Bob patiently provides support to the volunteers that need him to add website information periodically and is very kind about the multiple changes that often need made.

Bob is married to Toni Crummett (47 years) and they travel with Buddy, their 10-year- old Shih Tzu mix. Bob has been retired for 5 years from a career as a Graphic Designer/Web Developer. The last 16 years were within the Health Care Industry. He is native to the PNW and was born and raised on a small farm in SE Oregon (Lakeview). Bob and Toni currently reside in Portland.

How many travel trailers have you owned and how many were Airstreams? We traveled and tent camped off the back of a motorcycle for many years. Then our son came along and changed that dynamic. We had a 1972 19' Class A motorhome that I inherited in the early 80s (what a pain it was.) In 2010 we bought our first Airstream, a Flying Cloud 25FB. In 2014 we moved up to our current Flying Cloud 30RB. We are also currently restoring a 1955 24' Boles Aero Ensenada.

What made you decide that you wanted to buy an Airstream?

My parents were avid trailer campers when I was growing up. Long-time family friends, who were snowbirds, had a Boles Aero Ensenada (same model/yr as what I have now.) Their trailer is what started my love for aluminum. It was exciting to see that trailer coming up our lane spring or fall as they were heading North or South. When we decided to get a trailer, an Airstream was the only logical choice!

How long have you owned your current Airstream? 7 yrs What is the one thing you added to your trailer you love the most?Twin beds – offers so much more floor space

What is the one thing you would change on your current trailer?

Well, we have already changed a bunch. Thanks to Ultimate Airstreams: Twin bed conversion, all upholstery updated, new custom couch, new closet organization, Corian table and countertops including bathroom, new stove-top, dumped the gas oven, added drawers in place of oven and updated the microwave to a convection type. We updated the curtains and shades ourselves and we actually have carpet throughout that we love.

How many rallies and caravans do you plan on attending in 2021?

We will only be at 3 OAC rallies this year. We do have a heavy schedule of camping with friends though. Also, we are going to the Albuquerque Balloon Festival this fall (if it's not canceled again.)

What is your favorite time of year to camp? We like to camp year-round.

What is your favorite campground?

There are so many that we just love, it's hard to choose one. We did lose a favorite campground last fall in the fires, Fisherman's Bend, on the North Santiam River near Mill City, OR.

What was your all-time favorite camping trip?

Our favorite trip was a 2½ month jaunt to Austin, TX and back (6,300 mi.) We kinda went the long way, Pismo Beach, Palm Desert, Tucson, Austin, Santa Fe, Sedona, Yuma, up the central valley of CA and over to Hwy 1 and back home to Oregon (whew!)

Are you more of a boondocker or a glamper? We do both but probably more glamping.

What advice would you give to a newbie to Airstreaming? Stop along the way, get out, walk around and get some fresh air. Be prepared, be safe and just enjoy the great outdoors.

Do you have any safety tips for traveling?Don't depend on a single source for directions (like GPS.) Always do your homework.

What do you enjoy the most about being a member of the OAC? The friendships we have made.

Rallies are in full swing now. As of May 20, we will have completed 12 of our 37 rallies for 2021. Of all the spaces in those 12 rallies that we booked, we only had 8 sites that went unfilled. We still have six openings at Champoeg State Park south of Portland over the 4th of July (July 2-5), three openings at Nehalem Bay State Park July 14-18, five openings at the Narrows Rally near Burns, OR, September 30-Oct 2 and many openings at the year end rally also in September at the Deschutes Fairground and Expo. The rest of the rallies are booked BUT there are always cancellations from time to time so if you have a rally that catches your eye, definitely be in contact with the host to go on the waiting list. I think in every rally so far, we've had cancellations and largely emptied the waiting lists.

The CDC has told us that fully vaccinated people can gather outside without masks now "Anyone who is fully vaccinated can participate in indoor and outdoor activities, large or small, without wearing a mask or

physical distancing," Walensky, head of the CDC, said. "If you are fully vaccinated, you can start doing the things that you had stopped doing because of the pandemic." There are still some places where masks will be required - public transportation, medical offices, some large outdoor gatherings. We should be aware that there are a few people in our club who are still vulnerable to COVID due to health conditions that prevent the vaccine from being effective in them. We will respect and protect them to keep them safe as they continue to mask around those of us whose vaccines did work.

In addition, we are slowly adding back food at some rallies. We've asked that any host preparing and/or serving food at a rally take the short food handler's licensing course as an extra cautionary measure. For example, Hal and I are serving dinner one night at Pelton PGE Park. We will serve our guests ourselves rather than sharing serving utensils. We both hold food handler's licenses (as well as OLCC licenses if you ever need a bartender). The CDC is no longer very concerned about transmission of COVID through "things" vs. people, but out of a sense of caution, we will still be careful about food for now.

Amy D'abbraccio and I are working together to plan for 2022 and in 2023, she will take over rally planning. She's a joy to work with! If you have places you think we should look at camping for 2022, let me know. And if you would like to host, even better! twestover@mac.com.

RALLY ROUNDUP




St. Patrick's Day Rally

Looking forward to the next rally!






Joint Oregon/Washington Wine Rally: Reported by Carol Dion

Travel Apps for AirstreamersNational Park Service App for IOS and Android users

The long awaited new National Park Service app was officially introduced in February and wow, was it worth the wait! NPS staff were actively involved in the development based on what National Park users have requested and it shows. Still a work in progress but did I mention it is FREE? With over 420 national parks, content and features will continue to be added as more information is provided by park rangers.

So what does this baby do? How about self-guided tours to both the popular spots as well as the off-the-beaten-track sites?! Directions to how

to get there and what to do once you arrive.



Includes interactive maps for each park with roads and trails to help planning. And, guess what, content including maps can be downloaded for offline use so you don't worry about losing cell-phone connection in the middle of nowhere. Hungry and realize you left your picnic basket in the trailer at the campground 15 miles away? The app can help you locate food, restrooms, and gift shop for those of us that collect the U.S. Geological Survey benchmarks that look right at home in the Airstream.

Some fun things included in the app are a "share a virtual postcard" to your jealous

friends at home with some of the beautiful scenery you are seeing in person. And, of course, visitor center hours and locations are included. Another really cool feature is accessibility – the National Park Service staff take their mandate to make the parks available to all seriously and have worked very hard to ensure that visitors with physical challenges have a great visit.

We are planning a trip through Big Bend National Park in Texas on our way to the east coast in January and in five minutes, I have downloaded the map, discovered what the rangers consider the highlights of the park, and found the descriptions of the four campgrounds (with links to reserve), three driving tours, hiking and biking trails, and the best places to view sunrise, sunset, and the night sky. And downloaded it all to my cell phone. No more FOMO
