


In the past, we took our Argosy from Florida beaches to the Grand Canyon and lots of places in between

FROM THE PRESIDENT

Anna and I had a great time at the first annual "Streamin' on the Strand" Airstream Rally at Mardi Gras! Galveston in February. Allana is including pictures in the newsletter, but I'd like to answer a few questions all of us had when we signed up for the rally. 1) Security—we felt very safe and had no issues whatsoever. Everyone walking down Mechanic Street was both curious and respectful—some thought the trailers were for rent (they didn't know what the BRNs meant). So many said "Oh, I've always wanted one!" 2) Parades—yes, we were right on the sidelines, but one block from the Strand, where the clubs, stores, entertainment, and larger crowds were during the event. We had ringside seats as the parades passed by us on their way to the Strand and on their return,



making a game out of tossing beads at us. I finally had to tell Anna we had enough beads! 3)Services—we all had 30-amp hook-ups with few disruptions the entire time. If someone ran out of water, there was a limited supply available for topping their tanks. But hey, we're used to boondocking, right? Golf carts were available to ferry you back and forth to your tow vehicle as needed, and there were no security issues at the remote parking lot where we kept our vehicles for the weekend. 4) Rationale for expense—although some may have felt the rally was a little on the expensive side, we really got a lot of bang for our buck. Registration included parking for three nights, entry to the event area for the weekend, swag bags with t-shirts and other goodies, a Bloody Mary breakfast, a formal breakfast at the Tremont Hotel Ballroom, and a bagel goodbye bag on Sunday morning. 5) Logistics—parking at this first rally ended up with a few twists, but all 49 trailers were parked by 8:15 PM on Thursday night. Leaving Sunday morning went well with those of checking out in the morning safely off the streets before the 11:00 AM deadline (some opted to stay for Sunday's fun and exit after 6 PM). NTxAC was well represented by 7 rigs. The event organizers were so happy with our Region 9 organizers that a commitment was made for this event to be held each year for the next ten years. Watch for information for 2023 registration (Mardi Gras! Galveston will be in February again next year). Remember this is a limited space event so once the announcement goes out don't delay in making your reservation. That's all for now—hope to see some of you at Lake Mineral Wells State Park March 11-13!

FEATURE ARTICLE

In the last issue of the newsletter, I introduced Ted and Janice Larson, who own a 1951 Cruisette. I saved the description of their restoration of the Vintage Cruisette for this issue.

1951 Airstream Cruisette-#8023

It is a rare collectible. At 14'8" overall (13'cabin) and weighing only 1420 pounds, the Cruisette is the smallest Airstream ever made. Cruisette 8023 was the 23rd ever built out of 75 total that were made. With only a handful known to currently exist, this is one of the rarest of all Airstreams. A beautiful restoration, coupled with added custom features and upgrades, make this an extremely unique and one-of-a-kind collectible. You are guaranteed to be the main attraction wherever you go. The quality of this very rare and totally unique airstream virtually assures that #23 will continue to increase in value.

All restoration work was done by craftsmen of the highest standard but were also chosen due to their personal pride in delivering a work like no other. No expense was spared and attention to the smallest of details is evidenced throughout. With 1/8" birch wood lining the entire cabin area, the workmanship is breathtaking from the rounded endcap heads to the rounded corners on all the cabinets, drawers, and closet doors, which only a master craftsman could deliver. The polished original exterior panels give added character to this 65-year-old collectible. State of the art electrical and mechanical upgrades make this a better than new trailer while maintaining all the vintage features. Many of the custom features will not be found on any other camper.

#23 is finished with a 2-tone color scheme of aqua and satin black, popular with the period, except for dark green rippled glass cabinet doors which are also back-lit for added ambiance. The layout was kept mostly original but allows for maximum balance of space usage and yet incorporates needed convenience items, such as hiding the toilet in a storage area with a slid-out for ease of access.

Behind the well-crafted paneling is a high-tech maze of wiring-control panels for AC power, 12-volt, DC power, monster cables for video and audio prewired for satellite hookup, LED lighting, awesome surround sound speakers, as well as USB ports throughout.

CUSTOM FEATURES ADDED:

- Built-in wine cooler and wine glass rack (never be caught without again)
- Automatic icemaker for the non-wine drinkers
- Bed with tempur-pedic memory foam mattress custom fitted.
- Overhead canned LED lights in ceiling offers bright nighttime lighting, or the sconce lights for ambiance while sipping an evening wine.
- LED light at entrance step
- Custom wood blinds
- Built-in Microwave.
- Slide-out spice rack (impress your friends with a gourmet meal)
- Double radiant barrier insulation added between shell and inner lining for higher efficiency
- Awning rack with Aqua/white awning
- Self-closing drawers, do not need to be latched for travel
- Storage closet doors all have hydraulic shocks-to stay open
- Unique green rippled glass panel cabinet "covers" add striking beauty with backlights on at night.
- Lights in all cabinets, rear storage compartment and above exterior water &electrical plug-ins
- Automatic lights in storage cabinets come on when door opens
- Surround sound audio-whether rock-n-roll, country or jazz, it will blow you away





MEETING MINUTES

February NTxAC Business Meeting

Choctaw Casino KOA, Durant, OK February 12, 2022-10:00 AM Conducted by David Brandon

Welcome and Introductions. Present were Donald Wright, Allana Patterson, Tom Jensen, Dan and Jennifer Dice, Sue McLaughlin, Bruce and Denice Morrow, and David and Anna Brandon **Business:**

- 1. Jennifer Dice moved and Don seconded to accept minutes from January 15, 2022 meeting at North Texas Airstream Community.
- 2. Treasurer's Report: \$5751.09 balance, \$75 expenses in the last month.
- 3. Membership Chair, Tom Jensen, reported that three new rigs joined us last month.
- 4. Update on T-Shirts and Flags with new logo by Dan and Jenn Dice: Custom Ink, although we can order independently, still requires a minimum for order which we have not met with our current orders. Michael Gross outlined the way that Land's End works for customizing their items, as his club in California was set up to customize clothing through Land's End. Michael has sent the logo to Land's End for NTxAC, but the first proposal was not accurately rendered so we are waiting for a revision. Cost would be the price of the garment with an additional \$8 for the embroidered logo. Allana proposed that we go back to the way shirts were obtained before—the club itself purchased the minimum order and members bought the shirts from the club. Dan reported that most of the t-shirts ordered from Custom Ink were heathered gray so it would make sense to choose that color again. Jennifer moved that the club make a minimum order for gray t-shirts in assorted sizes from a local provider. Sue McLaughlin seconded the motion. David Brandon will contact Richey Company, an Irving, TX based company, for prices. Jennifer revised her motion to include that we should not place the order until members who have paid Custom Ink are refunded; Sue seconded the motion. Tom Jensen suggested that we give t-shirts retroactively. Allana moved that anyone who joined the club from January 2021 to present receive a free t-shirt when they attend a rally, and Dan seconded the motion. Anna continues to accept orders for the yard flags. Dan brings up the potential for the club to have a Venmo or Zelle to make payment easier for members.
- 5. Tom Jensen asked to resume the conversation about our Treasurer position. Lynne Mack requested to resign the position in December, but this had been tabled over the holidays. Dara Poole and Tom Jensen have both offered to accept the position. Tom has proposed that the Treasurer position fits well with his role as Membership Chair as both roles involve direct contact with our membership. According to our bylaws, this position can be appointed by the Executive Board and voted on this fall with the full slate of officers. David will call a meeting of officers and report the decision at our next meeting.
- 6. Allana Patterson, our Newsletter Editor, brought up that the logo on the Airstream Club International is so large that people are confused and don't scroll down to see the menu items. Anna Brandon explained that this is a "Microsite Lander" page that is set up by ACI. Jenn Dice will help coordinate with ACI to have the logo corrected. Allana also requested information and pictures for the March/April newsletter.
- 7. Review of upcoming rallies: Lake Mineral Wells State Park is our March Rally location; April we will have a membership meeting at the Brandon home in Grapevine, and the Region 9 Rally Let's Get Together! will be April 26-May 1 in Mineola, TX.

10:30 AM Meeting Adjourned: Tom Jensen moved to adjourn, and Anna Brandon seconded the motion.


