PAST PRESIDENTS' PERSPECTIVE JIM COCKE CAC President 2008 #4822



Hello Airstreamers,

I served as president of our local club in 2008. Debbie and I were fouryear members of Carolinas Unit of NC (now Carolinas Airstream Club) already and in our first year as full-time Airstreamers. We'd just quit our jobs, sold the house and contents, and moved into the Airstream. We were excited about life away from work, on the road, with each other. We had made the commitment to lead our local Airstream Club with two fantastic vice-presidents, Bob Clark and Linda Fishel.

While I was president of Carolinas, Debbie and I participated in the two-week Fly-Drive Alaska caravan. We returned from AK for the unit rally at Dan Nichols Park in Salisbury, then followed John Carriker out to the 2008 International Rally in Bozeman. Debbie and I, after the Bozeman rally, launched into the National Landmarks West Caravan. The only two local rallies we missed that year, August and September, were while we were still out west. We hustled back to North Carolina just in time for Raccoon Holler rally in October and, of course, for Ocean Lakes in November and the wonderful Christmas luncheon in December. A really busy year! We followed recommended best practices for local club leadership. Fortunately, this included recruiting strong leadership for numerous committees. Things can run so well when you have great people volunteering to help, and we developed closer bonds with the volunteer leadership. A great team effort resulted in our own local club flag. Rick Rorie volunteered to design this early in the year and by the Christmas luncheon we were selling the flags.

The international club was in turmoil in 2008 because of pressure on several fronts. Foremost among these was the "motorhome issue". Airstream Inc had announced they would no longer produce Class A motorhomes. This issue wasn't so much a hot button in our local club, fortunately. Airstream Inc was targeted by many members for their apparent failure to understand the club's needs. How could the manufacturer not realize the club needed continued production of Airstream motorhomes? Airstream Inc's patience inevitably wore thin with the strident assaults from membership. The club would need ten years to improve relations again and recover some of the former goodwill with Airstream Inc.

I was young and idealistic in 2008. Debbie and I did a lot of things online, as do many of you. My proposal to offer the monthly Tarheel Traveler newsletter on line was met with a lot of resistance and more than a little scorn. How would members without internet access obtain a copy? What would happen to the archival of the past newsletters? How could we keep it out of the hands of non-members? Our local club, it seems to me, has done a superb job maintaining inclusivity in this and other important facets.

Nowadays I find myself laughing at the differences fifteen years can bring. In 2008 we were pleased to report five or six new members a month. Currently the Carolinas Airstream Club often seems to celebrate five or six new members per week. Inevitably another change from fifteen years ago is the absence of so many friendly faces we knew so well. Some of you know who I mean when I mention, for example, the Ammons, Dixons, Heavners, Littles, Medlins, MacGills, Martins, Mosers, Overcashes, Plaxcos, Tysons, Yosts, and others. These all are very active members from Deb's and my early days in our local club. They all attended many rallies with us and had a big impact on us. We're grateful for the great example set by these members and for the relationships we are privileged to enjoy with members today.

Recording Memories

Recording memories of your Airstream travels is a great way to look back on some of the most memorable experiences, especially on a rainy day when you are waiting for your next big trip. Here are some tips on how to record the moments and how to take good pictures to highlight your trip.

Start with a good journal. If you prefer to journal by hand, you can order one from Etsy or Amazon



If you're more digitally inclined use some favorite apps such as "<u>Day One Journal</u>". A daily journal you can do online without having to have any cellular service. You can attach pictures as well as use voice memo. Also just using the Note app can be a quick easy way to journal and add in pictures from your phone.



Quick Guide for Taking Pictures on iPhone

1. Plan your shots around the best time of the day to shoot pictures, sunrise, or sunset.

Having a travel trailer gives you the opportunity to plan when you arrive at special spots and the proximity to the most scenic sights. Think about how the lighting will affect the scenery and add to the dramatic effects that your photos can capture.

2. ABC (Always Be Charging)

Keep your phone charged throughout the day either when in your vehicle or USB ports in the Airstream. Also, investing in a solar powered charger is always a good backup. **Pro Tip:** If you'll be away from power, use the iPhone's Low Power Mode to conserve power throughout the day. To do this, just ask Siri to "Turn on Low Power mode."

3. Talk to the Locals and the Rangers

This is the best way to find out where to take the best photos and also any history that might make your journaling even more colorful.

4. Get a Group Photo

Use the delayed photo feature on your phone or consider getting an iWatch. You can take photos by triggering them on your iWatch and you can also view the photo ahead of time.

Pro Tip: You could just prop your iPhone on a rock but it's much better to have a small lightweight tripod for your iPhone instead. I love the Ultrapod II + Studio Neat Glif. I've used nearly all the iPhone tripod solutions, and this is by far the best.

5. Adjust your Exposure

Sometimes a picture may appear too bright or dark on your iPhone screen. There are a couple of simple ways to make adjustments. Start by tapping the area of the screen that is most important. When you do this, the iPhone will focus and adjust exposure for the area you tapped.

Pro Tip: If you still want more control, touch-and-slide your finger up or down. This will brighten/darken your picture, so it looks exactly how you want it.
