This 2020 Emergency Resolution allows for required business meetings, International Officer Installation and delegates voting to be conducted

electronically for a period of six months. The meeting platforms will be secure, the Officer Installation ceremony memorable, and the delegates voting platform informative and easy to use. WE ARE ADAPTIVE.

On the Road Highlights of Member Travels

Kiptopeke State Park

One of our favorite local spots is Kiptopeke State Park on the Eastern Shore. It is a comfortable beach destination with plenty to do. Bike riding, kayaking, fishing, and relaxing on the beach make for a nice weekend there. It is close to Cape Charles where there is an interesting museum and a good restaurant we like to frequent called the Shanty. The campground location is where the fairy boats used to come and go before the Chesapeake Bay Bridge Tunnel was built. The "concrete ships" are sunk there which

CONCRETE SHIPS

Placed in 1948 to create a breakwater for the ferry system, these nine World War II-era concrete ships provide a unique habitat for birds and marine life.

Due to a steel shortage, these ships were built out of concrete in the early 1940s by McCloskey and Company of Philadelphia. They were primarily used as cargo ships transporting freight to allied forces in Japan and in training exercises in the Pacific.

While fishing near the ships is permitted, please do not attempt to anchor to or board the ships. For more information about the concrete ships, please visit www.concreteships.org.

The concrete ships provide an excellent habitat for a variety of species, including striped bass, flounder, tautog and black sea bass.

Ospreys and pigeons also use the concrete ships for nesting.

formed a breakwater for those fairy boats. These WWll relics' hulls lay on the bottom but the decks and wheelhouses remain above water. They



have deteriorated over the years and provide nesting spots for many species of bay birds. It is fascinating to paddle up close and look through the breeches in the hulls and see the rusty interior compartments. Lots of folks fish near the ships as they also make great fish habitats. Fishing is also popular from the pier which has a great view of the ships and sunsets. We have had many a close encounter with dolphins and rays when we have been out on our kayaks at Kiptopeke. I've included some pictures for this story from past trips – we look forward to getting there again soon!



Our Break-out Trip to Crozet, Virginia May 25-30, 2020

Somewhere between Covid Phase 1 and Phase 2, we decided to get out of Dodge (AKA Va Beach)! We hooked up our Serenity and took off to Misty Mountain Campground. We pulled into site 83 (where we had camped last year) and within an hour another Airstream (27' Flying Cloud) pulled in directly across from us. It was a very nice family from Williamsburg, whom we immediately tried to recruit to our Tidewater Unit.

Every year in mid-May, we go to the Virginia Appalachians in search of spring-time migrating birds and wildflowers. We either go to Highland Haven (shut down for the entire 2020 season due to Covid-19? Is this possibly true??), or Peaks of Otter or Misty Mountain. We like the upper level of Misty Mountain which is more private and treed than the lower section near the entrance. But we really like Misty Mountain because it is only 5 miles to the Rockfish Gap entrance to both Skyline Drive AND Blue Ridge Parkway.



As soon as we had settled into our spot, we were treated to a sighting of a Scarlet Tanager (that's a bird, folks). Jayne was in her glory, binoculars always around her neck. The campground has some nice trails and we took many walks in search of birds. Frank was hooked up to WIFI for the duration of our stay, so he was able to get in a couple of days of work.

Our kids (both UVA grads) told us we must get a Crozet Pizza .. and we did. After calling in our order, a waitress delivered it (Covid-style) to us in our truck. Crozet Pizza is very good.

We walked a popular birding trail in Crozet, imbedded in Old Trail Village, bordering the golf course. We were shocked by the extent of Old Trail Village, which appears to be a sprawling planned


community. The developers refer to it as a "Walkable Urban Village", with different styles of homes, shops, restaurants, etc ... no comment!

On the day before we left, we hiked the Humpback Rocks Loop at MM 6 on the Blue Ridge Parkway. It was a 4.2 mile loop, which took us 4 ½ hours due to many birdwatching delays. It was a beautiful loop, somewhat rugged. Most of the loop was part of the Appalachian Trail and we met several AT through hikers, including "Dude Man", who posts regularly on YouTube as 'Dude Man Appalachian Trail 2020". We are proud to say we have walked the Appalachian Trail - only 2185.8 miles to go! We did

see all sorts of beautiful wildflowers, migrating birds and a very large black bear. As you can see from the photo - we did keep our distance!







When we returned to the campground that day, we were greeted by another Airstream!.. another 27' Flying Cloud... brand new with a hatchback, parked right next to us in site 82. These were nice folks from St. Mary's, MD. So we had three Airstreams together... our un-planned minirally!

We came home Friday, stopping by Joanna and Richard Duncan's lovely house in Williamsburg. It was great to spend a few hours with them, and was a wonderful conclusion to our "break-out" camping trip!
