

News From Headquarters

HQ wants to make you aware of the following changes going into effect in the near future.

Membership Period - Anniversary Dates

Membership period is changing from a calendar year to an anniversary year. The anniversary year will be based on 12 months from the member's original join date. There is no change for current members. All current members will have the same anniversary date of January 1st. This means a current member's membership will run from January 1st to December 31st. The renewal process for members will start roughly 120 days before the expiration date. HQ (Headquarters) will send out notifications reminding members it is time to renew. Members MUST be logged into the member-only portal to renew online.

Starting July 1st, 2021, new members will be on a true anniversary schedule. If a member joins July 15th, 2021, their membership is active from July 15th, 2021, until July 14th, 2022. New members will be charged one year of International dues and one year of Local Club dues. The pro-rated dues system will <u>end on June 30th, 2021</u>. HQ will notify local clubs of new members as soon as they are processed as we currently do.

Affiliates

HQ will also be able to collect Affiliate dues for clubs. If your club would like assistance collecting Affiliate dues for your club, the current President or 1st Vice President needs to email <u>membership@airsteamclub.org</u> and tell us "Yes, we want HQ to assist with our Affiliates". In this email, include what the Affiliate dues are for your club. Email HQ by <u>August 1st, 2021</u>.

CPCs

New Airstream owner information, also known as CPCs, will no longer be shared with officers and membership chairs. The distribution of buyer's personal information is ending due to violations of privacy laws.

Founder's Award

Founder's Award program is ending as of <u>July 1st.</u> Founders recipients are listed on page 1 of the printed Membership Directory. The leadership team is working on developing a new program for member recruitment, retention, and acknowledgment.

Email Blast

An email blast will be going out to the general membership encouraging everyone to get logged into the Members-Only portion of the website. This will allow members to have access to member-only benefits and services.

Future Voting

Last year the International Board of Trustees voted to allow each member of the International Club to have a voice in the election of International Officers and amendments to its Constitution. This year, because of COVID-19, the Board decided to continue the delegate process. In the future, to vote electronically each member must have a valid email address on file with Headquarters. If you don't have an email address, it is simple to create a Gmail account with Google or with your Internet provider. Each member needs to have an individual email on file even if you share an email address with your partner.



Visits to nearby petroglyphs, Fort Rock, Cowboy Dinner Tree restaurant, Crack In The Ground and more kept caravanners busy. Still in the midst of COVID concerns, social distancing and small gatherings were the norm.

We packed up for our next destination, Malheur Station, where many got to practice their boondocking skills. Our camp was at a facility that is managed by a nonprofit organization focused on environmental and w old life issues. It began as aJob Corps site. The wind did blow here. A nest of baby owls provided entertainment for some. Others took the opportunity to visit nearby Peter French barn where another Great Horned owl was raising a family in the barn. There was also a lovely small bookstore, good food and the station manager gave a talk about efforts to rehabilitate and rebuild the area for groups such as ours. It is often used for education field trips for middle and high school students. We made another donation here t o the nonprofit's work.

The third and final leg of our journey led us further south to Lakeview and the Junipers RV campground. We enjoyed a talk by a local forest service worker and Director of the Lakeview Main Street program at the historic Alger Theater. Local museums were visited by several caravaners and a few hardy souls guided by Dan Pinson ventured out to find the Glass House on Hart Mountain. Caravanners searched their belongings to find items for a charity auction to support Alger Theater restoration project. Auctioneers Wendy Ware (her idea), Lon Brusselback, and Jim Ableman proved to be exceptional sales people as more than \$800 was raised. Once again we enjoyed some very interesting country and learned a good deal about what it is like to live in rural Oregon.








































Pelton Park Rally: Story by Donna Thorson
