Old Highway 86 Campground (Blue Eye, MO)

We took our first out of state camping trip to an amazing campground in Southwest Missouri called Old Highway 86 Campground. It's located just south of Branson, off...you guessed it...Old Highway 86. Highway 86 was flooded when the White River was dammed by the completion of Table Rock Dam in 1958. The campground is on a peninsula that juts out into Table Rock Lake, and nearly every campsite has a view of the water. We spent the majority of our trip at site 38, which is an interior site, and enjoyed its proximity to the bath house (fully plumbed toilets and showers), the playground, and the designated swimming area. With a very active two-year-old staying right on the water wasn't an option, but we enjoyed a nice view of the lake and swam every day from the shore that was right across the street. The campground features 30 and 50 amp service and every site has freshwater hookups.

One of the great things about Table Rock Lake is that is it a rock bottom lake. Our kids where able to walk into the lake and swim without getting stuck in mud/sand...and they didn't track any sand into the camper when they were done swimming! There is world class bass fishing, as well, and for early risers the lake is wonderfully peaceful for early morning fishing by shore, or boat.

The last day of our trip we were finally brave enough dump our tanks for the first time (ever). It did not go well. Our black tank valve is leaky, or stuck partially open, because when I took the cap off there was, shall we say, leakage. Luckily the dump station at the campground wasn't busy and there was a high-power freshwater hose to clean up. We are now proud owners of a Valterra Twist on Waste Valve that should allow us to get set up to dump without spilling again. Another fun part of camping is the comradery you build with folks you don't know, and may never see again. I appreciate very much the fine gentleman who helped us at the dump station and seemingly didn't judge us for not knowing what we were doing.

With newly dumped tanks we threw all of our junk in the back of the pickup and moved the trailer down to site 25, which sits of the end of the peninsula and has an incredible view of the lake looking toward the dam and The Branson Belle paddle boat. We enjoyed smores, local friends who stopped by, and a restful evening (after Hudson was in bed) looking out at the water.

Blue River Dispersed Camping GPS: 39.758778, -106.134573

Elevation: 8317'

Just north of Silverthorne, CO on Highway 9.

Quiet campers, but some road noise.



After one night of free camping we stayed at Heaton Bay Campground which mainly has non-electric/non-sewer sites on Dillion Reservoir. With our solar panels and plenty of mountain sunshine powering the Basecamp is no problem. This is one of our favorite areas in the region - great biking, kayaking and hiking with many services, outlet shopping, concerts and great places to eat. The free camping was on the Blue River (third picture) and the concert was free at the Dillion Amphitheater on Dillion Reservoir (last photo).
