Unit Constitution/By-Laws change on delegates needed

A change in the Wally Byam Caravan Club International constitution was approved by the delegates at the Madison, Wis. meeting and will mean that all Unit Constitutions/By-Laws will need to be revised to conform.

Article V1. Delegates. should now read:

Section 1. The executive board shall appoint one Delegate and one Alternate Delegate to represent the unit at the Delegates' meeting. The Delegate shall be from among the officers and regular members who will attend the annual Delegates meeting of the parent organization, the Wally Byam Caravan Club International, Inc. The Alternate may be a regular member of the Unit represented or an affiliate member of the Unit represented and a regular member of a Unit in the same Region. No Delegate or Alternate may represent more than one Unit at the Delegates meeting. Any vacancy occurring following such selection shall be filled by appointment by the President. The Delegate and Alternate should be instructed with respect to the wishes of the Unit on matters to come before the meeting, The President and Recording Secretary shall certify to these appointments.

Southern Indiana Unit gets special tour of military base

When the Southern Indiana Unit had its August Rally at Odon City Park it was in for a special treat.

John and Carrie Hays were hosts for the rally. John is a retired Public Works Officer at the nearby Crane Naval Surface Warfare Center.

John drew on relationships developed in his years at Crane to arrange for an extensive tour of the 64,000 acre military base. It's the third largest military installation in the United States.

The tour began with a visit to the Sonobouy tanks where deep sea conditions can be simulated. When Hays was at Crane he was responsible for the logistics of moving the tanks from Marble Hill Nuclear Plant at Madison, on the Ohio River, to Crane. The two tanks are each 45 feet tall, 18 feet in diameter with walls nine inches thick. They were first moved to the river and then barged to Louisville. From there they went by rail and trucks.

Also visited were:

- -- An area where armor for military vehicles is developed and tested.
- -- The Base X Expedition Shelter that Crane developed. It's a scalable tent that serves as a communication center and can be rolled out and set up in an hour, complete with all the technical equipment including heating or air-conditioning, depending on the need.
- -- The Electro-Optics Center that does research and develops lasers, visual augmentation, multi-sensor targeting systems, weapon sights and day-night optics.
 - -- The small arms museum.
 - -- Also included was a lunch at the Crane cafeteria.

The 100 square mile base is so large because in addition to the technology work carried out it is also one of three ammunition storage depots in the U.S. with 25 percent of the Navy ammunition stored there. On the technology side 80 percent of the 6,000 people employed at the base are scientists or engineers.

BETHALTO - "Silver bullets" are landing all over town and, so far, not a single shot has been fired.

The St. Louis Regional Airport Authority is playing host to an invasion of Airstream trailers, which are causing double-takes from passers by.

Caravan Club International - named for the creator of the Airstream - are here for a tourist stop and to generate interest among potential owners of the unique travel home.

"We bought our first one in '72. Now, we're on number 14," said Erika Schaette, a German immigrant

who settled years ago in Olney. She serves as the group's vicepresident and enthusiastic promoter. She gladly shows off the vehicle to those who ask and shows them literature on the sub-

She and her husband travel for business across the country, selling bicycle parts. "We were sick and tired of hotels," she

Some enthusiasts of the 60-member Unit arrived on Thursday, while others pulled in on Friday. By day's end today, there should be 25 of the Airstreams parked on the airport grounds.

Members will take in local attractions and restaurants in stops that are organized by the Unit leadership.

The traditional Airstream is round-edged, coated with silver aluminum — hence the "silver bullet" nickname — and pulled by a truck. The company, however, also makes what are called Squarestreams, which are rectangular and more like the traditional motorhome that drives on its own.

The vehicles range from about 19 feet in length to around 30 feet, and you can expect to pay up to \$80,000 for one of the best new models. Schaette said.
