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HISTORICALLY SPEAKING

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The 1971 European Caravan

Though we will continue our review of **Airstream** in the 1930s soon, we take a break this month to review a caravan for its 50th anniversary namely **Caravan 80 – 1971 Old World Europe**, or more simply, the 1971 European Caravan.

Airstream first offered a European Caravan in 1956, then repeated it in 1960. The Around the World Caravan toured Europe in 1964. Though Airstream considered offering European Caravans every other year at one point, the next European Caravan did not occur until 1971 and was different in several ways.

First off was the size, from the time it was first announced, the 1971 Caravan was planned to be 150 rigs! This was about the same amount as the three prior European tours combined:
36 in 1956, 57 in 1960 peaking at 79 after some African Caravan rigs joined, and only about 30-something still with the Around the World Caravan when it reached Europe. The final 1971 totals were 148 rigs and 308 caravanners! These caravanners came from 37 of the 50 states and one Canadian province. The caravan leaders were Bob and Helen Smith, supported by four staff couples covering tasks from advance scouts to mechanics to recreation.

Second, they used a "roll on / roll off" ship for the rigs so that they did not need to be hoisted aboard by crane as had been required in 1956, 1960, and 1963-64. The Atlantic Container Line (ACL) ship *Atlantic Song* carried their Airstreams and tow cars to Europe.

Third, their rigs arrived in and departed from Europe at the port city of Antwerp, Belgium, not at Rotterdam, Holland as in 1956 and 1960.

Fourth, for the first time on an overseas caravan, all the caravanners traveled to Europe by plane rather than ship. They crossed the Atlantic on one of TWA's first Boeing 747 "Jumbo Jets"!

Fifth, while their rigs were in transit, the caravanners stopped in England for a weeklong tour, the first time an Airstream European Caravan officially toured that nation, though without their Airstreams in tow.

Finally, this was the first official European Caravan to go behind the Iron Curtain (though the Around the World Caravan had done so in 1964). A tour of Russia was originally on the 1971 European Caravan itinerary, but the promise of entry visas for the caravanners was eventually revoked. It still did go behind the Iron Curtain to Czechoslovakia and Poland.
