OAC is using a New Email System for the Newsletter

OAC has recently started using Mailchimp for sending out emails to all our members. This Newsletter was sent using Mailchimp. We have heard that some of our club members have a difficult time finding the emails that have been sent using Mailchimp, and perhaps this brief explanation will help.

First, the email addresses we are using are what Airstream International has on file, so if your email was entered incorrectly, it will not find you. You might check your information on International's site to confirm all is correct.

Second, do a search of all your mailboxes. Your system probably has a way to search all emails for key words. Use a keyword like "Oregon Airstream Club" or "Streamer" (name of our newsletter). Hopefully the missing emails will appear in the search result.

-My email system (Gmail) has a few tabs, or folders, in the Inbox. These tabs are labeled 'Promotions', 'Updates', 'Spam', 'Primary', etc. The OAC emails may show up in one of these other tabs...Gmail thinks it knows how to sort incoming messages, and sometimes gets it wrong.

- Some email systems may think that anything sent from Mailchimp is a Spam email and direct these emails to 'Trash', 'Spam' or a similar location. If this happens then you may have to go into your email settings to allow emails from this sender.

We try to keep our communications with you informative and interesting, but If you prefer not to receive messages from us, let us know, and we will take you off the distribution list.



Region 10 Airstream International Club Rally:

Four days of fun, friendship, and all things Airstream at the Region 10 Airstream Club International Rally June 1 - 5, 2022. NW Washington Fairground and Event Center in Lynden, WA, is the site of our 2022 Rally. 1775 Front St, Lynden, WA 98264

Lynden is located north of Bellingham, just south of the US / Canada border, and is the home of Washington State's largest Dutch settlement. Conveniently located with easy access to Puget Sound and the San Juan Islands, British Columbia, Canada, the North Cascades, Whidbey Island, and the Olympic Peninsula. Hosted by the Washington and Idaho Airstream Clubs.

Registration Costs:

\$245 per trailer with 2 people (additional \$15 for each person 3 and over) and \$185 for a single attendee. Drive-in rate (those staying in hotels) will be \$165 for 2 people (plus \$15 for each additional person 3 and over)/\$105 for single. Please note that we have decided not to add cost of meals to registration fees so that those attendees with dietary restrictions can choose whether or not to participate. See separate charges as listed below.

Registration Includes:

Four nights of sites with 20 amp electricity, shared water (bring extension hoses), clean bathrooms and showers available on-site, and dumpsite available for \$5.

Deluxe goodie bag for each trailer upon arrival.

Ongoing educational seminars by the host Washington and Idaho Clubs. Hawaiian Shave Ice Truck with (1) shave ice for each paid attendee.Movie night with refreshments and a showing of Lucille Ball and Desi Arnaz in The Long, Long Trailer. Tour of Trailers hosted by

Ultimate Airstream highlighting upgrades to member trailers and drawing for prizes. Social Hour refreshments will be hosted two evenings by the Washington and Idaho Clubs. Silent auction with donations by members and including gift baskets donated by each of the seven region clubs to raise money for local nonprofits who work with food insecurity and the elderly. Live entertainment one evening (bring your dancing shoes)!

Optional charge events selected at time of registration:

Five-hour Whale Watching Cruise with luncheon (vegetarian option available), regularly \$150 person but subsidized by Airstream Adventures Northwest with a reduced price of \$50 per person, limited by boat size to the first 100 attendees to register. PLEASE NOTE: <u>Cruise requires proof of full vaccination and can be uploaded at the time of registration</u>. Continental Breakfast Package \$32 including fresh Lynden Dutch Bakery items for four mornings, fresh fruit, coffee, etc. Dinner Package \$38 provided by Mi Pueblito, local Mexican Restaurant and Food Truck one evening and Burnt Ends Barbecue a second evening. Vegetarian options can be selected. Washington State Tax, gratuities, service fees, etc. included in all optional charge events pricing.

Cancellation Policy:

Cancellation/refund received by April 15th will be assessed a \$25 cancellation fee to cover noncancellable expenses. Cancellation/refund requests after April 15th will be assessed a 50% fee. NO refunds after May 15th. Parking Policy: Parking crews will assist in parking as trailers arrive. If you want to park with friends, please arrive with them at the fairground.

Vaccination Policy: As stated above, participation in the whale watching cruise and luncheon requires proof of full vaccination. The current policy for Airstream Club International events does not require vaccination unless required by a vendor or local governance but is subject to review. If that policy changes, all registrants will be

notified and a full refund will be offered if the registrant is unable to provide either proof of vaccination or proof of a negative Covid test 24 hours prior to June 1.



AIRSTREAM MAINTENANCE & SAFETY TIPS

Fun facts with Florence:

I was asked to write a little article on tire safety. Spoiler alert: if you are seasoned Airstreamer, it may be pretty boring. I am a solo long-distance traveler and do all I can to avoid mishaps. The only things between the road and my trailer are my tires. I got an earful about tires (I was an Airstream rookie at the 2018 International Rally in Salem) from the then author of the Tech Help columns in the Blue Beret. All of this also applies to the tires on the tow vehicle.

The leading causes of premature tire failure are improper inflation, excessive heat, overloading and speeding (which leads to heat). Improper inflation is so easy to correct, and you'll avoid irregular wear, poor handling, and reduced gas mileage. Buy a high-quality gauge (avoid gas station gauges) and check the pressure on cold tires (at least 3 hours of rest). Don't forget to check the spare. Under inflated tires can also reduce fuel economy by 2% for every pound of air pressure below the recommended inflation.

Our trailers are often factory equipped with parts that could be upgraded. My guru was clear: replace the valves and caps with stainless steel. If you want to go all the way, replace the stock aluminum wheels with steel wheels and lugs, which do not have the expansion and contraction of

aluminum. This is not a cheap endeavor. Caps and stems are a no brainer. If you are real nerdy you can monitor tire temperature and make sure you are staying below the recommended 180°F with a no contact laser thermometer (like item 64847 at Harbor Freight). Slowing down 8 mph from 70 to 62 can reduce tire temperature from 180°F to 172 °F. A tire pressure monitoring system (TPMS) is a relatively inexpensive and valuable add on.

Next points of discussion are the tires themselves. This is a great one for around the campfire (I *actually do* find this entertaining) as there are as many opinions as chairs in the circle. Just like some folks are Ram only, and others are Ford only. Just no two ways about it. Once again, I draw from the teachings I was groomed on from my tech guru: the stock Goodyear Endurance ST225/75R15 is a good tire, yes, but it is a trailer tire (ST stands for special trailer). The Endurance tires that came on my 2019 International are 8 ply, load range D (1220 pounds capacity), inflation to 80 psi. My 2016 Flying Cloud came with Goodyear Marathon tires rated to max 65 mph at 65 psi. Heard horror stories about these... A "better" tire is the Michelin LTX/85R 16E M/S2. These are 10 ply, load range E (1520 lbs capacity), 80 psi max. Again, this is not a cheap endeavor as this light truck tire (LT) only comes on 16" rims. So when you get your stainless rims you can upgrade to 16" wheels, assuming of course they will fit in the wheel well of your coach. If you don't have room for a 16" wheel, just shop for an all-season tire with the most plies that will fit. I'm waiting for my Goodyears to fulfill their lifespan and do this upgrade. It'll be pretty cool to be towing all season, mud and snow light truck tires on my trailer.

I'd be remiss to leave and not mention a couple more safety issues. Have your wheel bearings and brakes inspected every year (or 10K miles). You might have nev-r-lube sealed bearings on the newer rigs, but it's still good to take a look. The first tool I bought after the earful on tire safety at that Salem rally was a torque wrench. Don't skimp on this. Get a mechanical clicker 1/2" drive torque wrench, something like a CDI 1503MFRMH. I think I paid about \$150 for it. It takes 5 minutes to check all 4 wheels. The spec for stock Airstream 15" wheels is 115 ft/lbs. Remember to store it in its case with the tension turned to zero. Especially with aluminum wheels and lugs, it is wise to check every 500 miles or so. The attorneys who collaborated on your Airstream manual say whenever a tire is removed to check the torque after 25 miles, after 50 miles, after 100 miles, and every 200 miles thereafter. Better safe than sorry ©

Chapter 1

David and I had international travel plans for October 2021 but were not quite comfortable traveling internationally with COVID flareups where we were heading. We decided to stay closer to home and bought the off-season Washington State Senior camping pass, sat down with a map of the Washington State Parks, booked 31 nights at six different parks, and decided there are some age benefits. A priority stop was to tour the site of the 2022 Region 10 Rally in Lynden to assist the host Washington and Idaho Airstream Clubs in their planning of this much-anticipated



event that was postponed in both 2020 and 2021. At the suggestion of our formidable editor and her right-hand guy, Norma and Bill Massier, I will do a series of articles and hope that other OAC members will explore some of these areas.

We left our home in Olympia on a Monday in early October and headed to Grayland Beach State Park. (Insert Photo 1)

Only 90 miles and a good start to a long

trip. We had camped at Grayland Beach several years ago and the mosquitoes were fierce due to all of the ponds and water-filled ditches at the campground. With an average temperature in the mid-50s this trip, mosquitoes were not a problem. Our site was level and with the senior pass price of \$10 a night for full hookups, we had no complaints. Campground showers were clean and a 3-minute shower was a 50 cent token bought through a vending machine when we checked in.

The weather was crisp and it rained all night so we slept like babies to the sound of rain on aluminum. Tuesday morning, some continuing rain so we caught up on emails and returned a couple of phone calls. Surprisingly, we had 2 bars of T-Mobile cell service and could hotspot to our laptops. One of my favorite stops in this area is a home accessories store called Pomegranate which had been closed our last trip through due to Covid. A quick shopping trip

netted us some great stocking hats with LED lights. (Insert Photo 2) We made the obligatory stop at the historical Tokeland Hotel's bakery and picked up an oatmeal cookie with toffee and dried cherries and, for dessert with dinner, a sour cherry hand

pie with sugar crystals. Yummy. The Tokeland Hotel was built in the late 1800s by the daughter of pioneers who settled among the Shoalwater tribe led by Chief Toke. In the coming years, the family bought additional land, developed a golf course, gun club, dairy, and post office. Tokeland was an important social center for the Pacific Northwest until a violent storm in 1932 destroyed many of the facilities. This, combined with the depression, marked the end of an era. Next stop, Brady's Oysters where we considered picking up cooked



crabs for dinner until we figured out they were \$20 a pound which would have been \$40 each. We decided to wait until they are in season in a couple of months. Grayland is famous for its cranberries and Ocean Spray contracts with many of the local farms.

Fascinating to watch the fields being flooded and then the cranberries skimmed off during the harvest. We were fortunate to be here this time of year to watch the process.

Wednesday dawned sunny but cold and we headed out for a beach walk after a leisurely morning of coffee and yep, more emails and phone calls. Off to nearby Westport and the docks to talk to the fisherman about what they were catching. Westport has several charter fishing companies and I caught a huge king salmon there several summers ago but just a little brisk and windy for me to fish this time of year. (Insert photo 3)

Back to the Airstream to pull out maps and start our

trip planning to the Airstream International Board of Trustees meeting in Savannah in January of 2022. From start to finish, we plan on four months so a lot of planning is yet to do.

At 5:00, we put up the maps and headed back to the Tokeland Hotel for a rare dinner out. After many years of travel for work and having to eat out three meals a day, I usually cook both at home and out camping. We were so glad we decided to treat ourselves to dinner. In 2018, the owners of the famous Wandering Goose restaurant on Capitol Hill in Seattle (they made our daughter's wedding cakes) moved with their five children to Tokeland and the hotel has become a foodie's destination. One of my favorite cheeses is fresh burrata and very few restaurants go to the trouble to make it. I tried making it once and ended up dumping the entire mess out for the birds. On the evening specials list

was a fresh burrata on arugula with grilled peaches, fresh figs, blueberries, and

Marcona almonds with a balsamic vinaigrette. We decided to split and it was a good choice as the salad was huge.

David ordered the highly recommended salt and pepper fried chicken with mashed potatoes and gravy, collard greens, and a biscuit the size of a dessert plate. I ordered the shrimp and stone-ground grits and at the first bite, was transported to New Orleans. Every bite of both of our meals was amazing and we had to box half of it to take home as servings were massive.

After a deep sleep on full stomachs, we woke up Thursday morning to another cold but sunny morning. Today's destination was a secret beach that I overheard had sea glass. Alas, high tide and a rookie



mistake so we moved on down the road to the Tokeland Hotel Bakery (third trip but who's counting) and picked up a slice of Hummingbird Cake to share. According to Southern Living magazine, the cake is their most requested recipe and is made with



banana, crushed pineapple, and coconut, then topped with cream cheese and toasted pecan frosting. Upon our return to the campground, we headed to the beach for sunset and an amazing sight. Over 200 cars parked on the beach and hundreds of people digging razor clams. It was the opening day of razor clam season and people came from all over as a perfect low tide at 6:00 pm. We ended the evening around the campfire with a cup of decaf coffee and a slice of cake and it did not disappoint.

A fitting end to a wonderful visit to this Southwest corner of the Washington Coast. Next stop – Bayview State Park outside of La Conner, Washington.
