It is hard to believe the summer is over and fall has begun, I am back in front of students at school and fairs around the area are in full swing. COCAC has four more events planned for 2022 – Rallies in Wales, MA, Townsend, VT, a rendezvous in Elizaville, NY, and in December a holiday party in Wilton, CT.

For most of August, 12 Charter Oakians along with 13 members representing 6 other clubs as far away as California travelled the Canadian Maritimes. The Nor' East to Nova Scotia Caravan left Fryeburg, Maine, on July 31st and arrived at Campobello Island, New Brunswick, Canada. Campobello was the summer home and summer White House for Franklin and Eleanor Roosevelt and is the only International Federal Park managed by both the Canadian and US governments. We experienced an afternoon tea where two research rangers highlighted Eleanor Roosevelt's life and accomplishments. The tea was delicious along with homemade ginger snap cookies.

The waters surrounding the island have tides and currents that are much different than those we see here in Connecticut. Many of our participants saw whales just offshore from the docks. There are two light houses on the island one that can only be reached at low tide with a slippery slimy trek across the sea floor.

To attract younger buyers, a new version of the 1950s Safari travel trailer was introduced. With a cost 20 percent less than its contemporaries, it was easier to afford while maintaining the quality Airstream demands. And because it weighed 20 percent less than a traditional trailer, it could be towed by lighter vehicles. It was a hit, and quickly about half the Airstreams being sold were Safaris.

Our group toured the reconstructed Fortress of Louisbourg led by a docent that described the history and living conditions of the fort. Side excursions for many included the Miners Museum and Marconi History Site. The last evening here we enjoyed an evening of live Gallic music at the Louisbourg Playhouse.

The group then headed west a few hours to Bedeck NS on Cape Breton Island. As a group we visited the Alexander Graham Bell Museum and had a private 5 course lobster dinner at the Lobster Galley restaurant. Some ventured off to drive and enjoy the almost 200 mile coastal Cabot Trail with it's vistas and coastal communities around northern Nova Scotia. The community of Bedeck was filled with eateries and shops.

The harbormaster, the night before at his home, had prepared a plate for each of us with stuffed squid, fried squid, dried squid and crab, nicely wrapped by his wife. Newfoundland joined the Canadian Confederation in 1949. Canada found it wasn't practical to provide services to some of the remote islands. They offered those residents allowances to move on to the mainland. Many accepted and towed their homes over with fishing boats. We met a few people who live in homes their parents had brought over. We were told they were floated on barrels then pulled into place rolling on logs with horses. People we have spoken with, say very few homes were lost. Neighbors all pitched in to help. D&K

Region One News

WOW! That was a wonderful International Rally! And to have it in our backyard...even better!

I was proud to see so many volunteers from each of our Region 1 clubs making this rally the success that it was.

Some of you might ask, "What makes up Region 1?" Well, it is all the Airstream clubs found in the New England states, Quebec and the Canadian Maritimes. Every two years we change our region leadership starting at the conclusion of the International Rally. At this time, I would like to welcome Eddie Carll to our Region 1 team as 2nd Vice President. Also, RJ Dominic became your 1st Vice President and I became your president. Our thanks go out to Doug Hart for the 6 years of service he provided to our region.

For years we have had surveys that indicated that membership wanted to spend more time camping, learning and having fun at the International Rally and have fewer meetings regarding club governance. To that end, after a significant amount of planning, it has become a reality. Thanks to the many local club meetings, ACI website information, the Blue Beret, and our electronic balloting, the membership sent their presidents to the Delegates' Meeting at the International Rally to vote in these important constitutional changes.

The ACI club constitution was significantly changed this summer allowing for future constitutional changes to be done by electronic voting by all the members. In addition, the Executive Council (EC) for the International Board of Trustees (IBT) was established and will be fully implemented in 2023. The Executive Council will be our leadership core along with your Region Officers from that point on. All council positions will become a two-year term and it will be possible

to have up to three terms (six years) if the membership votes to renew the council person's service.

These changes, and previous adjustments prompted by the pandemic, now allow us to decouple the International Rally from the IBT meeting in future years. Effectively it will allow the IBT to be more responsive as it will meet virtually more often and at a lower cost. Without the fiscal year dictating the International Rally date, future International Rallies could potentially be scheduled in a different season of the year and possibly now in southern states.

At this time, considerable effort is now being put into strengthening the International Nominating Committee to obtain a broad selection of talented candidates for the 2023 Executive Council. Additionally, ACI Int. President, Eric McHenry and 1st VP, Per Hamnqvist, are establishing a more expansive National Event Rally program. They are setting the tone to implement long range plans into yearly expectations. We will also see our professional staff at HQ in Jackson Center being more involved in the operations of future International Rallies as well as membership on-boarding and retention. This is not to say that we are forgetting our volunteers. Volunteering is still the heart of our club. We will all benefit from the additional continuity that HQ can provide along with the expanded officer terms.

On my part, I'm hoping to bring you newsletters throughout the year. Hopefully this will improve communication between our club's leadership and our members so you can realize that your paid and volunteer leaders are working on your behalf to enrich the traditions and yet be progressive with the future of this wonderful Airstream club.

Airstream Heritage Center Opens

Being an Airstream history junkie, Kathy and I were delighted to be invited to participate in the opening of the Airstream Heritage Center. After a twenty-month delay, due to the pandemic, the anticipation was overwhelming.



The Grand Opening was preceded by an evening of star-studded celebrities from the Airstream community including International and administrative WBCCI officials as well as some of the country's most notable Airstream collectors, restorers and appraisers. They were joined by Airstream Inc. executives to honor the history of the Airstream brand. Included in the mix was a reunion of sorts of those who had participated in the legendary

1950's and 1960's caravans. Most notable of this group was Dale "Pee Wee" Schwamborn from the Capetown to Cairo Caravan. Four of the Smith family (Max Smith authored "Thank You Marco Polo") and caravan scout Christine Charles Ramos were all from the Around the World Caravan. The weekend event was a historical juggernaut with Airstream historians Joe Peplinski, Fred Caldwell and the museum curator, Samantha Martin leading seminars and hosting festivities.

The Heritage Center is extremely well done and was the centerpiece of the weekend. It's like having a piece of a Smithsonian museum in the little town of Jackson Center, Ohio. You are first greeted by a grand sign welcoming all to the "Mothership".



Then came the fabled 1938 "Grand Dad" twin axle Clipper; an awesome art deco beauty with its renown "bat eyes". The museum progresses as a timeline from the 1930's masonite "Airlite" through the post war "Liner" era to the historical caravans' era. Here you will see impeccable restorations of Wally Byam's white 1955 Cruiser used in his European Caravan and Wally's 1958 World Traveler that he used on the Capetown to Cairo Caravan. In this area of the museum you will

see the most traveled Airstream and a trailer that was part of the Around the World Caravan along with multiple displays/videos of those famous caravans.

An Argosy Minuet gives nod to the 1970's and an Airstream funeral coach highlights the 1980's.



This special weekend had an additional outdoor display lot of invited guests camping with their distinctive Airstreams. This open house display included additional trailers that were on those legendary caravans, a "Squarestream", a class "C" motorhome prototype along with a 1950's "Wally Bee" fiberglass prototype.



NASA's tie with Airstream is noted by a mockup of the Apollo program's "mobile quarantine facility" along with photos of the Airstream Astrovan and presently used Starliner van. The future is depicted using scale models shown through the collaboration of the Nissan-Airstream design team.

Though a bit less unique, we were proud to be invited to show a 1990's Airstream B190 camper van that had been purchased by Bard's parents'. These van campers were the predecessors of the Interstate and Atlas touring coaches of today.

No museum tour would be complete unless you ended up in the gift shop. Airstream is no exception with a plethora of Airstream branded swag including Billy Steer's book "Let's Just Go".

If this was not enough, we were among the first to be given a guided tour of the brand-new travel trailer factory. More on that experience in a future article. ~

Building Airstreams

- Every Airstream Travel Trailer has an average of 3,000 rivets in the walls, trim, and even some of the interior fixtures.
- At the Airstream plant in Jackson Center, Ohio, two-person riveting teams work in a delicate, coordinated dance. One person works on the outside of the aluminum shell, one on the inside. Then, one by one they move down the length of the drilled holes setting and hammering the rivets.
- The advent of pneumatic tools made riveting more efficient. Today's riveting process is done with special air-powered riveting guns that fire many times a second, hammering the rivet head into its final, mushroom shape.
- It takes 350 Hours on average to complete each Airstream travel trailer.
- There are 1,200 Square Feet of aluminum on average used in each Airstream.
- It takes as many as 1,200+ Airstream Associates to build Airstreams.



There are many different kinds of modern rivets. The rivets that attach the aluminum panels of an Airstream body together are called buck rivets, named after the "bucking" process that shapes the head.






