





FEATURE TRAVEL ARTICLES

Jen and I have had a lot of opportunities to see our country this year. Most of it planned, like the International Rally, and some of it unplanned. One of those unplanned moments came somewhere between Maine and Texas when we decided to book Balloon Fiesta and see what all the fuss was about.

We headed out of Hillsboro and met up with David Brandon just north of Decatur to caravan together to our first stop – Amarillo, Texas. We found refuge at Oasis RV Resort, just west of the famous Cadillac Ranch off I-40. Oasis provided level, concrete sites with a fair amount of space between neighbors, nice bath and shower facilities, a pool (which we didn't use), and a dog park for the girls. This is a good stop if you are interested in not unhooking your rig but make sure you take food for the evening as it is a little outside of town if you plan to eat out.

Saturday, we left Amarillo and headed for Santa Fe, New Mexico! I was excited to finally visit this city I had heard so much about but never been to. With Jennifer working during the day, I had a lot of opportunity to explore city's Pueblo-style architecture, which blends seamlessly with the surrounding environment, with friends in tow. The Plaza in the historic district is filled exceptional restaurants and inviting shops where creativity and flair is on display. With an

elevation of nearly 7,200 feet above sea level, the weather proved perfect for enjoying several days and nights of open-air living and casual conversations under the awning.

One of the great things about Airstreaming is the people you meet. While on our Maine caravan from Texas, we met new friend Lori Ernst from the New Mexico Unit, BRN 09556. Lori has a beautiful home in Santa Fe complete with an amazing outdoor patio and bocci ball court. She invited us over for a memorable evening of friends, food, games, cigars, and fine spirits. Plus, we finally got to meet her incredibly cute and sweet pups, Chloe and Tuffy, who we had heard about in our previous travels together.



While in Santa Fe, Jennifer and Anna planned a little time for relaxation and pampering at Ten Thousand Waves. Both reported an exceptional experience at this Japanese-inspired sanctuary and came back glowing and relaxed.



After our time in Santa Fe, we headed to Albuquerque, New Mexico and stayed

the night at High Desert RV Park. This was another nice park with level sites, nice facilities and enough room between you and your neighbor to not feel squished. In preparation for the long weekend ahead, we filled our fresh water, emptied our black and gray tanks, and turned in early. While we were originally slated to stay at the Indian Pueblo Cultural Center, David Blackmon and I had talked to a random stranger who gave us the

bead on another place that was closer and not full for about the same price. We ended up making reservations there and were not only less than a 10-minute walk to the gates of the Balloon Fiesta but could see all the activities happening down on the field from our location!





The first day of the Fiesta, we went down to the field and stood among the crews getting

ready for launch. The energy of the teams as they laid out the balloon, checked everything and talked about the plan was calm and collected. It wasn't until the Zebra (flight coordinator) came over and said they were next that the vibe changed, and excitement sizzled in the air! Watching the well-choreographed dance of attaching the basket, filling the balloon, introducing hot air, clearing the space of spectators, and the launch was nothing short of spectacular! Among the "oohs and aahs" were collective cheers of excitement as we watched the balloon occupants wave goodbye to those on the ground.

Next, we moved away from between the balloon aisles and watched the scene from a short distance but still on the field. From this vantage point you could see all of the balloons filling at close intervals and taking off at random from what felt like tightly packed rows. The vibes in the crowd of a couple hundred

thousand people were completely different than being among the balloons. It was fun to listen to the conversations going on around, like parents point out different balloons to their kids. There was still excitement, but at a lower level.

The next day we watched the balloons take off from where we were parked. The vantage point was very good as we were on a hill and that allowed us to see a good portion of the field. Balloonists speak of flying "in a box" where they catch the airstream going horizontally for a period, use hot air to ascend to the next airstream going back the other direction and then release the hot air to descend down to the Rio Grande and "kiss the water" and then catch the initial airstream to land back on the field. From our location we could clearly see the box formation and marvel at the expertise of the balloon pilots. The vibes from this location were calm and friendly with many small conversations amongst the group that had gathered.

The Balloon Fiesta this year had several weather-related cancellations, and we were saddened to not have an opportunity see the nighttime glow. Outside of that, we could not have asked for a better time or better company for our first experience.





From Albuquerque we headed to Kanab, Utah and spent a week enjoying the vast dark night skies and beautiful red rocks and mesas at Dark Sky Campground. I had

an opportunity to travel into Zion for a day with David and Sierra and explore Friends Animal Sanctuary with Jen and Sierra. The girls and I got a lot of hikes in, and it was a great place to decompress surrounded by the most beautiful elements of nature.

This trip will forever be in my memory, and I would highly recommend you plan for Balloon Fiesta as part of your adventures.



AIRSTREAM AT THE PRICE

September 29th through October 2nd, 2022, saw a sporadically assembled group of Airstreamers all in pursuit of one common goal: to learn the history and story behind another American Design Icon. Wally Byam is synonymous with aerodynamic trailers, allowing the owners of the vehicles to enjoy the adventures of travel in high style while appreciating the engineering skill behind the design. We all undertake to live the Airstream Life to our fullest, living in and travelling with our homes that personify our values.

Frank Lloyd Wright is commonly associated with Prairie-style architecture, where the lines of the home resembled the lines of the horizon, colors were muted hues found mostly in nature, and materials were wood and stone. An "organic" architect, Wright often chose themes and ideas from nature. The "trunk" of the Price Tower is made of four elevator shafts and their structural walls. The trunk extends deep panels and sun louvers, the "leaves" of the tree, whose color was aided by chemical applications rather than due to the effects of nature upon the material. The building also tapers upward like a tree with the top three floors progressively becoming narrower and the penthouse floor only a single suite of rooms¹ underground like a "tap root" and provides the strong support for the upper floors, whose tapering cantilevered concrete floor slabs are like "branches." The exterior of the Price Tower is clad in copper



Wright also wished to visually connect the inside of a building with the landscape outside by using similar materials on both the interior and exterior, such as the copper panels, concrete, and aluminum trim. Large windows drew the eye outside toward the view of the Oklahoma prairie, with Wright preferring not to have draperies or artwork on the walls to distract one's eye from experiencing the beauty.²

Frank Lloyd Wright was interested in the ways in which a society worked and felt that architecture could both transform and improve the landscape while helping create a more functional society. Wally Byam was interested in encouraging Good Will and Diplomacy, as well as fostering a sense of adventure by providing a means of travel allowing people go out and pursue what they wanted to see. These two icons of American history impacted popular culture during their lives by introducing new approaches to issues of their time; and their unique and simple concepts have caused their products and ideals to endure through time and become known facets of American culture. Guest speakers included the curator of the Historical center and Pee Wee Schwamborn.

Rally attendees were given tours of the Tower, were invited to participate in a local Fun Run/Walk to raise money for mammograms, enjoyed Happy Hours in the shadow of the Tower, and frequented the local businesses of Bartlesville, OK for three days of fun, learning, and social time.

Hordes Creek Rally- Coleman, TX

Our October campout was at Hordes Creek Lake COE—a favorite campground for those who know about it. Although the lake right now is low and one half of the campground closes October 1, it is a place of beautiful sunsets and moonrises. Just 8 miles away you can take a step back to mid-century Texas in the little town of Coleman (population less than 4,000). Mike and Betty Richards (from the Texas Highland Lakes Airstream Club) joined us for the rally—Betty spent part of her childhood around here and still has family living here. In fact, her cousin Bonnie is a good part of the reason downtown Coleman hasn't gone the way of many a small Texas town. About seven years ago, Bonnie approached the city with a vision for attracting



merchants and visitors. They allowed her to gather a group of volunteers who painted each building on Commerce Street a different color, also including several beautiful murals. They papered up the windows of any empty stores, and Bonnie opened a mid-century furniture store called "Bonneville." Owl Drug, still an operating drug store and soda fountain, also became a gift store and anchors the street on one end while Grammar's, known for being the only place in town to buy ladies clothing, closes your downtown stroll on the other end of the street. Soon a winery moved in (Rancho Lomo), followed by a pizzeria (Rancho Pizzeria), and most recently a steak house (The Black Cur). Word spread in no time that a group of campers were in town

and the hospitality was wonderful. They proudly told us that folks drive all the way to Coleman from Abilene and other larger cities just to eat at one of these two restaurants. Along with Bonnie's story about revitalizing Coleman, the woman behind the 1920's cash register at Grammar's told us that she started working in the store when she was a junior at Coleman High School. She has worked there for 53 years, buying the store in 2004. We all left a little money behind but took some great memories back home with us. Campouts and rallies are not just about camping; they are about exploring these little worlds in our big state and, for just a day or two, pausing busy lives to make new friends and enjoy new experiences. - Anna Brandon

RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Time for Dutch oven Cook off! Here is one idea.

DUTCH OVEN CORNBREAD WITH GREEN CHILES

SERVINGS: 6 SLICES

This Dutch oven cornbread is loaded with green chiles and cheese for extra flavor!

INGREDIENTS

- 1 cup milk
- 1 egg
- 2 tablespoons honey
- 1 cup cornmeal
- 1/2 cup flour
- 1 tablespoon baking powder
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 (4 oz) can green chiles drained
- 1/4 cup shredded cheddar cheese
- 2 tablespoons butter

INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. Light 24 charcoal briguettes or start a campfire if you want to use wood embers.
- 2. In a mixing bowl, beat the milk, egg, and honey together. Add the dry ingredients (cornmeal, flour, baking powder, and salt) and stir until combined.
- 3. Move 7 of the charcoals or embers into a ring and place the Dutch oven on top. Once hot, add the butter to melt. After the butter has melted, pour in the cornmeal batter. Sprinkle the green chiles and cheese over the top.
- 4. Cover the Dutch oven and place the remaining 17 charcoals or embers on top of the lid to create an oven heat of about 425 degrees. Cook for about 20 minutes, until the middle of the cornbread has cooked through, and the top is beginning to brown.
- 5. Carefully remove from the heat, serve & enjoy!
