Sunday the VAC had their open house. It's amazing how some of those trailers are so old and yet they look better than when they were new. We had a little gathering at our trailer for the Central Penn members on Sunday night. It was nice we could all get together and share our stories of our trip up north. That evening we saw the *Alumination* documentary screening, that was very well done, I recommend watching this, if you haven't already. They had a nice crowd for the 70's dance that evening, I decided to keep the floor open for those with more experienced dancing shoes. We attended many seminars throughout the week, such as Historian Joe Peplinski's *Airstream 1931-1941*, Instant Pot Cooking, and *Airstream* by Justin Humphreys; browsed the photo showcase and the publications showcase. I must say, we have ourselves a wonderful newsletter editor, our newsletter really stood out from the others and is excellent, thank you Margaret Saylor, she does such a wonderful job! The newsletters were not judged this year, but if they were, I think we stood a good chance at #1. Some of the other seminars we attended were Pee Wee Schwamborn on *Airstream* & Helen Schwamborn, again a great presentation, I learned how much of an impact Helen was on *Airstream*, especially WBCCI! We saw the presentation done by Samantha Martin on the *Airstream Heritage Center* at Jackson Center. Beth & I can't wait to make the trip up to see that, it seems like it is nice with

a lot of displays and well-organized information. She didn't share everything as she wanted to keep some things a surprise for those that visit. Maybe a rally to tour the factory and Heritage Center could be an idea for the future.

Since we were so close to New Hampshire, we took an afternoon/evening and visited with some of my family that lives in Gilford, New Hampshire. When we returned to the fairgrounds, we stopped in at the reception held by Libby & Brad Trostle-Streaming Airheads. We made it just in time, as we were entered into the raffle and we both won a prize, whoo-hoo! Beth attended the Derby Tea event with Audrey, she said it was very hot, and yes, they served hot tea. She and Audrey were both hoping they would have switched to Long Island iced teas, but the pastries made up for it.

I attended the delegates meeting and out of a total 88 members, we had 40 that voted. Amendment #1 passed with a 77% yes vote. Amendment #2 passed with a 71% yes vote. Amendment #1 deals with the delegates meetings and how constitutional changes are made. The new system will allow all members to be involved with the discussions. Members will now receive an individual ballot for any constitutional amendment. Amendment #2 deals with the structure of the administrative branch of the club. This allows members to serve on the council and not necessarily commit five-plus years. I was "warned" that the meeting could be long, as some of the issues were controversial or at least could cause long discussions. Surprisingly the meeting was over at 10:45 am, I was happy with that.

We made the trip to Mt. Washington to do the auto road tour. On the way there we made a detour and went to the Fisherman's Market in Raymond to try lobster rolls. I gave lobster a second try, and still prefer crab; we chose this location recommended by the Luv Subbin' couple who did a lobster roll rating. Beth enjoyed it, and they had a fish market connected. did the van tour up the auto road on Mt. Washington. My truck is too wide to go up due to their regulations. It was a cloudy day, which we learned is typical on the mountain, so not much of a view looking out from the top. She reminded everyone about the importance of marking your trailer with personalized items so it can be easily identified if gone "missing", such as the BRN or even something small on the rear bumper that can easily identify your trailer or even having your trailer auto etched. We both also attended a seminar by Tye Mott on Cleaning the Interior of your Airstream, excellent with a lot of ideas and recommendations, such as using dryer sheets to keep mice out while winter storing or using a pumice stone to remove dog hair and using a cloth diaper and Windex to clean aluminum inside walls.

We ended the week with the closing ceremony & installation of officer's program. It was a nice program to end the week and I have to say, the band was awesome, with only a few days of practice and playing together, they put it together and sounded like they have been practicing for months. After the closing ceremony, we were both wide awake. So, we changed our plans and packed up, used the dump station, and headed to LL Bean in Freeport. ## News from the Region 2 President

It's been a busy week or so - last weekend, I joined Al-Mon-O for a rally at Laurel Hill State Park near Somerset, Pennsylvania, then this weekend we're at Gifford Pinchot [PA] State Park to join the Watchung Club for a rally.

I had written last month's notes before the end of the International Rally in Fryeburg, Maine, so I just want to mention that the rest of the rally was great as well. Erica and I are hatching a plan to get to the 2023 International rally in Rock Springs, WY by traveling on the weekends and working from the camper during the week. I've talked to quite a few region 2 members who are planning to go to that rally, so I think we'll have a good turnout.

The IBT has been busy. First, a new intra-club has been formed, for LGBTQ+ members and supporters, called Pride Streamers. I don't have a link for more information yet, but I'm sure they'll have something in an upcoming Blue Beret, as well as on the [airstreamclub.org](http://airstreamclub.org) website.

We also passed a motion that creates "interest groups" - think of them as Intra-clubs, but without the overhead required for the intra-clubs. My example of this is my interest in cycling - R2 Treasurer Will Kushto already runs bicycle excursions at International Rallies, but maybe a cycling interest group would be able to host rallies that are focused on cycling events. There's no need for extra dues, a treasury, and all of the complications that come with those things.

The other IBT motions lately have been related to the constitutional changes approved by the delegates at the Fryeburg rally. These changes were passed with overwhelming support (70% or more) at the delegates meeting. The new Executive Council setup will take effect next year, while the delegates meeting has already been abolished: In the future, we will vote on constitutional changes directly.

Before I close, I want to remind everyone that the 2023 Region 2 Rally is in Niagara Falls, Ontario, June 2-6. We don't have registration available yet, but mark your calendars!

**About Libby:**

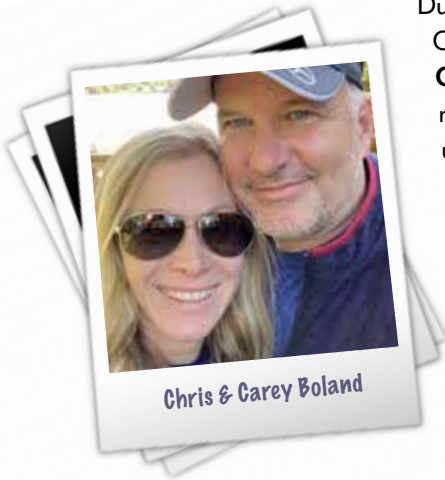

# Visiting the Airstream Heritage Center

During a service appointment at Jackson Center, Ohio, Chris and I decided to tour the new **Airstream Heritage Center**. It was a great experience and we learned much more than expected. The Heritage Center really allows us to reflect on the creation and history of Airstream trailers, the club, and the caravans that took place. It connects you on a personal level with Wally, Helen, and others you may or may not know about. With vintage Airstreams, artifacts, historical timelines, and videos to watch, there is truly something for everyone to learn about and enjoy. We had the opportunity to meet and speak with the Heritage Center curator, **Samantha Martin** (at right), and I was able to ask her some questions.

## What is your role in the Heritage Center and within Airstream?

"I'm the company historian. Within that I manage the corporate archives and then I serve as the curator for the Heritage Center. So my role is to collect and preserve stories and work with a team on how we are going to share and display those stories. I started in August of 2017 with Airstream and really we started on the Heritage Center in 2018 planning, designing."

## Who's idea was it to open a Heritage Center?

"It's been in the work for decades now. The company has such a long legacy and a rich history that there were several voices pushing over the years that we needed to have a space to tell that history. For many years we had a collection of vintage Airstreams, but they were on display outside so they were exposed to the elements in front of the service center, so there was this push to get them in a building, to get them protected and then that expanded into this idea that we could tell the company history, the club history, the caravan history, and so many other stories in that building. One of the biggest voices to push for this project was our chief marketing officer, Mollie Hansen. She was really passionate that those Airstreams needed to be inside. This was her dream and when it came to be that we were going to build a new travel trailer facility, they were able to have some space within that building that was able to be devoted to museum space."

## When did you start construction of this?

"We broke ground in 2018 for the new travel trailer facility which houses the Heritage Center. All the silver bullet trailers are manufactured here now except for Basecamp. The motorized units are all built in the old factory which was built in the 1970s."

## How much did it cost to build the Heritage Center?

"Great question, but honestly, we are still totaling up those figures so I don't have a definite number for you."





**Are there any Airstreams in the Heritage Center that are new to your collection? Any that we would not have seen outside by the service center before?**

“When we started talking about the Heritage Center, we kind of put out a call for vintage Airstreams, artifacts, photographs, stories, and people really rallied together so we have a couple of acquisitions that are new to us that are super exciting. Wally’s white Airstream we did not have, we have a 1948 Wee Wind named Ruby that’s new as well as a 1963 Tradewind in there with big red numbers #692 that was donated to us recently by the Golden Family that was used on the Around the World Caravan.”

**What is your favorite part of the Heritage Center?**

“Great question. My background is in archives and museum studies so I love artifacts. We have so many great pieces like our telegram from Wally to Helen, Wally’s passport, gosh just all these pieces of incredible history. Other than that the stories that people shared with us. We did a lot of interviews and they are on the video kiosks in there and that is a really special piece of it for me too.”

**What do you think we should tell our fellow Airstream Club members about coming to see the Heritage Center?**

“There are some vintage Airstreams here that you can see that are one of a kind, like Wally’s. We have all of this great video content on film like from the caravans , etc. There are things here that you can’t see anywhere else.”

You can visit the Heritage Center Monday through Friday 9am - 4pm, excluding holidays. The Airstream Supply Store is housed in the same building so your can get some souvenirs to take home with you as well.

# Airstreams in Alaska

Back in 2015, Bill was retired and I was still working. He went to the Hershey RV show just for something to do. He called me at work and said something like, "You should see these Airstreams". My reply was, "Do they still make them"? We both grew up tent camping, honeymooned to Montreal in my parents' truck camper, and had a pop-up while our kids were young. We also remembered the Airstream rallies in Hershey in the 60's. Camping wasn't in our retirement plans and I went with Bill to Colonial Airstream on a whim, never expecting to buy anything. We signed on the dotted line that November day and have been all over the USA and Canada during the last seven camping years. It was one of our best purchases.

The picture on this issue's cover was taken on the Top of the World Highway in 2018, when we were on the WBCCI North to Alaska caravan. When one goes on a caravan, there is usually a parking team that leaves earlier than the rest of the gang. On this particular leg of the trip, there were five trailers that left before the other 30 and we spent the night boondocking about 1/2 mile before the USA border so that we could cross the border when they opened in the morning. Being in the far north, the sun didn't set until almost midnight and coincidentally there was a full moon that night. It was an unbelievably beautiful experience. When driving on this highway (which is actually a narrow, two-lane gravel/dirt road but, being Alaska, they call it a highway), you do feel like you are on top of the world and there is nothing but mountains in the distance and tundra around you. You can see for miles and miles. As the sun set and the moon rose simultaneously, we watched nearby caribou herds grazing.

### How long are caravans?

Over the past few years, we have been introducing shorter caravans of 9-10 days for members with limited time flexibility. The longest caravans will be over two months and can have significant travel to the rendezvous point and from the final stop.

### What kind of caravans are there?

Local Club, Regions, and the International Club all sponsor caravans. Local Club Caravans tend to be shorter in length and may be limited to local areas. Region Caravans often travel within the limits of an individual Region since the leaders may have intimate knowledge of that area, or from the region to an International Rally. National Caravans that travel throughout the US and Canada tend to be extensive and repeated year after year if popularity demands it.

There is no better way to meet people, make new friends, and see the country than going on a Caravan. By all means, get on a Caravan and find out what Airstream Club Fun, Friendship, and Adventure is all about.

### Where can I find out more about Caravans?

### Who can go on a Caravan?

Any member of the Airstream Club International can go on a Club caravan. 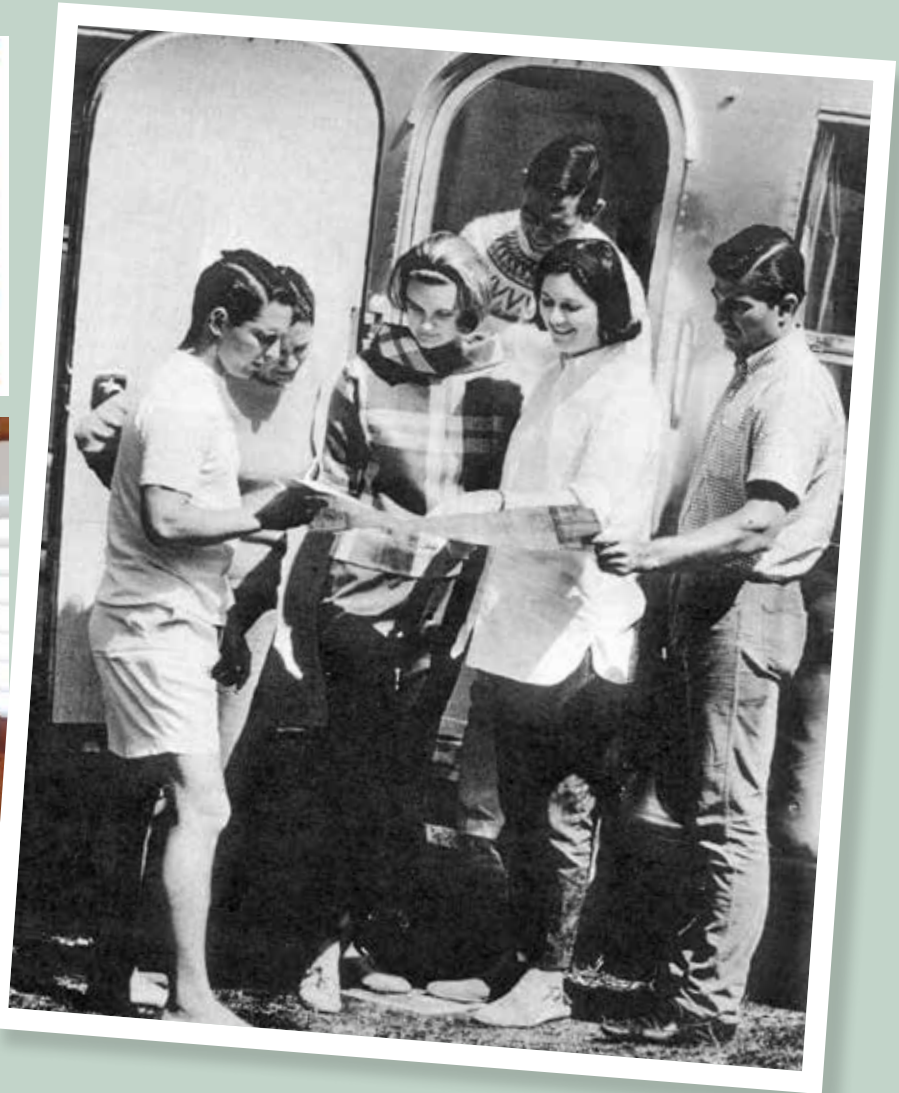

## Tire pressures

**NEVER ENOUGH** How many of you have purchased safety equipment for your vehicle and or Airstream and felt more relaxed? I have. We have a truck with built in factory tire pressure monitors. We purchased a TST Tire Monitor System. We have tire monitors on top of tire monitors. We can tell tire pressure, tire temperature, which tire, all eight tires are "road force balanced", all eight wheels have "CentraMatic" wheel balancers, on all tires and wheels on our tow vehicle and Airstream. We even have a therapist come to our driveway to make sure our tires and wheels have no unresolved issues before each trip.

**IS IT ENOUGH?** Ever since we purchased our truck in 2018, there has always been a slight shudder that numerous trips back to the auto dealership couldn't solve. Rebalancing, rotations, checking to make sure the tires were in factory spec, nothing could be found.

Fast forward four years and 37,000 miles. While traveling east on the PA Turnpike at the posted speed limit of 70 miles per hour, in the right lane, enjoying a beautiful sunny day, we heard a loud groan correlat-

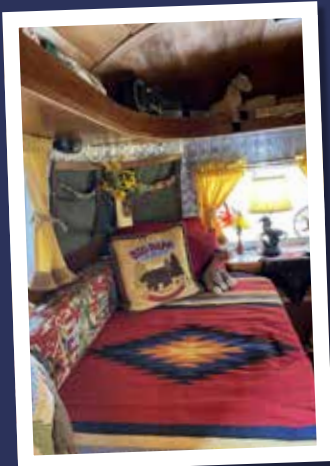
