Suzanne's Sunshine Corner



Have you Tried Courtesy Parking?

When we bought our Globetrotter in 2019, the salesman told us about Courtesy Parking. We joined the WBCCI and got our book of Airstream owners offering courtesy parking.

Our first long trip was to Sister Bay, WI and we stopped for one night in Helena, Ohio. We didn't know what to expect and were happily surprised to meet Steve Ruth whose company buys old Airstreams and renovates them! He had dozens of Airstreams lined up in various states of customization and he showed us around his shop. As we were leaving in the morning, Steve shared info about an Airstream park in Melbourne FL, which came in handy when we went south. That same trip, we also courtesy parked in Woodstock, IL and London, Ontario.

In early April 2020, when Covid hit, we were camping in Plano, Texas and, with everything closed down, we wondered how we could get on the road for home. We called Airstreamers who offer courtesy parking and were welcomed to stay with them in Memphis, Louisville and Cleveland. Each generously offered electricity, water, conversation—at a safe distance, and one even gave us eggs from their chickens!

We have used courtesy parking many times in the last three years and we've met many welcoming, generous people. We try our best to be good ambassadors for The Finger Lakes, even bringing local chocolate or Finger Lakes wine as a small thank you.

For this year's big winter adventure, we left Nov 1 and our first stop was new NYFLAC members, Catherine and Jim Heffernan in Carlisle, PA. They offered us dinner and a lot of laughs!

From there, we visited Roger and Celeste Sansom in Eden, Maryland. They have a 34' Airstream and a Bambi and they meet up with the mid-Atlantic chapter for rallies. We rarely unhitch when we are only stopping to sleep, but we arrived mid-afternoon so Roger sent us to Bordeleau Vineyards around the corner where we had a delicious flight of red wines and a pizza! We slept next to Roger's barn and woke in the morning to chickens and goats roaming their pasture!

We attended the Carolina Airstream Club rally in Myrtle Beach with 62 Airstreams. As we chatted with people and told them how we had courtesy parked to get there, we found that no one had ever used courtesy parking!

On our way to our winter campground in Texas, we stopped at a courtesy parking host in Caryville, Florida and really enjoyed getting to know Geoff Dean, a retired mathematical engineering professor from Virginia Tech. He totally renovated a 1976 airstream that had been damaged and left in a field. He now lives in it full time and gave us a tour. We knew rain was on the way that night but, at 5:15 am, Geoff knocked on the door and said "Time to go, there's a tornado watch. Too many trees here, you need an open space." We were ready in 15 minutes and he led us to the interstate. After an hour of driving, the heavy rain and lightning started so we pulled off. We're pulling a 28' lightning rod, after all! We never saw a tornado, and thankfully neither did Geoff, but there were many around the southern coast that day.

After a day of storms and a flat tire, we had a good night's sleep in Lafayette, LA under the carport of an auto body shop. Our generous host, Terry McFillan, sent John to his "tire guy" in the morning and both the tire and the spare got new valve stems. John pulled out his wallet and the owner said no charge! He and Terry do a lot of business together and he was so happy to help us.

Airstream's courtesy parking program is such a gift. Everyone we've met has said they are in the courtesy parking book but they don't get visits. We can say through our experiences that you can meet wonderful people, just stopping in driveways for one night along the way from campsite to campsite!

The National Museum of Military Vehicles

As I've previously written, whenever there's space in The Grapevine I'll be sharing some of our "bucket list" Wyoming places to visit. I must be honest...we haven't visited this museum yet because it's so new, but our Wyoming friends can't say enough good about The National Museum of Military Vehicles located in Dubois, WY. The following is from their website at https://nmmv.org/

The award-winning National Museum of Military Vehicles is a world-class military history museum which opened southeast of Dubois, WY in August of 2020. Inside the 160,000 sq. foot Museum, visitors will find nearly 500 fully restored military vehicles, artillery pieces, naval vessels and aircraft dating from 1897 to the present with a current emphasis on the American experience in World War II, the Korean War, and the Vietnam War. The focus of the museum is to tell the stories of how these vehicles were used and to remember the valor of service members who fought, and sometimes died, in them. The museum also houses a large, historically significant, firearms collection. The privately funded \$100M museum was founded by Dan and Cynthia Starks. Dan Starks is a former attorney and former CEO of St. Jude Medical.

Dubois is 191 miles north of Rock Springs. The population hovers just over 900 so it's a small, western town. For more information on the area visit https://duboiswyoming.org/
