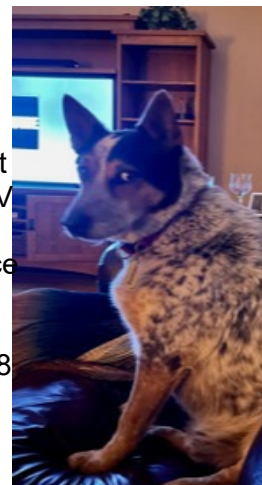

We began our trip to the 2021 Airstream Club International Rally at the Sparks Marina RV Park on June 27. One purpose of the Rally is to conduct the business of the Club. The other is to have fun, meet new people and learn new skills. As in 2019, rally attendees could find out what is going on and who was parked where through an App called Grupio.

The first evening's festivities included a procession of flags from all the local clubs, introduction of current officers and a salute to the armed services. Our own Grover Sandy did a fine job carrying the beautiful NorCal flag at the Opening Ceremony of the rally on Saturday, July 17. (See the photo in the August Poppy.) Grover stated that he and Cathy had a great time and were proud to represent our Club and carry the NorCal flag.

International Rally Continued

International President Andy Selking conducted the first business meeting of the IBT (International Board of Trustees) on July 19. Standing Committee Chairs presented reports; some included action items that had been discussed and were approved.

Newly installed International President Tye Mott held the second IBT meeting on Saturday, July 24. Here Tom and I were offered a new Big Red Number as we had served more than three years as Standing Committee Chairs.

At the Delegates' Meeting on July 21, Grover Sandy carried the votes of our club to approve three amendments to the WBAC constitution. NorCal was entitled to 296 votes because currently, each member with an e-mail address registered in Jackson Center has a vote. This is the last year that proportional voting will be allowed. One NorCal member voted against all three amendments to the constitution. If there had been a roll call vote, Grover would have cast 288 votes in favor and 8 votes against the proposed amendments. Luckily the delegates voted against holding a roll call vote, which facilitated the voting process. From now on only actual votes cast will be reported. I was shocked to learn that in Norcal, only 35 people actually voted. (We need to do a better job of having our voices heard.)

But wait – there's more than just business! There were dozens of things to do and places to explore. The most popular event was a trip to Nashville for a performance at the Grand Old Opry. There was so much interest that 10 buses were needed to take very enthusiastic Airstream club members to the venue.



On site at the fairgrounds, one could take an early morning bike ride or do a Yoga Stretch or learn a new line dance. There was a Pet Show one day where you could show off your dog or cat. Other activities included quilting, crafts, photo and snapshot competitions. There were seminars on Airstream cooking, Ham radio skills, club leadership, tire pressure monitoring and more! A local dealer brought in 4 new Airstreams. Each was sold before the rally was over.

Airstream's Vice President of Sales Justin Humphreys, gave a presentation on the state of Airstream.

Evening entertainment (besides the opening and closing ceremonies) included a magician from Bakersfield, CA, the Wally Byam Caravan Club Band, and a band called Top Tier out of Nashville who played music that got people up and dancing the night away.

And then there were shopping opportunities: We now have a new TPMS and Fantastic Fan. We are very interested in [SnapPads](#) and a beautiful grill from [Magma](#). Familiar vendors were A & W Designs, Blue Ox, Dexter Axles, Lifeline Batteries and more. Oh – and there was a food truck not far from the main meeting site that sold all the ice cream they brought. They even did a seminar called "Everything Ice Cream."

Tom attended Region Officer Forums and led the Delegates' Forum, Region Officer Boot Camp, and Local Club Leadership Seminar. He also was expected to read and answer questions at the IBT meetings about the many motions he writes in his spare time.

I set up the Publications Showcase on July 20. Here interested Airstream members could look at and read newsletters and directories from many local clubs. People took photos with their smart phones to carry ideas back to their clubs. There was a Poppy from 2019 as well the 2021 May issue. Our NorCal Membership Directory was one of 8 on display.

All too soon it was over and everyone scattered to the four winds. Some went to visit family and friends in the area; others did a quick trip to Maine to check out the site of the next International Rally. For us, the trip home was crammed into 8 very busy driving days. We did visit my family in Salt Lake City. Last stop before parking in front of our home in Fair Oaks was back in Sparks. After the required end of journey tasks: laundry and washing the trailer, we are ready for the next adventure!



Our journey to Oshkosh, Wisconsin, and the 2021 EAA AirVenture convention began long before our actual travel date of July 6, 2021. It started with talking to our fellow Airstream friends who have traveled this beautiful country and have gone on various caravans to collect their recommendations. The suggestions of routes to take and places to stay and see both going and returning made this trip even more memorable! The Christies told us about a great place to stay right on the harbor in Duluth: Lakehead Boat Basin. They also gave us some pointers on how to get around on Mackinaw Island. The Schroeders shared with us how to see the Soo Locks and Kitch-iti-kipi Spring in Michigan. We also heard about the fried steaks in Madora from a few NorCal members. After seeking what advice we could, we were on our way.

We traveled through Nevada, Wyoming, Montana, North Dakota, Wisconsin, the Upper Peninsula of Michigan, and on to the air show in Oshkosh, Wisconsin.

While traveling through Yellowstone, we saw the largest deer that I have ever seen in my life (that is, one that wasn't mounted to a wall.) Near Buffalo Bill State Park in Cody, Wyoming, we passed several camping sites right up against the river. We decided to pull in and check them out. These sites are National Forest Campgrounds, put your money in the envelope (seniors get ½ price - \$5.00), pick a spot

and enjoy the view. I think we'll stay at one of these the next time our travels take us that way.

We stayed in Cody for two nights and would highly recommend dinner at Cassie's Supper Club; great food and a live band for dancing. Be prepared to wait though as it is a very popular place. While in Cody, there are

various sites and museums to check out; it is worth a stay-over.

There were many more stops on our way to Oshkosh, so if you are traveling in that direction, just ask what we really enjoyed seeing and we'll be happy to share.

When we arrived in Oshkosh on Friday, July 23, we proceeded to Camp Scholler, the campground for AirVenture attendees adjacent to the convention grounds and the two airports used for the show and fly-in, where we had reserved a site with water and electric. It was hot and muggy so the electricity was an excellent choice, allowing us to run our air conditioner. We were amazed at the number of people in RVs and tents already in place even though the show didn't begin until July 26. Thousands of RVs were there, as well as many tents for those camping "the old fashioned" way. Showers and toilet facilities were available to all.

The air show began on Monday, July 26. Bob and I both have long had an interest in aviation that predates meeting one another. We were both licensed pilots and owned our own airplane, which we have since sold. Nonetheless, we still have an interest in planes and Bob is especially interested in war birds and their history. AirVenture has plenty of war birds and more. It is the largest air show in the world. This year there were 608,000 attendees and 3,176 aircraft registered including 1,420 vintage aircraft, 1,089 homebuilt aircraft, 354 warbirds, 148 aerobatic aircraft, 112 seaplanes, 33 ultralights, and 27 rotorcraft according to their data.

Destination: World's Largest Air Show Continued



Everyday we were treated to a variety of flying stunts and flybys with vintage aircraft and war birds. Besides watching planes flying and doing stunts, one could walk around and view the many planes that had parked on the lawn areas around the airport. Over 10,000 planes parked at Oshkosh this year compared to 5,000 on an average year.

On Wednesday, there was supposed to be a night air show and a large firework display but instead, we all had to hunker down as there was a tornado warning in the area. Eventually, campers were advised to leave the site and take cover elsewhere. Bob and I drove away from the storm, south to Fon du lac, stopping at a gas station/convenience store that was made of brick to wait out the storm. Of course, the tornado warning moved south and the manager of the Quik Trip Mini Mart invited everyone into the basement. Five minutes later the all-clear siren rang and we headed back to see if our Airstream was still there. Fortunately, the worst of the storm missed the airport area but did cause many huge trees to be uprooted in the surrounding communities. No campers, RVs or planes were damaged as far as we know.

The following day (Thursday) Bob and I took a ride in a 1928 Ford Tri-Motor airplane, the first commercial airline! Later that evening we saw the rescheduled night air show and fireworks. The air show they put on was unbelievable. Strapping pyrotechnics to flying airplanes is beyond my comprehension since in my mind, the two do not go together. But the result was

brehtaking and after watching the air show, we were treated to a spectacular fireworks show!

By Friday, Bob and I were getting ready to head home and see a few new sites along the way. We met a couple renting an Airstream and they had some questions for us. They also recommended some sites to see in Minnesota, such as Great River Bluffs State Park and the Spam Museum in Austin, Minnesota. Both were easy to get to and interesting. Unfortunately due to the air quality as a consequence of fires EVERYWHERE, we only got a very hazy view of the Mississippi.

In South Dakota we visited the Badlands and stopped at the Corn Palace because.... why not?



In Montana, we visited The Little Bighorn Battle Field. At Idaho Falls, we rode our bikes along the River Walk. Also in Idaho, we went to Craters of the Moon National Park and stopped at Shoshone Falls, which were more of a trickle than a fall.
