

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The Ten Commandments of How To Get Along With People

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

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Urbanna Oyster Fest

The 64th Urbanna Oyster Festival was held Nov. 5 & 6, 2021. Usually an annual event, it had skipped over 2020 because of COVID-19.

As has been the case since 2016, Airstreamers from throughout the Commonwealth held a rally in conjunction with this festival, but there was a difference this year: the rally was planned and hosted by the Tidewater Airstream Club instead of NORVA. NORVA originated this event and had been the rally

host for several years but, in 2020, decided to turn it over to the Tidewater Club when they expressed interest in continuing it. Tidewater's Frank and Jayne Muñoz did a terrific job in putting the rally together with assistance from several of their club members and NORVA's Tom Carmichael, Scott Arnold, and Lew Brodsky. Building on NORVA's contacts and prior experience, Frank again made camping arrangements with Urbanna town resident Craig Hall who, at a reasonable cost, provided ample space for Airstreams to park on a grassy field he owns near the center of town and just a stone's throw from all festival activities.

This was a dry-camping rally (no hookups). Participants were dependent on the batteries, solar power, and water systems in their Airstreams, although portable generators could be used at the campsites up until 10 p.m.

A total of 21 Airstreams occupied Mr. Hall's field this year. They arrived Thursday and departed after the festival on Sunday. Eight of the rigs were from NORVA, housing Tom Carmichael, Scott Arnold, Cathy & Lew Brodsky, Eric & Norma Colby, James & Nicole Oxley, Doug Anderson, Patsy & Gerry Nagel, and Barry Miller & Sharon Haw. They, along with members of the Tidewater, Spirit of Virginia, and the Virginia Airstream Clubs enjoyed lots of inter-club socializing over the three days, including sharing good eats at a group potluck "appetizerama" on the grassy field Thursday evening. The weather was unusually chilly for early fall, but several evening campfires kept everybody warm and in fine spirits.

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Of course, the principal focus of the weekend was the festival itself. The streets of the small, historic, Virginia town on the west bank of the Rappahannock River (population, less than 500) swelled with an estimated 50,000 visitors over the two-day event. RVs of every size and shape occupied every nook and cranny in the community, and they were "locked in," because the town's streets were

closed to traffic for the

two festival days. Therefore, unlike the lucky Airstreamers, thousands of people had to hike into town from distant perimeter parking lots. The large crowds made purchases at scores of craft booths, imbibed at wine and beer tastings, explored yachts and a vintage tall ship at the marina, examined marine-life exhibits, browsed fine art for sale, cheered at an oyster shucking contest, danced to musical bands, witnessed two awesome parades, and consumed a variety of foods and beverages. Vendors lined every street, offering up oysters that were raw, fried, roasted, breaded, and in stews and bisques, as well as barbeque, crab cakes, sausages, turkey legs, fries, ice cream and pastries.

By Sunday morning, the Airstreamers had enjoyed it all—the sights, the sounds, the shopping, and the food & drink—saying, "Let's do Urbanna again next November!"

TRAVELS WITH DICK AND JANE!

We enjoy traveling in our Airstream, so we look for different events to visit. You will see, RVing has its ups and downs so,

Most years, the Airstream Life magazine holds an Alumapalooza Rally at the Airstream factory in Jackson Center. This year it was the week after Labor Day. As we prepared for this trip, we discovered our refrigerator would not work while on propane. A local RV mechanic diagnosed our 95 Dometic in need of a new propane valve for the refrigerator. Unfortunately, there were none to be found.

A Replacement cost of a new Dometic refrigerator would be over \$2,000 plus installation. Additionally, with the current conditions, there is a shortage and therefore, Dometic did not have any available. After searching online and calling several possibilities, an Airstream friend told us of his success with

National RV Refrigeration in Shipshewana, Indiana. Since we were heading in that direction, we decided to depend on the electricity Alumapalooza was providing (only enough to run your refrigerator-microwaves and toasters were not included). We decided to head out as planned and stay in campgrounds on the way to our Alumapalooza destination. We planned to stay in

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campgrounds on the way. However, not for the first night because it was too close to Labor Day weekend and there were no reservations to be found. No problem, we stayed at Cracker Barrel! We had free parking, two great meals all for a little less than \$50.

We arrived at the Alumapalooza Rally and parked in the field behind the building that used to be where trailers used to be assembled. The rally organizers ran electric wires and water pipes to "daisy chain", hookups. Weather was wonderful. We did not need air conditioning or heat

and there was no rain! There were 180 Airstreams. There were seminars, happy hours every afternoon, entertainment several nights, cooking demonstrations, tire changing demonstrations and a CPR class. Most popular was a bourbon tasting event costing \$50 to attend with chances on winning baskets with

bourbon and other selected pairing options. We hoped to have a tour of the new Airstream factory and museum; however, that was not to be as there was so much COVID in the area. Masks and hand sanitizers were provided at the rally plus events were held outside and under tents, so that seemed safe to us. We were amazed at the many trailers awaiting completion and delivery to dealers.

the repair. We stayed at a campground a mile down the road from them so we could be there at nine in the morning when they

been moved there. Edison's lab from New Jersey is there. The Wright Brothers, bicycle shop is there. You can spend days there!

Next stop, Shipshewana, Indiana. You probably know this town as it is near Elkhart where so many RVs are made. We had made a trip there in the car from Jackson Center to talk to the guys in person about our propane problem and had made an appointment with them for



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opened. We arrived a little before nine and we were paying the bill at ninetwenty in the morning. All it needed was a new propane valve. These two Amish guys have all the Dometic refrigerator parts you need. They have buckets of parts upstairs in their garage. They

say the older Dometic refrigerators last much longer than the newer refrigerators. If you ever have a problem with your Dometic refrigerator, call NATIONAL RV REFRIGERATION, 260-768-7059. They also ship parts and have "scratch & dent" refrigerators.

Our flexibility was stretched once again when we had a problem with one of our hitch bars while in Shipshewana. Being in the RV capital, we were able to find an excellent hitch shop nearby (Dan's Service Center, Hitch Specialists). They fixed our problem in about 1- 1/2 hours late in the day as we waited.

Since we were in the local area for an extra day, we decided to look for a little something extra to do. So, we opened the Blue Beret and found a WBCCI rally in the area. This is something to remember when you are traveling as you are always welcome at any WBCCI rally. We found a Region 5 rally in Warsaw, Ind., not far away. We called and asked if they had room for us, and they did. It was held at the local fairgrounds with water, and electricity, and very level parking. We arrived on Friday in time for their Saturday breakfast of make-your own tacos. The highlight was a dinner cruise Saturday evening on the largest lake in Indiana - Lake Wawasee - 32,000 acres and 77 feet deep.

The waters were very calm as we cruised the shoreline and saw the many expensive homes, some old and some new. Eli Lilly, a pharmaceutical fame, was one of the early residents. Perhaps that is why our boat was the "S.S. Lillypad II."

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
