Silver in Streets
Day by Day

The "Silver in The Streets" Rally took considerable planning by Jeff Cutright, Randy Rinehart and David Broad, working closely with Abingdon town officials, but it all came together May 13-16. Eleven rigs made it, three being from Texas! Coordinated parking was started at a staging area and then guided onto specific spots on Remsburg Drive, just a block from Lee Highway, which is the main street through the town.

Once settled, everyone moved up and down the street, greeting old friends or new acquaintances. It is always fun to see how other Airstreamers do things, from hitches, flags, tow vehicles, bike racks and solar to interior arrangements. Three couples from Texas knew each other, but had planned independently, not knowing the others were coming.

A quick walk around town to get the blood flowing showed why Abingdon was chosen for the rally. It has a lot of history, lovely architecture, the wonderful Barter Theater, Martha Washington Hotel, the famous Virginia Creeper Trail, hiking and biking trails, great fishing and a wonderful farmer's market.

At 5:00, an historian, Michael Henningsen with History Alive Tours, gave us a unique lesson in Abingdon history. Dressed in the character of Rufus Soule, a tavern owner in the early 1800's. Michael proved an enthusiastic, knowledgeable teacher. For an hour, he told the history of Abingdon, its role as a crossroads of trade and in the Revolutionary War. He then led the group through town, bringing history to life. We were lucky with the weather for four days. It's cool here, and easy to forget we were in the mountains. The elevation is 2087'

Day 2: Friday morning started with a breakfast hosted by Peter Davey and Stephanie Tisch. This made for a pleasant morning gathering. One of the many attractions of Abingdon is the Virginia Creeper Trail, an old railroad bed that follows beautiful Whitetop Laurel Creek. Most were doing some form of the Creeper, but it was interesting to hear what others were doing. Some went to the Birthplace of Country Music in Bristol. The Virginia Creeper Trail is one of the prettiest bike rides in America. From Whitetop Station, it's all downhill to Damascus, then varies for another 17 miles to Abingdon. It follows beautiful Laurel Creek all the way, and Laurel Creek is as pretty a trout stream as can be found. Most of the Silver in The Streets group took some portion of the ride. It was a bit cool and wet in the beginning, but the sun came out mid-day to warm things up.

We had a meeting at the Farmer's Market, where Jeff presented gifts to the town manager, James Morani and Tanya Triplett, with Abingdon Economic Development and Tourism. The club presented donations to the Farmer's Market and to the Food Bank. A rally like this is of mutual benefit for the town and for the participants, and I think all parties were happy with the results.

Day 3: Abingdon has one of the best farmer's markets anywhere, and all we had to do was walk to the end of Remsburg Drive. We had a surprise visit from Betty and Junior Patton, who have done so much for the Virginia Airstream Club for many years! Even though they have sold their trailer, they still came up to visit.

In the afternoon, some relaxed, some went for hikes, some visited friends or relatives in the area and some went for drives in the beautiful countryside.

Sunday morning was our departure day, but no one seemed anxious to get on the road. It was a good group, and we hated to go, but agreed we'd love to do it again next year.

"BRIGHT IDEAS"

- 1. To prevent your clothes from falling off hangers in the rear bedroom closet, turn the hangers around so open end doesn't fave the front of the trailer.
- 2. Use chamois-type camping towels in order to have towels that dry more quickly. They have a loop to hang onto a suction cup hook in the shower. Or use Tali towels they dry fast. (www.talitowels.com)
- 3. Spice storage canisters called "Lockups" can be snapped together and stacked (available on Amazon in a number of sizes.)
- 4. To sleep cool without using A/C, cool the trailer during the day with the A/C. At night, run the front Fantastic Fan with only large rear window open.


