In September, 2020, the Executive Board lowered the annual lowa Club dues to zero for 2020-21. Now, however, activities have returned to a more normal level with four 2021 rallies and 2021 expenses have reduced the treasury balance. Treasurer Deb Ford stated that Headquarters has already accepted dues of \$10.00 on behalf of new lowa Club members for the upcoming year and, rather than billing those members for any additional cost, she suggested at the September Rally in Colfax that we set the annual fee for 2021-22 at \$10.00, with the 2022-23 dues to be \$15.00. now time to send your renewal check to our treasurer, Deb Ford. With the International annual dues remaining at \$75.00, this makes the total membership fee, for upcoming 2021-22, \$85.00. PLEASE, PLEASE, do this as soon as possible so Deb won't have to remind you. She will then send the International portion to Headquarters in one check. Your check must be received by Deb in time to get the International portion to Headquarters no later than December 31st in order for you to be included in the 2022 International Directory. As usual, Life Members will only pay the \$10.00 lowa amount. Thanks for your co-operation in this matter.

At the rally in Colfax, your newsletter team received a couple of requests for the recipe for the Fruit Cocktail Cake (you know, the moist one with the coconut topping). This recipe was included in a newsletter about 10 years ago, but, with some members having joined the club since then, by request, it is being repeated here.

2 large eggs ½ cup dark brown sugar 2 cups all-purpose flour 8 tbsp stick margarine ½ tsp. salt 10 oz. can evaporated milk

1 tsp. vanilla extract 15 oz. can of fruit cocktail

2 1/4 cups sugar 1 cup flaked coconut, sweetened

½ cup chopped pecans 2 tsps baking soda

NOTE: Use both fruit and juice from the fruit cocktail can. Eggs are to be beaten before adding and the brown sugar is to be firmly packed. Eggs can be beaten with a fork in the fruit cocktail can after emptying. More pecans can be used and evaporated milk can be shorted a little or increased, as desired.

Pre-heat an oven to 325-350 degrees. Grease and flour a 9"x13" baking pan. Chop pecans, if not already chopped, mix with brown sugar and set aside. In a large mixing bowl, combine fruit cocktail and 1½ cups of sugar. Mix thoroughly. Add beaten eggs, soda, salt, and flour. Pour into prepared baking pan. Sprinkle the nut-brown sugar mixture uniformly over the top of the cake batter. Bake for 40-45 minutes, or until top springs back when touched. Remove from oven. In a separate pan, boil margarine, evaporated milk and remaining 3/4 cup of sugar for 2 minutes. Add vanilla and coconut. Spread mixture evenly over the entire cake and cool. Cut as desired. When cut into 24 pieces (6 x 4), each piece contains 228 calories and 36 carbs.

FLOWERS, ARTS & STARS

The weather co-operated and the 10 RV's (9 members and one buddy) attending the September Rally of the Iowa Airstream Club at the Jasper County Fairgrounds in Colfax, Iowa enjoyed a wonderful weekend together. Parking had been originally planned for the large open-space camping area, but, with the relatively small number planning to come, it was shifted to the grassy, tree-shaded area near



the air-conditioned building that was going to be the center of the rally activities. AND, everyone was still able to get 30 or 50-amp electric. Since the temperature reached 97 degrees on Saturday afternoon, being able to run AC's was appreciated. It was a shame that we didn't see any of our new members, though.

The rally started off on Thursday with the usual "bring your own sandwiches and salad or dessert to share" meal, followed by an evening of visiting and catching up on what had happened since our June rally at Lake Iowa. The outside temperature was quite comfortable that first evening and most of the group gathered at the small open shelter in the center of our parking area.

Following a Friday morning breakfast of oatmeal and ice cream (choice of either cherry nut or butter brickle), along with raisin bread toast, orange juice and coffee or tea, Norman and Pat Van Klompenburg led a caravan to Newton where they had made arrangements for several tours. The first stop was at the Newton Arboretum and Botanical Gardens. The gardens, covering 6 acres, are located in part of the Agnes Patterson Memorial Park; an 80-acre farm that was donated to the City of Newton by the Patterson family. In 1990, a local group called Project AWAKE started the arboretum. There are now more than 185 individual trees of 150 species, along with flowers in three annual beds, a mixed perennial bed, an ornamental grass bed, a rose bed, two woody shrub beds, a shade garden, a tulip bed, a butterfly garden, a water garden, some native prairie, and over 3,000 feet of paved walking trails. Following a brief welcome by a Project AWAKE member, everyone walked some of the paved walks and had an opportunity to enjoy many of the flowering plants.

After leaving the arboretum, the next stop was the Centerfor Art and Artists near downtown Newton. At that location, there are small studios for those with artistic abilities to practice and further develop their skills. Several artists were on hand to show, explain and answer questions about

their endeavors. Among those were rug hooking (fellows, ask your wives about this) and pigment painting with oils and pastels. Also seen was an area that was being built to accommodate artists who would be working with wood. There was also a nice gift shop where some of the results of the artists efforts could be purchased.

Following a "lunch on your own", the group visited the Jasper County Museum, where numerous items were on display. The museum was started in 1973, when Jasper County was one of only nine counties that did not have an organization charged with preserving it's history. It is now one of the premier local museums in lowa. In addition to the museum tour, attendees were encouraged to follow a map that each were provided and tour Newton

(by auto or on foot) to view the morethan 120 various sculptures scattered around the city, but with the admonition to get back to the rally grounds

by 4:00



pm for the club business meeting.

The meeting was held, with the results of the 2021-22 officer election being tabulated and announced, along with other items of business that are covered in the meeting minutes included with this newsletter. Dinner was an "on-your-own" meal before everyone gathered to caravan to Ashton-Wildwood County Park (about 12 miles north) to enjoy an "Evening with the Stars". The centers of attraction were several very, very old celebrities. No, not Bob Hope, Bing Crosby, W.C. Fields, etc., but Saturn, Jupiter and friends. Rally co-host Norm Van Klompenburg is an avid astronomer and a member of the Des Moines Astrological Assoc. and, as such, was able to reserve the observatory at the park. With two domes and telescopes and the aid of a fellow astronomer (Greg Woolever from Ankeny, IA), everyone had the opportunity to view numerous bodies in the night sky. Of particular interest was the view of Saturn, with it's beautiful rings. Many rally attendees had never had the opportunity to view the sky through telescopes of the size at the

observatory, so that made for a special evening.

Following a French toast and ham breakfast on Saturday morning, the attendees caravanned to the Neal Smith National Wildlife Refuge, about 10 miles south of the rally grounds. The refuge covers about 13.5 square miles (a little over 8,500 acres) and it was established in 1990 with the purpose of re-constructing a small portion of the tall grass prairie that covered the Midwest before settlers arrived. They have accomplished that task and we were able to drive a paved road into the refuge, surrounded by millions and millions of yellow sunflowers and other plants. A ranger presented the history of the



refuge and answered questions, before the group moved to the auditorium, where they watched a short video about the refuge before walking through the exhibits. Although one was able to view, through a telescope, a portion of the 55-member bison herd, by the time we had driven to where they had been in the 600-acre pasture, they had moved on. Most, however, did get to see a lone bull bison cross the road right in front of the stopped vehicles, so the drive through the refuge

was not a total loss.

Saturday evening's meal was furnished and included in the rally fee and it consisted of fried chicken, baked beans, potato salad and applesauce, as well as food leftover and brought by attendees from the Thursday evening meal, so no one went hungry. The evening program was card bingo, with several nice prizes when it came time to open winnings. Sunday morning's breakfast, consisting of various pastries, orange juice and coffee or tea, pretty well ended an enjoyable weekend. Although thank you's need to go out to all who attended, a particularly **BIG THANK YOU** goes to Norm and Pat Van Klompenburg for all they did in arranging the off-site activities, to Mike Donahue for providing fantastic apple fritters and to all those who helped in any manner, particularly in the rapid and complete cleanup on Sunday morning. Duluth has so much to offer; canal, shops, food, ship rides along the lake shore and harbor, a Maritime Museum and a Railroad Museum. We did free-time exploring, sometimes as a couple or two, as well as a group excursion for the ship ride and the Buffalo Supper Club. What do you get when 30 hungry Airstreamers wait patiently for their food? Lots of loud talking and laughter. Thanks to the contained fire system of a fellow Airstreamer, most evenings consisted of a Happy Hour to share our daily excursions, compare notes and strengthen our friendships.

After crossing into Wisconsin and back, Tom and I continued along the north shore of Lake Superior, stopping at the Split Rock Lighthouse, before catching up with everyone in Gran Marais. It is a beautiful town along the shore of Lake Superior, with a lovely city park along the shore within walking distance of the town shops and restaurants. This was to be home base for seven nights. We enjoyed the Gran Marais sights and the drive to Grand Portage, as well as hiking to the Tallest Falls (Pic on previous page.) and driving the Gunflint Trail. The popular "catch of the day" this week was herring, giving us a chance for yummy fish and chip platters, as well as chowders of either herring or white fish.

The fire risk was high, so no campfires were allowed until our final night when the ban was lifted and a campfire

During our Gran Marais stop, we lost four of our group. Some were heading to the Clear Lake Airstream Park to visit with friends, while others headed home for more adventures. The Alabama trailer stayed behind in Gran Marais as they were just starting their Upper States travels and were headed in another direction. This cut our rolling group down to three from Missouri-Kansas and three from lowa. We hit the road for Ely, MN and the Falls Lake Campground.

The campsites were designed so that each site had a huge area for a table and cooking fire rings. There was none of this standing on your head or doing deep squats to try to cook. I was thoroughly delighted and wished lowa had such spaces. Again, we had so much to pack into three days. Tickets for "Supper With The Wolves" were part of our arrival night. beautiful waterfalls and drove 90 minutes to Vince Shultes American Bear Sanctuary. Roll call was taken absent officers were Kathy Allen Director and John Heckman Past President. All other officers were present. Further discussion regarding New Members info being published. Objection to proposal on publishing Shirley Herron due to occasional response for no communication by New members. Motion made that putting address and contact info will only be by response of new member approval.

Revisited approval to pay October Group site camping \$300 / weekend with reimbursement to club in rally fees and for meeting room rental \$220 reimbursed to Herrons of receipts mailed to Treasurer Deb Ford Chuck Cabalka requested reimbursement of \$475 for building this weekend, advised that food receipts totaled 126.49 camp fees are \$15.00 per nite. Mike Rickert proposed that \$15.00 per trailer cover the building fee with the remaining \$375 covered by club treasury. Further discussion fee per trailer for building increased to \$25. leaving club to cover \$225. Norm Van Klompenberg 2nd poll taken 17 to 1. Mike Donahue preferring \$39. per trailer requiring club to have no expense.

DorisJean Cabalka presented postage receipts to be paid. Motion by Norm Van Klompenberg that receipts be paid second by Deb Blaha. Poll taken passed. Receipts presented by Donella Watkinson for reimbursement for cards and postage of birthday cards created, sent by mail. Poll taken passed.

Pat Dellamuth requested October to be an additional Buddy Rally, 2nd by Deb Ford. Poll taken passed.

Ballots received were reviewed by president appointed committee of Chuck Helle and Arden Taube, report made of all ballots received the proposed officers approved unanimous. Move to accept report Donella Watkinson poll taken approved.

Motion to adjourn Doug Ford 2nd Deb Blaha

CARAVAN TO SWISS FESTIVAL RALLY

On the beautiful, mild afternoon of Tuesday, September 21st, four Iowa Club Airstreams gathered at Westlake County Park on the west side of Davenport, IA to prepare for their 600-mile trip to Sugarcreek, OH to attend the 58th Swiss Festival Rally. After a rather cool night (temperature down to 49 degrees), everyone awoke to clear skies and a light north



breeze. Leaving the Westlake campground at 8:30 AM, the day's route ran south to Peoria, IL, then east to arrive at the Earl Park, IN city park about 3:00 PM. By the time the caravan had reached Peoria, however, the wind came up and we drove with 10-20 mph winds from the north and clouds for the rest of the day. After arriving at the Earl Park campground and having supper, we looked out to see the western sky clearing and were treated to a beautiful sunset.

Quite a day!

Day 2 of the caravan dawned with beautiful clear skies and the drive to the Airstream Terraport in Jackson Center was made with no problems. Leaving the Earl Park City Campground a little later than normal, the caravan did not get to Jackson Center during the noon hour as has been the case in the past. However, with no factory tours, the arrival time wasn't really important. The lunch stop was at the city park in El Paso, IL. Upon arriving in Jackson Center (after passing by the new Airstream factory) the terraport was found to be less than one-half full,



which was quite a surprise, since previous caravans have had to search a little for spots in the three circles. The Helle's were even able to park beside the repaired Beu trailer. There was an opportunity for caravan members to visit the Airstream store to purchase items they needed.

On the third, and final, morning of the caravan, Chuck arose a little early and made the 20-mile drive to Sydney, OH to the nearest Walmart bakery, where he purchased a couple dozen assorted rolls.
