
Ferry Tales II August 25-August 28

The Cherry Train took us around for an overview of the island's history and interesting places. First stop was Schoolhouse Beach, site of the first log schoolhouse on the island. The "beach" was made up of limestone stones that over thousands of years the water had polished to a smooth almost silk like finish. The guide said it is one of 5 such beaches in the world. Several of the guys showed off their rock skipping skills. We also stopped at the Stavkirke Church, a beautiful chapel patterned after an 1180 Borgund Stave Church in Norway. We got off the train again at the historic Washington Island Farm Museum, where Ed went horseback riding. We drove by the Fragrant Isle Lavender Farm, and also Nelsen's Hall, famous for its Bitters Club. Several of us went back later and joined that prestigious club. Jim and I took the boat to Rock Island to see the beautiful Thordarson Boathouse, and hiked up to the Pottawatomie Lighthouse. The boathouse was especially interesting. Built in 1923 by an immigrant from Iceland, the Viking Hall contains ornate oak furniture pieces carved with Norse mythic scenes. The boat house below was huge.

Soon to be outgoing President Chuck Zellermayer presented soon to be President Bree Moore-Lawrence the club flag, as she is not able to attend the official installation meeting. 

Repairs, Restorations & Cool Airstream Things

Replacing waste tank valves on 1994 Excella 25-ft

We were in the first leg of a 2-1/2 week trip with our Excella and having a great time. First shower day of the trip I decided to dump the tanks. Black tank drained as normal, but when I pulled the handle on the gray tank there was nothing – just silence. No whoosh, no sound of flowing water, nothing.

A brief inspection and I was able to determine that the extension handle was still connected to the valve itself, so that wasn't it. After a bit more pondering, it was clear that the rod inside the valve had come loose from the sliding gate itself. Uh oh!

Off to Walmart for a dish pan. Luckily we still had use of the black tank, so we used the dish pan to catch our gray water in the kitchen sink and flushed it. We had reservations in campgrounds for every stop on this trip, so we'd shower in the campground showers. Onward with the trip.

With the help of someone from Air Forums, I was able to determine the parts I needed and get them ordered from Out of Doors Mart. Two waste valves and two adapters were waiting for me when we got home. On to the repair. I also ordered a new termination adapter for where my sewer hose connects to dump the tanks.

As everyone knows, there is no access to the waste valves provided by Airstream on these trailers. After drilling an exploratory hole in the belly pan, I used an electric sheet metal nibbler from Harbor Freight to cut a hole 18" x 20". (Yay! Another excuse for a new power tool!) Now all the bits and pieces were right there ready for repair. (Continued)



Replacing Waste Tank Valves (Continued)

- 1) Remove the rubber union and separate the black tank elbow from the wye fitting
- 2) Remove the four screws holding each waste valve from its tank adapter
- 3) Gently work the pieces out, including the 3" extension tube
- 4) Remove the clamps holding the adapters to the tanks and gently work the adapters from the tank opening

My main concern during all this was to avoid damaging the tank openings in any way. There is caulking used between the adapters and the tank openings, so it's necessary to gently work things back and forth a while until the adapters can slide out. After they were out, I used an old knife to gently scrape all the old caulking from the tank openings.

The only parts I needed from the hardware store were a 90-degree street elbow, a long radius wye fitting, and a few feet of 3" pipe. I wanted to use the ABS pipe as was there from the factory for two reasons: 1) It's a little lighter than PVC, and 2) It is more resistant to cracking from vibration. I was also a little concerned that the PVC would result in a different size setup due to variations. (Cont.)



Replacing Waste Tank Valves (Continued)

Getting the ABS was not so simple though – apparently it's not up to code in many jurisdictions so not every store that sells PVC carries the ABS fittings and pipe. I had to drive from Waukesha up to Appleton to get the parts. Once I had them, all that was left to do was put things back together.

Installation was pretty straightforward. After the 3" pipes were glued to the wye fitting, I put a thin layer of Sikaflex on both the adapters and the inside of the tank openings, and then slide the adapters in place. I tightened the clamps loosely, just enough to hold the adapters in place. Next was to connect the gray tank valve to its adapter by loosely putting in the 4 screws, and then I slid the black tank's 90-degree elbow into the rubber coupler and joined it to the wye adapter. Then the black tank valve was screwed into the black tank adapter.

All that was left then was to get things lined up for proper flow and drainage and get all the fittings tightened up. I reinstalled the handle extensions to the valve rods and used a bit of caulking to seal the openings around where the 3" pipe exited the belly pan and then I put back the rubber weather seals around the handle extension rods.

To fasten the new cover on the access hole I cut, I used S-channel for three sides. This is the same stuff HVAC people used to build duct work, and it made it so the cover can be slid in place and only a few screws on the outside edge are necessary to secure it. Before closing up the new cover, I patched the foam insulation with some new ½" pink board to hopefully keep the tanks from catching cold.

All in all this was a project with only moderate difficulty. Other than the electric sheet metal nibbler only hand tools were used, and the whole thing was under \$200.
