SWISS FESTIVAL RALLY WITH SWISS CHEESE AND AMISH FOOD

Five Iowa Club trailers made it to the 58th Swiss Festival Rally in Sugarcreek, OH. Four (Cabalka's, S. Allens, Lafrenz's and Helle's) arrived after lunch on Friday, September 24th, while Norm and Linda Beu arrived a day later due to Norm's dental problem (as reported in the last newsletter). For the first time in the memory of your newsletter team (back to 2005) this was the first Swiss Festival Rally they can remember where there was **NO RAIN!!** Blue skies during the day, cool nights (in the 50's) and moderate daytime temps (in the 70's) made for 8 great days in Sugarcreek. As has usually been the case, on arrival night, the four couples noted above went to Der Dutchman Restaurant in Walnut Creek for a buffet supper to celebrate their arrival. The food was excellent, tasty and filling.

Three days of touring Amish and Mennonite businesses and two Amish schools provided plenty of interest and activity for the first 3 days of the rally (Mon., Tue., and Wed.). The drives on the tours took everyone through the rolling Ohio countryside, with numerous Amish farms. Unfortunately, the festival was about 7-10 days too early to catch what promise to be a very colorful countryside, as leaves changed color. With 5 different day-long tours, of which attendees could only take 3, the Iowa Club attendees did not all choose the same ones. Each couple could relate a different story concerning the ones they went on. Among the places your newsletter team visited were Pioneer Equipment Co. making horse-drawn farming equipment, a shop making leather items (such as belts, etc.), Keim Lumber (a lumber yard that is a whole lot more than lumber), Pearl Cheese (multiple winner of the best Swiss cheese in Ohio), Warther Carvings (where David Warther displays sailing ships of all kinds that he has

carved from wood and ivory) and a broom-making business owned and run by a young Amish lady. An additional stop was the Amish & Mennonite Center (a building where



the history of the Amish, Mennonites and Hutterites is told in a round painting, standing 10 feet tall and 265 feet in length) which took artist, Heinz Gaugel, 14 years to complete. An Amish school with 37 students in a one-room country school was another very interesting stop. And, no trip to Sugarcreek would be complete without a stop at



Lehman Hardware in Kidron, with items you won't find anywhere else and a room full of beautiful wood carvings.

Evening programs consisted of a group of teen-age Amish youth singing for us, an elderly Amish gentleman explaining the Amish way of life, the Cambridge, Ohio Municipal Band (watching the director was a hoot), an excellent male vocalist (Kenny Evans), Crystal Gage (the female vocalist who those attending the Lewisburg International Rally will remember as the young lady who loves to rub the heads of bald men), the Joey Tomsick Polka Band and, as a last minute fill-in due to a cancellation, the Cambridge, Ohio Vocal Chorus. As you can see, there was a great variety of entertainment.

On Thursday, several Amish ladies brought a huge assortment of baked goods to the park for sale with the funds going to the schools on the tours. The gasoline-powered putt-putt ice cream maker was there, another Amish gentleman spent all day cooking apples into apple butter, free buggy rides were available, a six-mule hitch pulling a hayrack gave free rides, the children from the Amish schools



that were on the tours were in the park for lunch and the traditional ham and bean soup supper was prepared and served. All in all, it was a busy day at the rally site.

The parades in town Friday and Saturday completed the festival and by Sunday morning, everything was back to

FRYEBURG, MAINE, CLOSER THAN YOU THINK

It certainly is not too late to get registered for the 2022 WBCCI International Rally in Fryeburg, ME, running from July 23-29. A quick check of distances finds that it is just 1,205 miles from Davenport, IA to Fryeburg, compared to 1,410 miles to McAllen, TX, 1,342 miles to Punta Gordo, FL, and 1,554 miles to Apache Junction, starting from that

same beginning point. As you can see, Fryeburg is closer than many in the Iowa Club drive to spend their winters in warmer climates. So, you can't use the distance as an excuse not to go. Four moderate driving days of about 301 miles or five days at 241 miles would get you there. So, get that registration form filled out, write that check and plan on going to the rally. You'll find much to see along the way (either going or coming home), as well as lots to take in once you arrive in Maine.
