

FIDDLERS RALLY A GO!

The original Fiddlers convention was started in 1925 some of the old time with the intention of listening to fiddlers had started and playing

music. It was held in Athens, Alabama. The founder of this convention was a high school soon gained attention. principal who respected and loved old timey music. His name was W.H. Johnson. The an abandoned convention had also kickstarted the careers of popular bands and singers, most notably the Delmore Brothers. But soon the old time music was dying out at the arrival of a new, more modern type of music.

Many of the old musicians retired their instruments as it seemed that no one wanted to listen anymore.

Nearly 30 years later playing again in their living rooms such as Sam Mcracken and it Soon the community was raising money for schoolhouse to be repaired and used as the new meeting place. An agreement was struck with the community leaders and just like that, the fiddlers convention was reborn as the old time fiddlers. convention









Bill Lancaster interview

We interviewed Bill Lancaster and his wife with a few questions about the Fiddlers Airstream Convention in Athens, Alabama

The rally was started 50 years ago and was recently restarted with his help. It was originally stopped because people started losing interest.

The rally takes place in October and goes for a week. Bill, who is from Summerville, Alabama, has given us a bit of information about the rally and himself. Mr. Lancaster, a 20 year resident of Summerville, AL, has attended the convention with an Airstream for 2 years in a row now.

His favourite rally (besides the current one he is at—Fiddlers) is the International rally because he really enjoys meeting up with old friends. He found out about the rally by working with the local rally director: Russ Pry.

Athens state university hosted 15-20k people, everybody being brought together by their love of old timey music.

Bill Lancaster played the piano and started at age 12 but he wouldn't practice. A few years later he had become a professional musician but he had to stop because it was getting in the way of school. Even though he had taken a break, 30 years later he restarted the music business and soon was playing all across the country. He especially likes when he plays for the elderly, as they were the same age as him when the songs were popular "The way we know they are having a good time, is we look for what we call 'Happy feet', and if their feet are tapping, we know they are having a good time and if they are singing and smiling, then we are having a good time." He and his wife Betty have 6 CDs and 1 gospel Album. "You can't make an old friend, they just don't come that way, you can make new friends, but not old friends." His favourite music is a wide variety of music from the 1950s-60s when he was growing up, they play the music from their youth for audiences who appreciate it. This airstream rally combines his love of music and his ability to reconnect with old friends.

In Athens, Alabama there was a rally but it closed down because people lost interest. But luckily, it restarted. So who restarted the rally and who helped set it up? Well, let's figure it out and let's learn about them.





Interview with Russ & PJ

Their names are Russ Pry & PJ Pry, my grandma and grandpa. They restarted the Fiddlers Rally. Their friends told them it would be a good way to get old people active and have fun again. So, they started it back up, The End. Joking, we have way more...You ready? Andrea Patterson, Bill Lancaster, the mayor of Athens, and the Vice President of the university all helped them start it back up. Because of all of the work people did together, my grandparents have committed to 5 years of running the rally and they have 2 years left. To research how to start a rally they looked into the caravan guide. talked to the president of the International Airstream Club and rally Chairman, and used their past experience attending different rallies.

To start a rally you first have to have people to show interest in participating. It is not easy to start a rally, you have to find ways to make it work and you have to be flexible because sometimes health issues are a concern and plans can change. They said "it's like herding cats." Everyone is going in different directions and at the last minute everything comes together. They are planning to do basically the same thing next year, with a few changes and hopefully I will be there again to do the boat ride and robotics and cotton gin tours. This time I went, and we painted trees.


The teacher showed us how to paint the trees and we had a fun time while learning.

Event: The Belle Chevre cheese factory

The "Belle Chevre cheese factory" is where some of the best goat cheese is made. With only 7 staff members, it has probably the lowest number of employees in a factory in Alabama. It makes a ton of different types and flavours of cheese. With a few of those pictured below.







We were able to see what happens inside the factory, and it did not disappoint,

First of all, we found out that the cheese inside the container is *not* made with a mold

and is in fact hand formed, which is interesting. Next, they showed us the goats whose names are: Luna, Lenny, Dumplin', Little Bit, Starsky and Hunch. They are used mostly as 'mascots' and are not actually milked. Now, for a little bit of history. It all began in 1989 with a cheese lover named Liz Parnell.

She loved traveling the world, and one day she stumbled upon a cheese farm. After buying the farm she made it into a full time factory and has been making cheese ever since. In 2011 an employee, by the name of Tasia Makasis, recommended that they should widen their products and Belle Chevre started making more types of cheeses and cheesecake! Since then they have grown and have started making cheese spreads at cheap prices that everybody can enjoy! They can be found at Whole Foods and online.
