



Newsletter Editor Ramblings

As many of you know, Kay and I took a trip-of-a-lifetime bucket list item and went on the North to Alaska Caravan this year. Or very first caravan, with 28 other Airstreams. And we had a blast! We both highly recommend the caravan, but you do need to be a prepared for being in very remote areas with no cell service or wifi, and for some pretty rough roads. The scenery and vistas were well worth the trip and the repairs we have to make to our trailer.

I think we can credit the trip and rough roads to only a couple of repairs we need to make. One is our striker plate for the door broke. Not only ours, but there were three other 1972 trailers on the caravan, and all three ended up with broken striker plates. The temporary fix was to buy a household striker plate and attach it to the frame. A more permanent fix will happen this Fall or next Spring.

Another problem many people had was popped rivets. I think we only had 5 or 6 total pop the heads off, all inside our trailer. And 4 of them were on trim pieces. One of our travel companions




commented one evening that it was good day as they only popped 2 rivets! Come to find out, they had been popping 5 to 7 rivets each day when we had really rough roads to drive.

But, I don't want to scare anyone from making the trip! Just be prepared with a supply of rivets, more tools than you think you'll need, and if you're really paranoid like us, bring extra tires for both your trailer and truck. So, we had a mounted spare for the trailer, a mounted spare for the truck, and then an unmounted tire for each. Thought process was it would be easier to find a place to mount the tires on the rims if we needed to, rather than find a new trailer or truck tire in some the remote areas. Plus, there are always pretty good mechanics on this caravan, and they are more than happy to help when things broke.

Speaking of tires, there were a total of 3 flats on the entire trip. And we had two of them! The first one was actually not a tire leak, but the steel rim (wheel) developed a pinhole leak, which is almost never heard of on rim that's not rusty. And ours are not rusty. Fortunately, the campground in White Horse had a tire shop on site. We were very fortunate that they had a used rim to replace our bad rim so we had a mounted spare tire for the trailer again.

Our second flat occurred after the caravan was over. We picked up a screw on the rear tire on the starboard side (door side) of the trailer on our way to Banff. Learned something with this flat. I had bought a new tire repair kit before the trip (another paranoid planning thing). Only to learn that using it on a trailer tire is impossible (at least for me). I have used them on car tires in the past, but trying to push the plug through the 4 steel belts in a trailer tire is something I could not accomplish. So, we swapped it out for the spare and made it home ok with no other tire issues. When I brought the tire in to my local mechanic to get patched, he told me that the "off-the-shelf" patch kits you can buy at an auto parts store are not good for trailer tires because of the 4 or more steel belts. He has a much better tool that he uses, which he did not want to sell to me...

Here's the used rim we bought in White Horse. Lovely color scheme (red primer and white). But, it's actually very pretty since it got us home! It has since been replaced with a new black rim that matches the blue rim (or it will once we paint it blue).



The only other flat was the lone 34-foot (3 axel) trailer in our caravan. They picked up a screw in the sidewall of one of the center tires. So, that's not patchable. We were in Prince George then, so he bought a new tire at the local Canadian Tire store and had it mounted.

If you weren't at the Fall Rally, you missed seeing the Alaska, Yukon, and British Columbia dust and dirt that were all over the truck and our Airstream. The truck has since been washed, and Little Girl (Airstream) will get a bath in the next couple of days. Waiting for a warmer sunny afternoon to bathe her.
