Newbie Rally, May 12-15th, Casey's RV Park, near Oakridge, OR. Full hook-ups, 7 sites remain. Rally will also be open to non-Newbies, starting March 20. \$155. RIGHT on the river – gorgeous! You can sit right on the river's edge and just read a book if you wish. There will be workshops for newbies, and those who have camped for a while can certainly help those new to their Airstreams. Hosted by Wendy Ware and Dan Gleason. 5 sites remain. Now, that's unheard of, folks.

South Beach Family Fun Campout, June 23-26, \$115. Water and electric hook-ups. Join others at the South Beach State Park for a family rally. Bring your flip flops, beach chairs, bicycles, sand castle making tools and plenty of creativity to this family friendly Airstream event in beautiful Newport, Oregon. Lots of tourist activities in the area: Oregon Coast Aquarium, Hatfield Marine Science Center, Bayfront shopping and NYE Beach to name a few. Hosted by Julie and Shamus Gamache.

Chapter 2

Next stop, Bayview State Park on Padilla Bay outside of Anacortes for a three-night stay. We had originally planned a scenic drive going up Hood Canal, taking the ferry across to Whidbey Island, and driving up the island and off in to the Skagit Valley. It dawned on us it was a Friday and we made the decision to do the slog up I-5, so back to Olympia we went and got on I-5 there. The travel gods were with us and the

traffic going southbound was stop and go the whole way but northbound, we sailed through

Seattle with the only slog through Everett. We try to not drive more than 5 hours a day and pulled in to our campsite at 4.5 hours from when we left Grayland Beach. Full disclosure - Bay View applies to only a couple of select sites that are overlooking the bay. The majority of the sites are in a large circle with no views but with water and electricity (50 amp!). We have been here in the summer when the center of the circle was filled with children and dogs romping but this time of year, much quieter even though every hookup site was filled. There is a pay dump station available but with only a three-night stay, we will wait until we get to our next stop. Sites are wide and not deep but we were able to easily navigate our 27'



in to the site and then park our truck across the front sideways. As with our last stop, the campground was well groomed, hosts friendly, and bathrooms clean. Two bars of T-Mobile so enough to Hotspot to my laptop. The road that runs in front of the campground is lightly trafficked and quiet. Bonus is the walkway that goes from the campground down to the bay and under the road to a lovely picnic area with shelter and expansive views of the bay.

Friday night, we slept to rain all night and work to grey skies and drizzle. Perfect day to do some early Christmas shopping in La Conner. Best known for its location in the middle of the Skagit Valley tulip fields, La Connor also is filled with great restaurants and locally owned boutiques. After a stop at Handmade in La Connor for some bath and body Christmas gifts for family as well as a few things for ourselves, we stopped in to Calico Cupboard for lunch as is our tradition when we are in the area. Although they have other locations in the Skagit Valley, La Conner is our favorite. Calico Cupboard sells fresh bread and offers a bakery case filled with lovely and delicious temptations and we took dessert to go as our lunch was generous and filling. La Connor has at least six art galleries and is also the home of the author Tom Robbins and thank you, Rhonda Levine, for

that nugget

of knowledge! La Connor has apparently attracted talented artists and bohemians since the late 1800s. With their lovely location along the river, it is a "must see" when in the area. Tulip Festival is in April and takes some planning due to the crowds that attend annually but if you can find a camp site in the area, there is a bicycle route that will have you passing the backed up traffic and takes you to the tulip farms and fields for a sight you will never forget. When you are on the boardwalk behind the





restaurants and boutiques in La Connor, look across the Skagit river to the unique Swinomish Tribal park with points of interest covered by large scale, versions of the traditional tribal hats that were made from cedar.

Our next stop was a drive north to the village of Edison, established in 1869 and now on the Skagit Farm to Pint Ale Trail. Located just off Chuckanut Drive at the Bow Junction, we have watched it become a thriving arts community with both art

galleries and a handmade wood furniture business with custom woodworking. Well worth a diversion off I-5 heading up to Bellingham and Chuckanut Drive is the old highway that existed before I-5 and hugs the coast with spectacular views of the islands and several excellent restaurants serving fresh seafood. Warning – Larabee State Park is along Chuckanut Drive and offers camping but do not enter from the south end and drive north as Chuckanut Drive is narrow, windy, overhanging rocks, and prone to landslides and road closures on the south end off Hwy 20. A much better route is to enter from Fairhaven, an arts community just south of

Bellingham and Chuckanut Drive is a much better road going south down to Larrabee. Beautiful pullouts along the way with expansive views of the islands.

Sunday defied the weather forecast and was a perfect day to explore Anacortes across



Padilla Bay. Dominated by the huge container ships waiting to fill from the local refinery, Anacortes is mainly known by visitors driving through to the ferry to the San Juan Islands who don't stop to enjoy the town's charms. We were glad we took an afternoon to discover as so much history and beautiful old Victorian homes that have been

well maintained. A drive up to the viewpoint at Cap Sante took us past lovely

neighborhoods and in to a beautiful city park with views looking north and west through the San Juans and east to the Cascades. Anacortes was an important epicenter of the logging trade with saw mills, shingle mills, lumbermills, pulp, plywood, and veneer mills, and its large shipping port. The last mill on Fidalgo Bay succumbed to fire in 1992, ending an era in Anacortes.

A perfect day of exploring ended with a campfire and an early night as on the road to Lynden, WA tomorrow to tour the site of the 2022 Region Rally.

Traveling safety: understanding and controlling sway

Our Airstreams all come with a built-in flaw no one is immune to. The way they are hitched to our tow vehicles (TV), several feet behind the rear axle, give them the leverage they need to move the TV's rear end side to side. When this amplifies, we call it fishtailing. This can be controlled with a knowledge our TV gross vehicle weight rating (probably in the driver's door jamb) and our travel trailer (TT) gross vehicle weight (GVW) and weight rating (a sticker outside on the forward street side). With these numbers, we can get to the tongue weight, the holy grail of a safe and road worthy setup. As I like to do, I will share more words of wisdom from my safety guru. If you ever start to sway, do not touch the brakes. Release the accelerator and let your equipment do the rest. We all have felt the effects of strong crosswinds or the wave from being overtaken from the rear by a fifty-thousand-pound 18-wheeler. A good set up will require little correction and will quickly stabilize. Even though we get that sinking feeling in our gut.

You can find many articles on selecting the appropriate TV for a given TT. Dig a little deeper than just looking up that vehicle's towing capacity. Gross vehicle weight rating (GVWR), also referred to as towing capacity, is based on GVW which includes passengers, cargo, pets, fluids etc. Just because a TV is rated to tow 10,000 lbs doesn't mean you should. I haven't found a hard number of how much more towing capacity we should have than what we "need". But I have found story after story of shortened transmission life, shortened tire life, increased drive train wear... all of which can lead to failures on the road. There are also countless stories (some may be yours) of how having a bit more than you need increases stability in sudden braking situations, better gears for shifting on long downgrades, or that something extra to respond with quick acceleration to avoid another driver's foolishness.

So, we are towing this heavy thing that wants to wiggle around. If we can move some of the TT's weight forward of its axles, it will handle better. I'm going to assume you all have a weight distribution hitch. Let's keep the discussion of going with Hensley, Blue Ox, ProPride or another, for around the campfire. The idea is that these are designed to distribute weight to the front axle of TV, and to the trailer axle(s). The goal is a more even weight distribution through the equipment and built-in sway control.

Finding the tongue weight (actual weight bearing down on the hitch ball) of our set up is easy. Industry standard is that the weight on your hitch should be about 10-15% of gross trailer weight. While you can measure tongue weight with a specialized scale, these are expensive (\$250+). Bathroom scales also work, but to me anyways, this is an inconvenient method involving pipes and 2x4's. For about \$10 you can go to commercial scales and get accurate gross weights of the TV and

TT (https://catscale.com/cat-scale-locator/). I admit I was extremely intimidated my first time, reading my notes over, and being surrounded by those big semi's waiting their turn.

Go to the scales fully laden: fuel tank full, cargo full, firewood you may carry (cab side of the truck bed), passengers, pets, propane full (4.5lbs/gal), refrigerator full, and whatever water configuration you typically travel with (8.3 lbs/gal) in either fresh, grey or black water tanks.

I have found it useful to start by going inside and describing to the person printing the tickets what it is I am doing. Commercial scales are usually busy, so they want you to take your first weight, drive off the scale, go drop your trailer, then come back for the second weight. Look at the scales beforehand so you can premeditate your plan. Most have 3 pads, some 2. Tell them you only want the weight on the front scale when you go through with the trailer.

The math is easy: A = gross weight of TV B = weight of TV without tongue weight

A - B = tongue weight for weight distribution system

- 1) Roll onto the scale with only the 4 tires of the TV on the pad, with weight distribution hitch engaged. This is A.
- 2) If you can, unhook the TT while on the scale, if not, drive off and drop the TT. Take second weight. This is B.

While you're there, you might as well get the gross weight of your fully laden Airstream (GTW). Most of us only only know the curb weight and the GVWR (max weight rating). Then you'll be sure your setup is within the rated capacity of your tow vehicle and that it is not itself overloaded.

- 1) Roll onto the scale so that TV and TT are on one pad. This is GCVW (gross combined vehicle weight).
- 2) You already have the the TV weight (A) above.
- 3) GTW=GCVW–GVW

Remember anytime you make a significant change to your setup, take another trip to the scales. This could be adding a bike rack and a couple of bikes to the TT, adding a generator to the bed of the TV, adding an array of solar panels and batteries, or adding that gourmet cabinet remodel from Ultimate Airstreams. Safe traveling!
