The **North Texas Airstream Community** (NTAC) is located in Hillsboro, TX with convenient access to Waco and the Dallas/Ft. Worth Metroplex.

It is a 50 acre residential community limited to owners of Airstream/Argosy trailers or motorhomes. The community has custom built villas and houses as well as lots with three-point hook ups.

Pictured above is their TerraPort available for

rental for guests. It has 30-50 amp hookups and free wifi. NTAC has a beautiful club-house and an outdoor seating and dining pavilion. The enclosed "off leach" dog area is a pet favorite. Visit their website at https://ntaci.com or more information.

Texas Airstream Harbor, Inc. (TAHI) is also an Airstream-exclusive member-owned camping destination. It is located east of Zavalla, TX on the beautiful shores of Lake Sam Rayburn. Guests with trailers and motorhomes produced by Airstream Inc. are welcome for over-night, extended stays, winter visiting, full timers and WBCCI club rallies. There are cabanas and lots for permanent residents. The clubhouse is open for guests to use. Free Wi-Fi is available. All sites have water, sewer, and 30 amp electric service. Dear Rivet, Why do people put a plastic bag on their trailer hitch?

Dear Curious, The plastic bag helps prevent dirt and moisture from damaging your trailer hitch ball. As a Newbie, you probably have a bright, shiny trailer hitch ball. To help preserve its structural integrity, it is necessary to prevent friction caused by rust or dist. It is recommended that you grease your trailer hitch ball before each trip. First wipe off the old grease then apply axle grease. It's okay to use your fingers. It's messy so use disposable gloves. While you are there, be sure to crouch down and look for any sign of rust or bending to your trailer hitch and the tow vehicle hitch platform. An added benefit is proper care of the ball will help keep down "squeaking" noises from your hitch.


Update on the Airstream Club Website DataBase



Here's our story:



SLOW COOKER CARNITAS

In terms of standby recipes, we always depend on our trailer's crock pot for carnitas. Served with tortillas and guacamole, we can stay a little Texan on the road.

- 4-7 lb pork roast, excess fat removed
- 1 head garlic, cloves removed and minced
- 2 tsp ground cumin
- 1 tsp dried oregano
- 3/4 tsp salt
- 1/2 tsp ground pepper
- 2 Tbsp minced green chile (canned works)
- 1 large onion sliced
- 2 oranges
- 1 lime
- 1. Combine garlic, cumin,oregano,salt, pepper and Chile together. Rub all over roast.
- 2. Place roast in slow cooker and top with sliced onion.
- 3. Squeeze the oranges and lime into a bowl and strain seeds. Pour juices over roast
- 4. Cook on low for 8 hours.
- 5. When cooked, remove meat, shred and return to pot.
- 6. Serve with desired condiments and tortillas.

CHICKEN ITALIAN IN FOIL

Betty Crocker's Dinner for Two Cookbook, 1975 — [I have been making recipe a long time.] No pots or pans, Just the cutting board.

For each serving:

Olive oil

Chicken Breast {bone in or boneless], thighs or legs Salt

Pepper

Garlic powder, if desired.

1 medium potato, pared

1 medium zucchini

2 tablespoons catsup

½ teaspoon oregano

1 tablespoon butter

Grated parmesan cheese, if desired

Heat oven to 400 degrees. Brush oil on chicken pieces, sprinkle with salt and pepper [garlic powder optional]. Cut potatoes lengthwise into ½ slices. Spray 18 x 12-inch piece of heavy-duty aluminum foil. Sprinkle with salt and pepper. Cut unpared zucchini into ¼ slices. Place zucchini on potato, sprinkle with salt and pepper. Place chicken on top. Top with catsup, oregano and butter. Wrap securely in foil. Bake until chicken and vegetables are tender about 1 hour. Sprinkle with Parmesan cheese. If use boneless breasts, make take only about 50 minutes.

TO GRILL: Cook on grill 5" from medium coals 23-30 minutes on each side.

Camping Deluxe Marshmallow Bars

I received this recipe together with a plate of these yummy bars from Jean Ritenour, #8414 from Cleveland, TN. We were attending the 2016 International Airstream Rally in Lewisburg, WV. Jean travels with her granddaughter, Sophia. They have a tradition of making these bars and sharing them with their fellow Airstreamers. This is the recipe written as I received it.

You will need a box of Duncan Hines, double fudge, decadent 17.6 oz brownie mix

Use the mix as directed on the back of the box. After baking the brownies, sprinkle with mini marshmallows evenly over the brownies, return to the oven for 2-3 minutes. Using a knife dipped in water, spread the marshmallows evenly over the baked brownies. Topping: Microwave 1 1/2 cups of dark chocolate chips and 1 cup peanut butter. I do the chips first for 45 seconds then add the peanut butter. Stir the two ingredients till blended. Add 2 cups of Rice Krispies & stir again. Spread over the brownies. Put in fridge to firm up then cut into bars.

This is so delicious & easy to make in your Airstream.

Here is a recipe that is Marty's favorite dessert. He is crazy for Key lime Pie but these bars are easier to share with many folks.

Key Lime Pie Bars

12 Large graham cracker rectangles
2 Tab ground pecans
1/3 cup granulated sugar
1/4 teas cinnamon
One stick of unsalted butter, melted
3 egg yolks room temp
1 can of sweetened condensed milk
4 teas lime zest (about 3 limes)

Position a rack in the center of the oven and preheat the oven to 350. Spray 8x8 square baking pan with cooking spray, set aside.

In a small bowl stir together the graham cracker crumbs, ground pecans, sugar and cinnamon. Add melted butter and combine. Make sure all crumbs are moistened. Press crumb mixture into bottom of pan and bake for 10 minutes. Remove from oven and leave oven on.

In the bowl of electric mixer with whisk attachment whisk yolks for 2 mins. Add condensed milk and whisk for 2 mins. Stop mixer and scrape down the sides. Add lime zest. With mixer on low drizzle the lime juice in and run for 2 mins. Pour the filling in pan and bake for 15 mins. Cool and refrigerate. Serve with whipped cream



I have a story to share about this dessert.

We were in Michigan on the Caravan at a restaurant and eating out with Tom and Jean Beebe when it came time for dessert. Marty asked "How is the Key Lime Pie" to the server and she bragged how wonderful it was. As she came out with the desserts it was hard not to snicker as I saw her coming to our table. On the tray was a bright green jello looking piece of pie that was the Michigan version of Key Lime Pie.□ I think he took one bite of it. Best not to order Key Lime pie unless you can see it first.

Convection Oven Tips

How to Convert Conventional Oven Times and Temperatures to Convection Oven Settings A conventional oven cooks food by heating the space inside the oven. A convection oven cooks food not only by heating the air inside the oven but also by moving that air around the food. Because a convection oven circulates this hot air around the food, food can be cooked for less time and at a lower temperature than in a conventional oven.

Most baked recipes are designed for conventional ovens, so if you are cooking the food in a convection oven you must reduce the time and/or temperature, or else your food will burn. There are three ways to convert conventional oven settings to convection settings, depending on the type of food you are cooking. You can read each method below, or use the convection oven conversion calculator.

Method 1: Reduce the Temperature Only

For breads, cakes, and other desserts, the rule of thumb for convection oven conversion is to reduce the temperature by 25°F and keep the time constant. For example, if a conventional oven recipe calls for the bread to be baked at 325°F for 1 hour, then in a convection oven you should cook it at 300°F for 1 hour.

Method 2: Reduce the Time Only

For roasting meats, the rule of thumb for convection oven cooking is to reduce the time by 25%, but keep the temperature the same. For example, suppose a recipe calls for the chicken to be cooked at 350° F for 1 hour and 30 minutes. Since an hour and a half is 90 minutes, you compute 90 - (0.25)90 = 67.5 minutes, which is about an hour and 8 minutes.

Method 3: Reduce the Time and Temperature

You can split the difference between Methods 1 and 2 by slightly reducing both the time and the temperature. A good rule of thumb is the reduce the temperature by 15°-20° and reduce the time by 10%-15%. Use this method for casseroles, potatoes, custards, and other baked foods.
