
Travel Companions: Lily, a 12-year old Bichon and Winston, a 10-year old Yorkie that was in BIG trouble at the time of this interview.


A personal high point for me was watching the elk work their way by the campground just a few feet from us. It really got exciting to watch the bucks locking horns and hearing them sound off.



Story by Rhonda Levine:

We got to know the Edgertons a bit when we attended the same gathering at Riverbend Park in Sweethome last year. Our group of 8 trailers gathered apart and with masks to share stories and tales of travels and adventures. We learned that Rob makes wooden bowls which he donates to charities. And here is his story...

Rob and Janene bought their first Airstream in Eugene at Sutton in 2014. It was a 23' with a front bed. Rob had just retired. Prior to the Airstream the Edgertons had done some tent camping. And then graduated to truck camping. Rob had been a Boy Scout and was familiar with the great outdoors. He grew up in Silverton and in the 60s his neighbors had an Airstream. Those neighbors traveled and shared stories of their adventures. In 2020 they bought the second and last Airstream in Portland. It was a new 25' rear bed.

To say these folks have traveled extensively would not do justice to what they've done and where they have been. I'll start with a few of their more local trips. In 2016 they did Alumapaloosa in Jackson Center, Ohio which is the Mother Ship location. They toured the factory which was expanding. Explored the Service Center. The employees and bosses showed them through. They were very congenial. There were workshops to attend and lots to learn. In 2019 they did the Kentucky Bourbon rally for 28 days. Other West Coast Airstreamers were there. They did a Sternwheeler on the Ohio River. Saw Churchill Downs. Saw the state Capitol. And more. Last year found them in Colorado and Utah in September. Leaves were changing in the high country. Aspens were aglow in Telluride, CO. They had hoped to go to the Balloon Festival in Albuquerque but due to Covid it was cancelled. They will try again this year.

They have also done dozens of international trips to places like New Zealand(5 times), South Africa, Croatia and China. At some point we may do another interview about those trips. They have visited some 46 countries!



Now on to the bowls. When Rob was a boy his Dad had a Shopsmith and Rob would throw bowls. Other kids were doing that too, but at school. He could do it at home! Then for about 50 years there was a lull. Long lull! After retirement he built a huge shop. It's big enough to hold his 1931 Model A Coupe with a rumble seat(which he drives in parades and with the Model A club in Portland), his tractor, his large Janene's elk head, their Airstream and a shop area for woodworking

The wood used for the bowls comes from various sources. Some of it comes from supply stores. Some is local. It's mostly Eastern Hard Maple, Walnut, Bloodwood and Ash. Last week when they were at the Coast he purchased some local Myrtlewood. His bowls have segmented patterns which allows Rob to feature interesting layouts and multiple woods in each bowl.

They recently took out a 25 year old Japanese Maple at their home and he made Janene some items to remember it with.




The bowls are not for sale. You read that correctly. He will only donate the bowls where they can raise money for causes he favors. Like food banks and Meals on Wheels. So if you have a charity to donate to Rob may chat with you about it. He does do bottle stoppers for Red Ridge Farms in Dundee where they are sold at Durant Vineyards.



When they are not traveling, Rob and Janene can be found on their 25 acre farm west of Yamhill. I subscribe to several FB cooking groups plus follow a couple of online bloggers and Paprika kept popping up with members (and our daughter) as a favorite app. I purchased the version that I can use on my iPad and iPhone (\$4.99) last month and pleased to discover Paprika automatically syncs with both of my devices. (Also available for Android devices).

So what does this app do and why is it a good travel app?

- 1) It allows me to save recipes from anywhere on the web and allows me to both save and organize them. For example, I made categories on my Paprika app for breakfast, lunch, dinner, Instant Pot, and pot lucks (hang in there, one of these days.....) . Easy to read and can even be scaled for number of servings. And there are timers imbedded in the recipes so you just tap to get a reminder when something needs stirred or is done. And sharing recipes is easy peasy.
- 2) The app also allows me to add key words so if I have a recipe that is vegetarian, I note “vegetarian” when I save the recipe. Then, when my friend that is vegetarian is coming over for dinner (again, one of these days) I can filter by only those recipes. The search engine on this app is amazing. Let’s say the cupboard is almost bare but I do have a package of pork chops in the freezer. If I am out camping and have cell service or wifi, I can select “browser” within the app and search for “Ina Garten pork chop recipes”. Most often I do not have connectivity but because I have saved my favorite recipes in to the app, I can search “pork chops” and every recipe I have downloaded that has pork chops as an ingredient, will pull up as saved in to memory.
- 3) Exploring this feature now but I can create menu plans for my camping trip and the app will generate a grocery list. It even groups ingredients by aisle (dairy, meat, etc.) and combines ingredients used in multiple recipes. For example, if I am using eggs in two different recipes, it will tell me the total number of eggs I need to pack. I haven’t used it yet but I can also build a “pantry” list of items I keep in the trailer like olive oil, balsamic vinegar, etc. For now, I just know what I always keep in the trailer so can cross off the grocery list. Next camping trip, I will already have a template with recipes and meal plans and can adjust if I want to change things up for a couple of meals.

Best of all, instead of packing up cookbooks on longer trips, I bring my phone and iPad and have everything I need!

Helpful tip: Ina Garten is one of my personal favorite cooks and I am building a Paprika digital cookbook with lots of her recipes. I noticed if I try downloading a recipe in to the app through Google, I get an error message stating it is a “cached copy provided by Google and load from the original website in order to save”. CULINARY WISDOM

YOUR SHINY LIFE - By Mel Simrell

Welcome fellow campers! Pull up a chair around our virtual campfire and lets talk about: What's Cookin'?

This is big question and hear is my humble answer... Well that depends on what style of cook you are!

A. You are a cook who loves to plan meals in advance and prep your ingredients at home for the trip ahead

Or

B. You are a cook who loves all the appliances that make meals convenient

Or

C. You are a cook who loves the adventure of gathering your food on your travels when you visit markets, shops and stands

Or

D. You are a cook who loves to swing by Costco to choose from the variety of prepared "heat-and-eat" meals (and maybe a roasted chicken too)

Me? I'm probably "All of the Above".

Truth be told, if all my husband had to pack was peanut butter, bread, boxed mac & cheese and soda he would be just fine.

Maybe that should be E.?

I actually do meal planning and I keep in mind that fridge space is limited. That's why when it comes to prepping, I'm on it...

A. Cut raw veggies in pieces and store in water that can be in kept in containers or bags that zip (no water spillage!)

Spaghetti sauce, chili, stew, lasagna and soup can all be made ahead, bagged and frozen. Make sure they are frozen flat to stack them for more room when you store them in the freezer or cooler.

If you follow a particular diet/meal program, it makes sense to have your "go to" items prepped and on hand.

B. I know people who couldn't imagine traveling without their coffee station, ice maker, instant cooker, slow cooker, air fryer, the list goes on. Personally I have a toaster, a little 3qt slow cooker (which holds a whole chicken nicely), a table top grill and my favorite appliance, my electric skillet!

This fits perfect in an overhead locker and I use it more than I use the stove top. In fact, I place the skillet on top of the metal stove cover when I cook. I love "one skillet"

meals and especially like the easy clean up. Perfect for breakfast, hot sandwiches for lunch (yummy grilled cheese) and endless easy dinner options.

C. Some travelers find a thrill discovering the epicurean opportunities that the journey reveals. It's wonderful to savor local flavors and pick up ingredients that gives you a culinary flair!

Basics to have on hand:

Rice and pastas of your choice Chicken, beef or vegetable broth, Garbanzo beans, Lentils, Refried beans, Tomato sauce, Garlic, Onions, Cheese, Tomatoes, Mayo, Mustards, spices beside salt and pepper, if space is limited, I suggest: basil, rosemary, cumin, oregano, and chili flakes. These will take your meals in many flavor directions!

D. You probably know what your tried and true favorites are, but when you hit the deli aisle, think about adding: Kirkland pulled pork, Rotisserie chicken plus Kirkland or other brands of container soups.

Yes this is a topic that can go on for hours with recipes galore, but the bottom line is: if you give some thought as to what kind of cook you are, you'll be glad that you did some planning so you can be prepared for any quick getaway at a moments notice. 

GADGETS AND GIZMOS

Everyone has talents. Mine is in recognizing a good idea and shamelessly using it. I wish I could find the original FaceBook post of the person that photographed his/her system of storing multiple power cord adapters, surge protector and the sway bar wrench as I would give full credit for their genius idea! Since those are the things we need to get out quickly when we set up camp, I recognized his/her idea of storing them on the inside of the storage bay door would be both organized and convenient. Plus reminds us not to drive off and leave the wrench on the picnic table at our site. Since I like to camp fancy, I found these darling little guys on Amazon. They are called Bosszi Smiling Twins Broom Holders, are stainless steel so shouldn't rust, and came with industrial strength tape to attach securely. My helpful spouse bent stainless steel to make the bracket for the sway bar wrench and Gorilla double-sided mounting tape to hold the brackets on to the door so no drilling. Under \$40 project but regular broom holder brackets like the original post I saw would cost less (just not as cute) and perform the same function. ON THE ROAD WITH LUNA - by Florence Tramoni

We left Jan 6 in a monsoon rain and just about floated to central Oregon. I really wanted to make Redding CA on the first night and did, 11 hours and 610 miles. I usually don't make such long hauls. Redding RV Park is perfect for an overnight. This was my only stop in 3 weeks using hookups. Easy to do when it's sunny.

Day 2 was a breeze distance wise, 375 miles but ooooh the stretch in the east Bay on Hwy 680 through Concord, Walnut Creek, Pleasanton. I think Cal Trans forgot to repair this main highway after the SF earthquake in 1989. The pavement was wavy, broken, and potholed for about 20 miles. I was white knuckling just to maintain the speed limit (55) while mid-morning heavy traffic was moving at 70. I love my PNW drivers that are polite, use turn signals and let you into their lane.

Our first 3-day stop was south of Big Sur on the central CA coast at Kirk Creek Campground (no hookups).



Relatively no one on the Pacific Coast Hwy which was wonderful because the average speed is 30 mph with many 15-20 mph curves perched 1000 feet from the water with the edge just right there. Many of the trails I was hoping to hike were closed because of the rains they had this fall. So we went back north for a day to Carmel. It's a picture-perfect community, where everything is clean, cute and flawless. I gave a

moment of thought of playing a round of golf at Pebble Beach but my campsite was an hour and a half each way, so Luna and I just ogled the beachside holes. I was able to do the drive without the trailer to and from Carmel... what a different experience actually stopping to take pictures. One thing about this section of coastline is there are no beaches so my shell collecting was limited to say the least.



On the way to Santa Barbara, near Hearst Castle, a must see is the Piedras Blancas elephant seal rookery near San Simeon. The beach absolutely covered with elephant seals. Like hundreds of them! It is loud!

I had forgotten how much I love Santa Barbara. I ended up staying 4 days, camped at Refugio State Park on the

beach (no hookups). Super dog friendly town, great beaches, amazing golf, fun shopping. I went to college here in the late 70s and what is so cool, is the changes are imperceptible. They have taken city planning and growth seriously. AMAZING round of golf at Sandpiper Golf Course---who needs Pebble Beach??? I'm pretty sure they would not have allowed my canine caddy up at the fancy course in Carmel!




Well, we are off and heading south. Mid 60s, clear skies while it's snowing at home. I actually like both. Joshua Tree National Park is beautiful, but the



main campgrounds I found to be not so great with the trailer and the sites very close together. We ended up moving to Belle Campground and I got exactly what I was hoping for. Not many sites (first come first served), all huge, flat and just the big rocks you expect at Joshua Tree NP.

We moved on to Quartzite for a few days and joined the El Camino Real Airstream Club rally. I was a rookie to Quartzite and didn't want to do it alone so I crashed their rally. Great folks. If you haven't done Quartzite, it's a must at least once. Only in America...



FUN FACTS WITH FLORENCE... Florence Tramoni

Wastewater tank sensors – just what you want to think about!

My go to source for techy questions calls the tank sensors “idiot lights”. They are at their best in a new, perfectly level trailer. Then, some human intervention becomes necessary. On most Airstreams, the sensors are inside the tanks and become susceptible to gunk (esp paper in the black water tank) accumulating on them. One remedy is to go for a start/stop drive with some water and a bunch of crushed ice the tank. Another is to use a lidded trashcan and just not put paper in there. It seems reasonable that the sensors will fail at some point, and they can be replaced with those that have a Teflon shield protecting the probes.

The grey water tank should be sanitized at least yearly and you can find as many methods as there are forums and websites on the issue.

When it comes to your gray water holding tanks, solids are not the only things that can coat your sensors. Be aware of what goes down the drains: food waste, grease, oil, hair and soap cause most of the sensor issues during normal use. These have become one of my favorite gadgets https://smile.amazon.com/gp/product/B000T9YO5E/ref=ppx_yo_dt_b_search_asin_title?ie=UTF8&psc=1.

Really, I think the easiest method to avoid unpleasant surprises is to keep things clean in the way that works for you, and use a flashlight to look down in there if you aren't sure where the level is at 🖱


OAC BOARD NEWS

The Board has continued to meet via Zoom approximately once per quarter. Minutes are posted on the OAC website for your review. Currently the following projects are being worked on:

- (1) Development of a New Member Handbook (Carol Dion chairs this committee)
- (2) Review and Revision of our Constitution and Bylaws which is required every five years by our International Airstream Club. OAC members will receive a JotForm ballot to approve these revisions in a few weeks. Major revisions are: spouse/partner will also have a vote, terms of office for V.P.'s/President have been shortened to one year, and job descriptions have been more clearly defined for officers as well as for standing committees. These revisions are all based on a model constitution and bylaws which were developed by International.
- (3) The Board approved appointment of Chris Wagner to our open 2nd VP position.
- (4) Amy D'Abbruccio continues to expand our clubs social media presence.
- (5) We continue to discuss ways to camp safely during Covid concerns.
