





This info is from a brochure and would not post clearly, but through a series of scans, I was able to get it somewhat readable and is provided to give some idea of what you can do, and the layout of the campground showing Deer Run which Roger says is also known as Loop B





Camping: All campsites are equipped with a picnic table and a fire ring. A site is limited to six people and all camping equipment and vehicles must fit on camping the pad. Pocomoke River State Park, Shad Landing Area (172 sites) is open all year long. Newl Remodeled bath houses in Blue Heron and Deer Run. Milburn Landing Area (30 sites) is open April through mid-December. Electric sites available at both locations.

Youth Group Camping: Youth group campsites are available at both Shad Landing and Milburn Landing areas of Pocomoke River State Park. Advance reservations are required for all youth groups. Individual groups with a Maryland Youth Group Pass camp for free.

Mini-Cabins: 1-room cabins sleep four and 2-room cabins sleep five. No linens are provided. Cooking must take place outside of the cabin. Picnic tables and fire rings are provided. Tents are prohibited on cabin sites. Screen rooms may be placed on the picnic table pads. Shad Landing's 8 mini-cabins with ac/heat are located in Robin's Nest camping loop. Milburn Landing has four 1-room and new two 2-room mini-cabins, with ac/heat or heat/ceiling fans.

Pavilions: Five pavilions, with grills and picnic tables, are available for rent by advance reservation. Reservation fees cover the rental of the pavilions; not the surrounding area which is occupied on a first-come first-served basis. The pavilions hold between 50-180 people, depending upon the specific pavilion. The pavilion area is available from 8:00 AM until sunset.

Picnic Areas: Picnic areas are available at both Shad Landing and Milburn Landing. Standing grills and tables are available on a first come first serve basis.

Swimming Pool & Splash Zone: New! Eagles Landing Splash Zone for children 8 and under! The pool area at Shad Landing is open weekends Memorial Day to Labor Day, and open daily except Tuesdays mid-June to mid-August. The 25-meter pool ranges in depth from 3-11 feet. An adult must accompany all children 12 and under. Pool use service charge is required.

Concessions: Open weekends April - November and daily May –September at Shad Landing, Deli, snacks, souvenirs, camping supplies, groceries, boat rentals, marine gasoline, and firewood are available.

Boating: Launching ramps are open to the public at Shad Landing and Milburn Landing. Canoe, kayak, and boat rentals are available at Shad Landing's new rental facility. Canoes and kayaks can be rented as weather permits. Long-term boat slips, with electric and water hookup, are also available at Shad Landing. There are boat slips available to campers (for a fee) on a first-come, first-served basis.

Fishing: A Maryland Tidal Sport Fishing License is required to fish the Pocomoke River and nearby creeks. A "Fish for Fun" pond is located across from the marina parking lot at Shad Landing, and requires a freshwater license. The pond is part of Maryland's "Put and Take" trout program.

Pets: Pets must be leashed at all times on public lands.
Pets are permitted in designated areas at specific times—
see map inside. Pets are welcome on the undeveloped areas of
the state forest and at Milburn Landing all year.

Access: Many areas of Pocomoke River State Park are accessible. Please contact the office for more information.

Nature Center: The Nature Center at Pocomoke River State Park is a must see. The facility houses interactive exhibits and tanks containing reptiles, amphibians and fish native to the Pocomoke River area. The Nature center is open weekends in May and September and Thursday - Tuesday from Memorial Day through Labor Day . Be sure to complete the Nature Center scavenger hunt, you will be surprised at what you learn.

Hunting: Hunting is available on the surrounding state forest and wildlife management areas. Maps and regulations can be found at the registration office or online at www.DNR.Maryland.gov.

Pocomoke State Forest: The Forest consists of 15,000 acres in the Pocomoke River Watershed adjacent to Pocomoke River State Park. Much of the Forest borders the river, protecting the Cypress Swamps and designated Wildland Areas. In Pocomoke State Forest visitors can enjoy fishing, flat water canoeing, hiking trails, hunting, horseback riding, and mountain biking. For more forest information, call 410-632-3732.

# Dan McDougall Is On The Road Again

A year ago our much traveled bass playing member Dan took a trip across the good ole USA. He's at it once again. His trips are interesting and he chronicles his adventures well. So, I will include some of his exploits in the newsletter. Day 1 We're Off

580 miles \$42.08: Richmond, IN) Got in late last night from the Weird Al concert, but wanted to get an early start. All that pre-packing paid off, and I hit the road around 8:30 am.

If you've read past years' blog posts, you know my feelings on the "major" interstates in PA and West Virginia. There has been some meager improvement since then, in the form of some newly-cemented sections, but overall, the roads are still throwbacks to the Model-A era. Patched everywhere, two narrow lanes, overpriced & under-parking-lotted service plazas with expensive gas.

So, I powered through five states today: DE, PA, WV, OH, and IN. 580-something miles today. But I wanted to get ahead of the remnants of hurricane Barry before he heads North.

In doing so, I didn't leave many options for an overnight stay. I tried my new Harvest Host subscription, but the one I wanted was only open in the Fall (went to voicemail). The state parks laughed at me (it was Saturday at 4 pm, after all). KOAs are nice, but pricey, and my last resort. The ones on I-70 thru Ohio were really pricey (\$90!), but I saw one just over the Indiana border that looked promising. But first, I called the Richmond Walmart, and they DO allow overnight parking, In fact, I started there, but soon realized that at 91 degrees, I wanted an electric hookup for the A/C.

The 4 pm cut-off for app reservations had passed, but Richmond Indiana's KOA picked up the phone at 7:30 PM, were as friendly as could be, and said "come on over" (their office closes at 8 pm). \$42 later, I'm in a scenic water/electric (no sewer) site for \$42. And they have a pool!

## Day 2 - Big!

604 miles

\$29: Clinton State Park

On the road by 6 am this morning for a long day of driving. But how could I not stop in Casey, Illinois to visit their Big Things in a Small Town? They're big things.

In a small town.

Some are Guinness-certified as "The World's Largest".

Others are just Big.

A big pencil.





All the places of interest are beautifully landscaped. The grass is so perfect it doesn't quite seem real. Flowers in bloom. Swept clean. The Sunday morning stillness in the air. All exhibits have some sort of bible verse(s) attached to them, related to the item.

Most sites are within walking distance, so it was the perfect Sunday morning jaunt.

Those of you who are longtime blog readers, may see a pattern of "big and biggest" photos from past visits to: the world's largest Dilly Bar, a giant prairie dog, dinosaurs, another rocking chair claiming to be the largest, the "largest pistachio in the world", etc. You get the idea. And those were just the ones off the top of my head.

Since I was already off the beaten track, rather than re-join I-70's fast-paced race West, I took Route 40. It runs parallel to I-70 for a long time, and takes you back in time. Through real towns. With real hardware stores and diners. Shiny grain silos. Classic cars on their way to a community show.

And I was quite literally going back in time, since the time zone soon changed back one hour.

Kansas City snapped me back to reality. I-70 was been closed in two places on this trip.

This was the second, riddled with detours. Ok, fine. But then I experienced these three things within 5 miles:

- 1. Thanks to the detour, you merge onto one highway, only to have one mile to cross 4 lanes of traffic to get in the left lane (the only lane going to I-70). Y'know those drivers who, when you're ahead of them and signal a lane change to their lane, accelerate? That's no fun when you're towing a trailer, and need to cross 4 lanes. No fun. Most KC drivers were like that.
- 2. After I made the swap to the left lane, another driver who couldn't manage to compromise enough change lanes, stopped. Yes, stopped. In the fast lane (the lane I was in, that went to I-70). Stopped.
- 3. Before all this happened, I saw brake-lights ahead of me, slowed to crawl, and tried to avoid hitting a crazy-eyed man weaving, on foot, through the speeding lanes of traffic, almost daring to be run over.

## Day 4 - Luck

55 miles

\$23/night: Pawnee Campground (Arapaho/Roosevelt National Forest)

Luck is what happens when preparation meets opportunity

Another very early start (is this really only day 4?) to attempt the impossible: Pawnee Campground near Ward, CO. When I got off the main commuter route, it was a quiet (and cold!) drive up the mountain on Coal Creek Canyon Road.

After consulting brother Tim, I decided to start at the far point (Pawnee). If I was turned away, I had a few other options: Kelly Dahl and Golden Gate Canyon State Park. Both equally unlikely to get in without a reservation. All were around 10,000ft elevation, so would stay relatively cool, compared to Denver.

I got to the gate at Pawnee, and asked about sites. \*sigh\* I was told it was highly unlikely. Highly.
