From the Editor

This issue celebrates the California Poppy, a coolseason annual plant native to California, our Club's symbol and the namesake of the Club Newsletter. While March is generally the month when California Poppies "pop" out, some can still be found blooming in May, especially in Northern California. We have



official California Poppy Day: California Education Code Section 37222.12(a) states "April 6 of each year is designated and set apart as California Poppy Day, a day having special significance pursuant to Section 37222." The special significance is that the Poppy was designated the state flower on that day in 1903 under Cal. Government Code Section 421.

Lancaster, California, hosts the annual California Poppy Festival that "honors the beauty of the Poppy," generally in late April. We have a State Natural Preserve of Poppies in the Mojave Desert, the Antelope Valley California Poppy Preserve, an area of natural grasslands that comes alive with Poppy blooms, typically in March, which you can access via a live cam should you not be able to personally visit: https://www.parks.ca.gov/live/poppyreserve. If you can make it, the Interpretive Center is open from March 1st to Mother's Day annually. But that is not the only area to observe the poppies; check out this website for a map of other areas featuring carpets of Poppies: https://theatlasheart.com/where-to-see-california-poppies/.

Rumor has it that it is illegal to pick or hurt California Poppies – which is true IF the poppy is on public land such as a school, park, median or even outside a courthouse. On private property they are not so protected. Finally, California poppies are NOT addictive – having no opiates. However, developing research is showing that they can have sedative qualities that come from other plant alkaloids, and thus, can be useful in dealing with symptoms of pain and anxiety, including difficulty sleeping, when combined with magnesium and hawthorn. Native Americans reportedly used California Poppies for medicinal purposes, among other uses.

It lists the WBCCI members and their Big Red Numbers, chartered clubs, regions, and other important info on the Wally Byam Airstream Club.



Don't just set the issue aside, or quickly peruse between the covers and when you're done fix your WBCCI numbers to your rig so [the SNU Membership Chair/Newsletter Editor and his wife] can mark you down and send a note when [they] see you flittering around the countryside.

There is plenty more inside: names, photos, email addresses and phone numbers for our HQ Team who handle all the WBAC business and paperwork. Page through more thoroughly and you'll find supporting dealer and vendor ads, Code of Ethics, the Wally Byam Creed that the [Sierra Nevada Unit] incorporates via Wally's simple words throughout [its] club activities and organization. Keep reading and you'll find the WBCCI Constitution, our corporate officers and committee chairs.

You need to read on and find the listing of past International Presidents, Rallies and Attendance; did you

know that the largest rallies drew 4000 rigs or more: Bozeman, MT (3909) '73; Notre Dame, IN (3943) '74; Brandon, Manitoba, Canada (4209) '75; Louisville, KY (4493) '76; Bozeman again (3949) '77, Ames, IA (3993) '78. There were several Internationals afterwards that drew over 3000 rigs followed by up and down numbers through the years. Brandon, Manitoba drew 2263 rigs the second time in '94, then the WBCCI experienced a slow slide until an upturn in 2016 with 668 rigs at Lewisburg, WV, growing to 748 rigs at Lebanon, TN last year. The WBAC is pushing for 1000 rigs at Fryeburg in 2022 and they may make it.


There is even more club history and culture in these pages, listings of International events like the Mid-Winter IBT meetings, National Caravans and their leaders, Region Rallies, Region officers, members, units, clubs and some of the most important info for those of us that criss-cross the country, the Member Listing and the U.S., Canada and Europe Courtesy Parking! Next you'll find the Founder's Award Recipients (recruiting more than 100 new WBCCI members) and the Numerical Member Listings for identifying you as we pass on the highway. Read on and get a better feel for the club history: did you know there were nine caravans to China thru 1988 and 48 other Overseas Caravans thru 2007. There have been few out of the Country or at least our hemisphere caravans since 2007 but they've intermixed with the other 500 or so National and 280 or more Regional Caravans. Feel free to count them all but a good estimate would be over 1250 with the unit caravans added in. We're not done: the Airstream Company conducted 265 caravans to Canada, Latin America and Mexico and four more in the States! There's more, but I couldn't find the list of Airstream Factory Homecomings in the current book. Happy reading!

NorCal's Own Membership Directory

Several times a year, NorCal digitally publishes its own Membership Directory, which is disseminated via email to NorCal Members. This directory is chock full of Club information, such as Club officers, events, website access information, and significant Airstream resources, as well names and photos of our burgeoning membership. If you have not

Also - if you see the club logo by your name(s), then you have not provided a photo to him for inclusion in the Directory and we do not know what you look like. INFORMATION ON NEXT MONTH'S ELECTION

Next month (June) there will be an election on two amendments to the Airstream Club's constitution. **All** members of the The Airstream Club (with separate emails) are entitled to vote. The vote within NorCal will be done via email, electronically only. However, if you need a paper ballot, contact Tom Smithson at Tscats@mac.com.

Voting on these issues is especially important as the outcome of the election will have a large impact on The Airstream Club's management going forward. It is hoped that all members vote, regardless of which way.

The Airstream Club has begun educating its members on the vote. You may have seen recent emails about it. Some of that information is reprinted here, in case you missed it:

WHO IS VOTING AND WHEN?

Each of our 104 local clubs will send a Delegate to carry its members' votes in favor/not in favor of motions that our International Board of Trustees (IBT) approved to pass along for an all-member vote at the Delegates Meeting.

Q: Who is your delegate?

A: Usually, this is your local club president and in the case your president cannot attend rally, an alternate representative should be sent. If your club needs help identifying a delegate, contact your region president.

Q: How does your delegate decide how many votes "yes" and how many votes "no"?

A: Gather by the campfire and talk to your club officers NOW to gain/confirm understanding of how your local club gathers its votes between now and July 27. **[Ed note: NorCal will have a digital election via email between June 1 -15.]**

Q: I'm a member at large, so how do I vote?

A: Members at large will be provided a separate set of instructions on how to vote: please stay tuned and informed.

WHAT ARE WE VOTING ON?

At the Mid-Winter IBT [International Board of Trustees] Meeting, two motions were approved to be passed along to membership for an all-member vote. They are:

Constitutional Amendment #1 has to do with deleting the Delegates Meeting from our club constitution.

AIRSTREAM ENVISIONING THE FUTURE



In January 2022, Airstream unveiled the 22 ft "All-Electric eStream Concept: The Future of Sustainable, Electrified Adventures." This is only a concept trailer at the moment - built by Airstream in conjunction with its parent company Thor, who recently joined forces with ZF Friedrichshafen AG, a vehicle technology company based in Germany, to engage in joint development of a high-voltage electric drive system for towable recreational vehicles.

The concept trailer has 80 kWhrs of power stored in its battery bank, allowing the eStream "to provide more than 30 times the power of the lithium batteries that are included with many Airstream models today," according to Airstream. It has dual drive assist motors integrated with the axle and reduced hitch weight that Airstream hopes will end the need for distribution hitches, plus it is 20% more aero dynamic. This allows owners to be able to operate the Airstream via remote control - either hitching up or moving into a campsite. "With remote control ability and 360-degree maneuverability, for the first time Airstream owners can envision a world where they never have to back into a campsite again" states Airstream.
