Confessions of an Airstream Newbie

Having survived my first year as a new Airstreamer, I'm feeling less like a dumb-dumb and more like I've successfully run the gauntlet with a lot of help from my friends. I'd like to share with you a few lessons learned the hard way, either to demonstrate that everyone makes mistakes or, possibly, to help you avoid learning the same lessons the same way:

- Get a pair of leather gloves to take the cover off the gray and black tank drain. If your hands aren't strong enough, a flat-end tool and a rubber mallet work well to loosen it.
- Check and double-check that the hose to black tank connection is secure before you open the black tank at the dump.
- If you do not have shore power, only run your furnace for a few minutes in the morning or evening to take the chill off. Under no circumstances leave it on all night.
- Check and double-check that you have a trailer key in your hand or on a stretchy band on your wrist before you turn the inside lock and close the door. Keep an extra trailer key in your truck.
- If your friends at WISC-UP offer a backing up session, take it. Practice, practice, practice.
- Use the arrival and departure checklists in your Newbies Guide to Airstreaming like an airplane pilot: check them every single time you arrive and depart.
- Count the number of connections between your trailer and truck, then count them every single time you hitch up.
- Check and double-check that your refrigerator and bathroom door are secure before you start driving.
- When backing your truck to connect with your hitch, engage the parking brake before you take your foot off the brake pedal, so the truck doesn't roll a few inches. Remember to disengage it before you move the truck again.
- Always ask for advice and help when you need it – there are a lot of nice folks out there!

Repairs, Restorations & Cool Airstream Things

Airstream Electrical Upgrades

For those of us who use our Airstreams for boondocking, meaning camping with no hookups, the factory supplied battery capacity is inadequate, especially in newer models that use compressor fridges. Many folks are wondering how to improve their boondocking capability. Unless air conditioning is a must, two methods have the potential to eliminate dependence on electrical hookups almost entirely, especially when they are combined.

The first is to upgrade the battery capacity, and the second is to add or upgrade the charging capability.

Battery Capacity

When I talk about battery capacity, I mean the amount of electrical power that your coach can store. Storage is in the form of one or more batteries. From the factory, depending on the year and size of your coach, these two batteries are typically 12 volts, are stored outside the living space (usually on the tongue of a trailer), and have a typical storage capacity of about 80 Amp/hours (abbreviated as Ah) or less per battery. This capacity rating is the total number of amps the battery can deliver over a 20-hour period.

How much battery capacity you need is completely dependent on how many days you wish to be able to boondock and how much electricity you use, so the first step in determining your required capacity is to estimate your daily usage. This may be hard to do, and some folks decide to eliminate this step and figure out what fits their budget instead.

Battery capacity can be upgraded by installing larger batteries, by switching to batteries which use a different chemistry (e.g., lead-acid vs. lithium iron phosphate), or by doing both.

Charging Capability

Charging is how the battery capacity is restored. And while charging can be done using an engine-driven generator or windmill, this article will focus on solar charging. There are two major components to a solar charging system – solar or photo voltaic (PV) panels, which come in many sizes and capacities, and solar charge controllers - which take the electricity generated by the panels, monitor the battery state of charge, and restore the battery capacity based on the battery chemistry and state of charge.

How much charging capability you need is based on your battery capacity, how long you wish to boondock, and how much electricity you use on a daily basis. Charging really extends your boondocking capability and reduces the battery capacity you need. Again, some folks eliminate this estimation and calculation exercise and figure out what fits their budget instead.

Solar charging capacity can be upgraded by adding or upgrading solar panels, which can be either permanently installed on the roof of your coach and/or set up temporarily on the ground, or by upgrading the solar charge controller to a more efficient model, or by doing both.

Other Electrical Components

Several other components are included in the electrical systems that Airstream installs at the factory, and some of them may also require upgrades when you decide to upgrade your Airstream's battery capacity or charging capability. Of primary interest are the:

- Converter, which takes shore power (what you plug into at an electrical camp site, using a generator, or at home 120 volts AC) and converts it to 12 volts DC to supply the 12v systems. It also passes 120 volts AC to the standard electrical outlets in your coach and usually includes a 12-volt battery charger. The battery charger may or may not include the appropriate charge profile for the battery chemistry you intend to use.
- Inverter, which takes battery power and inverts it from 12 volts DC to 120 volts AC. You may or may not have an inverter in your system, and you may or may not want to have one. They consume a LOT of battery power, even if you are not using the AC outlets or appliances they supply. Most have an easily accessible switch to turn them on when you need AC power and off when you don't. They also come in a wide range of capacities (measured in watts) and costs; from units barely able to charge your phone to units capable of running a rooftop air conditioner.
- Wiring, which connects all the other components. There are many wire gauges or thicknesses available, and the ones that Airstream installed may not be sufficient to handle the battery capacity or electrical use you are planning, especially if you add or upgrade an inverter. I also include components like bus bars, circuit breakers, switches, fuses, shunts, and connectors like ring terminals as wiring.
