PRESIDENT'S CORNER

AIRSTREAM HUGS Western Trip (Part 5) Patsy and Gerry Nagel – Capitol Reef, Arches and Canyon Lands National Parks.

On July 14 we drove into Capitol Reef National Park, UT around 1:30 p.m. and, after a stop at the visitor center, continued to Fruita Campground. The campground is located adjacent to the Fremont River and surrounded by historic orchards. Latter-Day Saints pioneers planted the fruit trees that provided food and income from the 1880s to 1960s. Today the apple, apricot, cherry, peach, pear and plum orchards are preserved and

protected as part of the Fruita Rural Historic Landscape and maintained by the National Park Service. We were disappointed to learn that we had just missed the apricot season as you can pick and purchase in season fruit. The campsite was for only the first of our three night stay as we had to reserve two different campsites based on availability. It was easy to maneuver into the campsite, but the major problem was lack of shade and the temperatures were in the low 90's. Did I mention that there are no hookups at this campground? Generator hours were from 8-10 a.m. and 6-8 p.m. At 6 p.m. using the generator, I started the AC as we have an Easy Start system. For whatever reason it did not seem to be cooling so we shut it down. We did not want to damage the AC because it was hot at our next destination. We decided to

go sit in the orchard next to the campground where there was plenty of shade and several mule deer grazing. They just ignored us. We then drove over to see the Fremont Culture Petroglyphs located nearby along Utah State Highway 24. Currently accessed by two wooden boardwalks, the Petroglyphs were carved into the Wingate sandstone between 300 and 1300 C.E. (Common Era which is based on the Gregorian calendar). The panel included anthropomorphic (human-like) and bighorn sheep petroglyphs.

After supper it cooled down some, but we still had to keep the fans and windows open. Patsy woke up extremely hot around 1:30 a.m. and decided to move to the sofa hoping to cool down. In the campsite next to us four gentlemen in a Class C were camping and had built a campfire. The campfire turned into a bonfire with one of the gentlemen tending it all night. There was a wind blowing from the fire towards our trailer and the smoke was so bad Patsy had to finally shut the window. Patsy did not get a good night's sleep.



I was up early the morning of July 15 and walked over to the Gifford House where they have fresh baked pies and cinnamon rolls. The previous afternoon we had shared a two-serving mixed berry pie but wanted their legendary cinnamon rolls as they sell out fast. After

breakfast we moved to a different campsite for the last two nights of our stay. The occupants had left early so we hooked up the trailer and moved to this smaller campsite that was a little more difficult to back into. The good part was it had plenty of shade and was next to the building with water fountain, graywater sinks to dump dishwater, and flush toilets. After getting settled, we decided to go on a short hike on the 2-mile loop Hickman Bridge Trail. The trail featured a 133-foot natural bridge and views of the canyon. On the return trip we ran into a family who were Florida Gator fans and had a young daughter who was a real trooper on the hiking trail. We

returned to the campground to plan for our final day at Capitol Reef. With the help of the shade and temperatures not being as high, we both got a good night's sleep.

On July 16 it was another early morning walk to get cinnamon rolls for breakfast. After breakfast we took a stroll around the Fruita Historic District to view some of the historic buildings and orchards. Patsy had a craving for a milk shake so it was off to Torrey, UT about 12 miles away. There is no cell phone or internet service at Capitol Reef and when we were about 3 miles from Torrey, we came within range of a cell tower and Patsy's phone



camp site, we decided to hike the Fremont River Trail that is accessed from the campground. This is a 2 plus mile out and back trail with a 410-foot elevation change. After starting out the hike along the river you then ascended above the river on a trail that was narrow in places and had scenic views of the river valley. There was no shade, but it was overcast, and we got a light sprinkle of rain which we appreciated. After a supper cooked on the grill, we prepared to leave the next day for Moab, UT to visit Arches and Canyon Lands National Parks.

started pinging with all the messages and emails from the queue. We checked out the Torrey area and, heading back towards Capital Reef, found Slacker's Burger Joint. It was quite busy and we each got a delicious milk shake which we enjoyed while sitting under their covered patio. Returning to the entrance of Fruita Campground, we came across a critter about the size of a beaver that, when we had internet access to research, was verified as a Marmot (a species of a giant ground squirrel). Back at the

On July 17 we departed Fruita Campground around 7 a.m. on Utah State Highway 24 for the 147-mile trip to Moab, UT. The scenery initially was large rock mountains but then turned to level sage brush terrain. This took us to I-70 where we started looking for coffee. The first

town we came to was Green River, UT so we exited I-70 to see if we could find a McDonalds. As we were driving down the main thoroughfare, Patsy spotted the Green River Coffee Company. As there was parking along the street that would accommodate the Airstream, we were able to park and walk over to the



coffee shop. Due to the Wuhan Virus only one couple at a time could go in. We were graciously served our coffee and went back to the Airstream to drink it. This was one of the best cups of coffee we have had and if we had known how good it was, we would have ordered a large cup. After coffee, we continued to Moab arriving at Canyon Lands RV Park in Moab around 11:30 a.m. We set up our camp and, as it was hot in Moab, were blessed with a shady site. After a quick lunch we headed out to the Arches National Park (ANP) Visitor Center to get information to plan the next day. We returned to Moab and had supper at the Moab Diner; this was the first restaurant that we had visited since Sioux Falls, SD on June 22.




It was off to ANP again on July 18 to view several arches with the first being Delicate Arch. There are two ways to view this arch. One is a 3-mile hike on open slip rock with no shade and an estimate of 2.5 hours. The other is a 1/2-mile hike to a viewpoint of the arch. Since we wanted to see other arches and it was over 100 degrees, we took the shorter hike. Next was the Sand Dune and Broken Arch which is a 1.4 mile out and back trail. The Sand Dune Arch is a secluded arch among fins of rock and is a shady spot with deep sand on the ground. From there we took the trail to the Broken Arch. This trail crosses a large meadow before coming through some fins and a rock scramble to reach the arch. Then it

was back to the truck for our next hike. We drove to the Devil's Garden trail head and proceeded on a 1.9 mile out and back trail to Landscape Arch. This trail was paved in parts and hard packed in others. In addition to the

was spent trying to stay cool at the campground.



On July 19 we headed to Canyon Lands National Park (CLNP). Once in the park we stopped at the visitor center and talked to a summer employee about where to hike. He gave us some good suggestions for short hikes as the temperatures would be hot that day. The first hike

was the Whale Rock trail. This trail leads up the side of a sandstone dome ending with broad views of Island in the Sky. To stay on the trail, you had to follow the rock cairns.





Rock cairns are stacked rocks for navigation, safety, and for marking trails with minimal disruption to the natural environment. They help to avoid the need for unnatural and expensive signage along trails. On this hike we met a woman and her son from Portland, OR who were tent camping in CLNP and planning on heading to ANP. The lady, her son and Patsy and I were the only people on the trail which was refreshing after the crowds at ANP. After this, the next trail was the Upheaval Dome via Crater View trail. It is a 4 mile out and back trail








with a view of this geologic wonder. Upheaval Dome is an area approximately three miles across and the rock layers are dramatically deformed. In the center, rocks are pushed up into a circular structure called a dome. Surrounding this dome is a down warp in the rock layers. What caused these folds at Upheaval Dome? Geologists do not know for sure. As the temperatures were increasing it was time for some views that were close to parking lots. The first stop was the Green River Overlook then the Grand Viewpoint Overlook which had a view through an arch. Then it was back to Moab to cool down.

> It was back to ANP on July 20 to see a few more arches. We found a location where we could see several arches without traveling to different areas. In fact, we could stay in the same parking lot. The first arch was the Double Arch. The path was a flat graveled surface that led to the base of two giant arch spans which are joined at one end. We climbed up the base so we could get a closer look. The other arches were on the Window Trail. This trail led to






