areas have no charge. It's FREE -- just find a place that you like, park, setup camp and enjoy. In these areas you are actually free to enjoy a lot more of the country than in a State or National park. You can bring your pet out onto a trail, fly a drone, or take your dirt bike out to enjoy the countryside.

This brings up a big concern of mine which is road quality. Boondocking is done in open country so you need to be concerned with the roads -- they are not paved, the ground is not level, and they are remote sites. Word of advice -- before going into an unknown area to setup camp, unhitch your trailer and explore the area first. You may go around that corner and find large rocks, ruts in the road making it impossible with a low clearance trailer or you can't get out with a trailer attached. What does the road look like? What is the road quality? Can I get in and out of this place? What does my site look like? Sites may not be level so bring extra leveling blocks. Remember most sites are NOT designated campsites; they are areas where you just park! Airstreams have a low ground clearance! Last year we had a lift kit added to MaryAnn. Even in state parks the ground is not flat. I think it was the 1st or 2nd year when we had a swale in front of our campsite. We had to borrow 2x6's to straddle the swale and even then we scraped dirt.

Remember you will need to bring water. Always make sure your fresh water tank is full and your gray and black tanks are empty. Fresh water may NOT be available all the time. Every drop of fresh water may count, so bring extra. Fill jerrycans to pour into your fresh water tank for the sink, toilet, shower and collapsible (foldable) water bags that can be used for drinking.



Have you thought about Boondocking?

When you camp on BLM land you can extend the life of your gray water tank. You are able to dump your wash water on the ground, which is not allowed in other parks. You will want to dispose of the water 100+ft away from your RV and other neighbors. Plus, you don't want to attract unwanted insects and animals to the neighborhood! Some states may allow you to dump your gray water tank but I would check local BLM rules before doing so.

A collapsible tub for washing dishes is very useful. I recommend using biodegradable or earth friendly soaps. Reduce dishwater consumption by using paper plates and burn them in your campfire. Grilling your meal will also cutdown water for cleaning pots and pans. Your meal menu/plan will impact water usage. Think about easy clean-up meals like sandwiches and cereal.

So now your black water tank is full. You will need to find a dump station. Depending upon the time of year local campgrounds could be closed. We have a 22ft Sport and I find we can go 4-5 days before we need to find a dump station. But if you take lots of showers that number will be less. We reduce our water consumption by using wash cloths, baby wipes, taking Navy showers and dry shampoo between showers. Enough on water.....

The other concern is power for your water pump, furnace fan, lights and all the gadgets you brought along. Lead acid batteries don't last long. We invested in a generator to provide a source of supplemental power and to recharge batteries Generators do require fuel - gas, propane, or diesel. They all make noise but some are definitely quieter than others. We're looking for peace and quiet when boondocking which is why we're off the grid. You can't run a generator 24/7 so pick certain hours of the day when you run the generator to charge your batteries. Most campgrounds allow generators to run between 9-10 am or 5-6 pm. We just always follow that rule when on the road. Another option is solar panels. We have a 200W portable solar panel. On a sunny day it easily recharges our batteries. On cloudy days or in a shady campsite having a generator does the trick for us.

Another thing to think about is the weather. Is there a chance it's going to be cold, sunny, rainy, cloudy or windy? Make sure you have the proper clothing for these weather conditions. Clothing is key to being comfortable. You could be in a higher elevation than when you started out. A fleece jacket, wind breaker and warm socks can make it comfortable when outside. We found fleece blankets and wool socks for the bed will reduce your need to use the furnace which saves on propane. We try to use the furnace only when it's going to be at or near freezing temps.

Keep in mind -- these areas are not very friendly for internet or cell service. You could be 3 or more miles off the main road and who knows how far from a town. So, if you working remotely, you may have to give up being really remote vs. getting cell service. Also, if you have an issue out there, i.e., mechanical/health, it could play a role in getting help.

Finally, let's talk trash. I'm seeing more and more campsites where trash is being left behind. No one wants to camp in a trash pit. I can understand a small amount of trash that can get away from you and it blows around. Try to leave a camp area in better shape than when you first got there. We're out there to enjoy nature. Leave only footprints!

Airstream of Buffalo ColtonRV

Hello Finger Lakes Airstreamers,

Dave Testa here. I am the Retail Sales Coordinator with Airstream of Buffalo ColtonRV. I suppose the best thing we can say about 2020 is "thank goodness that's over". But it has impacted all of our lives and businesses. I just wanted to share some of what I learned at this year's Virtual Factory Training session and fill you all in on what has been going on in the RV business.

At the start of 2020 we at ColtonRV launched the rebranding of our Orchard Park, NY store officially as Airstream of Buffalo with the goal of building a team of Airstream specialists to better serve the needs of our customers and to grow the business. I am happy to say that we are now represented internationally with Airstreams having been sold to customers in Hawaii, England and Saudi Arabia.

The showroom in Orchard Park has been remodeled to feature the Airstream trailers and touring coaches in giant photo murals shot around the Buffalo area. New furniture styled after the Airstream trailers was brought in and we have our giant aluminum buffalo sculpture as our brand mascot.

The orders for inventory were placed and we planned on having between 20 and 30 campers available on a regular basis. Then Covid hit. Everything went into lockdown. Because some of our customers are living year-round in their RVs, we qualified as an essential business and were able to stay open on an appointment only

basis. When people realized that their traditional vacation plans were cancelled an unprecedented number of people turned to the RV industry as a safe, socially-distanced way to vacation. What little inventory we carried over from the fall was sold within the first couple of months and we were able to take deposits for future production. This was the same situation at every dealer in the U.S. and Canada. Dealers have sold most, if not all, of their trailers and touring coaches within the first few months.

Manufacturers are warning of supply chain problems and delays that may persist for the next couple of years. The price of materials, fuel, and labor costs all continue to rise.

The surge in new customers has far outpaced the production levels at the factory. Airstream currently has more than 1000 sold units on backorder and the list is growing each day now that spring is around the corner.

2020 saw the launch of the new 725,000 sq. ft. travel trailer facility in Jackson Center as well as moving the touring coach production into the vacant trailer building. These moves will allow for an increase in volume as well as providing the most up-to-date manufacturing facilities with room for future expansion.

On the innovation side of the business there are several improvements that were introduced in the travel trailer line. As of August 2020, all travel trailers (with the exception of the Basecamp line) have had the plywood subfloor replaced with a new composite floor material called TransCore. It is a one-piece, seamless composite formed of waterproof, inter-recycled glass and polypropylene. This new flooring is seamless, more rigid, and lightweight. It is also completely waterproof and 100% green and recyclable.

Two other major changes this year are the new tankless on demand water heater and 12V compressorstyle refrigerator in smaller floor plans.

The updated décor in the Flying Cloud series has been very popular and the addition of a new Flying Cloud 30FB Office floorplan really shows the willingness of Airstream to listen to the public and provide solutions to keep up with our hectic 21st century lifestyles.

We at Airstream of Buffalo want to be a part of what makes owning an Airstream and being a member of the Finger Lakes Airstream Club so special. We will soon receive our 5 Rivet certifications as an Airstream service center. We also look forward to supporting and participating in several upcoming events.

Finally, if you are considering trading or upgrading your current Airstream or if your friends and neighbors (who have all admired or envied your Airstream) are looking to explore the idea of owning their own Airstream, I would like to extend to opportunity to all of you to reach me personally.

We are also looking for quality used Airstreams to offer for sale. If you find that you are no longer using your trailer, have decided that camping no longer fits your lifestyle or if you know someone who is looking to sell their Airstream I would be happy to talk with you about the situation.

Finding Reservations when Campgrounds are Full

As the pandemic has closed borders and affected how people vacation, more are traveling in RVs than at any other time. This winter, even with the Canadian borders closed, campgrounds are full across the South. Getting reservations this year is going to be more challenging than ever.

We are currently traveling on a 5 month trip in the southwest with only 2 months of pre-planned reservations made before we left home. We enjoy a nomadic travel style, moving between campgrounds every week. Our preference is to stay at National and State Parks. In the past month, we have stayed at five different campgrounds. We plan our stays about a month or less in advance, allowing us the opportunity to stay at the great campgrounds that we have heard about from other travelers.

We are currently in Arizona - during February/March, when most campgrounds are full. So how do we find reservations when campgrounds are full - **Flexibly**, **Perseverance**, and **Having a Plan "B"**.

Flexibly - If you are looking to stay at that popular state park that everyone is talking about, you need to be flexible. Sites are available if you can adjust the days you can stay to fit what's available. We wanted to stay at Dead Horse State Park in Cottonwood, AZ. - we were able to find a couple nights mid-week that we were able to fit into our plans.

Many campground websites have the option to look for available dates over the next couple weeks. Using this option, you may be able to find an open site that fits into your travel plans.



Perseverance - If you don't find an available site, don't give up - keep checking the website everyday. People are creating reservations months in advance, and some cancel them as the dates approaches. We found availability at a popular campground the next day, when previously nothing was available.

Have a Plan "B" - Weekends can be very difficult (but not impossible) to find a site. Having an alternate plan can relieve some stress of not having a place to stay. Your plan "B" can consist of a less popular campground, or boondocking on BLM land. We were concerned with not having a place to stay over a holiday weekend - that week we were able to find a site at a remote state park that was 80 miles from the nearest city.

Bonus tip - Wandering Labs. Wandering Labs (<u>reserve.wanderinglabs.com</u>) is a website that will repeatedly search for availability on any Reserve America website. Reserve America is used by 100's of campgrounds including many state parks like New York. Many private campgrounds are also using Reserve America too. Wandering Labs will continue to search for an availability and notify you if an opening becomes available. Wandering Labs is free to use, but does offer a paid version that has additional features.

Hopefully these tips will help you plan that last minute get-away this summer.
