# **ALMA O'DONNELL**



We regret to inform Iowa Club members of the passing of another of our past members, Alma O'Donnell. She and her husband, Jack, were Iowa Unit members from 1972 to 2000. After she and Jack retired, they moved to Arizona, where she was the first female president of the Arizona Unit. Alma was 101 years old at the time of her death on June 20, 2021. Jack preceded her death in 2005.

According to her obituary in the Nevada, Iowa Journal, the couple thoroughly

enjoyed their Airstream after retirement. It was their home for 8 years as they visited every state in the USA. They also took several foreign trips, obviously without their Airstream. Jack suffered double vertical vision in his later years, so Alma took over the wheel and drove the Airstream to Mexico, the West Coast, Canada and almost anywhere wheels could go.

After age 70, Alma took up hobbies of tap dancing, oil painting, china painting and playing different musical instruments. She always carried an electric organ with her in the Airstream. She was a resident at the Story County Senior Care in Nevada at the time of her death.

The older members of the Iowa Club will remember that you always knew when Alma was around. She had such a bubbly demeanor and always seemed happy and outgoing.

# **BEU'S FIND CAMPGROUNDS**

Norm and Linda Beu want everyone to know that there is a campground in Du Quoin, IL that is not listed in any camping directory. It is at the State Fairgrounds in Du Quoin. On the way back to lowa from the International Rally in Lebanon, TN, they spent a night at the fairgrounds campground, parked right beside the lake. The cost was just \$20.00, with electricity, water and a dump station. So, if any of you are traveling in that area of Illinois and are looking for a place to camp for the night, keep the fairgrounds in mind. According to Linda, the main entrance is too narrow for trailers to enter there, but if you exit Hwy. 51 at Derby Lane (the street running east at the NW corner of the fairgrounds) and head east, you can get to the campgrounds via the fairgrounds back entrance.

Norm also reported that there is a good campground at Rantoul, IL named Prairie Pines Campground. It is an old mobile home park that was used as such when Chanute Air Base was in operation years ago. The spaces are large with full hookups and the current cost is \$26.50 per night. There are restrooms and showers available. The off-season price (November to March) is just \$20.00 per night. You can find all the information on the internet by just entering "Prairie Pines Campground, IL". Rantoul is about 16 miles NE of Champaign on US Hwy. 45.

Twenty members in twelve rigs showed up for the "Farm to Table Rally" hosted by Pat and Larry Dellamuth and Lavonne Sandersfeld.

The weekend started out on Thursday evening with a "bring your own supper", followed by a gathering around a campfire, although no one sat very close to the fire, what with the temperature still in the upper 80's. However, it was great to see friends that most hadn't seen since last October and the conversations flew.

Following a Friday morning breakfast of scrambled eggs, sausages and fantastic sweet breads prepared by Pat, eve-



ryone moved to the Lake Iowa Nature Center (air conditioned) where the park naturalist and a summer intern presented a couple of programs. The program covered by



the intern dealt with Amphibians and Reptiles, while the naturalist's topic (by request) was Squirrels. As part of the first program, boxed salamanders and a small turtle, as well as other items, were passed through the gathered group for viewing and handling. A fox snake, named of all things, Foxy, was handled by the intern and seemed to love coiling around his arm. In the squirrel program, many were surprised to find that we have flying squirrels in Iowa.

After the stop at the Nature Center, the rally attendees then drove about six miles to the Genoa Bluffs Strawberry



Farm where lunch was served. Prior to eating, however, several Airstreamers took advantage of the opportunity to go out to the strawberry patch and pick their own strawberries, which were then weighed and paid for. The lunch, prepared by

Pat's sister-in-law and her adult daughter, consisted of pulled pork, baked potato, green bean casserole and homemade rolls, was very tasty and enjoyed by everyone.



The daughter also gave a short history of the yestertown of Genoa Bluffs. Decades ago, there was an actual town of Genoa Bluffs and among it's businesses were a blacksmith shop, creamery, post office, church and cemetery. It was on the verge of becoming the county seat of lowa County until the railroad decided to pass through Marengo, which resulted in the death of Genoa Bluffs. By a razor thin margin, the lowa County residents voted to make Marengo the county seat. This was rather typical of many communities in the early days of the nation, when railroad routes dictated the life and death of many communities.

The afternoon was declared "free time" after hostess Pat informed everyone that, due to the heat and humidity, the pizza supper would be at the air conditioned Kum & Go business at I-80 Exit 216, rather than at the shelterhouse at the campground. Members spent the afternoon resting, going to the nearby Tanger Outlet Mall or just exploring the area on their own. When 6:00 PM rolled around, however, everyone was gathered at the Kum & Go, where they enjoyed pizzas with various toppings in the small dining

This is a nearby farm where the owner, Randy Schnebbe, developed a business of welding steel to make all sorts of animals, stands, etc. The largest item he has made and sold, to date. is a 10-foot tall steel tree for a



business in Wisconsin. He has a steel corn stalk in a legislator's office in Washington, DC and has another one made that will go into an lowa State Senator's office in Des Moines this fall. Randy also has several other items on display in DC. His most popular item is an ant which, with the materials ready and on hand, he can put together in about 10

minutes. When Covid hit last year, farmer markets



disappeared. Friends urged him to start a "flea market" at his rural

residence. It is now so popular that he has about 30 vendors participating, with everything from pastry and kettle corn to ceramic painting on glass and all sorts of craft items. There were even homemade cinnamon rolls that

nearly all Airstreamers bought and enjoyed.

Then, on to North English to visit shops in that small community before lunch (on your own) at a small restaurant; The Malt Shop. After lunch, the group caravanned to an organic farm where a young fellow primarily raised black beans and potatoes, along with other vegetables on a smaller scale, while also raising, butchering and selling chickens. He showed the bean harvesting machine, as well as the unit he uses to clean the beans, before bagging them for sale. The group was amazed at the two-row potato planter he used. His potato digger came from the grandfather of Wanda Paine, our Minnesota member. It was interesting to see how a young farmer has found ways to raise and sell various food items on a small acreage, compared to the thousand-acre farms producing corn and soybeans.

For our final rally supper, Pat Dellamuth prepared and served a delicious chicken-pasta casserole, as well as lettuce with a bean-vegetable topping. For dessert, everyone enjoyed strawberries and homemade shortcake. What a great way to bring an enjoyable rally to a close. To top it off, an Illinois couple, looking to purchase an Airstream, had seen the notice of the rally on the internet, called Pat to see if they could come (to which Pat of course said yes) and they joined us for the evening.

Sunday morning dawned sunny and cool. Hostess Pat purchased pastries at the Kum & Go, which all enjoyed (as well as more of the sweetbreads Pat had baked). No one was in a hurry to leave, so there were plenty of conversations going on before hooking up and heading down the road. and Larry Gatlin and the Gatlin Brothers. Also performing were John Conlee, Parker McCollum, Riders in the Sky (the

backup band for Roy Rogers), Aaron Weber (comedian) and Lauren Alaina. The show lasted for about 3 hours and was well worth the money.



Wednesday morning saw the Delegate Meeting convened at 9:00 AM. There are 104 units, or clubs, in WBCCI (counting the European Unit), but about 25-30 did not have any representation at the meeting. Tom Herron and Chuck Cabalka (your designated delegate and alternate) were in attendance. There were three amendments (check the February Blue Beret for details) to the International Club's Constitution on the agenda. The first proposed amendment (proposing to elect International officers electronically, with all WBCCI members having an opportunity to vote on-line) passed with no objections. However, when Amendment No. 2 was brought to the floor a motion for a roll call vote was made. During the confusion, the first vote was in favor of the roll call vote. After some head scratching and deliberation, a second vote was held and this time the roll call vote was defeated. The third proposed amendment passed without objection and the meeting was adjourned at exactly 10:00 AM.

On Wednesday evening, the attendees were treated to the usual excellent International Rally Band as they put on an wonderful concert. This year there were 36 members in the band, which seemed to be somewhat less than there have been in previous years. However, you would never have known it due to the quality of sound coming from the group. Their numbers ranged from marches to river songs to a salute to Tennessee. There was even a Marmalade String Band with five Airstreamers playing guitars, mandolins and a fiddle and they played four numbers that all paid tribute to Tennessee. All in all, it was a wonderful "home grown" entertainment evening.

Midway through the concert, the presentation for the 2022 International Rally was made. There will be about 3,200 sites at the Fryeburg, ME location, so there will be plenty of parking spaces. Fryeburg's population is about 4,000, while Conway, NH (about 13 miles west) has about 11,000 residents, so between the two, there should be plenty of necessities support. For those who like seafood, Portland, ME is just 57 miles away. There will be lots of information forthcoming in the upcoming months, so keep your eyes and ears open. Oh, by the way. The 2023 International will be in Rock Springs, WY and it appears that the

2024 rally will be either at the Iowa State Fairgrounds in Des Moines or in Lincoln, NE.

On the morning of Thursday, July 22nd, Justin Humphreys (Airstream's Chief of Operations) reported on what was

going on at Airstream in Jackson Center. They started manufacturing trailers in the new facility in March, just in time to be shut down for six weeks by governor's orders due to the pandemic. The new building is 635,000 sq. ft., making it the largest manufacturing plant in the US, maybe in the western hemisphere. They now have 1,500 em-



ployees and are still hiring. Employees have the normal benefits of insurance, vacation, etc., but they also get subsidized meals at the plant cafeteria and have a medical inhouse clinic, among other perks. Due to the pandemic, the temporary shut-down and just getting the new plant into operation, the Airstream Company is now more than 4,000 units behind their needs to fulfill customer orders and to stock dealer showrooms. Justin said that, at this time, there are probably less than 200 Airstreams nationwide sitting on dealer's lots awaiting a customer. One of the biggest problems Airstream now has is getting the non-Airstream-made components to build the trailers and motorhomes any faster. He said they hope to start tours of the new plant at Alumapaloosa in early September. If that is the case, it is likely that we will be able to tour the new plant in late September on the Iowa caravan's drive to the Swiss Festival Rally. The old plant in downtown Jackson Center, that previously made trailers, is now where the motorized units are made.

Your newsletter team decided to leave the rally site after Justin Humphrey gave his Airstream Company report and make a sightseeing trip into Nashville. The first stop was at Centennial Park, where the replica of the Greek Parthenon is located. It is a full-scale replica of the original



structure in Athens, standing 45 feet high, 101 feet wide and 228 feet long. It was built in 1897. It currently houses a museum that can be visited for an entrance fee.
