resident's Message

arch started with highs and lows for weather. Many here in the north met to celebrate St Patrick's Day on a cool bright March day. It was great to have a few new members participate. Indications are that spring is just around the corner and camping season will soon return here in the northeast. I completed several hours spring maintenance on my trailer last week, with plans to be camping by the end of April. Recently, I have

trailer this time.

received a few questions regarding what maintenance I do each year on my trailer. Therefore, I have created a checklist of what I do each year as a guide for anyone who may be interested (separate attachment).

You will notice the first thing I complete is an air pressure leak test on my trailer to confirm I have no water infiltration into the body of my trailer. This pressure test, which to

some you may be unfamiliar with, uses a pressure test blower (picture inset). If you have had a leak in your trailer, you may have experienced the frustration involved in locating hard to find leaks. Repeated repair attempts, frustration, and incredible repair costs have been the norm. The pressure test pinpoints the actual exterior surface leak, which is often remote from any visible

interior moisture, water damage, or odors. The pressure tester makes ingenious use of a very simple fact: air flowing through an opening covered with a soapy water solution produces a bubble precisely at the opening, similar to using Continued page 2

In the late 1950s, Airstream purchased four acres in Jackson Center, Ohio, near our Midwest factory. In 1971 a seed was planted there, and from it grew the world's most modern trailer manufacturing facility – 150,000 square feet in total. As a recession and the Middle East gas crisis hit American drivers hard in the late 1970s, it did the same to Airstream. With the expansion of the Jackson Center facility and a need to consolidate, Airstream finally made the move east complete. The California plant was closed in 1978, and all manufacturing and executive operations would move to the Ohio complex – where they remain today.

soapy water to find an LPG leak. The system draws outside air into the RV via the roof vent creating a positive interior pressure. This pressure difference causes air to flow outward through any outer skin faults. The application of a soapy water solution to the outer skin results in a very visible bubble exactly over each fault. The process takes about 2 hours complete and requires a location for your trailer with power and water available to essentially wash the trailer (not all campgrounds allow this).

With all the maintenance complete it is time to go camping! The season is looking very exciting with three outings planned in Connecticut prior to heading north to the International Rally in Maine. COCAC has requested a caravan parking date so many

of us can park together in Fryeburg. Plans are close to be final for a COCAC gathering at International as well. Artistic Glass with Class

his is our fourth year at Travelers Rest, and it is nice to see everyone again taking part in the park activities, post COVID. In our second season at Travelers Rest I started taking stained glass classes and found out that stained glass class was a kind of social gathering of friends where all were challenged in creating "one-of-a-kind artworks". As one person in class said, "once you start, it's an addiction." That said, finding a unique piece of stained glass that would look nice as a wind catcher or a suncatcher is where you begin.

While everyone is working on their piece, people are wandering around commenting or complementing what others are working on. The social gathering atmosphere of fun and friendly chatter never stops, whether it is while helping set up tables before class or after class while sweeping the floors.











The experience of working with stained glass is totally different than working watercolor, oil, and acrylic paints. It is taking a piece of square glass and cutting into the shape and size needed



in one's project.

There are two ways in working with stained glass. The first way involves foiling the glass pieces and then soldering them in place with a zinc came frame holding it together. Foiling is usually done with suncatcher pieces like those in the pictures above, including the tulip pieces by the Fullers and Gail Downing.

Another method is called lead stained glass. Here, pieces of glass are cut to fit into a specific "U" channel that is then surrounded with a lead came frame. Using this method Gail Downing and Kathy Fuller each made frames with

their initials in the center. Gail commented, "I am looking forward to trying it again next year. The good news is I did not get any cuts or glass splinters."

After finishing her stain glass piece, Kathy wanted a challenge in making a large, circular stained glass garden

piece for outdoors. This piece had many different circles she had to cut out, then put lead around every circle. Reflecting on this piece, Kathy commented, "I learned a lot in the process and afterwards on how to improve composition and technique. Now that I have the tools and some experience, I may continue with other projects."

So, if you are looking for challenging but fun activity you might like to try stained glass class either at Travelers Rest or in your local community back home.

The Airstream Club's IBT Recommends a New Leadership Model

(reprint from Feb. Chatter)

The WBCCI has done a reassessment of its leadership effectiveness as part of its long-range planning process. The turnover of a one-year presidency to a new administration was found to be counterproductive to the club's goals. In the previous seventy years of our club's existence our four International officers were elected by the membership and rose in rank through the vice president offices to become president for a one-year term. This term concluded at an International Rally.

Though this had served the club well in its early years, it has shown to be inadequate in our present more complex club having more diverse needs, desires and possibilities. At this year's mid-winter International Board of Trustees (IBT) meeting we concluded to recommend to the club membership a change to the executive leadership model. The recommendation is that there be an Executive Council made up primarily of 9 members elected by our membership and the immediate past president. The Executive Council would have these 10 voting members and, along with the 12 voting Region presidents, comprise the voting component of the IBT. It would then be up to the IBT to choose, from the elected Executive Council members, the best individual to serve as the club's president.

The Executive Council members would be elected for two-year terms. This council would likely be comprised of members that would have special skill sets who would not necessarily have any aspirations to be the club 's president. We could also benefit from one exceptional person serving as our president for up to four years. This would provide more continuity than what is currently provided with our annual changing of the guard. This council (board) approach is a time-tested leadership model for most non-profit organizations, corporations and many town governments.

This new Executive Council approach is further discussed in the Blue Beret, local club conversations and meetings. Ultimately it will need the membership to vote for the proper constitutional changes to make this effective and benefit us all for the next seventy years.
