### PRESIDENT'S CORNER

AIRSTREAM HUGS Western Trip (Part 4)

Patsy and I departed Hill AFB Family Camp on Tuesday, July 7 and picked up I-15 South towards Salt Lake City, UT. As we traveled past SLC, we made a stop at Sam's Club and Walmart in South Jordan, UT. Lunch was a sub sandwich in the trailer. The temperatures during the day were now in the low 90's instead of mild 50 to 70 degrees. Leaving South Jordan we continued south on I-15 with not much in the way of scenery. As prices for diesel were higher around Bryce Canyon, we stopped at Fillmore, UT for diesel. We continued on I-15 pass the intersection of I-15 and I-70, the western most point on I-70, and there was not a town nearby. We turned east on UT 20 for the Bryce Canyon area and made a stop for diesel at the Bear Valley RV and Camping Resort. From there we traveled on US 89 south through Panguitch, UT until we intersected with Scenic Highway 12 which took us through Red Canyon and Dixie National Forest. We arrived



at Ruby's Inn RV Park and Campground where we had made reservations in December 2019 and got one of the last three sites available.

Our assigned site was just around the corner from the office so I walked over to check it out. The site sloped to the rear and, with our Pro-Pride hitch, we would not have been able to lower the front of the trailer enough to get level. So back to the office to see if anything else was available. The lady checking me in said there was nothing else available in the park but



asked if we would mind a site in the employee camping area that were all pull thru and level. We said that would work for us. We had an easy park in the site and had a view of the Escalante. We opened the roof vents to let heat out as the AC was starting to work but the wind was so strong we thought it would break the vent covers so we immediately shut them. We didn't have to worry about the heat too long as it cooled down rapidly when the sun went down. It was AC during the day with the temperature in the 80's and low 90's then by 9 p.m. the heat pump is on and by 11:30 p.m. you switch to the furnace. Then start over with the AC by 9 a.m. the next morning.


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Bryce Canyon National Park (BCNP) had been on Patsy's bucket list since we made a short stop there in 2003 while I was TDY to Salt Lake City. It was beautiful, clear and sunny as we headed into BCNP on Wednesday, July 8. We made a stop at the Visitor Center and talked to one of the rangers about Hiking the Hoodoos and were informed we could get a certificate for the hike. All we had to do was take pictures of ourselves at three different benchmarks on the trails and present as evidence.

We then headed off to Sunset Point to start our Hiking the Hoodoos adventure. There was a choice of three trails to







make a loop hike: Wall Street, Navajo Loop and Queens Garden Trails. We decided on the Wall Street and Queens Garden Trail as the Navajo Loop intersects with Wall Street at the bottom of the canyon. We headed down the Wall Street Trail with a steep descent with many switch backs. It became apparent how the trail got its name as the path had sheer vertical walls on each side. It was interesting to see a large pine tree growing from the middle of the trail between the walls. After reaching the bottom, we came to our first benchmark where Wall Street and Navajo Loop trails intersect with the Queens Garden trail. As we began hiking the Queens Garden trail, we saw a Steller's Jay in one of the trees that grow at the bottom of the canyon. It was not your typical blue jay as it has black crested feathers on its head and a blue body. As we started to ascend from the bottom of the canyon, we came upon the second benchmark for the Queens Garden Trail. We already had two of the three benchmarks needed for our certificate. After reaching Sunset



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Point, it was a short hike back to the parking lot. We had to do a little cleanup as we had dust up to our knees from the trail. As the trail was the most hiked trail in the park, the dust was very fine and it was like walking in flour. Then it was back to the campground to plan for the next day.



Thursday, July 9 was another sunny, beautiful day. We drove around to some other sections of the park and decided to take a hike from Sunset Point on the rim trail to Inspiration Point. This part of the rim trail is a





continual rise in elevation and the hike gave us a different perspective of

the Bryce Canyon amphitheaters. While on the hike we came across a Golden Mantle Ground Squirrel who stopped and posed for a picture. Once back at the truck we drove up to Bryce Point which has one of the most scenic vistas of the full amphitheater. It was a great day viewing the awe inspiring vistas of Bryce Canyon National Park.



We decided to drive to Escalante, UT on Friday, July 10 taking Scenic Highway 12, which goes right through the middle of the Grand Staircase-Escalante. As we were starting the trip, we saw a sign for Mossy Cave Turret Arch and Little Windows Trail. As we would be doing more driving today, we decided to hike the one mile out and back trail to get a little exercise. At the end of the trail was Tropic Ditch Waterfall and the river provides irrigation for farming in Tropic, UT. On the trail we came across the



Mossy Cave benchmark which was the third and last one needed to qualify for the Hiking the Hoodoos certificate. Continuing the drive, just before reaching Escalante, we came across the Shooting Star RV & Airstream Resort Park. They were using Airstreams as lodging facilities and the park appeared to be under some type construction. We later reviewed their website and as they say "it looked good on paper" but what we saw did not appear to match the website. We soon arrived at the Escalante Interagency Visitor Center and found it was closed. There was a nice outdoor picnic area with partial covering from the bright sun so we had lunch there

and watched the humming birds who were hovering around the feeders located around the visitor center. After driving

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through Escalante we headed back to the Bryce Canyon Area and since it was still early, drove down to the Tunnel Trail. We had learned about this trail from Laural Veloz's "Driving Miss Dixie". The trail, located off Highway 12 near the west tunnel, has an elevation change of 240 fee in 0. 4 of a mile which is achieved by numerous switchbacks. As we approached the higher elevations of the trail, we had an excellent view of the two historic tunnels on Highway 12. Then it was time to return to the camp for the day.


We were ready for a bike ride on Saturday, July 11. Our 25 mile out and back route was along the Canyon Bike Trail from the campground in Bryce to the Red Canyon Visitor Center. The forecast for the day was clear and sunny and it was a really nice bike path. As we neared the Red Canyon area, we were on one 1/2 mile section with a 4 and 5% grade. At this point we were breezing downhill but also realized it would be uphill on the return trip. We reached the Visitor Center where bike parking stands were available along with drinking water and rest rooms. We had a good conversation with summer volunteer rangers about the area and places to hike. Heading back, the steep grade and 7,800 plus elevation kicked us. As we were climbing one of the hills, it started to sprinkle rain which actually felt good under the current circumstances. We

continued on the path with the sprinkling rain and about two miles out from the campground the sprinkle turned into a rain storm. We were soaked again and tried to take refuge under a pine tree until the rain slowed down. After this we discussed going into the rain making business as it seemed every time we went on more than a short bike ride we would get caught in a rain storm. Then the weather turned nice again and we headed to BCNP to catch the sunset along the rim.

Based on information from the rangers the day before, we headed back to the Red Canyon Visitor Center on Sunday, July 12 to hike the Golden Wall/Buckhorn Loop Trail. It is a lightly trafficked 4.7 mile loop with a total elevation gain of 1,056 feet and was a great trail that had some very interesting hoodoo formations. We ran into about 15 different hikers and the trail was not nearly as dusty as those we had hiked at Bryce Canyon. The Buckhorn Loop Trail ended in the Red Canyon Campground which comes under the USDA


Service. There are 37 campsites with picnic tables, fire pits/grills, tent pads and no hookups. Drinking water, flush and vault toilets, showers (closed due to COVID-19), dump station and garbage disposal are available. We had a nice conversation with the campground host and put this place on our list for the future. We drove on to Panguitch, UT and found "the" grocery store was closed. We did find a Dollar General and bought a few groceries there.

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Our last full day at Bryce Canyon was Monday, July 13. After spending time getting ready to hit the road, we went to Inspiration Point and Bryce Point and hiked along the rim. We made a last stop at the BCNP Visitor Center for final purchases. Late in the day we checked out the Fairyland Point area which many visitors pass since it is situated one mile off the main park road prior to the Visitor Center. We realized if we had another day, it would be great to hike the 7.8 mile trail with an elevation change of 1,545. We did hike down some distance and hardly saw anyone.





We left Bryce Canyon on Tuesday, July 14 and drove Scenic Highway 12 to Torrey, UT in route to our next destination. The distance was 116 miles and took over 4 ½ hours. The route to Escalante was 47 miles of fairly

flat, easy driving. After Escalante the landscape changed dramatically and gained in altitude 2,000 plus feet. There is no way to go fast as there were many S turns with a speed limit of 20 mph and elevation changes. Additionally, this area was an open range without fences for cattle and you needed to be on the lookout for them. We had at least two occasions where we stopped for cows in the road. We arrived in Torrey, UT and got diesel before heading 12 miles to our destination at Fruita Campground, Capital Reef National Park.

Next month – A Triple Header – Capital Reef, Arches and Canyon Lands National Parks.

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## RECIPE OF THE MONTH - Grilled Broccoli



#### **INGREDIENTS:**

2 tbsp.

Worcestershire sauce

1 tbsp. low-sodium soy sauce

3 tbsp. ketchup

1 tbsp. honey

3 cloves garlic, minced

1/2 tsp. kosher salt, plus more for sprinkling

Freshly ground black pepper

1/4 tsp. crushed red pepper flakes,

plus, more for serving

1/4 c. freshly grated Parmesan Lemon wedges, for serving.

**DIRECTIONS:** Preheat grill to medium heat. Trim off fibrous bottom half of broccoli stem, then quarter broccoli head into small trees.

In a large bowl, whisk together oil, Worcestershire, soy sauce, ketchup, honey, and garlic. Season with salt, pepper, and red pepper flakes. Add in broccoli and toss to coat. Let sit for 10 minutes.

Place broccoli on grill and sprinkle lightly with more salt. Grill broccoli until knife-tender and slightly charred, flipping every 2 minutes and basting with any remaining sauce, 8 to 10 minutes. Sprinkle with Parmesan and more red pepper flakes and serve with lemon wedges.

#### Factoid:

Broccoli is a good source of fiber and protein, and contains iron, potassium, calcium, selenium and magnesium as well as the vitamins A, C, E, K and a good array of B vitamins including folic acid.



#### Homemade Drain Cleaner/De-Clogger

#### Instructions:


- 1 Sprinkle 1/4 cup baking soda into your drain.
- 2 Pour 1/2 cup white vinegar into your drain also, which immediately foams when it reacts with the powdered baking soda.
- 3 Leave the area and allow the solution to clean your drain for **three hours**. This will allow enough time for the foaming mixture to work its way through your pipe system, requiring no work on your part during this time.
- 4 Pour a large pot of boiling water, approximately 1 gallon, down the drain to wash away the remaining foam solution and soap residue.
