2023 Region 4 Rally: Registration is now open. Go to the Region 4 section to read about things you can do in Kalamazoo County and some of the things we are planning for the Rally. During our Opryland visit, we heard a group called the Ten Year Town Band. They played during our included breakfast buffet. These three guys had very tight harmonies, which were beautiful. One of the groups we will listen to during the Region 4 Rally is the Mall City Harmonizers. The Mall City Harmonizers is a male a cappella barbershop chorus and quartets, and this group is celebrating its 82nd Anniversary in 2023. By the way, one of Kalamazoo's nicknames is Mall City. It is called Mall City because they were the first city in the U.S. to permanently close off a downtown street to make a pedestrian walkway. The walkway opened in 1959, and the pedestrian mall became the first of several hundred built in the United States. The bold effort was to make a downtown street car-free to spur urban vitality and defend against suburbanization.

Community Service: Jamie Kingseed is planning a service project that will move to different locations in the Region each year. Please read more about it in his article and plan to participate.

Swiss Festival National Rally: As you know, this year was the first time Region 4 sponsored this national rally. I want to tell you something about the strategy Fred and I have envisioned regarding running the Rally in the future, hoping it lives on for another sixty years. We want to grow a cadre of people who know and understand the different functions of the Rally. This way, if a person cannot work the rally for one year for whatever reason, there are people who can provide backup to fill in the vacancy. I am sad to report that Region 4 lost two Local Clubs this year. Mid-Eastern Michigan Unit and Mohican Valley Ohio Airstream Club. Both dissolved this fall. Each cited that they needed more volunteers to field the required offices stated in their constitution and bylaws.



Volunteering is the lifeblood of WBCCI, and volunteering has fallen off over the past several years. As you read the articles from your Region Vice Presidents in this edition of the *Region 4 Newsletter*, you will find that independently, each has written about volunteering.

What can you do? Run for office at all levels of the Club. Do your best to volunteer to support and help those in office. Volunteer to run a rally or cohost with another person/couple. It is fun! Contribute articles and topic suggestions for newsletters or the *Blue Beret* at all levels of the Club.

As the members who wish to remain active from the Mid-Eastern Michigan Unit or Mohican Valley Ohio Airstream Club look for a new WBCCI home, please make them feel welcome if they contact you or come to one of your rallies or dinners.

When I became Region 4 President, I created the slogan "Region 4 – The place where new best friends meet!" There were various reasons for this slogan—one knowing that it would be hard to park friends together at the on-street rally in Wooster. However, Dennis Kiehl and his parking crew did an excellent job of doing this.

Another reason for this slogan is that it is easy to "hang" with your friends and not reach out to other WBCCI members at a gathering. Data from a special task force looking at onboarding members into WBCCI has Region 4 as a very close second with the highest average membership longevity. Region 8 has 8.1 average years in the Club, and Region 4 has 8.0 average years in the Club. Region 4 is in the bottom 25% regarding the total number of memberships. You can equate memberships with Big Red Numbers (BRNs), and members refer to individuals. On average, the International Club is growing at the rate of around 50 members per week.

I keep reminding everyone in the IBT meeting that WBCCI is a Member Lead, HQ Supported, and Executive Council/Committee Measured Club.

However you celebrate this holiday season, I wish you and yours joy and blessings, and I look forward to seeing you down the road,

Pet Policy for the Region 4 Rally

The Kalamazoo Expo Center does not allow pets in their buildings. The following policy was modified from the suggested WBCCI Pet Policy. See the Tips and Tricks section for more information about this topic.

"All pets must be on 6-foot, non-retractable leashes when outside the Airstream. Please always check collars and leashes to ensure they fit correctly and are working properly. Owners may use a size-appropriate pet containment system at the campsite. Except for working service animals, pets are not permitted in the buildings or during a meal in outside dining/food preparation areas. Well-mannered dogs are welcome to play and exercise in designated dog parks. Always clean up after your pet. And make sure your pet has an ID tag."

We need to be aware that not all WBCCI members regard pets as members with free rein.

Series on Kalamazoo and the Surrounding Area

Part II: What to See and Do in Kalamazoo County, Michigan

"The Trails, The Parks, and So Much More!"

The Trails

According to the website, AllTrails, there are 16 trails in Kalamazoo County designed for hiking, biking, trail running, or just exploring the area. All are very scenic in all seasons, and many are pet-friendly. A few of the more popular trails include the Asylum Lake Trail, the Kalamazoo Valley River Trail Loop, the Kal-Haven Trail, and the Portage Creek Bicentennial Trail.



One of the easiest trails in the county's southwest corner is the Asylum Lake Trail. This 2.9-loop trail is rated as "easy" and can be completed in approximately an hour. Birding, fishing, and hiking are popular on and around this trail. Dogs are welcome but must be leashed. (<u>https://wmich.edu/asylumlake</u>)

Another popular trail is the Kalamazoo Valley River Trail Loop, a 4.5-mile loop trail near Nazareth, Michigan. Overall, this is an easy route, taking an average of 1.5 hours to complete. Many people walk and hike this trail, but there is still a great deal of quiet solitude, with no dogs permitted on the trail. Another advantage of this location is the Kalamazoo Nature Center nearby. (https://www.kalcounty.com/parks/krvt/)

For those who love to bike, there are two great options. First is the Kal-Haven Trail, an easy 34.3-mile bikeway (one way) connecting Kalamazoo with South Haven (Oshtemo) on Lake Michigan. On average, it takes over 10 hours to complete, yet it is a very popular trail for biking, including mountain bikes. Dogs are welcome as long as they are on a leash. (https://www.michigan.org/property/kal-haven-trail-state-park)

A second option is the 7.3-mile Portage Creek Bicentennial Trail which takes over 2 hours to complete. Again, this is considered an easy route for hiking and road biking. You will probably encounter others on this route as it popular birding. welcome and may be for Dogs are off-leash in some areas. is (https://portagemi.gov/facilities/facility/details/Portage-Creek-Bicentennial-Park-19)

The County Parks

The Kalamazoo County Government's website details the five county parks and their facilities: <u>https://www.kalcounty.com/parks/krvt/</u>. Starting just a few days prior to our Rally, the Kalamazoo (Area) Bike Week runs from the Saturday before Mother's Day through the next Saturday. Its purpose is to celebrate the many benefits and joys of bicycling in the Kalamazoo and surrounding area. Plus, May is National Bike Month! The 12th annual "KBW" will be May 13-20, 2023. This event is open to everyone and is hosted by Friends of Kalamazoo Valley River Trail and Friends of Kal-Haven Trail. The mission of these groups is to provide for the expansion and maintenance of the trails and continue programming, thereby attracting more people to take advantage of the regional resources. Another popular Kalamazoo county park with RV camping is Markin Glen County Park. Since we camped the first time here as part of an Airstream Joint Rally, we have returned several times, all with positive experiences. Although located in what looks like a residential area, you will be pleasantly surprised with the 38 sites, full hookups, and a small sand beach beside a lake with walking trails. Consider stopping here before or after the rally to take advantage of this beautiful camping location.



Markin Glen County Park was originally the estate of Morris Markin, the founder of Checker Motors Corporation of Kalamazoo. The Parks Foundation of Kalamazoo County was responsible for leading the fundraising drive that allowed the west side of Markin Glen to open as a county park in 1994 after the County acquired the property from the City of Kalamazoo.

Markin Glen features unique and beautiful natural features. From the top of one of the highest points in Kalamazoo, hikers can experience a scenic view of downtown. The park is also home to a wide variety of spring flowers and has a mature beech maple forest. The state-of-the-art campground was opened in 2004.

The Kalamazoo Nature Center is just up the road from Markin Glen County Park. The Kalamazoo Nature Center is a not-for-profit organization whose mission is to create relationships & experiences that welcome and inspire people to discover, enjoy, value, and care for nature. Over 14 miles of hiking trails wind through some of the most remarkable habitats in Michigan, so make sure to check out their list of activities and trails at https://naturecenter.org/visit/

The Museums

One of the most popular museums in the area, the Air Zoo Aerospace and Science Museum, 6151 Portage Road, Portage, Michigan, is a true gem! The Air Zoo was initially founded as the Kalamazoo Aviation History Museum. Still, today it is an aviation museum and indoor amusement park next to the Kalamazoo-Battle Creek International Airport in Portage, Michigan. The Air Zoo holds many historical and rare aircraft, including the world's fastest air-breathing aircraft, the SR-71B Blackbird.



Visitors can take advantage of various experiences at the Air Zoo, including flight simulators, indoor amusement park rides, the Missions Theater, and biplane rides. In addition, the Air Zoo boasts dozens of historical exhibits, including more about the history of Guadalcanal and space exploration.

Another great museum, The Kalamazoo Valley Museum, is located at 230 N Rose Street, Kalamazoo, and bills itself as a "hands-on" museum. Although aimed mainly at families, all ages will enjoy the exhibits focused on science, technology, and history. Kalamazoo Valley Community College operates the museum, and admission to the facility is <u>free</u>. Inside the museum is a planetarium along with changing and permanent exhibits. For Birders

If peace and quiet are what you are looking for, less than 15 miles from the Kalamazoo Expo Center is Michigan State's W.K. Kellogg Biological Station or Kellogg Bird Sanctuary for short--yes, the cereal people--with its three



miles of trails and numerous habitats surrounding Wintergreen Lake, the heart of the Sanctuary grounds. Visitors will see a variety of birds that call the Sanctuary home, including our resident waterfowl, gamebirds, and raptors. The Sanctuary is excellent for birding, nature photography, or simply enjoying a walk outside. No dogs permitted. The Sanctuary offers many different types of programming, and their calendar of events can be found here: <u>https://birdsanctuary.kbs.msu.edu/events-programs/</u> Admission is as follows: Adults (\$5), Senior Citizens (\$4) and Children, Ages 2-17, (\$3), and Children under Age 2 (Free).

Area Breweries

Many people may know Kalamazoo and the surrounding area as home to several excellent breweries. As described on the Discover Kalamazoo website, here are some of the suggested best Kalamazoo breweries you may want to try during our Rally:



<u>Bell's Brewing</u> is the oldest and most popular of Kalamazoo breweries, which has been serving up delicious beer since the 1980s.

<u>One Well Brewing</u> brings plenty of creativity and passion for quality brews to their business, which is reflected in their incredible range of beer and cider.

<u>Final Gravity Brewing Co</u>. is located on the Pedestrian portion of the Kalamazoo Mall and is a great place to sample their range of beer.

Brite Eyes Brewing Company, located in the Southtown neighborhood, features a great menu and huge windows that offer tons of natural light and great views.

Don't miss a chance to visit the <u>Kalamazoo Beer Exchange</u>. It's undoubtedly one of the most interesting Kalamazoo breweries and offers beer lovers an unforgettable experience, including food and games.

To sign up for the Wait List or Boondock Parking, go to <u>66th</u> <u>International Rally</u>.

If you are registered, here is some food for thought.

What's the rally schedule? A preliminary program can be found <u>here</u>.

When should I get there? Saturday, June 24, is the general parking day included with the base RV registration cost. You may choose to arrive up to three days before this general parking date for an additional \$50 per day beginning Wednesday, June 21. If you aren't sure when you want to arrive yet, you can register for the base rate and then fill out this form later if you decide to add any extra days.

When should I leave? The rally will go through Friday evening, June 30. Depark day is Saturday, July 1. However, the Sweetwater Events Complex (SEC) has arranged a <u>Stay and Play package</u> to allow you to stay parked (or move to a different spot at the SEC) for a reduced rate through July 16.

Caravan to the Rally? Groups with five or more rigs must register as a caravan to be parked together. To establish your group as a caravan, register your group by emailing <u>rally@airstreamclub.org</u>.

Pet Policies

This topic could have gone in the International section, but I chose to put it in the Tips and Tricks. There has been much discussion around pet policies with the IBT lately, and the following includes content provided by other IBT members in our conversation about this topic.

Jane and I are pet people and understand how pets are a part of the family. However, some people do not. We pet people need to be respectful of this perspective. The reality is that people have a range of emotions towards pets, from annoyance to fear. Even the most well-behaved pet is



unpredictable when placed in a crowded space with strangers and other pets. We have attended various events where pets were permitted to roam around the area, both inside and outside event spaces.

In case a member is asked to remove their service animal from meals or activities, they can affirm that it is a trained service animal and it performs a vital service related to a disability. There is no governmental agency that certifies a service animal. Still, a quick Google search shows many companies willing to provide "registration" for a fee but not requiring any testing to determine if the animal is trained to provide a service. "Emotional support pets" or "comfort aminals" are not currently recognized by the ADA because it has been determined that "providing comfort" is something an animal does "inherently." One region president was confronted with a situation where a member with a dog was wearing an "official" service animal jacket they purchased from Goodwill. There is no governmental agency that regulates or provides this attire. In the above link, two obvious questions can be asked: 1) Is the dog a service animal required because of a disability? and 2) What task has the dog been trained to perform? It is not worthwhile to ask for documentation that the animal is registered, licensed, or certified as a service animal since an agency does not regulate it. And it is not appropriate to ask the owner to have the dog demonstrate its task or ask about the nature of the owner's disability.

In the near future, Region 6 President, Larry Madden, will have an article in the *Blue Beret* about Pet Etiquette. I look forward to what he has to say. He is a big pet lover and recently lost his beloved pet.

A highlight of the Rally was an excursion on the Silver Bronco, a dome car on the Cuyahoga Valley Scenic Railroad (CVSR). The Silver Bronco was one of the six dome/sleeper/observation cars explicitly built for the famed California Zephyr, which operated as a passenger train between San Francisco and Chicago for 20



years. Its unique aluminum exterior made it an extra special attraction for Airstreamers, and we had the bonus of also using the Silver Solarium, a combination dome/observation car from the California Zephyr. Cucumber Sandwich

Ingredients

- □ 2 ounces cream cheese at room temperature
- □ 1 tablespoon low-fat plain Greek yogurt
- \Box 1 tablespoon sliced fresh chives
- □ 1 tablespoon chopped fresh dill
- \Box ¹/₄ teaspoon ground pepper
- □ 2 slices whole-wheat sandwich bread
- \Box ¹/₃ cup thinly sliced English cucumber

Directions



Stir cream cheese, yogurt, chives, dill, and pepper in a small bowl until well blended. Spread the mixture evenly on one side of each bread slice. Top one slice of bread with cucumber slices, then top with the other bread slice, cream cheese-side down. Cut the crusts from the sandwich and cut it in half diagonally.

- \Box ¹/₄ cup unsweetened shredded coconut



Directions

Combine oats, peanut butter (or other nut butter), honey, chocolate chips, and coconut in a medium bowl; stir well. Using a 1-tablespoon measure, roll the mixture into balls.

Tip: People with celiac disease or gluten sensitivity should use oats labeled "gluten-free," as oats are often crosscontaminated with wheat and barley.

To make ahead: Store in an airtight container for up to 5 days in the refrigerator or up to 3 months in the freezer.
