1. <u>**RV Lifestyle</u>**: Mike Wendland is an award-winning journalist who, with his wife Jennifer, and their dog, Bo, travel the country, attend RV shows, and interview industry leaders, etc. Their excellent podcasts, website, newsletter, eBooks, and YouTube channel are full of up-todate industry news, how-to's, product and campground reviews, and fascinating interviews. I love their "Off The Beaten Path" segment. They are based in Michigan and travel in a Class B van (they used and promoted RoadTreks for a while). They often have 'meetups' with fans, and encourage winter camping.</u>

2. <u>Girl Camper</u>: where they "go places and do things". Janine Pettitt gears her podcast, website, YouTube channel, and now magazine, to women, but my hubby also enjoys her show. She conducts great interviews with fascinating men and women, and she's upbeat and inspiring. Her hubby doesn't like camping, but he encourages her to go, and she has fun with her tiny trailer!

3. <u>Carolyn's RV Life</u>: Carolyn travels fulltime alone with her dog in an older Class C RV, and vlogs (video blogs) about her adventures. She takes longer summer trips (like the one to Alaska, where she went right through my tiny home town!), and then winters on BLM lands in the southern US. (She was in Minnesota last summer.) She's vegan, independent, gutsy, opinionated, loves to hike, and boondocks nearly everywhere she goes. She's a great videographer, as well. I don't always agree with her opinions, but I've been inspired by and learned a lot from her: how to repair things; how to relax if things don't go as planned; how to be adventurous and move out of your comfort zone. 5. <u>Keep Your Daydream (KYD)</u>: Marc and Tricia's YouTube channel was recommended by a friend, and I haven't watched many episodes yet. However, what I really like about them is that they have been trying out several types of RVs (including an Airstream!). They, with their three

children, travel full time in them, and then review them. They are fun to watch, and now Tricia has put out a cookbook, called "Small Space, Big Taste".

6. <u>America's National Parks</u>: podcast (part of the RV Miles Network of Podcasts, which also includes the RV Miles and See America podcasts): This is one of the best travel podcasts I've ever heard. Jason and Abby Epperson give details on how to get to a park, but they also dig up fun facts and histories of each park, and present them in an engaging manner. They do a fantastic job! (They travel full time with their three boys, and are on social media as "Our Wandering Family".)

7. <u>Aluminarium</u>: I had to throw in a blog by people who actually live in an Airstream. Leigh and Brian lived over 10 years full time in their Airstream. They seem to have been sheltering in place on property they own in Washington state since 2020 (and have stopped blogging), but their website is still there with tons of inspiration!

I'm sure there are a zillion more great people out there promoting the RV life, so if you know of (or ARE) one we should hear about, please let us know!

DISCOVERING CASCADIA AUGUST 14 – OCTOBER 21 2022



The Discovering Cascadia Caravan focuses on the forces that collectively define the Pacific Northwest (PNW) region as it is today. We will investigate the major elements that has had an influence, from the Ice Age to modern times. We will explore environmental, cultural, social, geophysical, and economic forces through different periods in our past and peek into modern influences at work today. Along the way we will sample

the foods, wines, music and traditions of many cultures that have contributed to PNW vibe. We will travel through the wilderness, see firsthand the challenges of the geography and its contribution to agriculture and industry. The caravan's participants will see how the region is influenced by the indigenous people, and the socioeconomic events that served as the catalyst in forming modern PNW society today.

The journey begins in Boise, where we will get our first glimpse of the Geological forces that shaped Cascadia, Visit the infamous Idaho State Penitentiary and dive into the culture of the Basques who migrated to Idaho from Spain. We tour a Basque Boarding house and the Basque Museum. We have a Basque dinner with Tapas and Txakolina in the "Basque Block" of Boise.

The caravan then moves into NE Oregon visiting Baker City, (hometown of Wally Byam), and Haines Oregon where we take a quick peek at the beginnings of the Oregon Territory. From there we navigate our way down Dead Man's Pass into Pendleton. Here we will visit the Tamastslikt Culture Institute and learn the story of the Cayuse, Umatilla and Walla Walla people. The indigenous tribes that call the Pendleton area and Walla Walla Valley home. We will also visit Pendleton learning a bit the towns rough and tumble past as it grew in the late 19th and early 20th Centuries. We will learn of Pendleton's surprising contribution to WWII. Caravaners will have an opportunity to visit and shop at the Pendleton Wollen Mills.

DISCOVERING CASCADIA

AUGUST 14 – OCTOBER 21 2022

We move on to Walla Walla and Milton-Freewater where we visit the Fort Walla Walla Museum, visit a Cider house, a College of Viticulture learning a bit of what makes this area one of the great wine regions of the world. We will visit multiple startups from an Vinter incubator center and spend an afternoon at Spring Valley, one of the pedigree wineries of the region.

From there the caravan swings NE crossing the Palouse region enroute to Spokane and the Inland empire. There we will see the Museum of Art & Culture, Bing Cosby House on the Gonzaga Campus, visit the River walk public space which includes the Spokane Falls viewed from a Gondola, the few remaining carousels still operating (Group Photo), and see a Pow Wow which occurs every year in the city on the West end of the Spokane River Falls. Leaving Spokane we will cross the Scab Lands, visit Grand Coulee and Dry Falls the remnant of the largest Waterfall in North America. We will briefly sojourn into the wilderness of the North Cascades, visit the 3rd deepest lake on the Continent, a western revival town and a Bavarian Village before crossing the Cascades.

Our caravan will try to find the soul of the metropolis of Seattle in its eclectic neighborhoods and markets, tour the Wing Luke Museum, Museum of History and Industry, a Sound Garden, and Boeing to name a few. Then we venture further North to Anacortes and the Salish sea. Where we board a ship and set sail on the hunt for whales (Orca and Humpbacks), Sea Lions, Seals and Otters. We cross the triangle of fire by Ferry. This is the entrance of Puget Sound once protected by 3 forts (Worden, Casey and Flagler), and explore the Olympic National Park. We will hike on Hurricane Ridge, the Hoh Rain Forest and camp on First beach on the Pacific Ocean, located in La Push. We then head to Raymond, Washington on the Willapa river, boondock in town and visit the NW Carriage Museum for a personal tour by the owner and curator.

Next, we are heading back inland to Castle Rock for a look down the throat of Mount St. Helens from the Johnson Ridge Observatory before we head to the coast and Astoria, Oregon. The mouth of the Columbia River, where it spills into the Pacific Ocean creates some of the most treacherous waters in the Pacific Ocean and North America. Explore Fort Stevens, learn a bit about Lewis & Clark, the early history of

Astoria and Maritime's volatile relationship with the mouth of the Columbia River. We will move on from there into the Willamette valley visit wineries, olive orchards, and an Air & Space Museum affiliated with the Smithsonian.

We continue south via land and back along the Oregon coast, just for fun. We fly kites, ride dune buggies, watch the sun set from Heceta Beach, and hike. We will drive along Siuslaw (See-Slaw) river as we begin to head East to Eugene tour at a brewery that is a model of the PNW work-lifecommunity culture. Visit the Cascade Raptor Center and wildlife hospital. Then we Travel further East and North to Redmond and Bend Oregon. We will visit the High Desert Museum, tour breweries (there are 21), and hike along the Deschutes River. Our journey will end near Government Camp with a tour of the National Historic Treasure, Timberline lodge and our Farewell banquet dinner at Timberline Lodge on Mt Hood. <u>https://airstreamclub.org/form/2022-discovering-cascadia-carava</u>

Hitch Caddy Version 3

Version 1 worked well, but Kay cannot lift the hitch head and put it in the receiver on the truck as it weighs ~95 lbs. That's the only disadvantage of the AirSafe hitch we have. On the plus side, it decouples the trailer from the truck and provides a much smoother ride over rough roads and highways.

In 2019, we saw on the Air Forums where someone modified a transmission jack to raise and lower the hitch head. Looked like a really good idea, so last winter I did my own modification to a transmission jack that I showed in the Jan 2021 newsletter. Here's a couple of pictures, both with and without the hitch:



Version 2 of hitch caddy

In the right-hand picture, you can see Version 1 of the caddy in the background.

Version 2 failed the first time we used it. (2) Seems the screw lift mechanism did not like being over-tightened with a torque wrench, and it came apart. I cobbled it back together enough to continue using it for the year, but knew we needed something different. Kay asked about using a floor jack instead of the transmission jack, which seemed to make sense. So, I bought one last fall and started working on it a few weeks ago.



Here's version 3:



I removed the tiny little casters and welded on larger ones with a wider stance to keep it from tipping over. I re-used the black plate that the hitch sits on and bolted it to the top of the jack. Needs to be painted, but that will wait until spring.

With the hitch:



It raises and lowers with the hydraulic jack much easier than the transmission jack did and seems pretty stable. This spring will be the test when I try to roll it over gravel and grass.

On a different topic, most of you know I retired Dec 31st. Tiz great! I have not missed work at all...

Some of you also know we went to Hawaii. Part of the trip was spent on the Big Island of Hawaii and we rented a camper van for 5 nights. We did a circle tour of the island and had a great relaxing time.

The reason we rented the camper van is so we can add Hawaii to our camping map. I could not wait until spring, and stuck Hawaii on it yesterday.



One of the coolest things we saw was the Kīlauea volcano, which is actively erupting. We went to the crater viewing area at night and saw red lava.
