

#### Mending the Broken Heart: A lesson in community

I tend to write about love and the heart a good deal. Probably because I worked for twenty-five years as a cardiovascular nurse clinician. And probably because my education and work as an integrative relationship psychotherapist informs me that feeling we are loved is the most important nourishment humans require from cradle to grave.

Dying of a broken heart is a documented phenomenon in scientific literature. For real. We are all aware that coronary heart disease is one of the top morbidities of the Western world. In my work at the hospital, I saw first-hand that, despite gallant efforts, people were still dying from heart attacks and heart-related illness too often. The causes of heart problems are not limited to common risk factors understood by most people. These risk factors include the use of tobacco products, uncontrolled high blood pressure, a lifestyle that doesn't include aerobic exercise at least five times a week, diabetes, elevated "bad" cholesterol, stress and others. But what of the emotional situations that can negatively impact heart health and the risk factors associated with heart disease mentioned above? And what can we do to mitigate the adverse emotional impact to our heart health? Our Airstream community can be a salve with hidden healing properties.

Some years ago, I had the pleasure of hearing Dr. James Lynch, PhD, lecture on the noteworthy topic of the many medical infirmities created by loneliness and isolation. Lynch, a psychologist, researcher and author, is considered a pioneer on the topic of the health implications of loneliness and social isolation. Lynch has authored three books on the subject: "The Broken Heart: The Medical Consequences of loneliness (1976), The Language of the Heart: The Human Body in Dialogue (1985) and A Cry Unheard: New insights into the Medical Consequences of Loneliness (2000).

Lynch made his discoveries as a byproduct of research he was doing in the 1960's at Johns Hopkins University. The researchers were attempting to create elevated blood pressures in canines in order to develop medications to treat hypertension in humans. By accident he discovered that interactions with humans, namely petting the dogs, dropped the blood pressure in the animal by up to 50%.

From there he went on to ask the question: "If humans can affect the cardiovascular system of animals, can humans affect humans in similar ways?"

What was found was that even the most transient episodes of human touch positively changed blood pressure and heart rate. Even when a nurse touched a patient's wrist to count the pulse the cardiovascular system responded in a favorable manner.

From here the question was asked, "If these temporary periods of contact had such a positive effect on the human heart, how does the absence of contact and isolation over time influence heart and vascular health"?

The world has just been through the most catastrophic pandemic in over 100 years. We all experienced an abrupt change in our ability to gather socially. Whether a person believes the changes were necessary is not the focus of this

article. Rather, it's to understand more fully how all types of isolation and loneliness are bad actors when it comes to our heart health and how our Airstream community plays an important role in reducing feelings of separation and disconnection. And in turn, how being involved with rallies and caravans promotes better heart health, reduces stress and leads to a more satisfied life.

Early on in Lynch's research studies something interesting was discovered: when people speak, blood pressure risesacross the board-and nothing brings it down. The only outlier to this was in the presence of schizophrenia. It is a normal part of physiology that talking produces a stress response in the body. Of course, the topic one speaks about has a direct correlation to the degree of rise in blood pressure. The research also revealed when people listen, blood pressure falls. What's more, the data showed that when the research participants reported they felt affirmed or "heard" by the listener, blood pressure fell the very most.

The end result is that Lynch and his colleagues proved through clinical research over an extended period of time that communication from the body-meaning face-to-face interactions, significantly decreased risk factors for coronary artery disease.

Stress and stress-related illness is now one of the top five most common infirmities in the world as reported by the World health Organization. Stress is a major component of worsening cholesterol levels and high blood sugar levels. High blood sugar requires the hormone insulin to be released either via the pancreas or by external methods. Increased insulin levels, in turn, increases tummy fat. Increased abdominal girth plus other factors like high blood pressure and stress are a bad combination. Ultimately what we see here is what is known as "metabolic syndrome"-one of the highest predictors of heart disease. Social companionship dramatically reduces stress and, in turn, the physiological affects like those mentioned above, without pills or therapy sessions. The mere act of talking, listening and validating our comrade improves both emotional and physical health.

Airstream founder Wally Byam understood the incredible social value of belonging to a community when he and others launched the novel idea to caravan together in their Airstream trailers. What he probably didn't realize was how club life would enhance and improve one's physical health. Today we find ourselves in an era where in-person gatherings and communication is being eclipsed by texting, social media and video. Speaking as a relationship therapist, I wonder if these technologies are creating a society that fails to see the importance of community, fellowship and lacks the talent of being together.

I hope this article motivates the reader to attend as many state and international rallies as possible. Together we share a passion for Airstream life. Within this passion we meet others who, though differently nuanced, carry stories similar to our own. It's the commonalities between us that allow us to listen with rapture and invest in alliances and fellowship that's long-lived. Besides an opportunity to make friends and build a strong sense of belonging, we can now claim that attending rallies is a therapeutic tool to combat stress and heart disease!
